

He wat ched the operation of the line and provided the power, and his plan was to urge the use of the heaviest en-gines where traffic was heaviest in order to reduce the train movements making it obligatory on the Mainten ance of Way forces to keep the track to the standard required. The heavy engines went on and the tracks were naintained.

The new C. N. R. official had also definite idea as to what a real eagine on a real railway ought to be The C. N. R. standard, or 100%, locomotive, was of 23,000 pounds drawbar pull, as against the C. P. R's 20,000 standard, which shows that the new road was nothing if not ambitious. Mr. Hungerford considered that in the light of the rapid development of locomotives these engines vere too puny to be clas ed as 100%. so he, as it were, "hitched his chariot to a star" by adopting for the C. N. R. 100,000 pounds drawbar pull as the requirement for a locomotive ranking 100% on that road. This is probably the highest standard adopted by any line. The C. N. R. had at that time no engines rating higher then 35% on its new rating, and has not even now any that go as high as 100%, but they have engines that have a drawbar pull of 65,000 pounds, which gives them a percentage of sixty five. This rating means that for each 1% there is 1,000 pounds of drawbar pull or tractive energy delivered by the locomotive to the

At the end of five years, the Mechanical Department of Western Lines of the Canadian Northern Railway was in first class shape, and S. J. Hungerford's jurisdiction was extended over the Eastern lines of the System in May, 1215. For two years and a half he was Superintendent of Rolling Stock for the System at Toronto, having wider jurisdiction than that of the General Managers, but he built up no departmental walls.
Although always a Mechanical Department officer, he was bigger than its limits would have made him, and always realized that engines and always realized that engines and cars belonged to the Railway and not to the Mechanical Department, and that the good of the Railway as a whole was also the good of any department in it. So he set about the business of standardization of shop practices and of the distribution of rolling stock throughout the Sys-



NEW YORK, Oct. 27—For reasons that have not been satisfactorily expained the betting on the results of Tuesday's election appears to be very mall in comparison with the amount wagered here in previous presidential contests. Brokers in the Wall street district who make a practice of plac-ing bets on a commission basis are complaining that they never did so little business in wagers on a national election. Elections In All the States

The quadrennial general election to e held Tuesday will, of course, emrace all of the States so far as the voting for President and Vice President is concerned. In addition there will be election of state officers, judges of supreme court, railroad commissioners, etc., in all of the States with the exception of Maine, which State elected its State officers and representatives in Congress last

In thirty five of the States Gover-nors and full State tickets are to be chosen. In others the election will be confined to justices of the supreme court and minor officials. The States in which Governors are to be chosen are as follows:

Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Conecticut, Deleware, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, / Illinois, Indianna, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minhesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Washngton, West Virginia and Wisconsin

While the prohibition and woman suffrage issues, which have been voted on in a considerable number of States for years by their absence, here are numerous other proposed constitutional amendments and ques-ions of various kinds to be submitted o the voters in the different States n one or two of the States the votrs are to be given an opportunity to express themselves for or against an entire revision of their State constitutions. In other of the States the questions to be submitted to the voters will deal largely with such maters as the extension of educational facilities, changes in the methods of taxation, irrigat in and drainage projects, highway improvement, and various projects for internal develop-ment. The most of these will be of local interest, but a notable excep tion will be the vote in California on the proposed anti-Japanese land law, the result of which will be of more than national interest.

The Sixty-Seventh Congress, com rising 435 representatives, will be elected. The possibility of a change in the dominant party in the house lends interest to the congressiona elections. The present Republican majority in the House is forty-six.
The active fight of the Socialists and ther minor parties to defeat some of the present representatives who are candidates for re-election and to elect ome of their own representatives is attracting attention.

DISTRESS IN EUROPE

British Empire Effort to Help Smaller Nations

dian Red Cross to Organize Appeal on Behalf of Orphans-Call to Be Made In Armistice

An urgent appeal for aid to combat the widespread disease and distress in the war-stricken areas in Europe has been made by the League of Red Cross Societies to the nations which have suffered least from the war. In response a War Relief Fund has been undertaken in Great Britain with an Empire-wide appeal for contributions. The Fund is under the immediate patronage of His Majesty the King and has the support of all parts of the Empire.

His Excellency, the Governor-General of Canada, having received communications from London upon this matter, consulted the Prime Minister, and with his approval referred the question to the Canadian Red Cross Society, and it was arranged for an appeal to be made in Canada during Armistice week in November. The Fund will be known as "The British Empire War Relief Fund."

To Make Known the Need.

The Canadian Red Cross Society accepted the task of making this ap-peal known throughout Canada only in view of the relentless circum-stances and the humane desire to help to alleviate the terrible suffering help to alleviate the terrible surering of a large number of peoples. The reasons are numerous and compelling. Large populations are suffering from distress and disease. Millions of innocent children are among them. Even in time of peace great numbers of their people lived close to the bread line. The war drained them of all their surplus resources

Through the years of strife they were denied all but the barest necessities, and their condition now is pitiful indeed. History has repeated itself. The diseases which took such fearful toil of human life after the Thirty Years' War, the Seven Years' War (1757-65), and the Napoleonic Wars are again widespread, and now there are millions of people in Galicia, Poland, Jugo-Slavia and Roumania who, in addition to being pov mania who, in addition to being poverty stricken, are in the direasemisery and despair on account of disease. In some twelve countries, most of which were either our Allies or friendly to the Allied cause, modern civilization is faced with the inevitable consequences of a great war through partial famine and pestioners.

A Previous Epidemic. That the epidemic is now one of

That the epigemic is now one or alarming proportions and terrible in its effect may be noted from the following quotation from "The Times":

"At present the worst results of typhus are confined to Galicia, where the schools are closed, business is at a standstill, and civic life is crippled. the schools are closed, business is at a standstill, and civic life is crippled. The whole community is faced with starvation, whilst the absence of clothing and drugs makes it impossible for the authorities to make any headway against the epidemic. Here we have a country into which the idea of modern sanitation has never penetrated; for the most part there is no water supply in the smaller towns and villages save wells, whilst the work of sewers is done by open guilles running through the streets. There are no doctors, no nurses, and no beds, and the miserable typhusstricken patients lie unattended on the bare floor. Throughout the rural districts whole families exist in miserable one-roomed huts, their diet consisting of starvation rations of potatoes and beet, both bread and meat being luxuries rarely seen. In almost every hut there are several cases of typhus and in many instances whole families are stricken with the disease, and are perforce left to die unattended."

Many Countries Are Suffering.

What is said of Galicia is true of other countries of Europe, guch as Esthonia, Lithuania, Lativia, huge territories of the Ukraine, Soviet Russia, Jugo-Slavia and Czecho-Slovakia. Nor is typhus the only affliction. Tuberculosia, smallpox, dysentery and relapsing fever are also ravaging.

These terrible conditions have been called to the attention of the people of the British Empire in a statement by the Right Hon, Arthur J. Balfour, who, speaking for the Council of the League of Nations, says:

"Men, women and children are dying by thousands, and over vast and civilised areas there are neither medical appliances nor medical skill-sufficient to cope with the horrors by which we are faced. Governments have in certain cases done all in their power to bring relief, but there remains a vast field for charitable enterprise which can be fiealt with only by voluntary effort."

NO. II-THE HARP

The name "Harp" is attached to se ments are plucked strings that it is advisable to mention some. The Irish harp is an instrument of the lyre family but having more strings and and to accompany another instrument. The harplute was an instru-ment of the guitar kind and an improvement was made by Edward Light, who produced this instrument with 12 gut strings, the finger-board having frets on it and a thumb key was fitted to each string, this key when depressed was to adjust the pitch similar to the modern harp and its pedals.

The harp is one of the most ancient and universal of stringed instruments, and possessed a larger number of strings than the lyre. The trings were plucked with the fingers The triangular form of the pre ent harp is very similar to that of the Egyptian and Assyrian harps depicted on the ancient monuments. The shape gives to us the idea of it

The real modern harp has a double action invented by Sebastian Erard hou: 1810. The modern harp is a graceful orchestral instrument pos essing a triangular outline. It has straight slendor pillar, a slanting ounding box and a carved neck conrecting the two, both pillar and sounding box rise from a circular ase in which eight nedals are aranged in a semi-circle, the compass of this instrument is over six octaves there is a limit to the technique on this instrument as the scales or passages of a chromatic order are alsages of a chromatic order are almost impossible and even when practicable is ineffective. Each lever or pedal controls two sets of discs from each disc project two pins, the strings pass between the pins, but in press ng the pedal half way down, presses he pin against the string, thereby chortening it or making it one semi one higher, by pressing the pedal entirely down presses the second pin against the string shortening it yet another semitone. The seven pedals effect the strings but the eight govern the damper. The voice harp possesses great sweetness, as the strings are not plucked sharp ly, but gives a sweeping motion, producing a stately effect.

Find Substitute For Spruce Pulp

"It has become axiomic in the paper industry that there are no substitutes for spruce wood in making paper pulp," writes Harry A. Mount, in Popular Mechanics. "Thou-sands of dollars have been spent by manufacturers in an effort to find ome material to replace the rapidly diminishing supply of spruce with-ut result. And so they have receiv-ed with a great deal of skepticism he recent announcement that a satisfactory paper can be made from the sea grass of Florida, and that a practical method of production has been developed. Recently a com-pany has been organized, however, and plans are going forward for build-ing a pulp mill with an initial capacity of 25 tons per day in the sea

"Engineers connected with the enterprise say that a preliminary survey reveals that there is in Florida nearly 6,000,000 acres of sea grass.
his can be harvested twice a year 'elding 20 tons of paper per acre to each cutting. It would seem, there-fore, that Florida might eventually urnish paper to the whole world, for t is claimed all grades of the commodity, from building papers and ardboard to the finest writing papers and vellums, can be made from

he grass.
"It is not surprising in the light of past experiments, that relief to the present paper situation should come from such a source. Fibre suitable for paper making should come from such a source. Fibre suitable for aper making has been produced from a number of plants, among them corn and cottan stalks. The pulp from these sources has been made only on a laboratory scale, nowever, because two chief difficul-ties stood in the way of commerial exploitation of the process. In the first place there is not a suffiient supply of any one material, nd it is too expensive to gather corn or cotton stalks from a wide area The second, and perhaps the most important, difficulty is that, because he material is not compact, only a pulp 'digester' at one time, making he production very expensive."

Fisheries Production Of Canada

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics ave issued a preliminary statemen of the Fisheries Production of Canada for the year 1919 prepared from the compilation of returns collected the Bureau in co-operation with the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The total alue of fish marketed fresh fish products is given as \$56,485,579 compared with a value of decreases both in value marketed and quantity caught. The catch of haddock, half but and cod was greater in 1919 than in 1918, while the value marketed was less. Salmon, lobsters and mac kerel showed increases both in quan tity caught in value marketed. Bri tish Columbia fisheries had a value of \$25,301,607, which is a decrease from 1918 of nearly two million dcl-lars. Nova Scotia fisheries were valued at \$15,171,929, a slight increase over 1918. Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta showed increases in value, while New Brunswick, Quebec, Man-

itoba and Yukon showed decreases. Of the principal fish products, can-ned salmon is given at 1,394,215 cases, valued at \$13,342,140 in 1919, slight decrease both in quantity and value from 1918. Canned lobsters were reported at 128,759 cases valued at \$4,095,934 in 1919, compared with 107,812 cases valued at \$2,254,690 in 1918. The quantity of canned sar dines was 119,225 cases valued at \$593,811 in 1919, compared with 177, 193 cases valued at \$1,227,988 in 1918 Increases in quantity and market value are noted in dried cod and salted mackerel, and decreases in green salted cod and pickled herring Of fish marketed for consumption frech, the principal varieties in point of value were halibut, 240,728 cwt. valued at \$5,114,416; salmon, 460,413 valued at \$3,824,158; whitefish. 196,953 cwt., valued at \$1,845,854; lobsters, 85,340 cwt., valued at \$1. 224,882. Other varieties which show ed large quantities marketed for consumption fresh were mackerel, her-ring, cod, smelts, trout and haddock.

Exhibition of Ranch **Bred Silver Foxes**

An unique exhibition under the immediate management of the Commission of Conservation of Canada will be held in Montreal on November 24th, 25th, and 26th. It will be the first international exhibition of ranchbred live silver foxes. Fur-farming is rapidly becoming a scientific branch of animal husbandry and, although little more than a decade old, is one of Canada's most flourish-

ing infant industries. While the greater number of Can adian fox ranchers are to be found in the Maritime Provinces and chie...y in Prince Edward there are many in each of the other provinces and the number is steadily increasing. The interest evinced in Quebec, Ontario and Western Canada generally demonstrates that many Canadians are desirous of barking in the fur-farming of mink, beaver, fisher, marten and other fur

bearers. Present advices indicate that fully 150 animals will be brought from Prince Edward Island alone. It is confidently expected that other provinces will send an equally large number in proportion to the number of their fur-farmers and many enquirles have been received from the United States. The Secretary of the exhibition is Mr. F. C. Nunnick, Comnission of Conservation, Ottawa.

A healthy growth of the industry should do much to check the rapid depletion of wild fur-bearing animals and to steady unstable conditions in the large fur markets. It is confidently expected that the exhibition at Montreal will result in the forma-ion of a Fur Breaders' Association of Canada, which can do much to es tablish and keep accurate breeding records of pedigreed fox stock and, in general, advance the interests of the industry.
