Rome, Nov. 8 .- It is two yearago since Pius X, issued his now celebrated Motu Proprio on the reform of Church music-and it is only this week that the Vatican Printing Press ibas issued the first instalment of the official edition in Plain Chant which is benceforth to be used throughout the whole

Charch. Now that the edition is well under way, Vex Urbis may safely say something about the diffi culties which almost wrecked one of the great enterprises with which the Pontificate of Pins X is destined to go down to history.

When the Mota Proprio speared, some wiseacres in and out of Rome ascribed the real authorship of it to the Maestro Percei, or Father de





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
