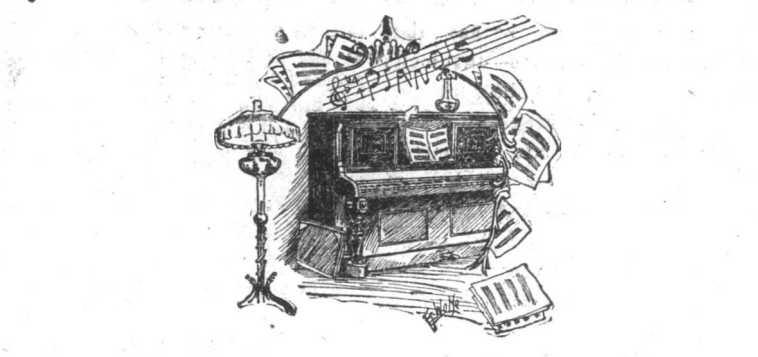

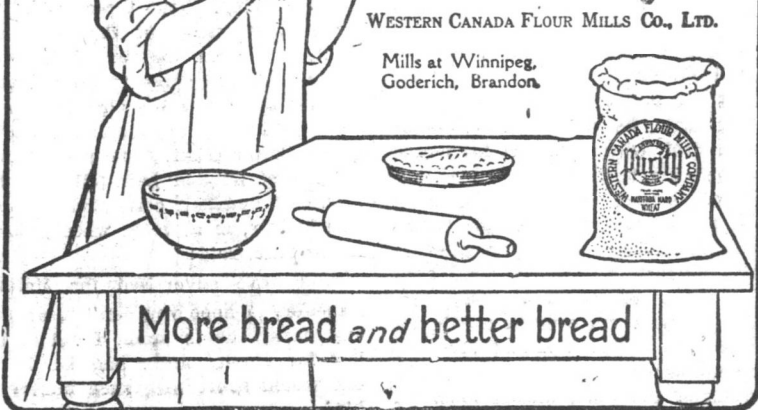

about this gentleman beggar that bleeds you of half-crowns—that melts the heart even of a pawnbroker!"

"Well, then, that beggar is the illegitimate son of the late Marquis of Hoopborough by a Spanish lady of rank. He received a first rate education, and was brought up in his father's house. At a very early age he obtained an appointment in a public office, was presented by the marquis at court, and received into the first society, where his handsome person and agreeable manners made him a great favorite. Soon after coming of age, he married the daughter of Sir E. Bumper, who brought him a very handsome fortune, which was strictly settled on herself. They lived in splendid style, kept several carriages, a house in town, and a place in the country. "Then, sir, I am Molinos Fitz-Roy!"

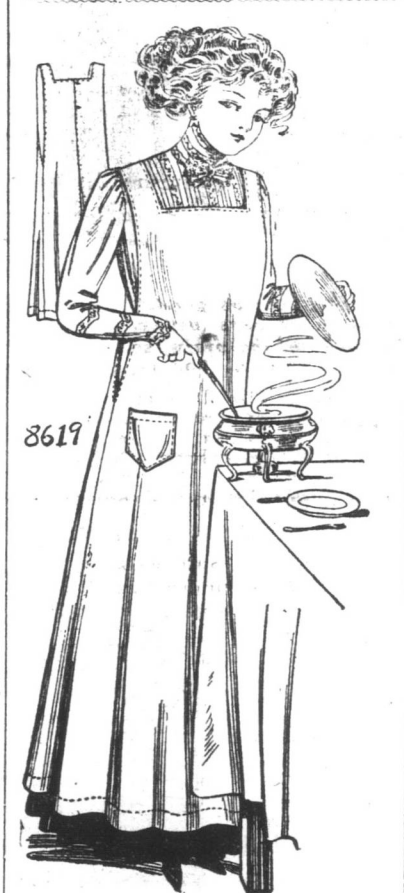

Will Toast King in Ginger Ale.

London's Lord Mayor-elect, Sir Vezev Strong, is the first "teetotal" Chief Magistrate in the 700 years' history of his office.

His anti-alcoholic prejudice naturally raises interesting questions in connection with the lavish entertainment that is obligatory upon every Lord Mayor—and it is distinctly convivial entertaining, too. At the innumerable banquets at which the Lord Mayor presides, the health of the King is invariably honored—usually in champagne—even if there are no other toasts.

Fortunately for Sir Vezev Strong, the late King Edward issued an official permit for his health to be drunk at public banquets in "soft drinks" and his successor, George V., has "O. K.'d" this indulgence. So like the German Emperor, who, although not a teetotaler, finds it prudent to take only soft drinks at banquets, the Lord Mayor will honor the toast of "The King" in ginger ale.

It has been settled also that Sir Vezev, unlike some of his predecessors, is a stalwart conservative in religious matters, and his assurance was secured in a quaint ceremonial traditionally associated with the function.

Sir Vezev Strong was called upon to answer a series of questions regarding religion before he was elected "a fit and able person to be Lord Mayor of his city for the year ensuing."

When the Common Crier directed "all persons to be uncovered in this hall" and ordered "all those who are not liverymen to depart the hall on pain of imprisonment." Sir Robert Rogers, a Common Councillor, rose from the ranks of the liverymen and said that this time last year he put some questions to the Lord Mayor as to attendance at St. Paul's Cathedral and other places of worship, according to custom.

"His Lordship refused to attend St. Paul's Cathedral and similar churches," he said, "except at the command of the sovereign. While refusing to do so, he did in full civic state attend Roman Catholic places of worship. That fact has given great pain and dissatisfaction to liverymen and citizens generally."

"In these days of too readily surrendering great and valuable principles by compromises and evasions, it is quite time that the liverymen and citizens spoke out in clear and unmistakable terms.

"While not limiting religious freedom in any degree we must take care that we appoint to the high office of Lord Mayor only a man who will bear in mind that we are a Protestant nation. We must insist on the Lord Mayor acting in accord with the practices of so many centuries."

Sir Robert then questioned Sir Vezev Strong.

"Are you a member of the Protestant faith?" he asked.

"I am," replied Sir Vezev.

"If elected, will you undertake to attend St. Paul's Cathedral and other churches on ceremonial occasions, according to the ancient custom?"

"I will."

"And will you, if elected, abstain from attending in state places of worship unconnected with the Protestant faith?"

"I will not."

Sir Vezev explained that it was quite conceivable that during the year of office of any occupant of the chair, a foreign King might die, and a service at the embassy in London of the country of that King might be held, at which it might be thought proper that the Lord Mayor should attend.

"I would unhesitatingly attend such a service," Sir Vezev added. "I desire, if elected, to be a servant of all and exclude none, and I will not allow religious beliefs to make the least possible difference in placing my services at your disposal."

"If other circumstances rendered attendance desirable, I would attend any service, from one in a Roman Catholic Cathedral to one in the barracks of the Salvation Army."

BOVRIL.

Report of the Feeding Experiments Made in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin:—The preliminary announcement of the results of the experiments conducted at the request of the Local Government Board for Ireland during the past year, in the School of Physiology, Trinity College, Dublin, as to the nutritive value of Bovril, and compared to the British Association at Sheffield ("Times" report, September 3), has created considerable interest amongst the Medical Profession. In order to secure a decisive test, dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Bovril—from 2 1/2 to 7 1/2 grammes—was then added to the food, with the result that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or, in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given. Afterwards Bovril was discontinued, and the animals fell back to the original weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white of egg, it was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 2 1/2 to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect. In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen, and in all an increased utilization of other foods. It was therefore concluded that Bovril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter by causing a more complete digestion and absorption of the other food given.

They report progress, and their verdict as to conditions for construction on the Arctic line is being awaited with a great deal of interest at Ottawa. Engineer Clifford says that except for a few encounters with blowing winds, which occasionally churned the water about his canoe a bit, his job in the north was the best ever. He claims to know all the ups and downs of one-half the road from the Pas to Nelson River. He says it will be smooth going; in fact, there are but few points on the whole section on which we covered where it will be at all necessary to make unreasonable curves in the line in order to secure solid foundation. He adds also that \$200,000 in bridge construction can be saved as a result of his investigation. There is news for the farmer and the summer tourist in Mr. Clifford's resume of his survey experiences. He tells of hundreds of acres of clay soil along the route which will put dollars into the pocket of the chap who is looking for a clean-up in real estate. Sturgeon, whitefish, and salmon are plentiful.

Unexampled Depravity

A few weeks ago the police brought to a successful completion a case which during the summer and fall months completely baffled them. It appears that a young woman residing on the higher levels, and of a very respectable family, received almost weekly anonymous letters assailing her character and couched in the most offensive and objectionable terms. She apparently was greatly exercised over them and showed some of them to a clergyman of the denomination to which she belonged. Eventually so annoying did the constant reception of the epistles become that the aid of the police was invoked. If possible, detect the writer. The recipient strongly suspected a young lady, a friend of hers, and samples of her handwriting being procured and compared with the scurrilous missives, there seemed to be great similarity in the chirography. After a while the young lady in question was taxed with the nefarious work but presented her innocence, so the clergyman and a member of the police force, but appearance were so much against her that neither could believe her; and so exercised was she over the matter that she determined to go to Trinity and reside with a friend. This she did, but still the letters came to the other, who hinted that the suspected one had not gone to Trinity but was in hiding in St. John's. A message

was then sent by the police to Sergt. Ryan at Trinity asking him to personally see and speak to the young woman if she was there and advise the sender of the telegram. The young woman was found, the police were advised by the sergeant, and this seemed to render the affair more complex, as the letters still came. Suddenly they ceased, and then a suspicion crossed the mind of the officer in charge of the case and he came to the conclusion that the recipient of the letters was also the writer of them. He secured several samples of her writing, found that she was intimately acquainted with that of the girl who was blamed, and eventually putting a bold front on the matter threatened to arrest the young woman who had been receiving the letters. She then said she would get a lawyer and want to a well known legal man. The lawyer seeing the samples of the writing observed that the letters she had been receiving in some respects appeared as if they had been written by herself. He told her she could be severely prosecuted, if she was the author of the letters and refused to take the matter up for her. She then broke down and confessed that she had been writing epistles all the time to herself, that she had carefully copied the suspected girl's style and reside with a friend. STRENUOUS FIGHT.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Dec. 5. The result of to-day's polling in the Parliamentary elections opened with more spirit and under more improved weather conditions. The closeness of the results, already announced, brought out a greater number of voters and workers to-day. In some divisions voters, who had removed since the last register was made up, spent the night in their old constituencies in order to vote early and get back to their work. The rush at many booths was great. Interest centred largely in the 17 contests in London boroughs. Of these seats 9 voted Unionist and 8 Liberal last January. The Liberal seats are quite safe, being held by large majorities. The Liberals have a hard fight to hold their own, notably in East Finsbury, the four divisions of Islington and in the east division of East St. Pancras, where Joseph Martin former Premier of British Columbia, has a woman suffrage as well as a Unionist candidate against him; and in West St. Pancras where Sir Wm. Collins, Liberal, won R. E. Michinson, Unionist in the last election; The Unionists are also making a great fight in Liverpool and expect to win the only Liberal seat there, that of the Exchange Division. They have no hope, however, of defeating T. P. O'Connor, who has a stronghold on the Scotland Division. Most of the other seats polling to-day are held by good majorities by the sitting members. In some parts of the country, particularly in Huntingdonshire, floods are interfering seriously with the campaign and many planned meetings have been abandoned. The two seats in Huntingdonshire are held by Unionists, it having been carried at the last election by majorities of about 100 each.

ever, that the Liberals lost at the January elections a large number of seats through three cornered contests. Such contests are largely eliminated in the present elections, and this may give the Liberals sufficient gains to balance those of the Unionists. On the whole it seems likely that the new House of Commons will meet with the position of the parties practically unchanged. The question will then arise whether the King will feel justified in giving guarantees for the Liberal Peers to force the Veto Bill through the House of Lords. The Unionist rally in Lancashire has been maintained, and the Liberal hope of winning two seats at Preston disappointed, but what the Liberals lost in Lancashire was compensated for elsewhere. The campaign led by the Unionist orator, F. E. Smith, had the result of greatly improving the Unionist position. The Unionists gained the seat for the Exchange Division of Liverpool as well as for Birkenhead. In the latter case the Liberal defeat was attributed to the recent absence of H. V. V. on the Free Trade mission in Canada. The two seats the Liberals lost in London to-day, Islington North, and St. Pancras West, were held by very small majorities in the previous Parliament. Apparently, therefore, the Metropolitan is much the same as January in its attitude towards the contending parties. Perhaps rather significant are some of the Liberal gains, such as Wakefield, a Cathedral city, which has been represented by a Unionist for 3 years, and Cheltenham, another Tory stronghold, and residential city, largely composed of retired officers. It is also notable that in the County Borough of Windsor the Liberals succeeded in reducing the Unionist majority. These signs of the conversion of the traditionally Conservative middle class may be an indication of a similar change in the country agricultural districts which are almost entirely Unionist in January. London to-night is displaying such enthusiasm, and the successful candidates are being brought in processions through the streets with torchlights. As the returns come in showing the closeness of the contest interest is greatly increased, and vast crowds gathered in Fleet Street, Trafalgar Square and other places where the results were shown, cheering and booing according to their political affiliations. There were similar scenes in Liverpool, Leeds and other towns where elections were held. The weather improved greatly during the afternoon and evening so that the crowds were enabled to watch the returns without discomfort. Political clubs were filled with members. At the Carlton and other Unionist gathering places much disappointment was expressed at the smallness of the gains which were predicted. The Liberal quarters the greatest enthusiasm prevailed as was predicted even amongst the staunchest supporters of the Government that the Unionists would make a net gain of 8 seats in to-day's pollings. Among the members returned unopposed is Alderman Daniel Boyle for North Mary. Boyle won this seat last January by only 40 votes, and his unopposed return is now attributed to appreciation of the services in accompanying John E. Redmond on his recent visit to America. Mr. Redmond to-night issued a public denial of the allegation made by a Conservative candidate that Redmond in a speech repudiated allegiance to the King.

ALLIES HAVE MAJORITY OF ONE SO FAR.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Dec. 5. Another batch of unopposed returns in the parliamentary elections to-day made the state of the parties early this afternoon as follows:—Government coalition, Liberals, 16; Laborites, 8; Irish Nationalists, 7; Total 31. Opposition Unionists, 78. To-day's unopposed returns show no changes in the political representation of the seats. There was polling to-day in 65 constituencies returning 25 members of the old Parliament. The Unionists had 35 of these seats, the Liberals 23, Laborites 6 and the Nationalists 1. The fight was renewed with more energy this week following the close results of Saturday, as a consequence a heavy vote generally was recorded. A rush of Nationalist members returned unopposed this afternoon again makes the coalition of group or People's Party, as some Liberal papers prefer to call it, on a numerical equality with the Unionists. This gave each of the opposing groups 61 seats in Parliament. At 3.20 o'clock this afternoon the state of the parties was as follows:—Government coalition, Liberals, 58; Irish Nationalists, 15; Laborites, 8; Total 81. Opposition Unionists, 81. The Stock Exchange which had anticipated big Unionist gains was affected adversely by the result of such pollings. The price of consols and home rails were depressed throughout the day. The position of the parties to-night after the second day's polling in the General Election is as follows:—Government coalition, Liberals, 87; Laborites, 14; Nationalists, 16—117. Opposition Unionists, 116. The result to-day merely confirms the opinion, formed from the results of Saturday's contest, that the Unionists now have no possible hope of replacing the Liberal Government in power, the only question remaining is whether the Liberals will return with a larger or smaller majority. To gain a bare majority in the new parliament, the Unionists must make a net gain of 62 seats; they have gained 11 and the Liberals 6 seats. The gain for the Unionists on Saturday was 7, while the Liberals gained 4; to-day the Unionists gained 4 and the Liberals 2 seats. A continuation of this rate of progress would fill the Unionist prediction that the Asquith Cabinet would come back with a greatly weakened majority, and would be even more than ever dependent upon the Irish and Laborites. It must be remembered, how-

Wrestling Match.

Martin Rock and Young Olson had a wrestling match in the British Hall last night. More people went to see them than was expected, in consequence there were some disgraceful rows over the ownership of seats, the policemen present being powerless in their attempts to keep order. There were probably 1,000 looking for 500 seats. Many of those who were unable to get them stuffed into smash up the chairs deliberately, showing that there is a good deal of the savage yet running in man, and all is required is some such occasion as this to bring it to the front. Goodland and O'Keefe, two local amateurs, came on the mat first and gave a good exhibition of wrestling. Then the big event of the night, the wrestling match between Olson and Rock, took place. It was set down as a wrestle to a finish. The end came so soon that some of the spectators had a feeling that they were not getting the worth of their money. Olson seemed to do his work with an ease and celerity that deprived the spectators of the excitement and tension of feeling that they had hoped for. Olson put Rock's shoulders to the mat apparently without exerting half his strength. On doing this the second time a dispute arose as to whether his shoulders had touched the mat. This riled Olson and going at it again he put Rock down like a mother would put her baby in the cradle. The trick was done in seven seconds. When this was over Olson felt like Chanticleer on the ridge pole of the barn, and in the warmth of his triumph sent forth a challenge to Otto Oppelt at fifty weight up to 155 lbs. with any referee. The sporting people of the town are all discussing the question to-day and wondering whether Mr. Oppelt, the Achilles of sport, will remain in his tent any longer. Although the spectators did not get as long a programme as they expected last night, and were obliged to throw in a little excitement themselves by breaking up the chairs, still nearly all have a good word for Olson, who did his work faithfully. We must not forget to give due credit to Mr. Rock for he took his defeat in a true sportsmanlike manner. He would no doubt give a good account of himself against a man of his own class. Olson being much too strong for him.

Trinity Spur Line

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Residents of Trinity are congratulating themselves that "Elector" who wrote in your issue of the 22nd is an outsider.

We should be sorry to learn that a resident in "Ye ancient and loyal town" (the black type is mine) could be guilty of such a misleading and impertinent effusion.

"Elector" was not content to advance some of his (?) shadow arguments against the building of the Spur Line, but he must needs let loose some of his vitriolic sarcasm on the "village" and the population, as compared with other villages with which he is apparently more familiar.

Trinity, it is true, can boast of no large resident population—we aim to get quality not quantity—but it is a business centre for a large section of Trinity Bay and as such has a floating or non-resident population of many thousands.

The large number of up-to-date general stores in Trinity attract hundreds and thousands of customers from North, South, East and West, who find it to their advantage to patronize the "village" stores when in search of goods they cannot procure nearer home. Hence it is that the population of Trinity (the trading population, the population that now demands the Spur Line) cannot be accurately estimated by consulting the Census Returns—a pastime of which "Elector" appears to be very fond.

It is merely in the interests of this large non-resident population that residents of Trinity are at present anxious to have all doubts as to the site of the railway terminus set at rest.

No such doubts existed until quite

recently, when certain busybodies of the "Elector" persuasion took it upon themselves to settle for us a question which had previously been settled by the Government.

We realize that those meddlers were not, and are not, acting entirely on their own initiative. "There's a nigger in the wood pile" and he is using "Elector" and others to save himself from being "scorched."

"Elector" tells us that in order to build the sub-branch or Spur Line "another contract with the Reid Co. would have to be formulated."

This is a very recent discovery and some of us would like to know from whom "Elector" derived his information, and whether the opinion is shared by the "best legal talent" of the Government and Contractor.

Unless the people of Trinity have been willfully misinformed in order to keep them quiet (and we hesitate to believe this) no member of the Government and no one of its legal advisers has ever expressed such an opinion; and as the Reid Co., submitting the plan and "profile" of the Spur Line as part of the Trinity section of the complete branch survey it is presumed that the Contractor was not aware that any new arrangement would be necessary in order to bring the line into Trinity from Gott's Cove.

Of course the Contractor may not until recently have had the benefit of "Elector's" expert legal advice and if the building of the Spur Line would cost more than the contract price per mile no doubt the Contractor will express due thanks for the hint.

While I am not a lawyer I contend that no such new contract is necessary, otherwise new contracts would have been necessary before diverting the line many miles out of the most direct route in order to touch at several places in Bonavista Bay quite as insignificant as the "village" of Trinity.

"Elector" is much exercised over the delay and increased cost in freight and passage charges which the Spur Line will entail upon people further north on the line.

Does he forget that passengers from Clarville to Trinity will have to pay for the extra mileage which calling at Seal Cove and Indian Arm entails.

Does "Elector" know that passengers to and from St. John's by the rail and "Ethie" are carried in some instances nearly 50 miles further than they want to travel and have to pay the extra cost without complaint.

Has he never heard that in order to get from Trinity to Catalina by the "Ethie" passengers must first be carried to Trinity East, Salmon Cove (sometimes Port Rexton) and that all this twisting and turning means more miles to be paid for?

It is generally understood that the coastal steamer "Prospero" will not be taken off the Northern Service as a result of the branch railway being built. That being so, the Contractor,

if he desires freight for his line, will have to grade through rates in competition with the Coastal Company, and the extra mile and a half of road is not likely to materially affect the rates.

In any case there is no reason why Trinity business men should be forced to truck their goods nearly two miles at a cost nearly equaling the freight charge from St. John's, in order that the people of Trinity East, Port Rexton, Catalina and Bonavista may be saved an increased freight charge which, if imposed, will be merely nominal.

Such arguments (?) as "Elector" advances on the freight and passenger question are too childish for serious consideration—excuses would describe them better. They are, however, the same arguments (excuses) we have seen hearing for the past month from two or three of "Elector's" classmates who have been attending with him the special course of instruction on "Reasons (excuses) Why the Trinity Spur Line should not be built."

"Elector's" letter proves him to be an apt scholar and his faultless repetition of his few lines will, no doubt, reap its due reward—if the building of the Spur Line can in any way be permanently "side-tracked."

We have been assured by the Premier that the site of the station for Trinity "as at present contemplated" by the Government places it right in the "village" and not at Gott's Cove. The Colonial Secretary (Mr. Watson) in to-day's issue of the Enterprise gives, in an interview, his views on "the matter and expresses himself as being entirely in favour of the Spur Line being built.

We have no reason to believe that either the Premier or Colonial Secretary is not entirely sincere.

We realize, however, that a very determined effort is being made in certain quarters to so influence public opinion against the Spur Line so as to get the Government to agree to an alteration of the original plan.

It was for the purpose of counteracting this (an inspired) agitation that the memorial was recently sent to the Premier.

So far as the residents of Trinity are concerned their desire is to keep the matter outside of party politics. As the railway is being built to Bonavista, Trinity does not want to be left out in the cold, nor have her passengers and freight dumped off in the woods.

We confidently expect the Spur Line will be built and we believe the Government will adhere to the original plan for the following reasons:

1. Because a station at Gott's Cove is not near enough to the business places of Trinity;

2. Because the Government promised the Spur Line and adopted it as a part of the Trinity-Bonavista Branch;

3. Because Trinity is a business and distributing centre for a large section of Trinity Bay;

4. Because, while Trinity has a resident population of something considerably more than "400 persons" she has a transient, or non-resident, population of several thousands;

5. Because the resident and non-resident population of Trinity will be called upon to pay their proportion of the cost of building the railway to Trinity East, Port Rexton, Catalina, Bonavista and other places in Trinity and Bonavista Bays, where the line will be in the towns, settlements or "villages" and not a mile and a half distant;

6. Because the Spur Line will benefit not only Trinity but many outside "villages" and will do no injury to Trinity East, Port Rexton, Catalina, Bonavista or other towns;

7. Because passengers who may not want to pay the fare for the extra mile-and-a-half of road could, no doubt, arrange for a "stop-off" at Gott's Cove to admire the scenery while the train goes out to the "village";

8. Because for years Trinity's "population of 400" have had to help pay for railways to Harbor Grace, Carbonear, Placentia and elsewhere—and have been very pleased to do it;

9. Because the expense of building the Spur Line (to the Government) will not exceed what it has cost to put the line conveniently near to other "villages" where there are fewer people to be served;

10. Because the Government should not encourage the prejudice, jealousy and opposition to Trinity of such people as "Elector," who are fearful that the Spur Line will tend to a greater development and prosperity of "the old town";

11. Because Trinity does not attempt to interfere in the affairs of outside "villages" without being asked to do so by them;

12. Because Trinity is TRINITY—and as such deserves the Spur Line. I have no need to cloak my identity. Mr. Editor, and are not ashamed of my place of residence, so, with thanks for space, remain,
