AUSTRO-GERMAN ATTEMPT NOT YET SUCCESSFUL.

PETROGRAD, June 21. The Austro-German attempt to force their way through the Russian lines north and south of Grodeck, in the battle for Lemberg, has not yet been successful. Regarding the approaching crisis in the Galician campaign, the Bourse Gazette says: "I n view of the continued German re nforcements, the Galicia situation orces us to choose between retaining Lemberg and preserving the free-dom of our operations, it is possible we shall have to make a sentimental sacrifice and abandon the Galician

GREY WARNS BRITISH SUBJECTS. LONDON, June 21.—(Official.) In view of the existing state of af-fairs in Mexico, the Secretary for Foreign Affairs (Sir Edward Grey), desires to warn British subjects against visiting that country, unless absolutely obliged to do so by neces

BRITISH OFFICERS' CASUALTIES.

The British Army casualty lists ending June 9th, show that since the beginning of the war, 3,372 officers were killed, 6,651 wounded, and 1,049 missing, making a total of 11,072. From May 19th to June 9th, 703 officers were killed, 1,407 wounded and 170 missing; 2,260 in all. During the last fortnight ending June 9th, the Canadian Contingent lost 40 officers killed and 130 wounded; the Austra-lians, 107 killed, and 175 wounded; wounded, who, being officers, were in large part English. With each cas-ualty list a certain number of offi-cers and men are transferred from the missing to the killed list, owing to the finding of bodies. The number of dead is also constantly increased

The same lesson came for England from the front, he points out while the retreat of the Russian armies in Galicia hammers it home again. The correspondent says the daily output of shells certainly is much larger than it was four months ago, and it is possible that a reserve of ammunition s being built up much more rapidly than is apparent at the front, but he adds what we have come to is the re demption of the world by shells.

RUSSIA LOOKS TO HER ALLIES. LONDON, To-day. Discussing the reception in Petro grad of bad news from the Galician front, the Daily Mail's correspondent in the Russian capital says: An appeal to the country to maintain calmness, signed by the Russian General Staff, is posted in public places throughout the city, giving assurances that the whole truth is given in official communications and that the wild rumors which are being circulated in Petrograd are unfounded. 


