#### Artillery in the Alps.

All sorts of out-of-the-way and often inexpected difficulties are met by the Italian troops in the fight against the Austrians. Several fights, for instance, have taken place at heights between 7,000 and 10,000 feet above sea level.

At these great heights the ordinary gun sights are useless. The higher the altitude the rarer the air becomes and farther a gun will shoot. Most of the gun sights are made for and tested at practically sea level. so the Italian gunners in the Alps would have found that their guns were not hooting accurately if special gun sights had not been used.

A shell at 5,000 feet up. for in stance, which at the ordinary level would travel 2,500 yards would go 2,560 yards, while at 7,500 feet altitude it would be going 2,600 yards, or 100 yards further than it ought to go. All the Italian mountain guns, thereore, have to have specially corrected sights. We have, of course, used nilar mountain guns in India and a campaign waged at such a height as the one between the Italians and Aus-


