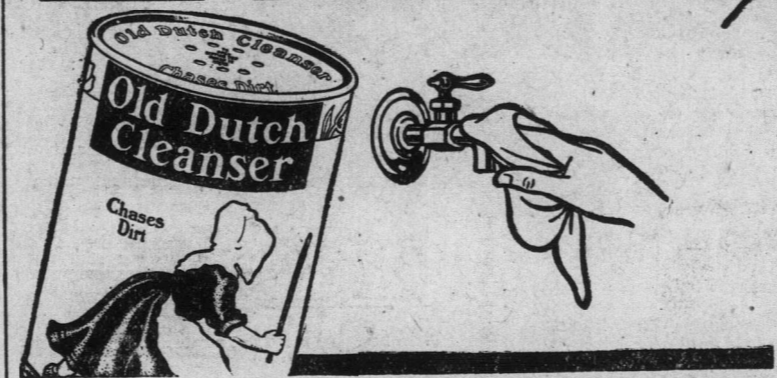
CHAPTER VIII.

Junior Dress in Semi Princess Style, With Convertible Collar.

Plaid woolen in soft blue and brown tones would be nice for this, or shepherd check suiting with facings of white pique. For more dressy effect, one could choose poplin, taffeta or velveteen, with facings of silk or satin. Plaid silk with brown velvet, white satin with black taffeta, or messaline with poplin would all be equally attractive. The Pattern is cut with panel fronts, that join full skirt and waist portions. The waist back has no lines. It has a deep tuck at the sides, and is stitched over the skirt below the belt. The Pattern is cut in 3 sizes: 12, 14 and 16 years. It requires 5 1/2 yards of 36 inch material for a 14 year size.

1522—A SIMPLE BUT ATTRACTIVE STYLE FOR HOME OR BUSINESS WEAR.



Ladies' House or Home Dress, with Sleeve in Either of Two Lengths.

As here shown striped gingham, in blue and white was used, with white line for trimming. The waist and skirt are cut on simple lines, with front closing; deep pockets trim the skirt, and a broad collar finishes the waist. The sleeve is dart fitted in wrist length, and is finished with a neat cuff. In short length a turn back cuff forms a suitable trimming. This style is good for all wash fabrics, also for taffeta, poplin, serge, corduroy, voile, and velvet. In Blue serge with facings of blue or black satin, it would make a splendid business dress. The Pattern is cut in 3 sizes: 24, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44 inches bust measure. It requires 6 1/2 yards of 44 inch material for a 36 inch size. The skirt measures about 3 yards at its lower edge.

Sees a Wave of Reason.

Philadelphia, Jan. 13.—The Rev. Dr. Joseph Krauskopf, before the Congregation Keneseth Israel, said that our greatest danger was not some imaginary enemy across the seas, but the "preparation hooter" within our own borders. He said such "waves of unreason" as the present fear of invasion had come in cycles since the dawn of history.

Dr. Krauskopf cited as waves of unreason the Crusades, the fear in Europe in the year 1000 that the world was coming to an end, and the persecution of "witches." He spoke of the day when Europe would come to its reason and wonder what the war was all about.

"And on that day," he said, "among the most surprised and humiliated will be those of the people of the United States who allowed themselves to be seized with a paroxysm of fear that their land was about to be invaded by mighty enemies, their large and wealthy seaboard towns blown to smithereens, the men put to the edge of the sword, their women and children sent adrift, their possessions divided among the despoiler, and their raising a mighty clamor for preparing against invasion, for calling hundreds of thousands of people from the drows and loom and furnace, from the shop and mill and laboratory, in order to train them in the arts of war."

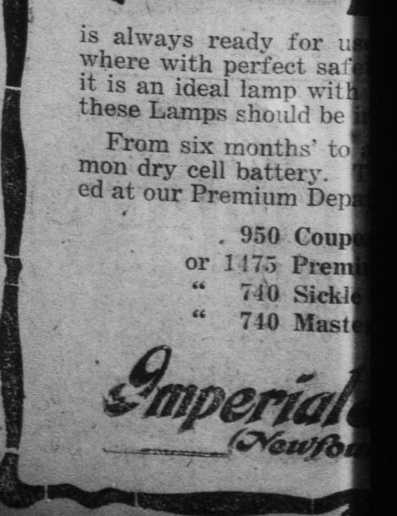

THE NEW CHARTER

If the new charter prepared by the Commissioners does not contain provision for Municipal ownership of public utilities, I shall be very disappointed. It is the one thing needed to supply cheaper Gas, Electric and Telephone service to a suffering public and to provide means for the extension of necessary work for the better convenience and health of the city. I hope shortly to have figures, showing what other cities have done in this connection, which shall present to the public for consideration.

As regards the charter itself, it is not clear if the city will adopt it simply because it proves favourable to the House of Assembly. In most cases of new charters the question is put to the people and they decide if it is acceptable to them. In any case, I presume that the Civic Commission themselves will stand for election and the endorsement or otherwise of their charter will to some extent be apparent by the number of votes they receive. New charters have often met an untimely fate at the hands of electors, and there are certain

THE THOUGHTS OF THEOBALD.

MIND YOUR OWN COAL BUSINESS!

A lot of people are talking about co-operative action in importing coal and I fancy that there will be many more importers of coal in the future when freight has decreased.

What about a Municipal Coal Company? There's a plank for a progressive Councilor's platform when the Municipal elections come along next summer. It is a big thing, certainly, but there is possibility in it. The City Council could get a premises and import coal for its citizens, charging them at cost prices plus a nominal profit that would be used to repay a necessary loan to pay for the first cargo. All transactions would be prompt cash. Coal seems to be one of the absolutely necessary requirements of us all, so why not get together and help each other? The citizens pay now 70 cents to the Council for every ton they burn, so that it seems to me that they are entitled to every help the Council can give them in cheapening coal. There can be no money lost in such a business, and in time the small profit of say ten or twenty cents a ton will amount to such a sum that will help to relieve taxation and also help to pay for improvements in the making of a better city.

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ments which you will find always against progressive innovations. Everyone with the welfare of the city at heart, and they are an ever increasing number, await with interest the recommendations of the Commissioners.

THE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM.

In most charters in the American cities, provisions for the initiative, referendum and recall have been inserted. These provide a means for public expression on any question of importance in return to the city. Before any large works are entered into, the people must decide that they must be done.

The philosophy is, that it is unwise to give unlimited authority to a small body of men without reserving the possibility of final control in the hands of the voters. Some people consider the initiative, referendum and recall as radical and dangerous instruments for the voters to possess. But as a matter of fact they are comparatively little used; the measures being "more valuable in their existence than in their use. Their existence impresses a sterner sense of duty and keener thoughts of responsibility in the minds of officials."

The prohibition election was really a referendum, and I don't think there are many who gainsay the worth of such an expression of public opinion as compared with the majority rule in the House of only 35 members.

DO GOOD TO THEM THAT HATE YOU.

With one phase of the "after the war" campaign I cannot seem to agree. If we are looking to this war to establish the rule of Right, and bring an era of Peace, I fail to see how it can possibly come about if we are already planning to kill the Germans commercially after the war. Trade enmity had a great deal to do with the cause of the war and if we are resolving that we will beggar Germany in the future, prohibit her goods in our countries, and put a stop to her world markets, then we are manufacturing enmity wholesale, and helping to perpetuate war. There is nothing that will bring war easier than an effort to circumscribe a people's freedom to expand. We have been denouncing the Prussian philosophy that the rules of right and wrong by which men are governed do not

extend to nations. Is not the supreme rule of right and wrong—that man should devote himself to the good of his fellow man? "Let no nation seek her own but every nation another's good." Kill out Erastianism if you will, but if we are already resolving that Germany must never recover the trade that she has lost in the war, then I say that the loss of life going on now is not worth it all. It is a pity that we should change a war of righteous indignation into a cold, studied, plan of vengeance.

Nurse Cavell left us a message before she died. She said: "Standing as I do in view of God and eternity, I realize that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone."

LOOKING AHEAD.

In future years we will not boast, as we are boasting now, that we had forebears in the host upon the Mayflower's prow. Nor will we boast of Norman blood, or how our sires shed gore, when they crossed o'er the raging flood, with Bill the Conquerore. We'll say, when gathered round the board, "By Woden and my Thor! Our fathers sailed with Henry Ford, and put an end to war! They cranked the ship with fiery zeal, and sailed for Peace's sake, with Henry at the steering wheel, his foot upon the brake. Across the briny deep they slid, and twanged their peaceful lyres, and when the ship began to skid, they calmly changed the tires. The monarchs in their anger roared, above the martial din, "What have we done that Henry Ford should come to rub it in?" War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Jan. 21. The Governor, Newfoundland: The French Prime Minister, after attending the War Council in London, has returned to Paris.

Headquarters in France report that in fourteen air fights we drove down two enemy aeroplanes, losing one ourselves.

Russia says that an enemy position was captured northeast of Czernowitz. Five desperate counter-attacks were repulsed with enormous loss.

In the Caucasus region pursuit of the disorganized Turkish army continues.

One hundred and sixty-three sailing boats have been destroyed on the Austrian coast.

The Allies have bombarded the Bulgarian ports of Dedegatch and Port Lago.

The Montenegrin Consul General states that the King and Government have refused the Austrian conditions, and continue fighting. King Nicholas with his two sons remains at the head of the army.

BONAR LAW. THE REASON FOR THE SEIZURE.

LONDON, Jan. 21. The seizure by the French of the Greek Island of Corfu, is now known to have been due chiefly to the location there of an Austro-German submarine base. A second base has been located in a narrow channel between Corfu and the Albanian coast.

Most of the submarine raids in the Eastern Mediterranean have been directed from these two bases by a fleet embracing German as well as Austrian craft. Submarine activities by Germans in the North Sea have largely abated, owing to international complications and relentless warfare by British destroyers. German submarines have been diverted to the Mediterranean to such an extent that, according to best information, only two small under-water craft belonging to the Germans remain in the North Sea. Co-operation by German submarines with Austrian craft in operations against Italian ships is regarded here as of political significance, it having been stated on good authority that Italy would declare war against Germany if it should be established that German submarines had contributed to the loss of Italian ships.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER'S MAIL SEIZED. LONDON, Jan. 21. A Reuter despatch from Copenhagen says that the Christiania Morgenblatt reports that during the stay of the liner Bergensford at Kirkwall, her entire parcel post was seized by British authorities, and that for the first time passenger luggage was examined, and eleven boxes labelled "Valdemar Petersen" were discovered but as no passenger of this name was aboard, the boxes in question were seized. The Bergensford, a Norwegian ship, sailed from New York on Jan. 8th for Bergen, Christiania, and other Norwegian ports. She was reported at Kirkwall on Jan. 17th, and arrived at Bergen to-day.

RUSSIANS KEEP MOVING. TEHERAN, Persia, Jan. 21. Russian columns operating in Persia, have pushed forward and occupied the town of Sultanabad, 150 miles southwest of Teheran, about an equal distance northwest of Isfahan. The Garrison and German Consul have fled to Bouroudjir, 50 miles west of Sultanabad.

WILL AMEND MUNITIONS ACT. NEW YORK, Jan. 21. A News Agency despatch from London to-day, says that a most imperative need for more ammunition has forced the Government to propose a drastic amendment to the Munitions Act. Premier Asquith informed the Commons this afternoon to increase the number of persons engaged in making shells. The Government proposes to replace skilled union workers engaged in minor tasks, by men and women classed as semi-unskilled and transferring the skilled union men to more important work. This measure, the Premier announced, will be introduced following agreement with the Labor Party members. What reception the Government proposal will receive from radical laborites is not known. A few months ago the Minister of Munitions, Lloyd George, made unsuccessful attempts to obtain the sanction of unions to such a scheme, but radical leaders declared they suspected a scheme to undermine unionism, but said they might agree to such a programme if convinced that it was absolutely necessary.

was 340 feet long, and was owned by the Sutherland Steamship Company of Newcastle, at which port she was registered.

IN THE COMMONS.

LONDON, Jan. 21. After a brief debate, the Commons to-day passed the second reading of a bill amending the Trading with the Enemy Act, empowering the Board of Trade to prohibit any person, firm or company of hostile nationality, or associations, from carrying on business in this country during the war.

Solicitor General Sir George Cave explained that the purpose of the bill was to put an end to a situation which enabled German companies to continue business here during the war, hoard their profits for their own benefit, and the economic struggle which might be expected to follow the conclusion of peace. I have reason to believe that British property in Germany is being treated in a high handed way, the Solicitor General continued. While there is no desire to confiscate enemy property in this country, it is desirable on the other hand, that the State should be placed in control of such property, and that it be kept safe until it is known what has happened to British property in Germany. The Commons also passed, without discussion, the supplementary Navy estimates, authorizing an addition of 50,000 men to the personnel of the Navy.

ALBANIANS JOIN MONTENEGRINS. LONDON, Jan. 21. A despatch from Rome states that Eshad Pasha, Provincial President of Albania, has arrived at Scutari with Albanian forces to join the Montenegrin troops, which are retiring to that point. The despatch says that these measures are being taken with a view of defending Scutari. It was reported from Paris last month that Eshad Pasha had declared war on Austria and Bulgaria, and that he was said to have 20,000 armed men who would assist the Allies.

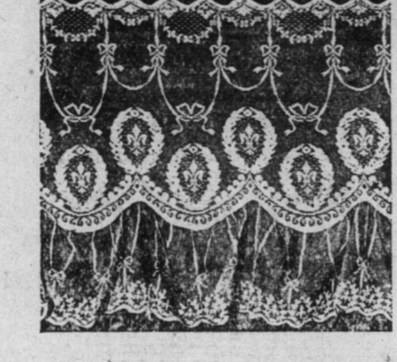
THE GRAIN SUPPLY. BUCHAREST, Roumania, January 21. An Anglo-French Corporation, with a capital of \$96,000,000, has been formed to buy up all available grain so that the Central Powers will be unable to import needed supplies. It is not known what use will be made by the Allies of the proposed purchase.




