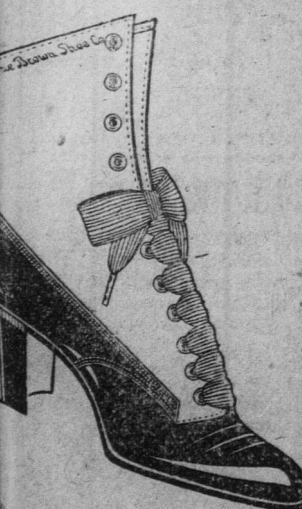
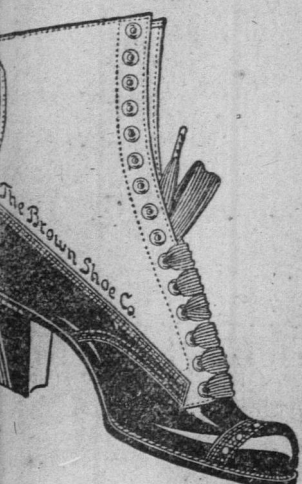

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

POSTPONEMENT OF THE REICHSTAG.

LONDON, Oct. 3. Telegraphing from Amsterdam the correspondent of the Central News says: It is generally believed that postponement of the meeting of the Reichstag is due to dissatisfaction with the speech of Dr. Von Bethmann Hollweg. In the meantime strenuous efforts will be made to reconcile the people to the Imperial Chancellor's policy. Meetings are being hurriedly arranged to be held in a number of towns, where members of the Reichstag will make addresses. A public mass meeting at Frankfurt passed a resolution in favor of an early peace. The Vossische Zeitung says that Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg had a lengthy conversation yesterday with Prince Von Buelow, the former Chancellor.

GERMANS TAKE THE OFFENSIVE.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 3. German forces have taken the offensive south of Vinny attacking the Russian lines in force near Leva Alexandrovsk, the war office announced today. They were met by an intense defensive fire from Russian guns, however, and forced back to their positions.

BRIDGES DESTROYED.

BERLIN, Oct. 3. The war office announced today that Austrian-German monitors had destroyed the pontoon bridges across the Danube in the rear of the Roumanian forces which had crossed the river and invaded Bulgaria.

BULGAR ATTEMPTS FRUSTRATED.

ATHENS, Oct. 3. Serbian military officials report that desperate efforts made by the Bulgars to recapture Kaimakalan Plateau, which is the key to Monastir, have been frustrated and that the Serbs assaulted and captured the important

It is stated the Bulgars have transferred to this region their 9th and 10th division from Dobruja with the hope they may regain the crest of the mountain range commanding Monastir Valley which is now held by Serbs.

VIOLENT FIGHTING.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 3. Violent fighting continues in Transylvania and Dobruja, generally with success for the Roumanians, says today's official. The Roumanians have captured more than 500 prisoners in Transylvania.

BULGARS ABANDON POSITIONS.

PARIS, Oct. 3. The Bulgars have abandoned several positions in the Starok, Grobs and Fred River regions. The Entente Allies have occupied Sovich, Petokak, Verbeni and Jenkol, northeast of Florina.

PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT.

CANEA, Greece, Oct. 3. Former Premier Venizelos is expected to leave here shortly for Mytilene where he will establish the seat of the Provisional Government. Vice-Admiral Coundouriotis will go to Salonika to represent the Provisional Government there.

IN THE STRUMA.

BERLIN, Oct. 3. A portion of an official issued by the war office to-day concerning fighting in Macedonia, reads: An attack against the British who crossed the Struma north and west of Lake Tassinos has been made and is in progress.

RESIGNATIONS IN THE HANDS OF THE KING.

ATHENS, Oct. 3. The resignations of all the cabinet members, except the Premier and Minister of foreign affairs Carapanos are in the hands of the King. The cabinet will be arranged probably so that several supporters of Venizelos will hold portfolios, thus giving the new ministry a national character. Orders have been issued to Royalist newspapers to cease attacking Venizelos in view of the co-operation of his adherents with the new government.

MUST QUIT.

ATHENS, Oct. 3. Two thousand Italians including artillery and cavalry, who have been holding Santa Quaranta, have occupied Argyro Castro, Albania. The Greek military authorities have been allowed a limited time in which to evacuate the coast. The Greek civil authorities are allowed, however, to remain at their posts.

LOYD GEORGE'S INVITATION.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3. An invitation from David Lloyd George, War Secretary, and the Lord Chief Justice of England, for the States to send an industrial commission to that country similar to the one now investigating the opportunities for foreign trade in France, was read here to-day at a luncheon of the American Manufacturers' Export Association. The letter quoted Lloyd George as saying that he hoped a similar commission would be sent not only to England, but by the rest of the world, which he said is big enough for all.

Everyday Etiquette.

"When I am introduced to a man should I rise and shake hands," asked Jennie. "Girls are not introduced to men, but men are introduced to them. It is not necessary to rise or extend the hand in acknowledging such introductions. If you are already standing and wish to be unusually cordial you may extend the hand," answered her sister.

VISITING CANADA AND U. S.—Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Cash left by last evening's express on a visit to several places of interest in Canada and the United States. They expect to return in six weeks' time.

Only Nild Fish at Oporto

A late advice from Messrs. Lind and Couto at Oporto received by the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon shows that there are still no Norwegian stocks of fish in the market there. The stock of Newfoundland cod for the past week was quoted at 14,040 quintals and consumption 5,405 qts. as compared with 15,220 qts. and 6,207 qts. respectively, for the week previous.

Germany's Lost African Colonies.

The conquest of the largest, best developed and most valuable of Germany's colonies is no misfortune for the world. It has been well said of them all, that they produced "no tangible results save battle, murder, and sudden death." The German officials treated the natives as the German Staff treats the Belgians, the French, the Poles, and the British prisoners—with sheer savagery. They produced elaborate treatises on native anthropology, after killing the natives to measure the skulls. They drove the Hereros of South West Africa into the desert, and deliberately starved them to death. They murdered women and children precisely as they have murdered them in Europe. It is not the standard of civilization that vanishes from the map, but the black flag of a nation of spies and criminals. And these colonies were without colonists. In the whole 1,027,000 square miles of territory, once German but now under the Allies' rule, there were not 20,000 genuine German settlers. Of this vast area, which included some of the finest territory in Africa, nothing now remains, and for the hundred million sterling which the Germans spent on developing it there is nothing to show. With all their great outlay they never produced a single self-governing State such as those which are the glory and strength of the British Empire. But that result is not achieved by rulers who boast that they are above the laws of God and man.—London Daily Mail.

Submarine Agitation Ceases in Germany.

Controversy Over Food Dictator's Policy Supplants Demand for Unrestricted Attacks.

Berlin, Sept. 12. (via London, September 13.)—The weeks which have passed since the appointment of Field Marshal von Hindenburg as Chief of the General Staff have been marked by almost complete cessation of the discussion in regard to resumption of submarine warfare on the old or on a more vigorous basis. Nonpartisan newspaper observers who are in touch with leading statesmen and politicians express the opinion that for the present at least there will arise no question of a change in submarine policy. The administration of Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg now feels itself fully in control of the situation in this respect.

The controversy over the methods employed in connection with the food dictatorship has now supplanted the submarine issue in the conservative and other newspapers which are opposed to the Chancellor. These newspapers are engaged in arguing with Adolph von Batocki, head of the Food Regulation Board, the pros and cons of compulsory production as opposed to an increase of maximum prices as the method of enlarging the production of foodstuffs.

Herr von Batocki has declared himself a convinced opponent of the theory that the food problem could best be solved by compulsory methods; that is, by prescribing what farmers should plant. He also has little sympathy with the demand of the agrarians for increase or removal of maximum prices to encourage production. Accordingly the present system will continue.

Should the submarine situation remain as at present and should he be assured that no revival of the underwater campaign is contemplated, Ambassador Gerard may take advantage of the opportunity for a trip to the United States, as he feels the need of a vacation.

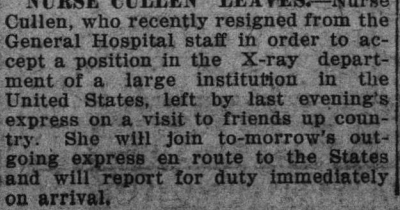
The Ambassador hopes that before this he will witness completion of the prolonged, difficult, and delicate negotiations which he is conducting for relief of interned civilians in Germany and England. As a result of his efforts two proposals are under consideration. One of them calls for a general exchange of civilians under parole not to serve during the war. The alternative plan is the release of all men more than 45 years and others unfit for military service. These plans are now before the British Government, and the acceptance of either would mean the success of a difficult task of humanitarian diplomacy.

Prave Liebknecht

Cannot be silenced by Prison Terms and Bullets Aimed at Him.

To mention the name of Herr Liebknecht among Germans is to bring down every kind of abuse on the head of the politician who has been described as the "bravest man in Germany."

Nothing, however, daunts Liebknecht for he comes of fighting stock.

His father, Wilhelm Liebknecht, fought for Babel, the famous Socialist, almost precisely the same battle, during and after the Franco-Prussian War of 1870, and was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in a fortress for "treasonable intentions."

His imprisonment merely resulted in his being returned at the election of 1903 to the Prussian Landtag, one of the parliaments of the countries constituting the German Empire.

An excellent speaker, with a temperament full of enthusiasm and fire, highly educated and well read, Liebknecht soon became a leader among Socialists.

Parliamentary group has expelled him from its ranks recently. There is no doubt that Liebknecht has a tremendous following of sympathizers.

These are growing stronger every day as the people recognize what has been insisted on telling them time after time, viz., that Germany is waging not a defensive, but an offensive war, and that all the misery which has been brought to the country is the outcome of Prussian aggrandizement.

It is interesting to note that Liebknecht, like his father, is a passionate internationalist, and three years ago he visited Paris, London, and Brussels, holding forth on the necessity of combating the machinations of militarists in every country and of preserving the world's peace.

Bremen Held by British. Says American Doctor Who Has Returned From The Front—New London Still Awaiting Her Arrival.

Philadelphia, Sept. 25.—The Bremen, the second German merchant submarine, frequently reported on its way to this country from Germany, has been captured by the British and is now held a prisoner in Falmouth Harbor, according to Dr. B. T. McKenzie, physical director of the University of Pennsylvania, who returned to this country to-day after serving all summer as a major in the Medical Corps of the British army.

British officials refuse to admit the capture of the Bremen, Dr. McKenzie added, but the general public is convinced of the truth of the reports now current in every part of England.

The English fleet, he learned of the capture," said Dr. McKenzie, "by the dispatch to Falmouth of several diamond appraisers, whose mission it was to estimate the value of the \$25,000,000 worth of diamonds which the submarine carried."

The assignment consisted of a great variety of cut and uncut stones. It was reported, destined for several of the large diamond and jewelry firms in this country.

Dr. McKenzie did not see the Bremen, he says, nor did he know of any one who had seen her, so strict was the guard placed about her hiding place in the harbor of Falmouth.

Domestic Tragedies.

France Has a Multitude of "Enoch Arden" Stories.

There is a notable multiplication of domestic dramas of the type familiar through Tennyson's "Enoch Arden" and Balzac's "Colonel Chabert," who, lost on a Napoleon battlefield, returned home to find his wife remarried to a nobleman of the Restoration.

Thus, a Madame D— of Arras was informed at the beginning of the war that her husband had been killed. Hoping to Paris she waits some months, and then married her brother-in-law. The first husband is now on his way back from Germany, where he was a prisoner.

Charles le Goffic cites other cases in La Liberte. He says: "In a small commune near the Channel two soldiers' wives remarried in this way. The death of their first husbands was registered, and all the papers were in order."

But these husbands reappeared one fine morning, both of them with amputated limbs.

"More curious is the tale of the Breton soldier whose arm, cut off by a shell, was found on the battlefield, while the rest of him had disappeared. As the arm carried the identification plate its owner was reported dead. The wife received a certificate to this effect, and was permitted to remarry. The first husband, however, proves to be alive and inclined to insist on his rights."

The most unfortunate of these tragic misadventures was found in Switzerland recently in one of the parties of seriously wounded soldiers returned from Germany. A French visitor stopped before a man whose face was so disfigured as to seem no longer human. He asked if he could do anything for the sufferer, if he could see his family and tell them.

"Useless," was the reply, "He is dead."

The soldier had risen to the heroic delicacy of deciding that, rather than horrify those he loved, he would leave them to believe him dead.

There is a ray of light in this case, for the surgeons hold out hope of great improvement, and if this is accomplished their patient will give up his name and come to life again. "But perhaps," adds M. le Goffic, "it may be too late."

It is said there are 70,000 French prisoners in Germany who have not been able to communicate with their families. The French law requires ten months of widowhood before re-marriage. The question is being asked whether this delay should not be extended, and Henri Robert, the eminent pleader, is one of those who think that soldiers' wives should not remarry before the end of the war.




