

Skull Patch.

Dr. Wayne Babcock, the Principal of the Samaritan Hospital, Philadelfor unseless trash, tin hats and teddy phia, has just completed a marvellous piece of surgical work with complete bears; then you will always have the success. A man was admitted to the institution who had received such injury to his head that some inches of the skull bone were completely shattered. Dr. Wayne removed the damaged bone and after trimming the edges of the fracture, fitted into place a bone patch made from a shoulder blade of mutton which had been stew ing for some days in the kitchen

> This is the fifth case in which Dr. Wayne has fitted soup-kettle bones into the human body, and he uses shoulder blade bones on account of their lightness and thinness. By a series of boilings he exacts the animal matter, and then cuts the bone about half an inch apart.

He brings the thoroughly sterilised bone into contact with the edges of the living bone and fastens it in place with a few stitches of catgut. The live bone sends new blood vessels into the porous dead bone and so re-Hitherto the operation has been
