



COLLISION IN ST. LAWRENCE RIVER.

QUEBEC, Aug. 15. The Canadian Pacific Ocean Liner Tunisian from London, and the Havre and Furness Freighter, Manchester Division from Manchester, limped into port here to-day, both considerably off Red Island, shortly after three o'clock Saturday afternoon. Both vesels were inward bound and from what could be learned of the circumstances of the accident, it appears that the Manchester Division coming into a thick fog thought it prudent to anchor. As she was riding at anchor with tide ebbing, she was tolling her bell as a warning to other craft, when suddenly the Tunisian loomed up through the fog. When both vessels sighted each other, it was apparently too late to avoid collision and they came together bow on. When the impact occurred, passengers on the Tunisian became panic stricken, especially the foreigners in third class quarters, but they were gradually calmed down by the ships officers vessel's damages, found that she had not suffered below the water line, and was in no danger of sinking. The Tunisian had her starboard side ripped open for about fifty feet, while the Manchester Division suffered serious damage on her port side, but als above the water line. 



That Britain does not intend shipbuilding figures are necessarily unavailable, but those given are ample proof of the place which the Empire occupies in the world's shipping list. For the period above named there were nine hundred and forty-one merchant vessels, aggregating a total gross tonnage of three million, five hundred and seventy-eight thousand, one hundred and fifty-three, under construction in the United Kingdom alone. Of these eight hundred and ninety-five were steam, 888 being steel, 3 Ferro concrete and 4 wood and composite, and forty-six sail, of these 41 being steel, 3 Ferro concrete and 2 wood and composite. An Act to Provide for the Better Obtaining of

Information Respecting the Codfishery. Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:

1. The Master or owner of every ship, yessel, schooner, craft or boat which shall arrive at any port in Newtoundland from fishing in any of the places following, that is to say, on the Banks, on the Coast of Labrador, in the Straits of Belle Isle, or elsewhere out of Newfoundland, and on the coast of Newfoundland. elsewhere out of Newfoundiand, and of the coast of Newfoundland in the District of St. Barbe, shall within 48 hours after arrival at his destination report by telegraph at the expense of the Department from the nearest telegraph station to the Department of Marine and Fisheries at St. Ichn's and the nearest Cus-toms Officer, stating the quantity in quintals of fish on board

2. As a part of said report the said Master or owner shall state whether the number of quintals reported is reckoned as of dry fish, Labrador fish, salt bulk or green fish, or otherwise as the case may be; and shall state whether it is the intention of such master or owner to cure such fish (if the same be not cured) as soft Labrador, dry Labrador, or dry Shore.

3. If any such Master or owner shall fail to report as aforesaid or shall wilfully report incorrectly, he shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00; to be covered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magis-trate; or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding

4. In publishing information or statistics of the fisheries, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall not be bound to make public the name or catch of any specific ship, vessel, craft or

5. Every licensed exporter of codfish shall report to the Min-ister of Marine and Fisheries on the last day of every month, or within 48 hours thereafter, stating the quantity and quality of all fish then held in store by such exporter. The said report shall be verified by affidavit, and the said Minister shall not publish or allow any person whatsoever (except in pursuance of legal process) to have access to any such report; but the suntotal of the quantities and qualities so reported shall be intimated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to the President of the Newfoundland Board of Trade for the information and use of the Trade generally.

6. If any such exporter shall fail to report as hereinbefore provided, or shall knowingly make any false or incorrect report, he shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$1,000.00, which may be recovered in a summary manner before any Stipendiary Magistrate, or, indefault of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months.

7. If any person publishes, writes or disseminates any false information or statistics respecting the quantity of codfish caught or held in store, or otherwise in Newfoundland or exported, he shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars or imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month for each offence.

8. All penalties recovered under this Chapter shall be paid to the Minister of Finance and Customs for the use of the Colony. 9. Any person aggrieved by any conviction under this Act may appeal to the next Session of the Supreme Court in St John's or on Circuit upon giving notice within fourteen days of his intention so to appeal.

10. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Codfish Report Act, 1920."





BODY OF DANIEL BEATON BADLI BATTERED - COMPLICATED

at Glace Bay

Brutal Murder

Sydney Aug. 11.-Mystery of the nost complicated kind surrounds the nurder of Daniel H. Beaton, 31, whose mangled body was found by an auto party, lying face downward on South Street, Glace Bay, at 1.15 this morn

The deceased earlier in the night had been engaged in a row at the Stirling, the negro quarter of the town, to which the police had to be called, but he escaped from the encounter without serious injury, and started for home, accompanied his brother, William, and a brother in-law.

His movements have been traced from the time he left the Stirling until he crossed the big bridge, but from that time on all is confusion The police are vigorously investigat ing the case, but they are at loss to know whether he was pursued and killed by those who attacked him at Stirling, whether he was killed by some other person, or whether he was run over by an automobile.

Up to the present the developments point to a case of brutal murder Robbery was apparently not the motive, as a purse containing \$219 was found not far from the body.

The Facts to Date. The facts as gleaned by the police up to the present time, are as follows:

About midnight, the police were called to quell a fight at the Stirling. Officers Dan K. McDonnell and William McDonald responded, and on arrival found that the row had subsided There were present among others Dan H. Beaton, the deceased, his brother, William, and Fred. Stillman, a brother-in-law of theirs.

They told the police that Dan had been severely beaten by a gang. The officers offered to take them home in a car, but they decided to walk to

South Street, about a mile away. This they did. When about fifts yards beyond the bridge on Commercial street, the brother-in-law declared he had gone far enough and that he was going back home to Number Two. He turned about and went

Where the other two men went the police do not know.

Japanese opinion in London is very concerned with the scant but disturbing news received during the past few weeks from Eastern Siberia. The military censorship in Japan is very stringent, and there is more than a suspicion that it is being used by the army chiefs to propagate their own views to the exclusion of political and civilian opinion generally which, I am told, is energetically opposed to the desire of the militarists for the quasipermanent occupation of Russian or ex-Russian territory. The average Japanese now thinks in terms of com mercial rather than of territorial axpansion. The country is becoming the world's carrier in all the Eastern seas even as Germany just before the war and regards military adventures as unremunerative work. There is, in fact going on in the Japan of to-day very much the same struggle as was being waged between the German militarists and peaceful penetrators during the quarter of a century prior to the cataclysm of 1914. Britain is Ready.

the last six years of the war that was to end all wars that it is difficult to realize that once again, after less than two years of peace, Britain and France stand at the brink of another great conflict. There is bustle and yet; some are due from New York activity at the British War Office and at the Admiralty these days, and the comforting messages are flashed across to us that the fleet is ready and the army awaits orders for the despatch of its divisions.

> To-day Premier Millerand and Lloyd George meet in conference again at Boulogne, and if Soviet Russia persists in its attitude of insincerity and defiance the war clouds will burst over Europe once more. Against such a contingency the world fervently hopes, for after the destitution and suffering of the Great Armageddon the Allies have little stomach for more fighting.

Yet of the justness of the Allied sause there can be no doubt. The Allies are pledged to support Poland not only in honor, but because a devastated and a dispirited Poland would let in the floods of Bolshevism and the seeds of discontent would find a fertile soil. Poland demands the right to national existence in return for the crimes that were committed by greedy politicians against her one hundred and fifty years ago. If selfdetermination means anything, Poland surely has the right to selfexpression. For centuries she was a powerful state, founded on ideals of democracy which were far in ad-

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
