

I may say that the Postal, like the Anglo, is open continuously, and offers a 24 hour service at its main office. The confusion on this point has probably resulted from the fact that an eight hour day, for six months of the year has recently become effective in the outport offices. Doubtlessly the Postal Telegraphs, like other systems is not perfect, but the Telegraphers Association co-operating with the heads of the department aims at a constantly improved service. yours truly,




