So far those whom he had wronged and injured so heavily dealt generously towards him. But beyond this they marked their sense of his conduct in a very decisive manner. They insisted that he and his should remove from Glenfask, and seek no further intercourse with them. After what had come and gone for which Stephen Gibson expressed no sorrow or repentance—it would have been mockery to maintain a show of regard; and as he had deliberately and impudently outraged the deepest and most tender feelings of their nature, he had left no feelings there either of affection or respect for himself, and there was nothing for it but utter separation. The Captain silently accepted this result, and before two months were over he and his family had removed to a residence in one of the midland counties of England.

With their departure the long account of Fossil was closed, and the four happy young people were freed from an annoying presence and left to the enjoyment of their first and happy married life. Before we present this as a last scene in this changeful drama, let us note a few more facts which have a necessary relation to past incidents and events.

He was kept on in the management of the plantation, and George ultimately sold it to him at a fair price.

Walley—the poor, faithful and afflicted man—was buried at the feet of his mistress, but not in the deserted churchyard on the lonely hill near Ardrossan. In pursuance of a filial desire which took firm possession of his mind, George had the decayed remains of his mother, which had mouldered for twenty years in that solitary grave, removed to Glenfask, and interred by the side of her husband's father in the burial place of the Morrises. The same hands which covered the sacred fragments brought also the body of Walley from the Asylum, and he was given an honored grave close beside those whom he had so faithfully loved and served.
