

Iron continues firm and best grades are held at \$25 or \$1 above the nominal rate. Coal continues in fair demand. Potroleum advanced on Friday after a decline during the preceding portion of the week. Wheat has advanced sightly during the week. Corn has been firmer, but has experi-enced less change in price. The weather has been reported unfavorable to the growing corn cop. Provisions have advanced somewhat. Purchases of new wool for estern markets have been moticesoly large. Ocean freights are firmer, and higher for grain.
