On every hand approval is being expressed of the course of the World in urging the Provincial Legislature to take action in reference to the mines of Ontario.

The annual reports of the Bureau of Industries for Ontario for the year 1898 states: It happens very rarely that any one hesitates to give the fullest details of his mining operations.

One of our sources of information on the industry in the province is the exports of the Dominion, but from these it is not possible to get the total production, since the quantities of various minerals in the list are estimated at times.

For the six years, 1893-6, the total value of the minerals exported was \$12,690,064. The leading articles are iron ore, copper, nickel, lead, zinc, silver, and gold.

Comparing the exports of 1898 with the average of the six years, there is an increase in coal, gold, iron ore, zinc, copper, nickel, and manganese.

CAUTION NECESSARY

On the Part of Austria Because of Russian Movements. Vienna, Jan. 11.—The Political Correspondence publishes a letter from Paris stating that the recent movement of Russian troops renders the utmost caution on the part of Austria necessary.

London, Jan. 11.—The Times' Berlin correspondent says the powers have agreed to summon Prince Ferdinand, through Turkey, to resign the Bulgarian throne.

Protestants Against a Proposed Russian Consulate in Toronto. Toronto, Jan. 11.—It is reported that a consular building for the Russian Government has been discovered in a suburb of Sofia.

Concentration of Troops. London, Jan. 11.—According to the Standard's Vienna correspondent, Russian concentration of troops on the Polish line within the past fortnight, and which is still in full operation, is far more general and active than was the case in December.

Baracks and Magazines in Galicia. Paris, Jan. 11.—A letter from Russian consular officers is published here, stating that the Russian Government has ordered the construction of all horse, cattle, pigs and sheep to be sent to the barracks within three days after they have been declared, and that similar order with respect to other articles of food is expected to be issued.
