THE NEW DURHAM MURDER

King and Mrs. Hartley Plead Not Guilty to Poisoning. BRANTFORD, June 19.—At the Police Court here to-day Maria Hartley and Henry King were preliminary tried on a charge of having murdered Caleb Hartley, husband of the female prisoner, by having administered poison to him at New Durham on May 13.

Both prisoners pleaded not guilty. Dr. Haight of New Durham, who attended deceased in his last illness, was in the box mostly all day. He described deceased's condition when he first saw him, and detailed the symptoms as they manifested themselves. It was only the day before he died that he became delirious. He called in Dr. Wright, who concurred with him. The analysis of the stomach of the deceased had revealed a considerable quantity of arsenic.

The remainder of the hearing was taken up with corroborative medical testimony, after which the preliminary trial was adjourned until to-morrow morning.

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THE BIG CONFERENCE.

IMPORTANT QUESTIONS TO BE CONSIDERED AT OTTAWA.

Cable and Steamship—Delegates Will Also Talk About Inter-Colonial Trade Relations—The Representatives of the Various Colonies That Will Take Part in the Conference.

The selection of Ottawa as the meeting place for the Inter-Colonial Conference, the standing of Canada among the colonies, a gracious recognition of the fact that, as Canada has been the chief mover in the ambitious projects to be discussed and considered, the projects should be discussed and considered on Canadian soil.

It is no ordinary mission that brings the representatives to this meeting, so that a number of miles from their native haunts—from Australia, from South Africa, and from the heart of the Empire—representatives will be present.

Questions fought with the deepest interest to the Empire in particular, and to the colonies, will be discussed. As the London Times puts it: "It is scarcely doubtful that the tone of this Ottawa Conference will be imperialistic, but it is ESSENTIAL THAT SETTLEMENT GIVE WAY TO THE BUSINESS OF THE CONVENTION, which is to promote shipping and telegraphic communication, with a view to develop trade within the Empire."

Delegates will probably be asked to bear in mind that the primary object of the Conference is to produce a practical scheme for the Pacific Cable. Upon this step there necessarily will follow. But if the attention of the Conference is allowed to wander over a whole range of interesting topics, it will be vain to hope for a definite result.

Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, whose recent trip to Australia was one of the causes which gives rise to the Conference, speaks of the objects to be considered by the Colonies delegates with greater authority than The Times, however; and THIS IS THE ORDER OF BUSINESS which has been outlined: Closer trade relations between Canada and the Australian colonies; second, the laying of the Pacific cable as of an exclusively Canadian project.

Mr. Charles Mills, K.C.M.G., other questions relating to this project to settle. Perhaps one of the greatest magnitude is the extension of the submarine cable to the Cape. But there are other matters that will tax the minds of even the clever men who will assemble at Ottawa.

THE VOICE OF THE DOCTORS.

IT IS STRONGLY IN FAVOR OF A CONSUMPTION HOSPITAL.

Deputation to the Executive.—Mr. Gage Correlates Some Misapprehensions—No Taxation for Maintenance Will Be Required—Some startling statistics of Consumption's fatal ravages.

The sub-committee of the Executive to whom has been delegated the consideration of Mr. Gage's munificent offer of \$25,000 towards the erection of a consumption hospital met yesterday afternoon. Aid. Hallam presided.

The Mayor introduced the following medical deputation, who wished to address the committee: Drs. Cameron, Graham, Temple, Ferguson, Cavan, Milner and Cotton.

The chairman stated his appreciation of the proposed gift and his desire that as a very early day practical steps would be taken to supply what was greatly needed in Toronto, a consumption hospital.

Mr. Gage's statement. Mr. W. J. Gage corrected an erroneous impression—that the City Council would have to contribute one-half of the cost of the erection of a \$50,000 hospital, and after its erection to pay the cost of maintenance.

One-half of the \$50,000 Mr. Gage felt certain would be gratefully contributed as soon as the site was obtained. All the work of the Council was the grant of an eligible site, and he would prefer High Park.

As to maintenance, with a good business committee of management, they could rely on the generosity of the public in response to appeals such as were made on behalf of the Sick Children's Hospital and other institutions.

Also a Summer Home. Mr. Gage explained that in his letter to the Mayor he had fixed the sum at \$50,000 so that a really creditable-looking home might be built, one that would be no detriment to the park. It had been suggested to him by several medical gentlemen that in connection with the High Park hospital there should be a summer home in Muskoka.

Consequent on this suggestion he had corresponded with the Grand Trunk Railway authorities, who had generously stated that free transportation would be given the patients.

Dr. Graham's endorsement. The first speaker of the medical deputation was Dr. Graham, who gave particulars of the success of consumption hospitals in Europe. In Germany 20 per cent. of the patients were practically cured. This was very much ahead of the percentage of cures in Canada.

The three primary elements of success in a consumption hospital were pure air, rest and proper food. Fresh air was the most important. It was from the lack of that that the most deadly symptoms often arose.

To compass the desideratum of pure air it was imperatively necessary that the site of the hospital be erected in the suburbs of Toronto.

Constituents of city air. Smoke, dust and millions of bacteria mingle in the city air. Nutrition should be of the best, and it was the lack of these requisites from the homes of the poor that really consigned the consumptive to death from the beginning of the disease.

On the financial aspect he concurred in Mr. Gage's sanguine expectations. When the hospital was open he thought they could rely upon a city and provincial grant, as to the General Hospital. There would surely be a class of paying patients, and he advocated voluntary subscriptions, as in the case of the English hospitals.

Speaking of the urgent need for a consumption hospital Dr. Graham said that in one in eleven of the entire population of Ontario fall victims to this disease.

No change on the paper. Dr. Temple concurred in and supplemented Dr. Graham's remarks. He commented on the unfavorable surroundings of consumptives in city hospitals, their need of isolation and good sanitary surroundings.

Dr. Irving Cameron said that the ordinary daily allowances of the General Hospital would not be sufficient for maintenance of consumptive patients. This would probably be \$1.25 per day. Consumption was one of the most curable diseases when treated in its early stages. He placed the mortality as high as one to seven of the population. If High Park could not be secured as the site, Scarborough Heights was a very desirable location.

More Medical Testimony. A letter from Dr. Bryce, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, was read, favoring the cottage system of hospital.

Dr. Cotton spoke on similar lines, and Dr. Milner and Cameron concurred.

The chairman said he doubted the council would favorably consider Mr. Gage's generous proposal.

On motion of Dr. Ferguson, it was agreed that the chairman, Mr. Gage and Drs. Graham, Temple and Cameron be a committee to visit the sites suggested, and to report thereon to the council.

"Sir Oliver and the shirivally Affair." Editor World: I am not at all surprised at the revelations of the Leys correspondence. It simply shows that Sir Oliver Mowat is human like any other politician; not much above the common voter, susceptible to the ordinary influences of greed and self-interest.

The only difference between Sir Oliver and the wicked Tory is, while their actions are extremely alike, Sir Oliver is common with the other lights of the party of purity, in possession of a useful and honest conscience, and a sense of duty, which is lacking in the ordinary politician, who is a mere tool of his party, and whose only aim is to get the most out of the system.

But this is not what I seek to direct your attention to. It is generally assumed that when Sir Oliver so reluctantly divulged the shirivally of York into that of Toronto and York he simply gave the salary of Sheriff Jarvis to his son and the shirivally, leaving the public in no worse position than before. But this is not the case.

What Sir Oliver did was to make two shirivally where there was only one before. Let me explain by an example: Where John Smith was paid \$1000 a year and recovered judgment to place writ of execution in Sheriff Jarvis' hands against the goods and lands of Brown cost \$8 each, or \$12 for both, why did he not write word to the sheriff to have put an end to the stupid and expensive practice. But what was any necessary for the two shirivally to cover the same ground? John Smith has to pay \$24 where he formerly paid \$18, and of course, poor Brown must ultimately repay to Smith interest, this the sheriff acquiesced in, and the shirivally, regarded as disgraceful, Sir Oliver, however, stands by, witnesses this extortion which puts money in his son's pocket, and with uplifted hands asks to unfurl the banner, "May God be with you." How much more commendable had Sir Oliver given a similar salary to Sheriff Jarvis' ornamental successor. But this would not have been "reform."

On a par with this is the equally disgraceful division of the office of the Crown Attorney for York, the working of which is both ridiculous and expensive, as witness the case some "common," not political, thief, whose desire is to be tried by a jury of his countrymen. He is first investigated by the clever Police Court Attorney at the expense to the county of \$5, he is then handed over to the Attorney General at the expense to the county of \$20 to the Attorney General, who requires again to the case at additional expense of \$20 to the county. He is then called in a political hack, known as a crown counsel, who also costs over, at more and greater expense, the whole case again and the trial is conducted at the expense of the county. It is not a step in the right direction. It is no excuse to say that one man could not have done the work, because the three grandmen indicated each practice outside of their public duty, and these crown counsel are all to be found today stamping the country in favor of the party that pays them so handsomely.

That Mr. Meredith could put an end to all this I very much doubt, but even if he could not accomplish all this surely he could confine it in its true colors and not under the hypocrite's cloak, and finally a long-suffering public might ultimately be brought to change the system for one having some little ingredient of honesty and common sense. What do you think? ARTI-HUMBRO.
