The Bridgewater Fire.

Last Thursday morning Bridgewater was visited by a disastrous fire, which completely destroyed the principal business portion of the town. Two banks, three newspaper offices, post office and many stores are in ashes. The telephone and telegraph offices were also burned out. The fire started in Music Hail at the head of. Main street, and for a quarter of a mile every building on both sides of the street was levelled.

Fifty-four buildings were burned, entailing a loss of over \$200,000, which will be partially offset by about \$60,000 insurance. Eighteen families were burned out, but as the configaration was largely confined to the stores, the same degree of destitution that obtained after the great Windsor fire does not exist. The town will no deubt quickly recover from the disaster as its 3,000 people are noted for their enterprise. The town was without a water system but had a good steam fire engine and a sufficient supply of hose to do effective work. Canadian Pulp and Paper Washington, D. C., Dec. 27 .- The Amer ican Newspaper Publishers' Association has presented to the Anglo-American Joint Commissioners a carefully prepared argument in favor of free paper and free pulp. The following is a syllabus of the argument:

The directors of the American newspape publishers' association representing 157 daily newspapers in the United States, and repre senting the bulk of the total consumption of print paper, are in favor of free paper and free pulp. The tariff of six dollars per ton on print paper is prohibitory and we believe it has been making thin ally ground wood pulp is excessive; that the American paper manufacturers need no protection because they can manufacture paper cheaper than is done in any other part of the world and that they are now supplying the Australian, Japanese and and German manufactures; that no print paper is brought into the United States, but during last year the export has averaged over a thousand tons per week and that the entire revenue received from the importe of mechanically ground pulp was only \$41,-342 last year, so that no serious question of national economy could be urged in opposition to free pulp and free paper; that American manufacturers are protected to the extent of \$1.60 per ton by reason of their proximity to their customers. The rence in the cost of the transportation to market is their great guarantee of security against Canada or any foreign country. They are also protected by reason of their ability to obtain cheaper and more convenient supplies of coal and chemicals, which, as yet, are not obtainable in the Canadian forests. The enlightened policy of New York and other states in protecting forests should

be encouasged by putting Canadian pulp and paper on the free list.

"Go down to the cellar and look over the bulbs and roots that were carefully stowed away there in the fall," is a suggestion for winter from Gardening. "Cannas, dahlias, gladioluses, etc., may be safe enough so far as temperature is concerned, but it is wise to be on the lookout for decay among these and other roots. Dahlias are especially subject to rotting, and this is an infectious disease to rotting, and this is an infectious disease which spreads rapidly among the tubers. Then the gladiols corms need cleaning and sorting, and tuberous begonias also should be turned over and arranged by size. Cannas need particular attention, but in their case it is a liability to shriveling from lack of moisture which constitutes the chief danger."
