GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit the annual medical report of the Almshouse of Annapolis County for the year 1898.

Number of admissions including two deaths 20

Discharged 20

Deaths 5

Present average 14

The deaths have taken place at the dates, and from causes as follows:

March 17th, man, age 80, Bright's disease.

May 25th, woman, age 74, chronic disease of heart.

July 15th, man, age 81, debility and old age.

Oct. 29th, man, age 60, paralysis and epilepsy.

Dec. 21st, boy, age 12, consumption.

The mortality has been that in some years past and there has been no death from scarlet fever.

The sanitary conditions of the buildings in general are as good as can reasonably be expected in an institution of this description, and as far as cleanliness and good management are concerned, cannot be better.

The nursing and care of the sick and infirm have been well and kindly attended to by Mr. and Mrs. Lowe and I have to thank them for their efficient assistance which they have willingly rendered to me on all occasions. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Be it ordained by the County Council of the Municipality of Annapolis, that a bounty of four dollars for killing each bear, and a bounty of two dollars for killing each leopard, wolf or wild cat, shall be granted, the same to be paid out of the funds of the Municipality of the County of Annapolis on the order of the Council of the Ward in which the capture has been made, and upon the party satisfying the Council that such bear, leopard, wolf or wild cat or wolf was killed within the limits of the Municipality, and producing and leaving with such Councilor the most of such animal's skin.

Upon reading the report of the Committee on Finance the same was on motion received and adopted.
