Developing a New Clover Seed District



During the last three years Mr. Don H. Bark, Chief of the Irrigation Investigation Division of the Department of Natural Resources of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been conducting a number of experiments in the growing of clover seed in Southern Alberta, and has met with surprising success. Before coming to Alberta in 1915, Mr. Bark was for several years connected with various irrigation enterprises in Idaho, His experienced eye noticed that the clover growing on lawns, ditch banks, waste places in Alberta, from the boundary line to as far north as Edmonton, gave promise of good results. This promise was fully confirmed when he shelled hundreds of heads that he gathered. They revealed a large quantity of seed of unusually good quality.

Foremost amongst the fishing waters of this region are: St. Mary's Lake and river, Kootenay River, Moyie Lake and river, Gold Creek, Cherry Creek, Perry Creek Lake, Doyle's Lake, and Premier Lake. Perhaps the favorite rendezvous is Premier Lake. This lake is situated about thirty-eight miles from Cranbrook. It is three and a half miles long and one mile wide. Mountains surround it on every side, and it is very deep. There is no visible outlet for the waters. Springs that rise adjacent to the lake and streams from the mountain sides gush to rest in its placid bed.

On August 12th, 1975, the Game Conservation Board of the Eastern District of British Columbia furnished Premier Lake, along the Kootenay Central Railway, a branch of the C. P. R., with 10,000 Kamloops fry, 'each one then being about three-quarters of an inch long. A prophecy was made that the fry within four years would develop into fish weighing between twelve and thirty pounds. The accompanying illustration shows some of the fish caught when three years old. 





Fox Farming on Prince Edward Island



FEW years before the war, silver fox farming suddenly sprang into the list of Canadian industries, and from Atlantic to Pacific travellers in the observation cars of the C. P. R. used to have pointed out to them fences where thousands of dollars worth of animals were said to be penned up. Companies were formed to exploit fox farms, and the speculation was about as great as that in the Calgary oilfields. Since the outbreak of war less has been heard of this boom, and yet in certain districts it still seems to flourish. Fox furs are still in demand and are worth

a great deal of money.

At the beginning of the pelting season in 1917 the number of foxes on the ranches of Prince Edward Island was approximately 10,000. From December 1st, 1917, to January 31st, 1918, 2,500 foxes were killed and their skins sold. In 1918 there was a pup production of 3,500, thus making the number of foxes at the opening of the last pelting season 11,000. Allowing for a kill of 3,500 during the past season and the shipment of a small number abroad the season of 1919 will open for ranch breeding with about 7,000 selected foxes as a breeding stock.

Good silver fox furs are of great value. They are worn by real queens and movie queens. When the daughter of the Duke of Devonshire was married not long ago a silver fox fur was one of the most prized gifts she re-

One of the best known fox ranches has a central passage through which is carried the feed to be distributed on either side and which is also used for carrying away the refuse from the pens. 
