WILL THERE BE MODIFICATION?

Joint Meetings of the Allied Experts Have the Matter Under Consideration

Paris, June 4.—The atmosphere in Peace Conference circles was full of speculation to-day as to possible modifications in several of the clauses of the treaty with Germany, but nothing tangible is expected to develop until the outcome of the joint meetings of Allied experts becomes known.

It is understood that Premier Clemenceau maintains a firm attitude against any revision of the treaty. The German counter offer of a hundred billion marks as an indemnity surprised some of the Entente financial experts, who all along had believed that the prospects of getting much more from Germany were not particularly good.

These experts argue that from the viewpoint of world credit arrangements, it might be better to base the future financial plans of the Entente governments upon a definite sum of one hundred billion marks, voluntarily offered, than upon an indefinite assessment, which the Germans might accept only under protest.

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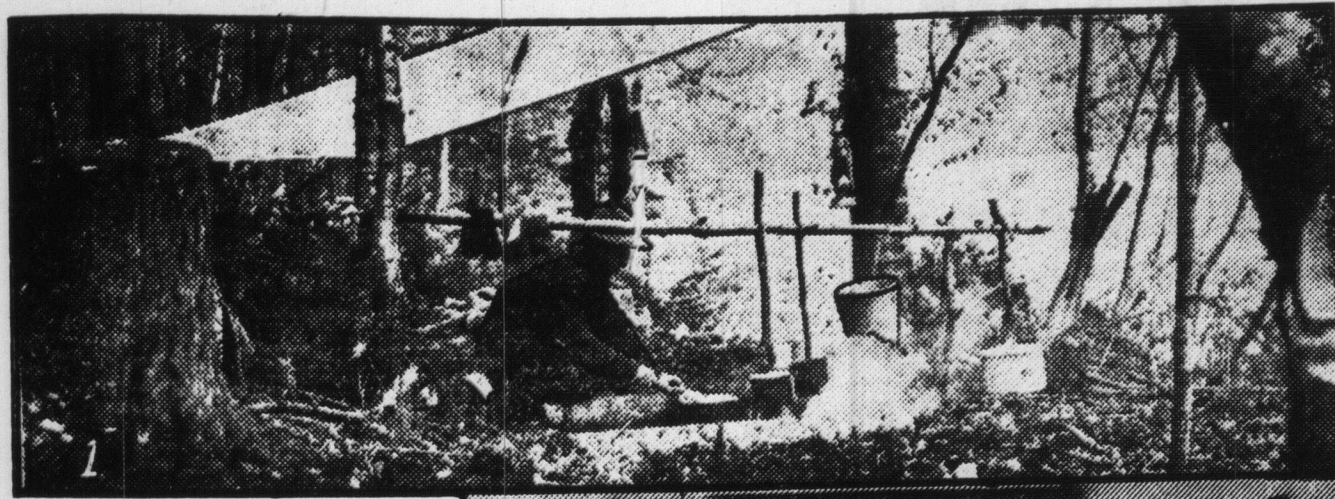
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## A Wonderful Fishing Region



THE rivers and lakes in the vicinity of Cranbrook, British Columbia, on the Crow's Nest line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, are happy and prolific haunts for lovers of fishing. All these waters are well stocked with mountain or cut throat trout, rainbow trout, Dolly Varden trout, bull trout, landlocked salmon or Kamloops trout. Excellent catches are made in the fishing season. Foremost amongst the fishing waters of this region are: St. Mary's Lake and river, Kootenay River, Moyle Lake and river, Gold Creek, Cherry Creek, Perry Creek Lake, Doyle's Lake and Premier Lake. Perhaps the favorite rendezvous is Premier Lake. This lake is situated about thirty-eight miles from Cranbrook. It is three and a half miles long and one mile wide. Mountains surround it on every side, and it is very deep. There is no visible outlet for the waters. Springs that rise adjacent to the lake and streams from the mountain sides gush to rest in its placid bed.



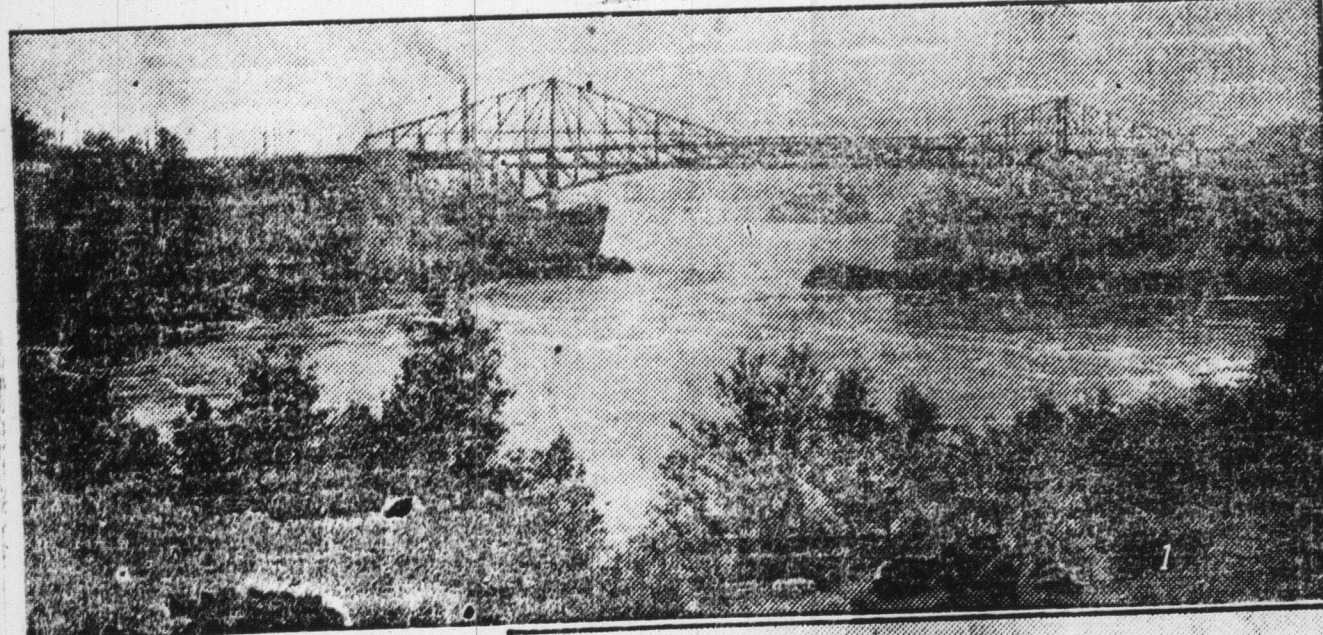
Landlocked salmon caught in Premier Lake, British Columbia, on May 15th, 1918.

On August 12th, 1915, the Game Conservation Board of the Eastern District of British Columbia furnished Premier Lake, along the Kootenay Central Railway, a branch of the C. P. R., with 10,000 Kamloops trout fry, each one then being about three-quarters of an inch long. A prophecy was made that the fry within four years would develop into fish weighing between twelve and thirty pounds. The accompanying illustration shows some of the fish caught when three years old.

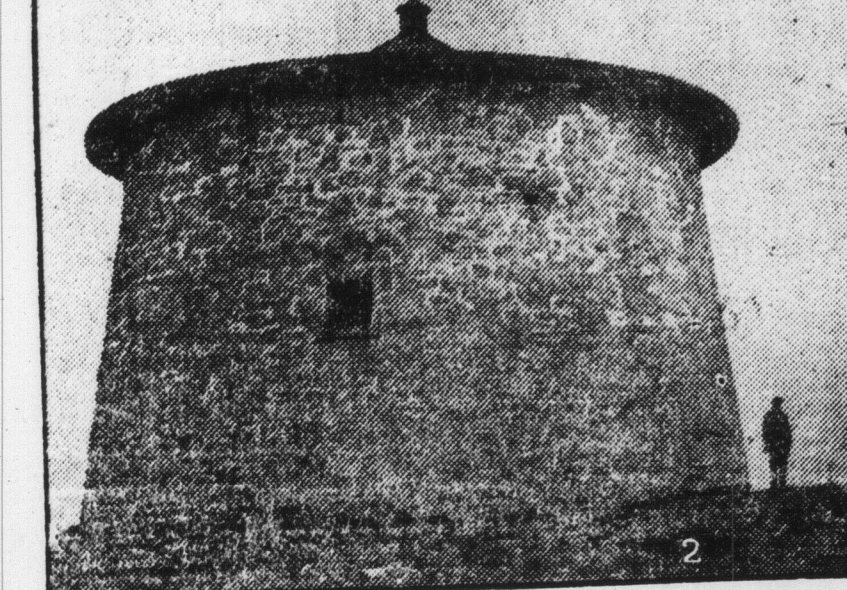
Realizing the sporting possibilities of the Cranbrook region some of the residents met in Cranbrook on November 7th, 1917, and formed the Cranbrook District Rod and Gun Club. A hatchery was started in Cranbrook; 200,000 eggs were brought in and incubated. The enterprise was a huge success, and fry were distributed: 75,000 in St. Mary's Lake, 12,000 in Rock Lake, 25,000 in Premier Lake, 50,000 in Moyle Lake, 2,000 in Doyle's Lake, about 4,000 in Perry Creek Lake. These fish will spawn at the age of four years, and

when they begin to multiply in the natural way it is certain that Cranbrook will be one of the finest fishing districts in the world. The best season for fishing these waters is from May 1st to June 15th and from August 1st to September 30th. The fly is used generally with success. Trolling will bring good results in St. Mary's, Moyle and Premier lakes. Distances from Cranbrook to the different fishing waters vary, but none of the lakes and rivers is difficult of access. Good automobile roads radiate in all directions. The scenery of the Cranbrook fishing district is beautiful, and in addition to a creel laden with splendid trout, the fisherman will bring home with him memories of a landscape as fair as the eye can anywhere behold.

## The City of the Reversible Falls



The Bay of Fundy is famous for its tides which are reputed to be the highest in the world, and the variation in the harbor depth, owing to the great rise and fall in the tides, is from 20 feet at ordinary neap tides to 25 feet of water at ordinary spring tides. St. John is the winter port of the C.P.R., and has splendid facilities for handling ocean traffic. The harbor is entered from two channels, the east channel being used for large vessels and that on the west side for smaller craft. Numerous large berths stand in the harbor and alongside them there are many capacious warehouses and some big grain elevators. The war has stimulated shipbuilding in St. John.

The chief attraction for the tourist to St. John is the Reversible Falls, a curious phenomenon due to the great tides. When the tide of Fundy Bay is low the waters of the St. John river pour under the great railway bridge in the form of rapids. But when the tide begins to rise it forces back the current of the river and gushes up into its bed with great force. This continues until full tide. Then as the tide recedes, the immense volume of water in the bed of the river dashes to the Bay in a massive whirling sheet of foam. At low tide the piled up water, and at high tide the incoming flood of the Bay of Fundy is higher than the river. That is the explanation of the phenomenon. It is only at certain periods of the day that the falls may be seen at their best. The river is deep, but no boat, however large, dare venture on these waters when they are falling. Small boats

go up and down the river at opportune times when the waters are in their mildest moods. Lancaster Heights overlook the port of St. John, and it is here that Martello tower stands. This tower was built over a century ago as a watch tower over the harbor. Since the Canadian Pacific Railway has taken over the hotel at Digby, Nova Scotia, known as "The Pines," there is likely to be an increased influx of visitors to the Land of Evangeline in the future. Before crossing the Bay of Fundy from New Brunswick to Digby there is a great

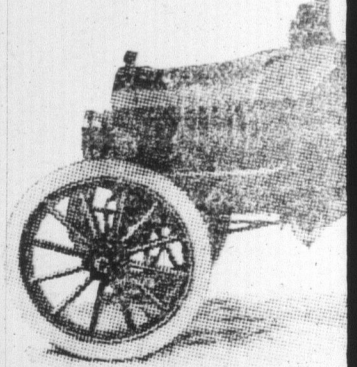

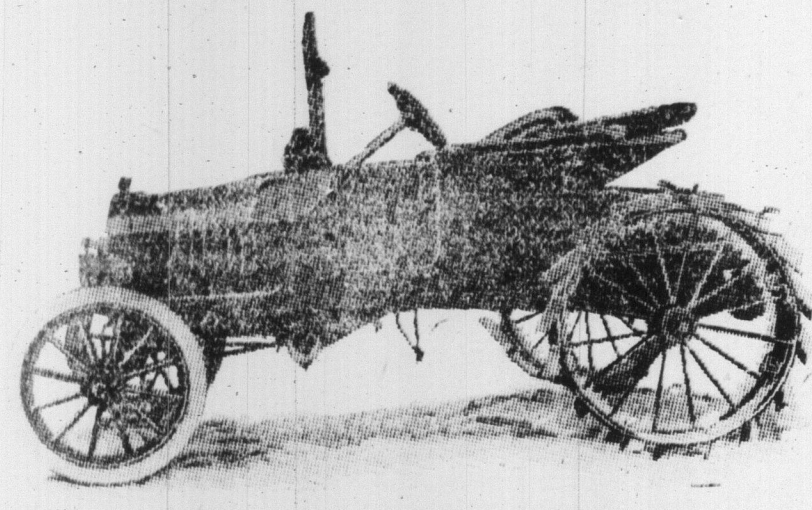



**Fox Farming on Prince Edward Island**



A FEW years before the war, silver fox farming suddenly sprang into the list of Canadian industries, and from Atlantic to Pacific travellers in the observation cars of the C. P. R. used to have pointed out to them fences where thousands of dollars worth of animals were said to be penned up. Companies were formed to exploit fox farms, and speculation was about as great as that in the Calgary oilfields. Since the outbreak of war less has been heard of this boom, and yet in certain districts it still seems to flourish. Fox furs are still in demand and are worth a great deal of money.

At the beginning of the pelting season in 1917 the number of foxes on the ranches of Prince Edward Island was approximately 10,000. From December 1st, 1917, to January 31st, 1918, 2,500 foxes were killed and their skins sold. In 1918 there was a pup production of 3,500, thus making the number of foxes at the opening of the last pelting season 11,000. Allowing for a kill of 3,500 during the past season and the shipment of a small number abroad the season of 1919 will open for ranch breeding with about 7,000 selected foxes as a breeding stock.

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One of the best known fox ranches has a central passage through which is carried the feed to the hard earth, which is known as hard-pan. titution were provided. The wire netting runs down into the ground about three or four feet, or to the hard earth, which is known as hard-pan. The walls are nine or ten feet high and have overhangs of netting extending two feet on either side of perpendicular walls to prevent the foxes from getting out or other foxes getting in. The latest model fox house is a twin-house, one being the den and the other the living room with a chute connecting and another chute for entrance from outside to the living room. These houses are each about four feet long, two feet wide and eighteen inches high with hinged

roof to enable cleaning and catching foxes. Americans bought 253 island foxes in 1918. Japanese and Norwegians are entering the fox breeding industry. Japan took 34 island foxes last year and Norway took 24. Good pups were realized, averaging about \$100 each.

A good time to visit a fox ranch is in the spring when the pups are usually looking their best. In April, mature to full growth by following November and produce young in the succeeding spring.

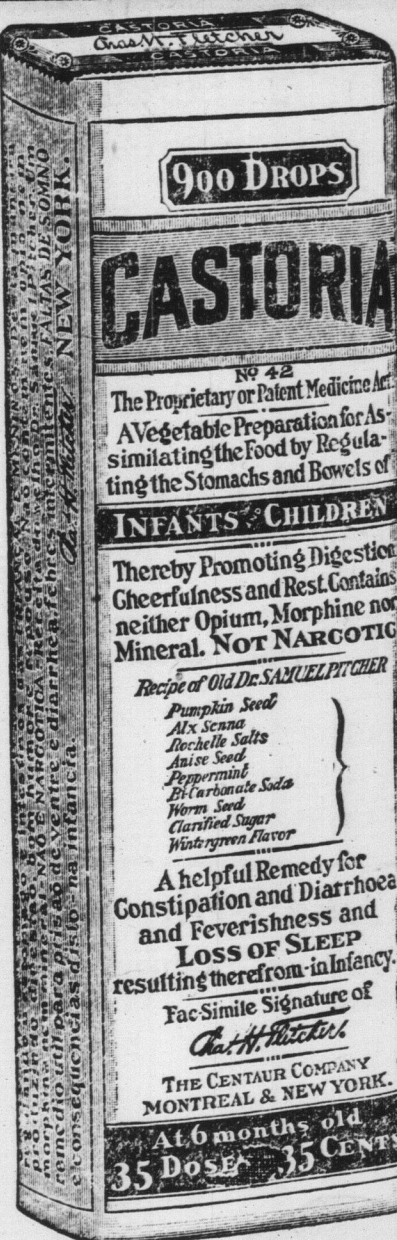

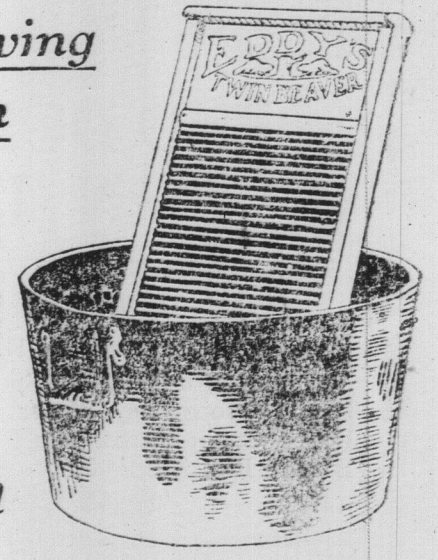

They range in length from seventy five to ninety five feet, and measure from eighteen to twenty five inches in diameter. They were discharged into the harbor Thursday afternoon and will be towed to Meteghan, expecting four which have been purchased by the Scotia Shipbuilding Co., for the vessel building in their yard at Yarmouth North.

### Successful Flight Across the Atlantic

London, June 15.—The final goal of all the ambitions which flying men have ventured to dream since the Wright brothers first rose from the earth in a heavier-than-air machine was realized this morning, when two young British officers, Captain John Alcock and Lieut. Arthur W. Brown, landed on the Irish coast after the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic ocean.

Their voyage was without accident and without unforeseen incident, so far as can be learned. It was a straightaway, clean-cut flight achieved in 16 hours and 12 minutes, from Newfoundland to Clifden, Ireland, a distance of more than 1,900 miles.
