Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants the Clergy ; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign, and the labours of those Missionaries who are proclaiming the same in this Province. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—AMEN.

O MERCIFUL GOD, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made, nor wouldest the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live : Have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word ; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ, our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end.—AMEN.

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CONSTITUTION.

I.

The Society shall be called **THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese ; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary, within six months of the said meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting ; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member ; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same a Member of the Society. Provided that no Member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such meeting.

VI.

OFFICERS.

1. The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, if any, shall be the senior Vice-Presidents ; and any life member may, at any meeting of the General Committee, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee ; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year ; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a special meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The officers of the Society, as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life

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Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound : to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or St. John, on the first Wednesday in January; on the day next following the Annual Meeting ; on the first Wednesday in March ; on the first Wednesday in June ; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following the aforementioned days, as may be approved by the President, or, in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting ; but, so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate, and property whatsoever, which may now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in Session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer, and Secretary or Secretaries, of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, *ex officio*.

2. Five Clerical and seven Lay-Members of the Society, qualified for election as Members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the

General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed Member by two Members of the General Committee, together with one Clerical or Lay representative chosen by each Deanery and resident within the same, whose name shall be certified to the Committee by the Secretary of such Deanery, as having been duly elected at a regular meeting.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five Members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

OBJECTS.

The Society shall embrace the following objects and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

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7. The creation of a Fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or securities as Special Trusts.

11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any Member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

LOCAL COMMITTEES.

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the Members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to elect two Lay Delegates and two Substitutes at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The Members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay Delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the said Delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct ; and the said Delegates, upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as Members of the General Committee.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special Meeting of the General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or, in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks' notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIV.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz. : The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the

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Auditors ; the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees, as before provided ; all such persons being subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The Members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* Members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society, and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows :

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the Members present ; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held ; provided that in every such case a Report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

1. The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

2. The Clergy are further requested to take up, annually, in their respective Churches, a collection for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided for, be equally divided between—(1.) The Widows and Orphans Fund. (2.) The Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund. (3.) The Children of the Clergy Education Fund. (4.) The Divinity Scholarship Fund. Provided that any such special collection may, at the option of the Congregation from which the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the Special Funds or purposes of the Society, in such proportions as they may direct; and provided also that the yearly collection required by the rules of the Widows and Orphans Fund, in the case of Clergymen joining such Fund, shall, in such cases, be considered as the special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries; therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in Session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a). The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church, in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c). Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary through the Society shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled, in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d). Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e). The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter; if paid in money, the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer, and if paid in produce, such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

(f). Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g). Should neither the money nor receipts for produce, to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice (C); and should neither such money nor receipts have been so received by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice (D).

If, however, the arrears be subsequently paid, the Board shall have power to renew the grant on application from the Mission.

(h). In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed,

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unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i). It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(k). The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules, and regulations as may in their opinion be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That in every case of a Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return, on or before the first day of December in each year, shewing—

- (1). The general limits of his Mission.
- (2). The extent thereof in square miles.
- (3). The estimated number of the members of the Church of England living therein.
- (4). The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.
- (5). Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house, belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
- (6). The extent of the Church and Glebe Land connected therewith.
- (7). The income from such Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 1st April last.
- (8). The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
- (9). The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.
- (10). The average congregation in each place of worship.
- (11). The number of communicants.
- (12). The number of baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
- (13). The number of communicants.
 - A. Added
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
 - D. Present number.
- (14). The number confirmed.
- (15). Marriages.
- (16). Burials.
- (17). Names of Church Wardens.
- (18). Names of Lay Delegates to DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY and Synod.
- (19). The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions

forthwith, and before the General Committee, on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary, in default of rendering any such statement or return, so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the Board of Home Missions shall, as soon as may be, after the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns the printed returns and statement required annually by the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, and forward the same, reporting specially to the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, any Missionary who may be in default.

7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society, be requested to forward to the Secretary in like manner, on or before the first day of June in each year, the returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars may each year be published with the Society's Report, as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary Meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society; and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Venerable SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow, in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first of July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a

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grant, not exceeding \$100, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

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THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the second object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus of this Fund, and add the same to the Capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the Capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the Capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions, as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of Clergymen who are incapacitated by age or infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000, being the amount now specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to the relief of disabled Clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

2. The Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund and add the same to the Capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

4. Any Clergyman, duly appointed as Rector, Missionary, or Assistant Curate, in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application in writing to the Executive Committee, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The applicant shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension or income, of which he may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit; and in all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Executive Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of any application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure, with all its emoluments.

7. If at any time there should be more demands upon the Fund than its income will meet, the Executive Committee may revise the whole of the pensions according to their judgment.

8. If any pensioner shall be so far relieved from his disability as to resume any clerical duty, for which he receives any settled stipend, the pension shall cease as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund, unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his identity and continued disability shall accompany each draft for his pension.

11. The pensions shall be paid half-yearly in advance, on the first day of January, and the first day of July, in each year; and shall commence on the first of these days which shall happen after the pension is granted, and terminate on the first of those days which shall happen after the death of the pensioner, or any other event by which such pension is to cease.

12. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "The

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CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND," which shall consist of the present Capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities) of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased clergymen, in accordance with these rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the **SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL**, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments and all congregational collections shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days. If this rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above rules, **THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY** undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension of Two Hundred Dollars, to the Widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood. Provided that in case the income should at any time be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions, for which it may be liable, such pensions shall be reduced by the Executive Committee, *pro rata*; provided, nevertheless, that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

6. If the widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the will of the Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are

unwilling or unable to act; or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application for the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from the Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

14. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations, and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener if required by him.

16. None of the above rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK HEREBY CERTIFIES, That the Rev. of has this day paid to the "Widows and Orphans Fund," of this Society, the sum of being his first payment under the annexed Rules and Regulations. And THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK hereby covenants and engages out of the Special Fund called the "Widows and Orphans Fund," and none other, to pay the widow or children of the said. after his decease, the Pension of Two Hundred Dollars per annum, so long as the same shall be payable according to the Rules and Regulations annexed. PROVIDED ALWAYS, That the said. shall yearly and every year, on the first day of January, make the annual payment of and otherwise faithfully observe and comply with the said annexed Rules and Regulations. Provided that in case the income should, at any time, be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions, for which it may be liable, such pension shall be reduced by the Executive Committee *pro rata*, provided, nevertheless, that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto (being \$1,869.79) of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to, or applied by, the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of Clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died, or retired with the Bishop's approval, on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, who if they shall think fit, may vest such management in a sub-committee, at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant, to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension, or income, of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, may, in any case, require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee or its sub-committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, shall determine, in each case, the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee, be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith as the Executive Committee or its sub-committee may direct.

9. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.

That, in future, no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

ABSENCE OF MISSIONARY.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee, for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

LIST OF SUBSCRIBERS.

That, in the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, be required, in their lists of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

CONDITIONS OF GRANTS.

Whereas, The grants made by THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions,

Therefore resolved, That, in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

REQUESTS TO BE FUNDED.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

RETURNS FROM PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes, and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized.

Therefore resolved,—1. That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

CONTRIBUTIONS—HOW CHARGEABLE.

That the Secretary of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions, reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting, and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

SECRETARIES OF LOCAL COMMITTEES.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish, annually, to the Treasurer of THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

That the certificates of the Lay Delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

MISSIONS BECOMING VACANT.

That when any Mission now receiving aid from the Society shall become vacant, the grant from the Society shall therefrom cease, and

shall only be renewed upon application to the General Committee, or to the Board of Home Missions, and upon such terms as to assessment and grant as they, or either of them, shall consider equitable.

AID TO LOCAL ENDOWMENTS.

Whereas, It is desirable that this Society should encourage the formation of moderate endowments to take the place of grants now made to Missions throughout the Diocese, which grants must of necessity be rapidly reduced, and in many cases completely withdrawn, before very long;

Therefore resolved, That if at any time within the next three years any Mission receiving a grant from this Society shall raise an endowment of not less than Three Thousand Dollars, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer of this Society, in trust, for the payment of the stipend of the Missionary, the Board of Home Missions shall be authorized to order the Treasurer to pay into such Trust Fund, out of the Capital Funds of the Society, not specially appropriated, a sum equal to double the grant that such Mission may be receiving from the Society at the time such endowment is completed; and thereupon all grants, in aid of such Missions, shall be withdrawn and shall not afterwards be renewed.

PROVISION FOR THE RETURN OF SUCH ADVANCES.

And further resolved, That in order to provide for the return to the Capital Funds of the Society of moneys so paid, the Treasurer shall reserve and set aside out of the income of the Society each year, for four years after such payment has been made, one-half the amount of the grant that such Mission was receiving at the time the endowment was completed, and shall re-invest the same as part of the Capital of the Society.

PROVISION AS TO THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF SUCH ADVANCES.

And further resolved, That the payments made under this resolution out of the Capital Funds of the Society shall not exceed Two Thousand Dollars, until further authority shall be given by the General Committee.

I.

Whereas, It is necessary that an increase be made in all the assessments, in order to meet the withdrawal of aid heretofore received from S. P. G.; and

Whereas, It is desirable that such increase be made gradually each year, rather than in large sums at longer intervals; and

Whereas, There are many inequalities in the present Schedule that should be removed; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions be directed during the ensuing year to revise the whole Schedule, and in doing so to arrange for an annual increase of \$500 at least in the total assessment, and a corres-

pending reduction in the grants from the D. C. S., and submit such revised Schedule to the General Committee next July; and further

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to carry the sum saved by such reduction of grants into a Reserve Fund, until the reduction in the S. P. G. Grant makes it necessary to use the same.

II.

TRAVELLING OUTFIT.

Whereas, It is very desirable that some provision should be made whereby men commencing work in this Diocese may be enabled to purchase the requisite travelling outfit without becoming involved in debt for the same; therefore

Resolved, That when a man commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the D. C. S., a sum not exceeding \$250 may be advanced to him for the purchase of the necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to serve at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be repaid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of the three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

III.

Resolved, That the statement made by the Board of Home Missions to the S. P. G. be printed in the Annual Report of the Society.

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RESOLUTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

GLEBE LAND COMMITTEE.

A Committee shall be appointed, to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, at public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale, and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purposes to advertise in any manner the said lands, or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the Seal of the Society to be affixed to the same, also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made: all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisions and stipulations of Chapter 59, 37th Victoria; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of lands leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by, the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

LISTS OF SUBSCRIBERS.

That the Committee on printing be requested, in publishing subscription lists in the Annual Report, to include those only which contain the names of subscribers to the Society; and that the Clergy be requested to forward only such lists for publication in the Report,

REPORT.

1884.

The members of the Society should be deeply thankful to Almighty God for the blessing He has vouchsafed upon its work during the past year, and especially that the ranks of the Missionaries have not been thinned out by death. Yet it must be a matter of great regret that several Missions have continued vacant so long. This great evil, in some instances, has lately been remedied. In a short time, there is reason to hope that other important posts, where the ministrations of the Church are earnestly required, will be occupied.

The members of the Church in this Diocese should again be reminded that within a short time the grant from the Society for Propagation of the Gospel will be largely curtailed, to end in a few years with its total withdrawal; the Church must soon be left to its own resources and become self-sustaining.

From a careful estimate made by the Board of Home Missions, it will be observed that an increased amount of annual contributions is requisite, in order to maintain the present Missions, as now provided for.

Every year there are found large settlements or districts, where are those professedly members of the Church, and others equally worthy of regard, wholly destitute of the means of

grace. To meet such requirements, and the proposed gradual withdrawal of the grant from the Society in England—it will be necessary to increase the Parochial assessments to a sum equal to the aggregate to that which will be annually withdrawn by the S. P. G. This assessment should be made, as far as may be, proportionately to the ability and local resources of the several Parishes or Missions.

In the performance of the plain duty to which the members of the Church are now called, they should remember how much has been done for them, in the very things they are required to do for others. They have received the benefit of large grants from the Societies in England for many years,—in many of the principal Parishes there are considerable endowments, and by the liberality of others, that noble endowment has been provided for the Diocese, by which the invaluable services of two Bishops are afforded without any charge upon the Church.

Besides the maintenance of Missions, which may be regarded as the first great purpose of this Society, it has other objects which strongly appeal to the regard of every member of the Church. Next in view to the provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, is the fund for the Aged and Incapacitated Clergy. It is impossible for the Clergy, from their stipends, often insufficient for necessary expenses, to lay by, in health and strength, any provision for infirmity or advancing years. Instances exist, and must continue to arise, when Missionaries, whose life and strength have been spent in the Master's service, must continue their labors or stand in want of the necessities of life.

In all such cases the Society should provide means for well-earned rest, and the work once so fully performed should be entrusted to young and active men.

The attention of the members of the Society is called to the subjoined abstracts of the Reports of the Missionaries, and also to the Statistical Returns.

REPORTS FROM MISSIONARIES AND LOCAL COMMITTEES.

ALBERT—REV. A. J. CRESSWELL.

"On March 1st, last, the Bishop appointed me to the vacant Mission of Albert County. I had arrived in Canada only a few days previous to setting out to my Mission—being in Deacon's Orders. The weather for the first 2½ months was such that I could not get about to visit the people, as I desired—and consequently it is no matter of surprise that I have not yet got to know the people who claim allegiance to the Church.

"This Mission being vacant for some considerable time, on my arrival I found no list of Church people, and I was dependent for this which was lacking on the knowledge of some few who did their best to supplement it.

PLACES IN THE COUNTY WHERE CHURCH SERVICES ARE HELD.

Hopewell Hill.—"Here is a small neat Church, for which prior to my arrival, a few devoted Church members showed their zeal, by holding a bazaar, realizing \$150, with which they repaired the Temple of God.

"The congregations are of course small (owing to the withdrawal of the church), and I learn a good many people have joined themselves to other religious bodies, in the absence of Church services in Hopewell Hill. Now, that the Church is repaired and is in their midst, I pray God that they may return "unto the Shepherd and Bishop of their souls." Here, too, I hope (D. V.) in a few weeks, to start a Sunday School.

Riverside.—"Three miles from the Church at Hopewell Hill, and three miles from Harvey, is Riverside. Here there is quite a collection of houses, and a good congregation might be gathered together within a distance of two miles. Riverside is a village which has sprung up within the last few years. I have been fortunate in hiring a large "Public Hall," where every other Sunday afternoon we have service, and the congregations have been numerous and very attentive. The second Sunday after Easter, I had a congregation of 120 in this Hall.

"In July (D. V.), I contemplate starting a Sunday School,

and have had the promise of one or two, who volunteer their services for teaching.

"Before closing my Report of Riverside, I must add that the Hon. Senator McLellan has offered us a site of land for a Church. We now want to start a fund for this, and I earnestly hope some churchman, who may read this, and who is "rich in this world," may be ready to give and glad to distribute "something" towards this object.

Harvey.—"Thirty-five years ago there existed both a nice little Church, a resident Clergyman, and a coterie of Church people in Harvey. It is needless to add that there are now great changes, *e. g.*, the Church is in a very delapidated condition, and would (on the authority of a Church architect) cost as much to repair as to build a new one! The Church members are no more.

"I think there are about ten members of the Church in Harvey; however, there are some few who are favorably disposed towards the Church.

"I have had service in a Methodist Meeting House once a fortnight, the congregations being at times good; but sometimes literally the "two or three" to whom Christ's presence is promised; but still I purpose keeping it up if possible."

Hillsborough.—"Here there are four families who are very anxious to have Church service, and to hear the Liturgy and Collects, which are "dear to the English ear." We have engaged the Masonic Hall, and every alternate Sunday Divine service is held. I am delighted to report (though on my arrival, I was told that it was "the hardest point in the county" as regards Church work) that the few Church members in Hillsboro' have evinced great energy and already have purchased an organ, and the fortnightly congregations and offertories are far beyond what I was led to expect. I really think the people appreciate the services, for on three different occasions I have had voluntary subscriptions given me towards the "Organ Fund." These contributors, I may add, have attended the services, but are not Churchmen.

"The Church people at Hillsboro' are very much in earnest, and contemplate building a Church, the land having already been promised.

"These four places are the only stations I have hitherto had

regular services at. When I possess a horse and carriage I hope to visit the following places:

- (1). Alma.
- (2). Salmon River.
- (3). New Ireland, where once the Church flourished but is now too delapidated.
- (4). Cape.

"I regret, however, to add that I have suffered since my stay in Albert County from throat trouble. I cannot, at present, take more than two services on Sunday.

"Before closing this small sketch of Church work, I must mention the visit of his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor. On the first Sunday after Easter (the octave) his Lordship came and administered the Holy Communion to the few faithful, who for many months have been entirely without this precious means of grace.

The offertories for the two services, viz.: At Hopewell Church and at Hillsboro' in the evening, amounted to \$7.66—and were given to the D. C. S., as the "first-fruits" of the Mission. The little Church at the Hill was tastily decorated, while his Lordship added to the decorations by very kindly presenting us with two Kneelers for the Chancel, an Altar Frontal, and Pulpit Hanging.

"I hope I may be pardoned when I say I find it is very hard uphill work here. Being alone, and awkwardly distant from a brother Clergyman, of course there are times when one feels lonely; but what I require is patience—and to leave the results in the hands of God "who giveth the increase."

Contributions to the amount of \$32.

BATHURST—REV. W. H. STREET.

"The hopes often expressed in former reports, have been so far realized that I am now able to report the completion and consecration of the Parish Church at Bathurst.

"After years of waiting and anxiety, we could not feel too thankful that our beloved Metropolitan was spared in health and strength to set apart to Almighty God a work, which being assisted by his Lordship's ever ready and substantial aid, was to the best of our ability carried out according to a design recommended by his correct views of Church architecture, as consistent with that style of building.

"This "House of Prayer" was set apart without *reserve* to its sacred use inasmuch as the seats are *free* and unappropriated, the fruit of which is the evident increase of the congregation, and more reverent appreciation of the services.

"During the cold winter months the Church was most comfortable, thanks to an admirably arranged "furnace." This simple contrivance has proved such a success, that I would recommend Mr. Boss, of Bathurst, who did the work for us, as a most efficient man in anything of the kind. So often hearing complaints of the failure of furnaces in many Churches of the Diocese and elsewhere, I take the opportunity of mentioning this.

"In connection with all this Church work, I must bear witness to the hearty co-operation of our small band of willing contributors and workers—whose financial resources have been sorely strained during the year passed.

"Sixteen miles from Bathurst—at New Bandon—there is a Church sadly out of repair. Built in the early settlement of the county, it has neither Chancel nor Vestry. In fact it is entirely unsuited, as at present arranged, for reverent worship. We can only hope to improve matters by appealing to the kind sympathy and aid of friends elsewhere, as the local resources are very limited.

"We constantly read with saddened hearts of those scattered sheep, in many parts of the Diocese, deprived of the means of grace. What must be the needs, for instance, of a field like this, embracing as it does a whole county, and extending to the mouth of the St. Lawrence.

"My list of contributors to the D. C. S., is not yet complete. But I trust that financial depression and the numerous calls of local work during the year will not in any way interfere with our duty in aiding to our utmost the general funds of the Society.

BAY DU VIN—REV. W. J. WILKINSON.

"The following are some of the principal Church notes since last the Society met. The services have been kept up without much interruption. During the summer months there is daily morning and evening Prayer. The Holy Communion is celebrated, when possible, every Sunday and Holy Day. Services have been held fortnightly in a School House,

up the Bay du Vin River, to enable the Church people who have not horses or waggons to attend Divine Service.

"The number of infants baptized during the year is six. One marriage has been solemnized, and two funerals have taken place.

"We are deeply indebted to the B. H. M. for increasing its grant, \$40.00, and for taking that amount off the assessment. The Mission, however, had got so far in arrears, owing to the death and removal of some large contributors towards the assessment that the Mission is now just one quarter in arrears. This amount has, however, been advanced by the Church Warden, from quarter to quarter, and an effort will be made, this summer, when there is money in circulation, to make it up. Several improvements have been made to the Rectory and grounds since my last report. A suitable porch or wood house has been built, at a cost of \$80.00. The rooms on the first floor of the house have been painted, and a paling fence put around the grounds.

"On Thursday, June 26th, we had a visit from the Most Rev. the Metropolitan, who confirmed eleven persons.

"The "willing workers" have met regularly every week at the Rectory, and have realized, from the sale of their work, a handsome sum, which has been expended upon the Rectory. I have not yet taken up the annual collection for the Society, as I find I cannot get money from the majority of the persons till later in the season."

BRIGHT, QUEENSBURY AND SOUTHAMPTON— REV. W. LEB. MCKIEL.

"In reporting from this Mission, I would beg to remind the Society that when Queensbury and Southampton were joined to Bright for the purpose of being served with the Church's ministrations by the Clergyman residing in Bright, it was understood that the arrangement was only a temporary one, and to cease whenever the two Missions were able to enter into agreement with the Society for the support of a Clergyman in each of the Missions. It is to be hoped that this will not be lost sight of and that every exertion will be made both by the Diocesan Church Society and the Church people in the respective Missions to have the old Missions re-established. I have urged this upon the attention of the members of the Church in Queensbury and Southampton, and

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an attempt will, I believe, be made this summer to see if the amount required can be raised.

"During the past year the work has been carried on as usual. On All-Saints Day there was a special confirmation at St. Paul's Church, Upper Keswick, when there were twenty-one confirmed by the Coadjutor Bishop. Evidences of fresh life and zeal can be seen in the Church on the Keswick, and the Church is growing and gaining ground every day. Among the improvements are new fences at the Churches in Caverhill and St. Paul's, Keswick.

"Reports the sum of \$2.18 from Mission boxes up to 1st July."

BURTON.—REV. W. GRIER.

"Rev. R. Simonds reports contributions amounting to \$77, with the prospect of an additional sum.

CAMBRIDGE.—REV. C. H. HATHEWAY.

"It is with deep thanksgiving to Almighty God that I now submit my first report to the Society, from this large Mission.

"At the request of the people, his Lordship the Metropolitan appointed me Priest in charge of this Mission, which consists of three civil Parishes, viz.: Cambridge, Waterborough and Chipman, and covers an area of about 400 square miles.

"There are three Churches and three Stations that have received regular attendance, and several outposts that have been occasionally visited.

"Our first step was to straighten up some of the tangled financial difficulties; which has been done partly, so that we now know somewhat of our troubles, and hope soon to have all in a more satisfactory condition.

"Then there was a collection for the D. C. S., which amounted to \$44.73.

"At the last meeting of the Society it was decided that the money which had accumulated from the time that the late Rector resigned until my appointment, should be left to the Finance Committee to decide what would be done with it. Later we received a letter from that Committee, stating that the sum of \$266.66, with interest at four per cent. would be given to this Parish towards purchasing or erecting a Rectory,

when the Parish had raised a sufficient sum for this purpose. This resolution gave great satisfaction to us all: for we believed that the money, which was from the "Scovil Trust," should in some way benefit the Parish, when deprived of a resident Clergyman.

"With a few exceptions, there have been three Sunday services—one in each of the three churches—with a service at the Stations, during the week, and on Saints Days. All these services have been well attended, and to perform these duties I rode and drove over 2,000 miles.

"There has been much to encourage me in the way of Church improvements. At a concert and supper held last winter, at the residence of James B. Wiggins, Esquire, we cleared \$50.00, which at a Parish Meeting, was devoted towards the purchase of an organ—the first ever placed in the Church of the Parish of Waterborough.

"And while at Jemseg we are contemplating renovating St. James Church or else, if possible, building a new one, the people of White's Cove have made an extra effort, and now the Parish Church is a credit, not only to the neighborhood, but to the Diocese. It has been painted thoroughly outside and inside, the walls have been stained with alabastine, and the roof and rafters are oiled and stained, while a neat Gothic surbase of pine and ash makes the building appear Church-like.

"All this, besides some decorations from kind friends in Fredericton, places our Parish Church on a equal with most Churches through the country.

"Some friends outside have kindly assisted us with the good work, especially the Metropolitan and Mrs. Medley.

"Our collection on Christmas was \$7.00, which we gave to Algoma: and our Ascension-tide offering was \$5.00, which was devoted to the Northwest Missions.

"There have been three Sunday Schools started this Spring, which are supplied with a grant of books from the S. P. C. K., procured for us through the kindness of Bishop Kingdon.

"We have adopted the New Register, and from it we see there have been three marriages, six burials, thirty baptisms, seven of which were adults.

"There is a class awaiting the Holy Rite of Confirmation: for his Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor, has promised (D.V.) to be with us next Sunday.

"For these and all other mercies God's Holy Name be praised."

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CAMPOBELLO & WEST ISLES—REV. H. H. NEALES.

"Quite an interesting account might be given of this Mission, apart from the ordinary annual record of work done and progress made. It is the oldest Mission of the S. P. G. in the Diocese, being established in 1791. It has had for many years the fostering care of the family who, until four years ago, owned the Island, and yet strange to say, notwithstanding this, and the faithful work of earnest, faithful men, it has not made nearly the progress that has been made by many other newer and less favoured Missions.

"I must not dwell, however, upon this topic, as of course, what is desired are notes of actual occurrences during the year in the Parish. Very soon after the Church Meeting in Fredericton, last summer, our venerable and dearly loved Bishop gave us the pleasure and blessing of his presence for three days.

"During the time his Lordship was with us, he preached twice and gave two addresses, administering the Rite of Confirmation to twenty persons, and besides, in company with Mrs. Medley, visiting a number of the people. I need not say how happy we were to have them with us.

"We have also had built for us during the past year a new Rectory, at a cost of a trifle over \$3,700.00. This may seem a large sum to expend in a rural Mission Station. There are two things to be said about it. The same building could have been erected in almost any other part of the Diocese at a much lower cost; partly in consequence of our insular position, and chiefly because the influx of wealthy Americans has had the effect of more than doubling the previous cost of labour of every kind. The fact, also, that it is probably the most comfortable and convenient country Parsonage in the Province, will in part account for the expense. A condition of the large help given in building, was that it should be thus furnished.

"Miss Derby, a most estimable lady, of Boston, who spends her summers on this Island, originated the idea of a new Rectory, secured the plans, and by her energetic efforts got together the majority of the means for building. The balance was made up by the exertions of the Parish Sewing Society, and by the sale of the old parsonage, \$900.00 of the proceeds of which were used for the purpose.

"Miss Derby, however, was not satisfied with seeing the

house built. She did not rest until it was also suitably and comfortably furnished throughout.

"We have also to thank other ladies and gentlemen among the summer visitors, for kind aid given in many ways.

"Miss Emery, of New York, kindly supplied the Sunday School with a year's supply of the *Young Christian Soldier*. Mrs. Derby, of Boston, gave us \$25.00 for the Sunday School Library, and Mr. Conarroe \$5.00, for the Sunday School Festival at Christmas.

"The civil Parish of Deer Island, which really embraces the two islands, Indian and Deer, forms a part of this Mission. I have visited both Islands. On Deer Island there are three or four kinds of Baptists and a number of Methodists. I could not discover one Church family. I found a very few isolated nominal Church people, I can only recollect one who had been a communicant. On Indian Island there are a number really members of the Church. There is no place of worship and no other religious services are held. I am giving them a fortnightly Sunday service—having one of the Campobello boatmen to take me down. So far the offertories have paid the expenses. This trip occupies about four hours, and is not without some little danger. Last Sunday a sudden squall struck the little vessel in which we were going, causing her to ship a large quantity of water, and compelling us to lower the sail as quickly as possible—any one but an experienced boatman would have fared badly.

"As in my opinion, this is the worst possible time of the year to gather money for the D. C. S., I intend postponing, for the present, the annual collection; also trusting that we shall soon receive the additional impetus of a visit from the Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese on behalf of the Society.

CARLETON AND FAIRVILLE—REV. LEB. W. FOWLER.

"On the First Sunday after Easter I began duty in Carleton and Fairville.

"In Carleton, the Church is both small and old, but has been recently much improved, and is always well filled with devout and hearty worshippers.

"The congregation are working hard for a Rectory, which they hope to complete next spring.

"At Fairville, I found the Church of the Good Shepherd,

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begun just before the Saint John fire, was still, in consequence of that fire, nothing but a shell. About \$600.00 had been collected, a sum sufficient to make the Church ready for use, and work upon the building was in actual progress. We hope to use it for service in a few weeks. But it will be far from completion. The congregation are poor in this world's goods, though strong in faith, and are nobly struggling to build a decent House of Prayer.

"I trust the Diocesan Church Society will continue its present grant to this Mission, for a few years more at least.

"There certainly *ought* to be another Missionary at work in Fairville, and the surrounding country, but *how* he could be supported, at present, I cannot see. The Church is the sufferer.

"The contributions from Carleton and Fairville amount to \$62.00. Amount from Home Mission boxes for 1883-4, reported by Rev. T. E. Dowling, \$82.37."

CHATHAM—REV. D. FORSYTH.

"I am thankful to report to the General Committee that, notwithstanding the contributions made to Foreign and Domestic Missions and the local requirements of our Parish, the amount contributed to the Diocesan Church Society will equal and perhaps exceed that of last year. Since my last report, this Parish has contributed \$33.00 to the Foreign Missions of the S. P. G. in response to the Epiphany appeal of the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Canadian Church, and \$32.00 in response to the Ascension-tide appeal. This represents an increase for these two purposes of about \$40.00 over last year. It is therefore very gratifying that, notwithstanding the unusual depression in trade, and the nearness of the Ascension-tide appeal to the time for making the annual collections for the D. C. S., there has been no decrease in the contributions to our Diocesan Missions. During the past year, a Parochial Missionary Association has been formed, and is accomplishing much good. Probably nearly \$100 will be collected within a year for Missionary and Parochial purposes. Seventy-five copies each of *The Canadian Missionary*, *Banner of Faith*, and *Gospel Missionary*, are distributed in the Parish, and supply healthful reading matter. The Parochial Guild has held regular weekly meetings during the year, and has accomplished very

much good. With the Divine Blessing upon this organization, for Prayer is made at every meeting, I hope for yet greater things to come to pass. Since my last report, we have been favoured with two visits from the venerable Metropolitan, and one from the Bishop Coadjutor. In September last, the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, held a confirmation, at which 37 candidates were presented for the "laying on of hands."

"I am glad to say that daily Public Prayer has been continued without very much interruption during the year. Evening Prayer has been said during the winter, and Morning and Evening during summer, when other duties do not interfere. Thankful for these daily blessings and privileges and for the health and strength to work, I have great pleasure in presenting this brief report of the past year's proceedings, rejoicing in the hope that they may have been counted worthy of the Divine Blessing, and that they may be instrumental in making God's "power and glory, and the mightiness of His Kingdom more fully known among us."

DERBY—REV. AUG. F. HILTZ.

"Owing to the hardness of the times, we have not been so active in Church affairs as during other years, although we have not been altogether idle. The new organ for the Derby Church, purchased something over a year ago, has been paid for; thanks to the ladies who are always foremost in Church work. Efforts are being made to procure funds for a font—an article of furniture which our Church, although an old one, has always lacked. And I trust that next year I shall be able to report that our efforts in this direction have been successful. We are indebted to Wm. T. Crocker, Esquire, of our own Parish, and H. D. Whitford, Esquire, of Liverpool, G. B., for valuable and handsome presents towards making our little Church more complete. The former has given drapery for the pulpit, altar, &c. &c., and the latter a very fine set of book-markers.

"A substantial fence has been erected around the graveyard in Blackville, at a cost of \$100.00. As there had been some delay in procuring suitable workmen to paint the interior of the Church, it was thought advisable to use, in this way, the money on hand for that object. But the parishioners had not given up the intention of the painting, but went to

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work immediately to raise money again for this purpose. They have now about enough, and the work will be proceeded with immediately.

"The congregation at Nelson has shown a decided increase during the past year. Extra services held during Lent were highly valued, and as well attended as those held on Sunday.

"In Derby, in addition to the Lenten services which I had formerly held, this year I held services every evening during Holy Week; and they were well attended.

"Owing to the general depression in business throughout the country, the contributions to the General Fund will suffer some diminution. I have decided to keep the lists open as long as possible, and cannot, therefore, tell what may be eventually collected; but the amount will not fall below \$136.00.

DORCHESTER—REV. J. ROY CAMPBELL.

"I have very little to report to the Society, but good words and good wishes and a free will offering of two hundred and eighty-two dollars and thirty-eight cents, (\$282.38,) for the general purposes of the Society, made up by \$25.30 cents from two semi-annual collections; \$44.08 from Mission Boxes; and \$213.00 from annual subscriptions. My people find it somewhat hard to maintain themselves and help others as well; but I will do them the justice of saying, as the list will show, that they are learning the lesson not ungracefully."

FREDERICTON.—REV. GOODRIDGE ROBERTS.

GAGETOWN—REV. JAMES NEALES.

"When the roll of the Clergy was called at our last D. C. S. Meeting, but one responsive voice was heard of those who forty years ago attended, with me, the Annual Meeting of this

Society held in Fredericton, under the presidency of its chief promoter and founder the venerable Archdeacon Coster. Death has reaped his harvest; but the life of the Church continues, and He continues ever, who has promised, "Lo, I am with you always." There is nothing to discourage us in the present state of the Church. It has gone on, in spite of trials and difficulties, prospering and increasing, strengthening its stakes and lengthening its cords, from that time to this. Sudden and severe sickness has made me feel the significance of the words *morituri salutemur*, but it is with the firm conviction that our places will be filled up, and the interests of Christ's Holy Catholic Church sustained by the young and well-trained soldiers of the cross, who are pressing on behind us. "The living, the living, they shall praise Thee, as I do this day."

"With regard to my own Parish, I have little to add to my last year's report; our work has gone progressively on, our numbers are maintained, the services of the Church have been regularly held, and her sacraments administered; and we have again a class of candidates preparing for the Apostolic rite of Confirmation, to be administered next month, by the Bishop Coadjutor.

"As I have not yet received the subscription papers from the collectors, I cannot state the amount subscribed, but trust that it will at least be equal to that of last year."

GRAND MANAN.—REV. W. S. COVERT.

"Reports contributions to the amount of \$19.25."

GREENWICH.—REV. D. W. PICKETT.

"Contributions to general purposes of D. C. S. this year will reach about \$55.00. This is a falling off from last year, which is to be accounted for, not by any increasing indifference to the claims of the D. C. S., whose continued liberality to the Parish is more and more appreciated every year, but by the pressure of local claims, chief among which are the repairs of the old Church and the building of a new one. The new Church is favorably situated on an eligible spot of ground about five miles below Oak Point. The exterior of the building is almost completed and the finishing of the interior is to be proceeded with at once. The work has been carried on

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so far without any material assistance outside of the Parish, and as the people are of limited means and money scarce, it progresses slowly. The "willing workers," by their persevering efforts have added largely to the funds, and deserve the thanks of all the parishioners. Repairs to some extent have been made upon the Parsonage, by means supplied by the Ladies' Church Aid Society. One of the three Sunday Schools has been closed, owing to the removal from the Parish of two members of the congregation, who were mainly instrumental in conducting it, but increased interest is manifested in this important work, through the establishment of the Sunday School Teachers' Union of Kingston Deanery.

"We are now looking forward to a visit from his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor, in the latter part of the summer, for the purpose of holding Confirmation."

HAMPTON.—REV. O. S. NEWNHAM.

"In the Autumn of last year, I was elected to succeed the venerable Canon Walker in the charge of this Parish, to which I removed in December last, since which time services have been regularly held in St. Paul's Church, Hampton, St. Andrews, French Village, Hampton Station and Hampton Village. A service is also held fortnightly on Darling's Island. The attendance at all the services has been good.

"Sunday Schools are held at the Village and Station, the average attendance at each School having been during the winter about 40.

"The Parish of Hampton having been a regularly organized Parish for so many years, there is not much to report—excepting the regular ministrations of the Church—which would scarcely be of much interest to the members of the Society.

"The amount of offerings to the general purposes of the Society is \$120.00. For several reasons this is somewhat less than last year, the chief one being that having been in charge for a portion of the year only, I was unable to have more than one collection in the Church, and the falling off is from this source only. The subscriptions are some \$9.00 in advance of last year. Considering that the Parish has to make up a larger amount this year for local needs, I think this is a good sign. I trust that next year will show an increase in the total amount—it will not be my fault if such is not the case."

JOHNSTON.—REV. J. R. DE W. COWIE.

"The past year has been but a preparation for work in this Parish, and the people are now ready and anxious to have their Clergyman take up his abode among them.

"The monthly services have been well attended at the Parish Church, and at the three Stations, and, as a sign of the interest which the people are beginning to take in the Church's services, I might mention that with the aid of a colporteur about \$20.00 worth of cheap Prayer Books and Hymn Books have been sold, and these are faithfully used.

"The new Church at Goshen will be ready for consecration by the first week in October.

"The present Missionary has not been able to solicit subscriptions for D. C. S. by going from house to house, but feels sure that as soon as Mr. Hanington settles among the people he will without difficulty be able to obtain at least \$30.00."

KINGSCLEAR.—REV. H. MONTGOMERY.

"In September last, at the request of the Lord Bishop, I undertook the charge of this Parish. The people gave me a cordial welcome, and rendered what assistance they could in my getting settled and at work. My first object was to find out how many members of the Church there were in the Parish. I was informed that the last census returns reported 439 members of the Church of England in this Parish. I at once set out to find them, but have not yet succeeded. Every part of the Parish has been searched for them, inquiries have been made for them, but they are not to be found. After diligent search and inquiry, I find that there are not over 215 real and nominal members of the Church. No doubt a few years ago there were more, the decrease may be accounted for partly, by the closing of the mill at Spring Hill, when (I am told) between eighty and one hundred members removed from the place, and partly because of the exodus of many of the young men from the Parish, who have been afflicted with the Western fever. I mention these statistics because they are facts which must be taken into consideration and dealt with by every Clergyman in taking charge of a Parish. And if I may humbly be permitted to say, ought to be known and considered by our Board of Home Missions, when assisting in

the work of the Church, by making grants, and assessing the parishioners. Indeed to arrive at a fair basis the population and wealth of the Parish must be considered. With regard to the work that has been done since I took charge I am thankful in being able to report that there are many hopeful and encouraging signs. The congregations are steadily increasing and much interest is evinced by all the people in the welfare of the Church. A class of twenty candidates has been confirmed by the Most Rev. the Metropolitan, nearly all of whom have become regular communicants, and seem firmly resolved to fight manfully under "Christ's Banner" to their lives end. One interesting feature of the confirmation was that two of the candidates had passed their allotted time of three score years and ten, while a third was not far behind. We have also the pleasure of reporting a visit from his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor, who earnestly appealed to the parishioners for more funds and a greater interest in the Diocesan Church Society. We feel sure his stirring appeal will not have been made in vain.

"During the present year the Parish has been freed from debt, and efforts are now being made to put memorial stained glass windows in the nave of St. Peter's Church, which we hope to get done before the winter sets in. The ladies are also busily at work with the object of getting the rectory re-modelled and renovated. At Upper Kingsclear the faithful few have been hard at work, giving time, labour and money towards repairing St. Mark's Church, which for so many years has been in a very dilapidated state. A new foundation has been put under, the roof has been shingled and the outside is soon to be painted. For the good work too much credit cannot be given to Mr. F. W. Clements and family; they have exerted themselves even to self denial that God's house might be put in order. We hope in another year, with the help of those who can give of their abundance, to make the interior more suitable for the proper rendering of the service, especially the sacraments, than it now is. A Fout is very much needed as well as other articles of Church furniture and fittings. I cannot close my report without referring to the very great kindness that has continually been shown me by the parishioners. When I moved into the parsonage I found new stoves had been put in and a fair stock of provisions in the store room, wood in the shed and hay and oats in the barn for my horse. The latest token of their good-will is a present of

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a valuable cow. I feel deeply thankful for all these favours, not so much on account of their value, but because of the good-will they betoken. I cannot mention the names of those to whom I am indebted for so many kindnesses, as it would include nearly the whole list of my parishioners and that would take up rather much space in the report. My earnest prayer is that it may please God to bless each one of them and so direct and guide us by His Holy Spirit that we may do an acceptable work for Him, to His honour and glory and the welfare of His holy Church.

"The contributions towards the general purposes of the D. C. S. amount to \$112.00."

KINGSTON.—REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT.

"Having obtained the permission of the Bishop and the Wardens, I was absent from this Parish from September 4th to March 21st. My place was filled by Rev. D. J. Wetmore, who zealously performed all the duties required of him.

"My register notes twenty-five baptisms, infants and three adults; burials, nineteen, of which four were communicants; marriages, three.

"On the 8th of July we had our first service in St. Paul's Church, White's Point, which for several months previously had been closed for repairs, etc.

"In August last, a new carpet was laid down in the Chancel of Trinity Church at a cost of \$60.

"On the evening of the 29th of August, a meeting of the Church people of Clifton was held in the Hall of that place, at which the Rev. E. S. W. Pentreath, a native, formerly of this Diocese, urged upon them the propriety of erecting a Church in that neighbourhood, and held out encouraging promises of help if they would immediately set about the work. So animating and convincing was his address that late last fall a site was chosen whereon to build and a foundation commenced. Plans of a neat ecclesiastical edifice were procured by Mr. Pentreath from an architect in Winnipeg, and presented to the building committee, and much valuable help has been given and promised by some kind friends in St. John, so that it is hoped that the Church, the frame of which is now up, will, at no very late date, be finished and ready for service if not for consecration. The distance between the Parish Church and it is about five and a half miles.

"I am sorry to state that Mr. Richard Wetmore, licensed lay reader, after a year's faithful and regular attendance at St. Paul's Church, where his labours were thankfully received and highly appreciated, has felt himself obliged to discontinue his stated services, but has promised not to withdraw entirely from the work and will occasionally read service in that distant portion of the Parish.

"Sunday Schools have been organized at Clifton, St. James and Trinity, with a fair staff of teachers and a good attendance of pupils.

"The amount of subscriptions to the general purposes of the Society, which is considered the "cream" of every parochial report, I am not at the present time able to state. The "onus" of these annual gatherings generally falls upon the Missionary, who, owing to the present distress, prefers to wait till the clouds roll by, before actively canvassing the usual subscribers for aid in behalf of the Society. Up to date, however, about \$28.00 have been raised by subscriptions and collections, of which \$10.92 have been paid into the Treasurer. Amount from two mission boxes, \$1.05; and offerings to S. P. G. \$11.00. Since my last report I regret to say that our losses by removal still continue, two families and several single members out of other families having left the Parish for other parts, and their places filled by other than Church people, we are by so much the poorer in numbers and financial strength."

MACADAM.—REV. T. E. DOWLING.

"St. Croix and Macadam are mentioned in the Society's report for 1873.

"In 1874 the Deacon in charge at St. Croix wrote as follows: 'The people generally take an interest in the services, which is very encouraging, and as the number of people here is very small, the large numbers at the services are a source of great comfort.'

"This Mission of St. Croix and Macadam appears on the lists of 1875 and 1876. Since then it has been allowed to die out. Yes, as a united Mission to die out; for at St. Croix diligent search was made on June 17th to find one Churchman and in vain.

"At Macadam, through the co-operation of the Clergy of the Deanery of St. Andrews (with the approval of the Diocesan), Church work has again revived,

"A Church Sunday School, containing four teachers and forty-one scholars, is now regularly held every Sunday morning, under the superintendence of a devoted layman from St. Stephen.

"The railway authorities have expressed their approval and may be relied upon for practical assistance. But if this work is to be permanent, it will be necessary to secure the services of at least a candidate for Holy Orders, and to commence a Church School at once, land for which has been already secured.

"As Secretary of the Deanery of St. Andrews, I would very respectfully draw the serious attention of the General Committee and Board of Home Missions to this isolated corner of the Diocese, difficult of access with a horse, but which is becoming an important railway centre.

"There are no regular public religious services at Macadam, except those now being occasionally held on week days by the neighboring clergy.

"Surely it is well not to forget that the *first*, and not the last, object of the D. C. S. is this: 'Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman and aid to new and poor missions!'

"Bishops, clergy, lay delegates, of your charity give a grant, not hampered with unreasonable restrictions, to Macadam."

MONCTON.—REV. A. HOADLEY.

"Our contributions last year did not amount to what I anticipated; we have yet to learn much in regard to our privilege and duty to the D. C. S. I hope, however, this year our subscription list will be longer, and show a much larger amount. The many pressing needs of this growing Parish have, no doubt, prevented our people from doing what they would wish for the D. C. S.

"The past year has been one of progress. The Parish is free from debt, a position we have not been in for many years past. All the services have been well attended; especially the weekly celebrations of the Holy Communion; since we have had a weekly celebration the number of those who communicate has increased greatly, the result of which is seen in the growing interest taken in the spiritual work of the Church in the Parish.

"The Sunday School is also growing healthily, the school-room built two years ago, being no longer large enough for our work; the increase in the numbers attending the school is marked; the average attendance two years ago was a little over sixty, last Sunday there were one hundred children present. *Laus Deo.*

"It has been our privilege and pleasure during the year to welcome several times his Lordship Bishop Kingdon. These frequent visits of his Lordship, although some of them have been flying ones, have greatly strengthened my hands in the work of the Church, and we all appreciate them greatly.

"On the twenty-fifth of May, eighteen candidates received the sacramental ordinance of confirmation, some of whom it was my privilege to prepare for holy baptism as well as for confirmation. This confirmation was particularly impressive and will be long remembered by us all.

"In my last report I mentioned the need of a Mission-room in a poor and thickly populated part of the town. This need, I am thankful to say, through the great kindness and generosity of Bishop Kingdon is now supplied. The building is now completed and when I can obtain seats, service books, and a small organ and other necessary furniture we shall commence a real missionary work amongst a class of people who, hitherto, have been greatly neglected. We need about \$150 more to enable us to begin the work and shall be glad to receive any donations for the furnishing and carrying on this Mission, and I can assure any one who gives that they are giving to those who greatly need their help and sympathy. The Bishop Coadjutor has kindly given some large oleographs illustrative of our Lord's life for the walls, and has promised us five guineas for books; and other ladies and gentlemen in the Parish and in the Diocese and in the United States have expressed their sympathy by sending us donations. A bell of good weight and tone, which for a time did duty on a locomotive engine, has been given to call the people to worship.

"Other good works are also in progress. Money is being raised to put a new fence around the church and rectory; and a mite society has been established, the first object of which is to procure a peal of bells for the Parish Church; we have no bell at present. His Lordship the Metropolitan has shown his sympathy with this work by promising a liberal subscription. The Society has been established three months and has already gathered in about \$95.

"In conclusion I will say that the Parish of Moncton is at the present time presenting such an opportunity to the Church as is seldom seen, and had I a brother Priest or Deacon associated with me in the work, the growth of the Church would, I am convinced, be unusually large.

"I would like also to express my thanks to the many parishioners who have rendered me such valuable assistance in the work of the Church during the year."

MUSQUASH.—REV. HENRY M. SPIKE.

"I here enclose the return for D. C. S. As one of our mill establishments is now closed the business of the place is very much decreased, I fear we shall not be able to get as much for D. C. S. as formerly; knowing the great need of the D. C. S. we hope it will not fall much short of the past years. When contributions are sent in we hope to raise between \$90 and \$100.

"The sudden death of J. E. Knight, Esquire, and of Mrs. Spike, I pray may be overruled by God's mercy for our more earnest faith and love and zeal for God's glory among my parishioners.

"We have had St. Thomas Church at Dipper Harbour very much improved by a new prayer desk and altar made of black ash. The frontal of the altar is very neatly carved in the three panels, representing the lily and the cross; also a dorsal on which is worked the dove and above the inscription: 'I am the bread of life.' On the retable is a neat cross and two vases for flowers; these improvements are the gifts of kind friends in St. John. I hope that all my parishioners will see the necessity of sustaining the Society, that the work which has been so much encouraged in past years may not come to nought for want of self-denial on our part. We must ever be mindful of the words of the Lord Jesus who said, 'it is more blessed to give than to receive.'"

NEWCASTLE.—REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

"With the one very great exception in connection with the narrow escape of our beautiful little church from destruction by fire, there has been no striking or remarkable break in the ordinary routine of the work of this Parish during the past

year. The various services of the Church have been carried on uninterruptedly, and, I trust not altogether without signs of an increased interest in spiritual things among those to whom I have been called to minister. There has been a slight increase in the number of communicants, and I have now under instruction a class which I hope to present for the holy rite of confirmation some time towards the latter end of the summer.

"In a most remarkable and providential way fire in the church was discovered in the middle of the night, and to a worthy couple who live opposite the building we are indebted, under God, for the preservation of a church which in its many details could never be replaced. A special service of thanksgiving was held on the following day which happened to be Sunday, and never, perhaps, have the glorious strains of the *Te Deum* been sung with greater earnestness than on that occasion. The damage done was slight, being principally confined to the flooring and matting, and was fully covered by insurance.

"We had the pleasure of a visit from the Bishop last fall, who, notwithstanding a cold and dark night, kindly drove a considerable distance in order to be present at one of our Sunday evening services.

"My brother spent several weeks of the summer with me, being at the time under medical advice, on a sick furlough, after enduring much hardship and undergoing most laborious work in the Missionary Diocese of Algoma. I mention this otherwise personal matter, as I think his public addresses were the means of arousing an increased interest in the domestic Missions of the Canadian Church.

"The members of the Deanery of Chatham have held one of their sessions in Newcastle during the past year. Taking advantage of their presence, we held a quasi-Missionary meeting in the School-house, during which stirring addresses were delivered by the Revs. F. Almon and A. Hiltz, the former on the Church of England Temperance Society, and the latter on the Foreign Mission work of the Church. A collection was taken up at the close in behalf of the S. P. G.

"The 'Young Woman's Guild' and the 'Mite Society' have done a good work during the year. By the unwearied efforts of these two societies the Parish debt has been reduced to \$324, and this I trust will be met before the close of the current year. It will be a great source of comfort to myself to have

this old debt settled, as we have much work needing immediate attention, but which I do not wish to be touched till we can rightfully attend to it.

"The members of the choir have been formed into a guild, which will, I trust, help forward the more efficient rendering of the Church's services, as well as lead the various members to estimate aright the truly responsible position which they are called upon to fulfil.

"We have had one or two serious business difficulties in the Parish since my last report, and there has been a general depression in the lumber interests, but we have tried to do our best and our subscriptions to the D. C. S. amount to \$144.26; this may possibly be added to. The Parish has also raised for Foreign Missions of S. P. G. \$10.34; and for the Domestic Missions of the Church of England in Canada, \$15.00, making a total of \$169.60."

NEW DENMARK.—REV. N. M. HANSEN.

"Since my last report, I have had a little trouble and a great pleasure. There came a man from Denmark last fall and called for hospitality at my house, which he received for nearly a fortnight. As he left my house he commenced to address the people and told them much evil about my family and me, which he pretended to have seen and heard at my house, and he let the people know that if they would take him for their pastor, they would get a better man. Every man of that kind will at every place find an assisting party. However, in consequence of information received from Denmark he soon disappeared and we have not since heard of him. This trouble took place as we were most busy with completing the church, and it was a drawback for us. But by the help of God it was ready for service before winter and licensed by the Bishop. The 17th June it was consecrated by the Metropolitan, who was attended by Rev. L. A. Hoyt; ten young persons were confirmed. There were present one hundred and eighty persons, nearly all Danes, and about eighty partook in Holy Communion. It is to be hoped that most of them understood the Bishop's friendly address. The consecration sentences were read by Rev. L. A. Hoyt in English and by the Missionary in Danish. The Bishop expressed his contentment with my work, and this day was for me and many more the happiest day in America.

“St. Ansgar’s Church in New Denmark is built in Gothic style, and is in our eyes a fine building, an ornament not only for the settlement but for the whole Parish of Drummond. But we have to divide the honor of building it with a considerable number of churchmen in and outside New Brunswick. The Bishop and Mrs. Medley have done very much for us. The baptism font is given by Mrs. Medley, the altar by Rev. J. M. Davenport, the pulpit by Colonel Raymond, Woodstock, the organ partly by Rev. J. B. Medley, England, the communion plate by the Coadjutor Bishop, a credence-shelf and a good collection by Rev. Thomas Neales. The Rev. L. A. Hoyt has done much for us, and H. P. Petersen, Esquire, New Denmark, as architect and leader of the work, has given much time, much work and money in favor of our church. To these and all other contributors we say heartily thanks for their good help, and I hope they will share with us the joy over its consecration. This church is the only church in the Parish, and I will try, if possible, to make it useful to the English population, by having an English service once a month, although it is for that purpose not situated in the best place; but a small English attendance has already been obtained, and by the blessing of God it may grow a little every year. I am now coming to the worst part of my report—the money matters. We can have a good attendance at the services and a good number of communicants, but in money matters we are behind. This year again is a very hard year. The farming produce, our only resource, is partly very low in price, and partly can not be sold at all. If we had not completed our church last year, we would not be able to do it this year. My subscription list is not yet completed, but I suppose it will not exceed \$20.”

NEW MARYLAND.—REV. FINLOW ALEXANDER.

“The past year has not been very fruitful of events in this Mission, and in consequence I have not much to say concerning it. The services of the Church have been well attended, and with the exception of a few Sundays when I was kept at home by illness, they have been regularly sustained. While absent through sickness from duty last autumn, my place was supplied by a brother priest of the Church in the United States, the Rev. G. H. Hunt, of whose faithfulness I cannot speak too highly or too gratefully; his influence for good was very widely felt both in this Mission and in Fredericton.

"I regret to have to record the loss of the services in the Sunday School of Mrs. W. H. McKnight, my valued superintendent. Since her marriage, she has found it impossible to continue her charge, but her connection with the school will be long and gratefully remembered. Miss Lilian Dunbar has very worthily succeeded to her office, and with the kind assistance of Miss Fisher carries on the work of the school with much efficiency and conscientiousness.

"Financially, we are prospering, that is, if being out of debt and the having a little to go on with may be called prosperity. The annual contribution to the D. C. S. will, I hope, be liberal; 'in fine' we have much cause to be thankful to God, and to enter hopefully on the work of another year."

NORTON.—REV. E. A. WARNEFORD.

"I am happy to say that our Parish Church, which has stood for a long time in need of repair, is now in course of renovation and when completed will look very different from the old building. It was thought that about \$800 would be sufficient, but on pulling down and tearing away we found we had a far larger work on hand than what was anticipated and consequently a much greater expense, one repair needing another and so on until very little remains of the old church, in fact it will be almost a new one. We hope before long that it will be sufficiently advanced to allow of services being held in it. To accomplish what has been done, several members (with a little aid from abroad) have made very strenuous efforts and I do trust and pray that what remains to be done, may call forth in the future the same loving efforts.

"Since the church has been closed, I have been holding service in a hall kindly lent for the purpose by the inhabitants of Bloomfield.

"The services during the year past have been regular and well attended. The two Sunday Schools, one under the care of Miss Fairweather, the other under that of Mr. George Raymond, are, I trust, doing good work."

Contributions reported to the amount of \$82.60.

PETITCODIAC.—REV. CUTHBERT WILLIS.

"I am afraid our contributions this year will fall slightly short of those of last year from several causes, but I hope, after

a full canvass has been made, will reach eighty dollars. The causes are fewer people, hard times and poor prospects for this year's crops. As, however, I have given the contributors until the end of September to pay up, should the prospect brighten there is a probability of the amount being increased. I can promise, however, eighty dollars.

"The Mission has found it difficult to meet their agreement with the D. C. S. as regards the missionary stipend. This I believe to arise, not so much from the want of ability as from a mistaken idea as to their duty. Men who have given one-half or less than one-half of the 'tenth' think they have given very liberally. The duty of proportionate giving has been impressed upon them both from the pulpit and in private over and over again, but I am afraid the present generation will have to pass away before the Scriptural rule of paying to God his dues is generally carried out. The work in this Mission has been conducted as usual. The Parish of Cardwell, not properly in my Mission, has had a regular monthly service, and I have visited the sick there regularly.

"Our congregations have been good, and especially at Petitecodiac and Pollett River. At Havelock they have been reduced by death and emigration westward. Here, too, several members have, through old age and infirmity, been compelled to give up attendance at public worship.

"My present curate, Mr. Hanington, being about to leave me, much to my regret and that of the parishioners, I am now endeavoring to procure a successor, my voice not being strong enough to take all the duty myself."

The contributions reported in addition to \$80 for general purposes are, W. & O. fund \$8.22, collection in church \$11.96.

POINT DU CHENE.—REV. W. B. ARMSTRONG.

"During the past year we were refreshed by a visit from the Bishop Coadjutor, when he held a confirmation in the Parish. This was one of the bright spots during the year, which was an exceptionally trying one in many respects. In the first place we have lost our Church Warden, Mr. W. J. M. Hanington, who was suddenly removed by an attack of typhoid fever after a short illness. He was always a most liberal contributor to this Society and ever took a warm interest in his Church of which he was a constant and generous supporter. His loss to us

as a Parish is irreparable. We have also had other losses which in addition to the exodus of English people that is continually going on here makes it impossible for the people to maintain the ministrations of a separate Clergyman. The Parish of Point du Chene will, therefore, have to look in the future to the Rector of Shediak to supply them occasionally with the services of the Church.

"At the commencement of this year my family was attacked with the terrible scourge of diphtheria, there being six of us, including myself, ill, and one of our number succumbed to the ravages of the disease. Thus we have with the Psalmist to sing not only of 'mercy' but also 'judgment,' and doubtless both are equally necessary in this life present.

"The contributions to the D. C. S. for this year will amount to \$37.00.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—REV. LEB. W. FOWLER.

"In my report last year I said, 'we are beginning to build a much needed church hall near the rectory and to improve the interior of Saint John's Church, Magundy.'

"Both these works were begun during 'Synod week,' and I am now thankful to be able to report that the church hall was completed and formally opened November 20th, and that the debt upon it is less than \$50.00. The Metropolitan was so good as to give \$20.00 towards the building fund, and other kind friends outside the Parish \$30.00. It is a neat little building (thirty-six by eighteen feet) close to the rectory, and very useful both as a church hall and a Sunday School house.

"I am also glad to say the interior of Saint John's Church, Magundy, was very much improved, and now has somewhat the appearance of a church. About \$60.00 were spent upon it, besides the gifts of altar, lectern, altar desk and cross, frontals, etc., by the Rev. Canon Neales, Rev. J. M. Davenport, Mrs. Medley, Mr. Bourne and others.

"The stone wall under St. Clement's Church was also repaired at a cost of about \$30.00.

"Saint Paul's Church is too large and cold for the congregation in the winter season; and last winter we gave it up for a time, accepting Mr. H. A. Davidson's kind offer of a room in his house for evensong on Sundays.

"All Saint's Church, Magaguadavic, is in great need of substantial repairs, and I had hoped to arouse the congregation to set about them this summer. Regard for my health would not permit me to conduct service in it another winter in its present state.

"Having been chosen rector of St. George's Church, Carleton, I resigned Prince William April 1st, and therefore leave all report of subsequent work to my successor, the Rev. A. E. G. Lowndes.

"Contributions to D. C. S. between July 1st, 1883, and the date of my resignation were, as reported elsewhere, \$5.00.

RICHIBUCTO.—REV. F. H. ALMON.

"I regret that I have not much of interest to report. While the Sunday services both at Richibucto and Kingston are not so well attended as they ought to be, the week day services are better attended in proportion to our numbers than is usually the case, and I am encouraged by the regular attendance of some at all the services. I have held occasional week day services at Kouchibouguac, about twelve miles from Richibucto, and have been much gratified by the number, chiefly Presbyterians, who have attended.

"I have several times visited Buctouche about seventeen miles from Richibucto, had a fair attendance at the service generally; for a short time a Sunday School was organized which has been discontinued. My experience here has led me to conclude that Parishes long vacant as well as those which ought to be opened as new missions, would be much benefitted could the Diocese secure the services of a travelling missionary endued with zeal, and experience, and tact, who would spend two months in each vacant Parish or proposed Mission, ascertain what the people were able and willing to give for the support of the ministry, and by frequent services and pastoral visits awaken by God's blessing a desire for the benefits of the ministry of God's word, and the sacraments, and the care of a faithful pastor.

"There has been progress and improvement in our Sunday School, and zeal and interest in their work manifested by those engaged in them.

"I have been able to take part in the Sunday School at Kingston, although holding three services, by having the school held immediately after service, and then only for half

an hour, and not allowing the afternoon service and sermon to exceed an hour; in this way by a short service and Sunday school, I am able to assist in the school and not weary the children by a long service and school. The establishment of of a Mite Society for collecting monthly subscriptions of small sums towards reducing the debt of the Parish, and other useful objects is a cause of congratulation, and the zeal and diligence of the lady collectors a great encouragement. Through this Society the habit of regular giving to Church purposes will be taught and the need of resorting to bazaars and tea-meetings to raise funds be avoided.

"Our Church Temperance Society still holds its regular monthly meetings which are fairly attended and has effected some good for the cause of religion and temperance and the reformation of the intemperate. A Band of Hope in connection with this Society has lately been organized, its meetings are well attended, they are held every month, fifty-six children are enrolled and are much interested in the meetings.

"While I hope that the railway communication which at last Richibucto enjoys may do much to benefit and increase the ability of my parishioners to support religious objects, our late cold spring this year delayed work. I therefore thought it advisable to postpone our collections for the Diocesan Society till July, when the laboring classes will be better able to contribute and more will be collected than if they had been asked this month. I hope our contributions may somewhat exceed those of last year. I feel the importance of each Parish doing its best to aid the funds of the Society, not only when aided by the Society to return help given for the support of its own pastor, but also to assist other Missions, and to remove the necessity of taking funds from the Society for propagating the Gospel, which ought to be spent in aiding those portions of the British Empire which are less able than New Brunswick to support the ministry of our Church, and in sending the message of the Gospel to those multitudes of heathens who still are ignorant of its life-giving truths."

RICHMOND.—REV. F. W. VROOM.

"There is not much of special interest to report from this Mission. The chief event of the year was the visit of the Metropolitan for confirmation on June 12th, when eleven

candidates were confirmed, there is reason to hope that before another year has passed as many more will have received the blessing.

"There has been nothing to necessitate extra effort on the part of the people during the year, but steps have been taken for repairing and improving the rectory and tinting the walls and putting a new foundation under the chancel of St. Paul's Church, South Richmond.

"Some improvement may be seen in the special collections, though still very meagre.

"An Algoma Aid Society has been formed to interest young girls in Mission work. It is a small beginning but it is hoped that it will do good work in time.

"The most encouraging sign of the year's work was the annual meeting of the Local Committee, which, though not well attended, shewed a general desire to do more than has been done in the past for the work of the D. C. S., both in the way of subscriptions and increased assessment."

ROTHESAY.—REV. W. HANCOCK.

Mr. R. T. Clinch reports \$60.55 as the amount of the contributions.

SACKVILLE.—REV. C. F. WIGGINS.

"I regret extremely that although the aggregate of our contributions is greater than last year, yet the amount given for the immediate purposes of the Society is not so large. I trust, however, that when the special efforts which we have been called upon to make this year are known, that the Society will be ready in some degree, at all events, to pardon this lack of a more hearty response to the present pressing need of increased offerings.

"In the first part of the year necessary repairs concerning the lighting and heating of St. Paul's, called for special offerings. St. Ann's (Parish Church) was also renovated inside, wood-work grained, walls tinted and stenciled, and the grounds enclosed with a neat and substantial fence. The rectory and buildings were also insured for \$2,000, for three years, making a total of \$5,400 on the church buildings of the

Parish. And last, but not least, we have made a strong and successful effort within the last three months to pay off a debt of \$850.00 resting on the rectory (a debt which has been sadly hampering our work). This I am happy to say is entirely pledged and the greater part already paid, and we hope before the Synod meets to be able to report it entirely removed, making a total for this one purpose of \$1,750.00 raised in three years in the Parish from direct offerings of the people, with the exception of \$85.00 (\$35.00 of which was given by our beloved Metropolitan) and \$100.00 the generous gift of your Society; and when in addition to this, it is considered that this small Parish is almost entirely self-supporting, I hope that the Society will of their clemency bear with us in this seeming dereliction of our duty towards them.

"The general working of the Parish has not been without its encouragements. The services have been regularly held with a steady increase of attendance. The Sunday Schools have been fairly successful.

"I think we may safely say that the Church is slowly yet surely gaining ground, and it only needs (humanly speaking) faithful and judicious work to largely increase her strength and influence in this Parish. The Bishop Coadjutor visited us in September last, for the purpose of confirmation, when twenty-four received the holy rite. Seventeen of those were formerly dissenters, making a total of thirty-seven brought in from dissent in three years, twenty-six of whom were *heads of families*. Many more are now feeling their way towards the greater light and the ancient faith. God grant that they speedily find it! Our list of communicants has been almost doubled, we have now ninety-three, while three years ago there were forty-nine. The rector has been much encouraged, especially during the past year, by the hearty co-operation of the people. Their late efforts for the removal of the rectory debt have been worthy of all praise. The women of the Parish, as usual, have taken the lead, but the men followed as though they felt they were led by those who intended to conquer. These are signs of progress which we trust will be pleasing to the Society, and encourage them and cause them to think that even *yet* there may be hope for Sackville."

The contributions reported are, general purposes \$57.48, W. & O. fund \$5.08, Aged Clergy fund \$5.00, Algoma and North-west \$11.10, Foreign Missions \$4.36.

ST. DAVID.—REV. J. W. MILLIDGE.

"Since making my last report, the Parish of St. David has suffered a severe loss. On the fifth September, 1883, a day to be remembered with regret at Oak Bay, about three o'clock in the afternoon, fire was discovered in a barn belonging to a blacksmith, the flames spread rapidly, soon communicating to a dwelling house and the smith's shop. The wind was blowing a gale directly on the church and although there was a considerable open space, just a week previous an old school house had been (in spite of the protests of the parishioners) moved into the vacant lot. The school house soon took fire, and it was soon seen that the church was doomed; a perfect hail of sparks and brands fell around, the grass, fences and trees were all in a blaze, and as no fire engine was at hand the church itself was soon wrapped in flames. All the furniture, with the exception of the stoves, was saved; but there was no insurance. This blow falls with greater severity as we had the year before repainted and repaired the Church at a very considerable cost. Rebuilding I fear will be very difficult, because almost all the Church people have left Oak Bay, and those who live at a distance of eight and ten miles know very little and care less about the Parish Church. The other parishes of this Mission are fairly prosperous; a number of young people and some heads of families have become candidates for confirmation in St. Patrick and St. James; there are very few in St. David. His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor visited this Mission on behalf of the D. C. S. in May, and delivered four interesting addresses to as many different gatherings. Although times are hard and money scarce, I am able to report a slight increase in contributions; \$2.13. General purposes, \$101.13; Incapacitated Fund, \$20.00."

ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.—REV. R. E. SMITH.

I have nothing new to report about my Churches or the "times." Considering the state of the latter we have struggled through, so far, wonderfully well. I do not think that we have reached "bottom" yet. Our services are largely attended in both Churches, and a good deal of interest evinced. I am at present engaged in preparing classes for baptism and confirmation.

We find that the system of free sittings works well in St. George, and we had a balance of \$30 on hand at Easter, after paying all expenses. Under this system the congregation has increased, and a greater general interest in the Church is manifested.

We will do all we can to make our subscription as large as last year.

SAINT MARY'S.—REV. W. JAFFREY.

"The Missionary at St. Mary's speaks very satisfactorily of the Sunday School in his parish, which he says is the most hopeful part of his work, by means of which the young are taught not only the doctrine and precepts of the church, but also her forms and ceremonies. He uses a form in opening, compiled altogether from the Church service in such a way that the children become familiar with the service, almost imperceptibly. The greatest difficulty he finds in his parish is the fluctuation of the people, the continual changes going on among the working people connected with the railroad and other works. People are continually coming and going. He writes:

Although I cannot report many accessions to the church from without, yet I am thankful to say that outsiders are becoming more familiar with our system, and can see more and more the truth of our doctrines and the beauty of our service. There will be a slight increase in the amount over that usually collected in this Mission.

The Missionary also says that he has been enabled during the past year to keep up his fortnightly appointments in the Stone Church, Douglas, though meeting with very little encouragement, either in the way of assistance or support. The offertory collections in this Church for the support of the service during the past year amounted to \$12."

ST. MARTIN'S.—REV. J. LOCKWARD.

"One certain cause of the stagnation, if not positive ebb, of church life in this Mission, is the very low degree of depression in trade and business which has fallen upon its temporal life. The financial sources of the church are drying up in some degree from this cause, though possibly other causes may exist, into which I need not enter.

"But very little has been done in the matter of a projected new Church. We have been now for a whole year without the service of our beautiful church bell, thinking to save the expense of putting it up to further the building of our much wished new Church. However, the people have decided that the loss of the bell is too much privation, and that punctuality at the services might follow upon the restored use of the church bell. As regards the fund for a new Church, some two or three rather large amounts have been promised in the Mission, and among others the Metropolitan has, with his usual readiness and generosity made us a liberal promise, or in other words put down his name for a generous sum. The collectors to whom subscription lists were entrusted seem to have done but little, and even less—almost less than nothing has come from wide fields afar.

"With very little allowance for the storms of winter, I have kept up the usual Sunday and week day services, which, however, have fallen off far too much in the average attendance. It may be that a process of sifting has set in. On one Sunday last October I was absent in Halifax, when the Rev. A. W. Weeks kindly took my regular duty.

"I think the subject of our Reports require a little more uniformity. For instance, we have to make an annual Report *twice* a year, and if you will, have to make *two* annual Reports dating the one from the end December, the other from some time in June. This makes oftentimes a considerable difference in the statistics of the returns. I find that during the year ending on the 31st December last, I returned twenty-six baptisms, three marriages, and nine burials; now during the year dating from last return to the Church Society, I can report thirty baptisms, three marriages and eleven burials. In many other points these many reports are confusing and confounding.

"I have just now a small class of adults in preparation for baptism, and also a class in preparation for confirmation.

"A matter of much regret was the hard fact that I did not feel that I could send to the committee who had in charge the fund for Incapacitated Clergy any names of persons who might and could contribute to the same. I trust that what we could not do, others might enjoy to the full the pleasure of doing. The committee deserve our very heartiest thanks.

"Last year our papers informed us that a Mission was being held in the city of Halifax, which I learn from a very

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interested quarter was very much blessed to the renewal and increase of Church life. Now the same papers are informing the wondering world that a similar Mission is to be held next week in the city of St. John, and that St. John's Church in the Parish of St. Mark, is to be the centre of the Mission. I am thankful for these two facts, which I trust will lead on and prepare many Parishes and Missions for a similar awakening and arousing up. The presence in our diocese of a clergyman who holds the high position of Missionary for the diocese of Montreal, should certainly arouse and excite our Diocesan Church Society to appoint a similar workman in this Diocese. He need not be a *sinecure*!

I regret that our General Annual Collection is not yet completed, but might be before the Annual Meeting. We return, however, three collections, one for W. & O. Fund, \$4.63; Domestic Missions of N. W., \$2.54; Foreign Missions of S. P. G., \$1.81, and the two Semi-annual collections of D. C. S., \$7.77. I cannot hope, perhaps, that our general collection will be equal to that of last year. I do not know the amount received from our Mission Boxes.

ST. PAUL.—REV. CANON DEVEBER.

"Reports contributions to the amount of \$425.95, of which \$55.75 are restricted to W. & O. Fund, and \$32 to the Incapacitated Clergy Fund, leaving the general purposes \$338.20."

ST. STEPHEN, CHRIST CHURCH.—REV. THEODORE E. DOWLING.

"The contributions for this Parish last year amounted to \$50.00. This year they have, I am thankful to record, increased to \$159.05, and are appropriated as follows:

SHEDIAC.—REV. H. H. BARBER.

"My report this year will be very brief. The first event I wish gratefully to record is a visit from His Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor. When here he held a confirmation, when three males and two females were confirmed. Our communicants, roll has been increased considerably during the past year. I have also gratefully to record the termination of the long-standing lawsuit which hung so threateningly over our heads, an amicable settlement having been arranged. Our rectory debt is being rapidly decreased. I have not yet been able to make a list of contributions for the D. C. S., but (D. V.) will do so before the report is ready for the printer. The offertory for Domestic Missions amounted to \$11.00."

SIMONDS.—REV. GEORGE SCHOFIELD.

"I returned from my visit to England early in last October, and forthwith resumed my work in the Parish. During the year ending May 31st there have been 23 baptisms, 5 marriages and 13 funerals, and during the 25 years of my ministry here I have officiated at 909 baptisms, 156 marriages and 305 burials.

"We find it difficult to meet the increased assessment on the Parish. The members of my different congregations cheerfully contribute according to their ability, but, as the Deanery Fund which last year assisted the Parishes not self-supporting has been discontinued, I fear we shall have some financial difficulty in consequence. However, we shall do our best.

"I am now engaged in preparing candidates for confirmation, and am looking forward, with pleasure, to a visit from the Bishop Coadjutor for that service. For some months past, by the kindness of G. Herbert Lee, Esq., my much valued Lay Reader, we have had Sunday School and Service every Sunday at Coldbrook, Mr. Lee taking the whole duty each second Sunday.

"Work has been resumed at the Rolling Mills and Nail Factory, but as most of the men live in or near St. John at present, there has been only a slight increase to our numbers.

"Last January I commenced a monthly service at Drury's Cove, which is valued by some families in that neighbourhood and I hope will be useful.

"I earnestly pray for the Divine blessing to prosper all my labours."

SPRINGFIELD.—REV. J. H. TALBOT.

"Several things have occurred in this Parish since the meeting of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society last July, which have been of great interest to ourselves, and some of which will be of interest to the meeting and to Churchmen in the Diocese.

"On October 29th, the little Church on the Bellisle Creek Road of which I spoke in my last year's report as nearly finished, was consecrated by His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor, and dedicated to St. Simon and St. Jude. It has proved so far of great benefit to the Parish. Congregations are twice as large as they were in the Hall previously used, and indeed counting, besides the Sundays, the services on New Year's Day, the Day of Consecration and the Confirmation, average more than the Church is built to seat.

"It is a neat little building with open seats. The Holy Table was the gift of Rev. J. M. Davenport, and the East Window, which is of rolled glass, was kindly given by the Rector and Vestry of Trinity Church, St. John. It cost in money \$830, besides voluntary labour, of which there was a great deal, and \$200 is still needed, as the responsibility of debt to that amount has been assumed by myself and a few members of the congregation, and we should be glad of any help which our wealthier brethren may offer in clearing it off. We also need a font.

"At Norton Station the sheathing of the interior of the Church with black ash has been completed, and there is now a reasonable ground for hoping that Church building is stayed for some time to come in the whole Mission.

"At the present time the carpenters are at work upon the Rectory, adding a new kitchen, with a fair sized class-room alongside of it, with some rooms overhead. The class-room will fill a want long felt; indeed, it has been difficult to get along without it.

"On Saturday, June 21st, His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor paid us a second visit, preaching at all three Churches on Sunday, addressing a congregation at the Parish Church upon the affairs of the Diocesan Church Society on Monday evening, and confirming at St. Simon and St. Jude's Church on Tuesday 24th, when twenty-two candidates were presented for the laying on of hands.

"During the year two of the oldest Church members in the Parish have entered into rest. Vincent White upon May 20th, at the age of ninety-five; and Rachel Anne, widow of the late Samuel Marven, on May 23rd, at the age of eighty. Mr. White was, I believe, one of the originators of the lumber traffic in New Brunswick.

"I am thankful to say that I have been able to hold service every Sunday at each of the Churches ever since the opening of the new one, and an additional celebration at the Parish Church on Easter Day, and also that the Eucharist has been offered in the Mission every Sunday as well as on the great festivals. The communicant's roll has increased considerably since the building of the new Church and the increased number of services, and now stands at one hundred and twenty-five.

"I do not know the amount of the contributions to D. C. S. this year, as I have waited to gain the benefit of the meeting held the other day by the Bishop. It will be safe to estimate it at last year's figure—\$90.00 in all—and I hope for some improvement as the result of the meeting."

SUSSEX.—REV. CANON MEDLEY.

"The past year in this Mission has not been marked by any events of startling interest, partly perhaps, because I have not been as strong as I could wish for the greater part of it, and partly because there have not been quite so many irons in the fire to keep warm. However, it must not be thought that we have altogether been asleep. The services have been regularly kept up, the sick regularly visited, the dying have been regularly ministered to, and all calls for special duties attended to. I feel much that my want of strength has interfered with my regular system of parochial house to house visiting, and can only trust that I may be enabled to make up some of the lost time. We have just been stirred up by his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor to a more lively interest in D. C. S., and I hope his burning words will not be forgotten when the call is given for subscriptions.

"The manner of raising the requisite sum for all Church expenses in this self-sustaining Mission (mentioned in my Report of last year), has been found to work satisfactorily, and out of the sum total a portion will be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of D. C. S. for general purposes. In addition

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to this I hope to get some subscribers for *Incapacitated Clergy Fund*. This will only apply to the Parish of Sussex. I regret to say that in the Parish of Studholm the old-fashioned subscription list is still in force, a fact which fully accounts for the difficulty of paying the due proportion which is allotted to that part of the Mission for the missionary's stipend. If it were not for our Guild there, *Studholm* would always be behind in its payments. Strange to say, on the other hand *Sussex* will not accept the action of the Guild, which cripples its working material, and throws all the labour upon two or three earnest workers in the Vestry.

It is with deep feelings of gratitude to Almighty God that I record the erection of Johnston and Waterford into two separate and distinct Missions, both well helped by generous grants from D. C. S.

"As the missionary of Waterford will no doubt inform the Society, he has just received good proof of the truth of my oft repeated statement, that Waterford has had within it all these years ample material for the diligent and undivided labours of a missionary. I fully believe that in five years from this date, Waterford and Johnston will be *two* of our most thriving country Missions. We must also as a Church be grateful for the re-opening of *Albert*, and I doubt not, many of those missionaries who have ceased to do much pioneer work will extend a helping hand to the deacon missionary of that extensive Mission. It is good to give our prayers, but a little help in addition to them does not go amiss. There is no parsonage in *Albert*, I believe; if the good people could look out a convenient house, like that lately purchased in *Johnston* for the sum of \$330, with eight acres of land attached, would their brethren throughout the Diocese help them? I hope we should all answer, "YES." I earnestly trust that God's blessing may rest upon D. C. S., and that God's grace may make the members of the Church more liberal in their offerings."

UPHAM.—REV. S. JONES HANFORD.

Reports "I hope the contributions will be equal to those of last year. We shall perhaps send more."

VICTORIA.—REV. D. B. PARNTHIER.

“Reports contributions to the amount of \$15.00.”

WATERFORD.—REV. J. R. DEW. COWIE.

“This Mission can by no means be called a strong one, but there are evident signs of growth—and that a healthy growth.

“Since my last report the sacrament of baptism has been administered to thirty-one infants and four adults; twenty men and twenty-four women were, after careful preparation, presented to the Bishop Coadjutor on the 19th of June, and received at his hands the sacramental ordinance of confirmation. The names on the communicant’s register have increased from twelve to thirty-six, and will be increased to sixty as soon as a communicant’s class can be held; and sixty families of adherents to the Church have been searched out. The Sunday School has now three teachers instead of one, and twenty-three scholars against fifteen last year, and it is doing good work in the way of feeding the minds and hearts of the children with definite Church teaching.

“A society called the “Woman’s Church Work Society” has lately been formed and has begun to accumulate funds for Church purposes. These facts will tell their own tale.

“But though the missionary is trying to do his best, the work at present is all uphill and against great odds. The Parish Church is nearly ready to tumble down, and it is bitterly cold in winter. A new church is a great necessity. At Jeffries’, on the new line of road, there is no Church; service is held in a most uncomfortable school-house. And at Sussex Corner, where a service ought to be held, it is impossible either to borrow or rent a building. However, we trust that by the patient and steadfast work of priest and people, the Mission will in two or three years be in a much better condition.

“We are grateful to the Society for the liberal grant of \$500.00, and the missionary earnestly desires to return to the Society, in the way of subscriptions, as much of the above amount as possible.

“Subscriptions and collections will not fall short of \$35.00 which exceeds last year’s amount by about \$25.00.”

WELDFORD.—REV. H. HOLLOWAY.

"I arrived by the S. S. *Vancouver* at Quebec on Sunday, May 18th, and proceeded on the following Tuesday to Newcastle where I was received by the Rev. J. H. S. Sweet and most kindly and hospitably entertained till Monday, May 26th, when I came to this place. I was met at the station and warmly welcomed by the Right Rev. the Bishop Coadjutor, the Rev. A. Hoadley, rector of Moncton, and the Rev. A. J. Cresswell, of Albert, who all worked with a will in getting me settled in a comfortable house which I was fortunate enough to find vacant and which I secured immediately. There is quite a large village springing up round Weldford station, and it is very important that a Church should be built here as early as possible. The inhabitants of the place received me very kindly and showed all readiness to help to establish my home among them. I had service in the forenoon on Whitsunday in the village hall and preached. There were about ninety persons present. I have commenced a pastoral visitation among my immediate neighbours, and as soon as I can get a horse I shall be able to extend my work more rapidly.

"I have forwarded to the Treasurer the sum of \$11.22, the amount of the offerings at three services, for the general purposes of the D. C. S."

WESTFIELD.—REV. A. V. WIGGINS.

"I regret very much that I cannot give you as favorable a report as usual this year. The Parish has had to undergo some very severe trials which have thrown the work back a great deal. Things are beginning to brighten again now, and I hope that in a short time we will be moving on in the old way.

"I am unable to report at present as to what amount we will be able to send in this year, but I fear that it will be less than last year. There will be a serious falling off in the Mission boxes. The January opening amounted to only \$16.61. Last year it was \$30.00. However, we will do the best we can, and I trust that next year you will receive a more favorable report from Westfield,

WICKLOW.--REV. J. E. FLEWELLING.

"I beg leave to report that the Mission of Wicklow sends to D. C. S. the sum \$56.04 subscriptions and collections.

"The past year has been one of much spiritual progress.

"The parishioners of Wilnot have succeeded in completing their Church at Centreville and having it consecrated. The Metropolitan visited us on June 13th, and consecrated St. James Church and confirmed nine persons, one being about eighty-four years old. The day was bright, the services were hearty, the congregation large, the words of the Bishop profitable and the singing good. The Deanery of Woodstock met at the same time so that we had the presence of several clergymen at the consecration. We hope the cheering words of the Metropolitan will not be soon forgotten.

"A parsonage is very much needed for the missionary. Could not we look for assistance from warm-hearted Churchmen outside? How many will send \$1.00 and \$5.00 bills to aid us in obtaining what is so much needed? We have helped ourselves in building a Church, and therefore we can the more confidently appeal to loyal Churchmen outside. 'Brethren help.'"

WOODSTOCK.--REV. CANON NEALES.

"In addition to other matters which the past year has of interest to the Church in this Parish, a few may be considered worthy of record by the Society.

"Many liberal gifts have been made to our new St. Luke's Church by friends, among them a handsome brass lectern given by Mrs. G. R. Anderson, of Halifax, N. S., and a very fine bell for the Church, for the greater part of the cost of which we are indebted to His Lordship the Metropolitan.

"On June 11th, His Lordship visited the Parish and administered the holy rite of confirmation to thirty persons.

"We have to regret the removal by death of a devoted member of the Church, James McCoy, Esquire, who for many years faithfully filled the post of superintendent of the Sunday School.

"In the place of Mr. E. B. Hooper, as lay-reader, who has gone to the Diocese of Toronto, we have Mr. A. W. M. Harley, a graduate of King's College, Windsor, whom we hope to retain for some months at least.

"Contributions to general purposes \$166.00,"

FROM the foregoing reports, in connection with the Statistical Returns, the Society may learn, to a certain extent, how the work it has undertaken has prospered during the past year.

The members of the Society should feel and acknowledge their gratitude to the Bishop Coadjutor for his valuable aid. His Lordship's visits, during the past and present year to almost every Parish and Mission in the Diocese, have greatly cheered the clergy in their labours, and have resulted in a considerable increase to the missionary fund.

Of late the Society has been unable to report, as it often did in years gone by, special donations or bequests. Its objects claim the consideration of Churchmen, to whom abundant means have been afforded, in the way of special donations or bequests, in the final disposition of their property. As a Corporation, this Society may be regarded with the fullest confidence. Its financial management is under the supervision of most reliable men of business, and in its care with regard to endowments and trusts, as well as in the dispositions of its funds, the most exact scrutiny is exercised.

On motion of the Bishop Coadjutor it was resolved that the Treasurer be authorized to transfer the sum of \$17.92, referred to in the Report of the Committee on the Incapacitated Clergy Fund to the credit of that fund with interest for six years.

On motion of the Rev. T. E. Dowling the following resolution was adopted :

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a Report which he read, and on his motion, it was resolved that the same be received and printed in the Annual Report, and be referred to the Board to be elected to-day.

On motion of Mr. Frith, it was resolved that power be granted to the Executive Committee to deal with all questions in reference to Glebe lands and in bringing action for the recovery of the same as fully as the General Committee, and also to delegate such powers as they deem necessary to any sub-committee.

On motion of Mr. Schofield, the Committee proceeded, by nomination and ballot, to elect the Board of Home Missions.

submitted to the Committee appointed to take charge of the said fund for amendment, and that they report thereon.

Rev. R. E. Smith presented a memorial from the Deanery of St. Andrews with reference to a proposal for a Travelling Missionary in that Deanery, and moved that the memorial be referred to the Board of Home Missions. It was moved in amendment by the Rev. W. Jaffrey, that the appointment of a Travelling Missionary for the whole Diocese be recommended to the Board of Home Missions, and not for the Deanery of St. Andrews alone; the amendment was lost, and the original motion was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. Frith,—whereas the duty of providing for the superannuation of Clergymen incapacitated for active work by age or infirmity, should be deemed of, at least, equal importance with that of opening new Missions, that it is desirable to augment the Incapacitated Clergy Fund by an annual grant from the general funds of the Society.

It was moved in amendment by the Rev. J. H. Talbot to add the following words: “provided there be available funds.”

On being put to the Committee both the amendment and the resolution were lost.

The Committee adjourned to meet at 8 P. M.

The Committee met at 8 P. M.

On motion of Mr. Frith, it was resolved :

Whereas, The application of the Rev. W. S. Neales made to the Executive Committee to be placed permanently on the W. and O. Fund under Rule X., was referred to the General Committee by resolution of the Executive Committee,

And Whereas, No action was taken on the subject by the General Committee ;

Therefore Resolved, That the said Rev. W. S. Neales be placed permanently on W. and O. Fund in compliance with the terms of Rule X.

The Treasurer called the attention of the Committee to the following balances or contributions reported for the past year still unpaid :

Campobello, \$42.75; Greenwich, \$74.63; Musquash, \$4.50; Norton, \$25.60; Petersville, \$3.00, which latter, on motion of the Treasurer, was ordered to be written off.

On motion of Mr. Schofield, the following resolutions were adopted :

I.

Whereas, It is necessary that an increase be made in all the assessments, in order to meet the withdrawal of aid heretofore received from S. P. G.; and

Whereas, It is desirable that such increase be made gradually each year, rather than in large sums at longer intervals; and

Whereas, There are many inequalities in the present Schedule that should be removed; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions be directed during the ensuing year to revise the whole Schedule, and in doing so, to arrange for an annual increase of \$500, at least, in the total assessment, and a corresponding reduction in the grants from the D. C. S., and submit such revised Schedule to the General Committee next July; and further

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to carry the sum saved by such reduction of grants into a Reserve Fund, until the reduction in the S. P. G. Grant makes it necessary to use the same.

II.—TRAVELLING OUTFIT.

Whereas, It is very desirable that some provision should be made whereby men commencing work in this Diocese may be enabled to purchase the requisite travelling outfit without becoming involved in debt for the same; therefore

Resolved, That when a man commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the D. C. S., a sum not exceeding \$250 may be advanced to him for the purchase of necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to live at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be repaid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of the three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

III.

Resolved, That the statement made by the Board of Home Missions to the S. P. G. be printed in the Annual Report of this Society.

On motion of Mr. Schofield, it was resolved that the Board of Home Missions be authorized to make a grant of \$500 to aid in the maintenance of a Travelling Missionary.

The Committee proceeded to consider the Missionary Schedule, submitted in the Report of the Board of Home Missions, when the following appropriations were made for the Missionary Schedule of the current year.

The Treasurer was authorized to pay the grants in quarterly payments, provided that the rules and regulations of the Society are complied with.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

OF THE

DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY,

For the Year Ending July, 1884.

The Committee met at Fredericton, July 6th, 1883.

An Abstract of the proceedings of this meeting is to be found in the 48th Report, pages 106-107.

The next meeting was held at St. John on the 3rd October.

The Treasurer submitted a balance sheet of his account made up to 30th September, and also a list of unpaid contributions as reported to the Secretary. The Treasurer was requested to write to the Clergy in charge of Missions from which no contributions have been reported and make inquiry with reference thereto.

Mr. Robinson from the Committee on Printing, stated that the Annual Report would be printed by the end of the month. It was resolved that the bill of Messrs. Barnes & Co. be paid on the completion of the work to the satisfaction of the Committee.

Rev. F. S. Sill, from the Committee to interest Sunday Schools in the work of Home Missions, stated that the amount reported for the half year ending July, 1883, from Mission Boxes amounted to \$410.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 2nd January, 1884.

Read a Report of the Committee on "Occasional Papers" recommending the preparation of a Paper on the condition, wants and capabilities of certain vacant Missions, the Report was accepted, and the proposal approved with the addition of Queensbury to the Missions named in the Report.

A Report was presented from the Finance Committee, a portion of which was referred back to the Committee for farther inquiry and information.

A letter was read from Messrs. Wetmore and Winslow, relating to Glebe Lands in Andover, including a copy of notices to quit, directed to Thomas Kennedy and wife.

The action of the Lord Bishop in authorizing Mr. Wetmore to act as agent of the Society was approved, and also the notice given by Mr. Wetmore.

It was resolved that Earnest H. Hoyt of Andover, trader, be appointed agent of the Society to demand possession of the Glebe property in the hands of Thomas Kennedy and wife, and that the corporate Seal of the Society be affixed to the Power of Attorney now prepared.

The Honorable the Chief Justice, Mr. Bliss and Mr. Fenety, were appointed a Committee to inquire into the case, and to report at the next meeting of this Committee whether it be desirable to bring an action of ejectment in the name of the Society.

A special meeting of this Committee was held at St. John on the 8th February, 1884.

An application was read from Mr. J. J. Bostwick, offering the sum of \$2,500 for a lot of land in the City of St. John, fronting on Prince William Street.

It was resolved that the property be sold by public auction, provided any person will agree to put it up at \$2,500, and if not so disposed of the Finance Committee are authorized to sell at the best price obtainable. In case the sale is effected the Secretary was authorized to affix the Seal of the Society to the deed under the direction of the Finance Committee.

The next meeting of the Committee was held at St. John, on the 4th March, 1884.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his accounts and balances up to 29th February, 1884, also an account of contributions for 1883 unpaid at this date.

Rev. W. O. Raymond made an explanation with reference to the sum of \$48 appearing to be due from Stanley, which was written off. Explanations were also made with reference to sums reported as due from Sussex, Fredericton and Springfield.

The Treasurer was requested to write to the Clergy, when lists are in arrear, requesting them to take steps for the early payment of the amount due.

Mr. Jarvis from the Finance Committee, presented a report which was adopted.

A letter was read from Mr. E. L. Wetmore, relating to Glebe land in Andover. It was resolved that the matter be referred to the Glebe Land Committee, with the Honorable the Chief Justice, with power to use the name of the Society in bringing an action of ejectment against trespassers, if found desirable; satisfactory indemnity to be given that the Society be in no wise liable for cost or damages.

It was resolved that the Revs. Canon Brigstocke, G. M. Armstrong, Canon DeVeber, Canon Medley, G. O. Troop, Messrs. H. L. Sturdee and T. B. Robinson, be a Committee to make arrangements for the Annual Meeting of the Society in July next.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 4th June, 1884.

A statement of the Treasurer's account up to the 1st May, was submitted and received. Also a Report from the Finance Committee.

The Secretary read a Report of the Executive Committee for the past year, which was received, and he was directed to add thereto an abstract of the proceedings of this meeting and lay the said Report before the General Committee.

The following were appointed a Committee to arrange the order of proceedings at the Anniversary Meeting to be held on the 3rd July: the Right Reverend the Bishop Coadjutor, the Reverend Canon Brigstocke, the Reverend G. M. Armstrong, Messrs. W. M. Jarvis, T. Barclay Robinson and the Secretary.

The Rev. Henry Montgomery was admitted to the W. & O. Fund on the usual conditions.

A Report was submitted from the Glebe Land Committee which was received, and that portion referring to certain Glebe lands in the County of Albert was referred back to the Committee for further consideration.

A Report was submitted from the Book Depository Committee which was received for publication in the Annual Report, together with the Accounts of the Depository Committee.

The Committee of arrangements for the Annual Meetings were requested to prepare a circular, to be sent to the Clergy and Lay Delegates, stating the hours and places of the several meetings and services to be held by the Society during the first week in July.

Certain bills for printing and other incidental expenses were read and ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at St. John, in the Trinity Church School Room, on Friday, July 4th, 1884, at 9.30.

The Minutes of the last Meetings of the General Committee and of this Committee were read and approved.

It was resolved that 3,500 copies of the Annual Report be printed, and that the following be a Committee to attend to that duty :

Mr. C. E. L. Jarvis, the Bishop Coadjutor, Rev. T. E. Dowling, Mr. A. P. Tippet, with the Treasurer and Secretary.

The following were appointed members of the Finance Committee:

Messrs. W. M. Jarvis, H. W. Frith, G. A. Schofield, W. Carman, G. E. Fenety, T. W. Daniel, G. Sidney Smith, C. F. Kinnear, and the Treasurer; four to form a quorum.

Mr. H. L. Sturdee was appointed Secretary of the Widows and Orphans Fund.

Mr. Macdonald presented a Report from the Glebe Land Committee, which was received and referred back to the Committee now to be appointed, who are as follows:

Messrs. C. A. Macdonald, G. A. Schofield, G. Sidney Smith, H. L. Sturdee, C. W. Weldon, E. L. Wetmore, and the Treasurer.

It was resolved that the Glebe Land Committee be instructed and authorized to take such steps and bring such suits as they may think necessary to retain possession of, and recover all lands and property connected therewith, vested in the Society under the Act 34 Vic., Cap. 76, subject always to the consent and approval of the Lord Bishop.

It was resolved that a Committee be appointed to prepare, at their discretion, during the ensuing year, one or more "Occasional Papers" containing a statement of such facts and information as may be deemed likely to further the interests of the Society; and report the same for the approval of the Executive Committee; and that the Right Rev. the Bishop Coadjutor, the Revs. Canon Medley, T. E. Dowling, O. S. Newnham, and Messrs. G. A. Schofield, and H. W. Frith, do compose the said Committee.

That Mr. T. B. Robinson be Secretary of the Fund for the Education of the Sons of the Clergy for the ensuing year.

It was resolved that a Committee be appointed to propose any additions or alterations that may appear desirable in connection either with the Constitution of the Society, the regulations which govern its various funds, or the forms at present in use, and to submit their Report to this Committee for further

consideration and for presentation to the General Committee, and that the following do form the said Committee: Messrs. G. A. Schofield, H. L. Sturdee, G. J. Bliss, H. W. Frith, the Hon. the Chief Justice, the Treasurer, and A. A. Sterling.

It was resolved that the amount of the average annual collection, required from the Rev. W. S. Neales, on his continuing in connection with the Widows and Orphans Fund, under Rule X, be fixed at \$400; his annual premium continuing as before.

It was resolved that the Finance Committee be instructed and authorized to take steps and bring such suit as they may think necessary to retain possession of, protect and recover all lands, excepting Glebe land, and other property belonging to the Society, subject always to the consent and approval of the Lord Bishop.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The following is an abstract of the Reports made by this Committee to the Executive Committee during the year ending 30th June, 1884.

JANUARY, 1884.

1.—*Land Damages :*

Miss D. B. Hazen Trust :—The track of the St. John Bridge and Railway Extension Company being about to be carried over a part of the lands bequeathed to the Society by Miss Hazen, a sub-committee had attended before the Commissioners appointed to assess the value of the land required for such track. The quantity of land taken was a strip 600 feet in length, and varying in breadth from 70 to 90 feet. The damages awarded were \$1,000.00, and that sum had been paid to the Treasurer.

2. The Committee had authorized Mr. G. E. Fairweather to take any necessary proceedings against two persons trespassing on lands in the Parish of Simonds, belonging to the same Trust.

3. City of Saint John Street Debenture, No. 12, for \$400.00, and County of Saint John Alms House Debenture, No. 6, for \$500.00, had matured and been paid off; and the several sums received with other monies, amounting in all to \$3,000.00, had been placed on deposit at 4 p. c. in the Bank of New Brunswick.

MARCH, 1884.

1. Explanations given of certain parts of the last Report asked for by the Executive Committee.

2. The lot on Prince William and Water Streets, Saint John, ordered by the Executive Committee to be sold, had been offered at auction on the 14th of February last, and purchased by Mr. James J. Bostwick for the sum of \$2,500.00.

3. Mr. V. S. White had given notice that he would give up the store and premises on the North Market Wharf, St. John, belonging to the S. Seovil Trust, on the 1st May next, unless the rent should be reduced; and, rather than reduce the rent, the Committee had advertised the property to be let.

4. The Committee submitted a petition from Mr. Thomas P. Trueman, praying a reduction of rent on his lease of land, belonging to the Miss Hazen Trust, and lying between Gilbert's Road and the City Road, St. John. The Committee recommended that the matter be dealt with as follows:

The present lease was for 21 years, from 1st November, 1878. The rent under a prior letting had been \$90.00, but the property, during the litigation over Miss Hazen's will, having got into arrears to the extent of \$540.00, a new lease had been given Mr. Trueman, at \$135.00 per annum. Mr. Trueman now proposed to pay his rent at this rate up to 1st May next, which, for the $5\frac{1}{2}$ years the lease would then have run, would amount to \$247.50 beyond what he would have paid at the old rent. Placing this sum to the credit of the arrears there would remain unpaid \$292.50. It had been agreed with Mr. Trueman, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, to divide the lot into two, giving one lot on Gilbert's Road, of 33 feet by about 80 feet, and one on the City Road, 34 feet by 49 feet, with a right of way from the City Road to the rear of the other Lot, $7\frac{1}{4}$ feet in width, and to make the rent of the lot on Gilbert's Road \$72.00; and of the other lot \$36.00. Two new leases to be issued to Mr. Trueman, for 15 years and a half, and the old lease cancelled.

5. The Treasurer had deposited \$1,000.00 in the Bank of Nova Scotia at 4 p. c.

JUNE, 1884.

1. The property lying between Prince William and Saint John Streets, in the City of Saint John, sold in March last, to Mr. J. J. Bostwick, for \$2,500.00, had been paid for by him, and the transfer completed.

2. Leases, in accordance with the resolution of the General Committee, had been prepared for Mr. Trueman, but not yet executed. Mr. Trueman had paid up his rent in full to 1st May last.

3. The store and premises on the North Market Wharf, Saint John, belonging to the S. Scovil Trust, had been vacated 1st May by Mr. White, and, although duly advertised, no other suitable tenant had been found.

4. Owing to a reduction being made by the Bank of New Brunswick, in its rates of interest on special deposits, the Treasurer had withdrawn \$2,000.00 from that Bank and deposited same in the Bank of Nova Scotia, with \$4,000.00 previously there at 4 p. c. The amount received from Mr. Bostwick, and \$1,000.00 more, had also been deposited there, making in all the large sum of \$9,500.00, waiting for investment, but for which no suitable investment had been found.

REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE, For Year Ending June 1st, 1884.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Committee to whom was entrusted the management of the Depository of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their Tenth Annual Report and Accounts:

The sale of Books for the year ending April 30, 1884,
amounted to..... \$989 00

Last year 877 copies of "The Dawn of Day" were circulated in 22 Parishes.

This year 942 copies have been paid for in advance.

Trinity Church "Parochial Magazine," and "Kingston Deanery Magazine" localize 425 copies.

Eight Meetings of the Committee have been held during the year, and ten importations of Books have been received direct from the Parent Society.

Two Branch Depositories have been established: one at Moncton, and the other at St. Stephen.

There is reason to hope that they will be self-supporting, and that their number will gradually increase throughout the Diocese.

Your Committee beg to place on record the following Grants made to this Diocese by the Parent Society:

1. Passage money—£10 0 0 each, from Canning's Fund—to the Reverend Henry Holloway, the Reverend Amos J. Creswell, S. A. C., and Reverend J. C. Titcombe.

2. A renewed Grant of £30 0 0 for School-church, at Moosepath, Simonds, and £25 0 0 to complete the church at Wilmot.

3. Books and Christian Season Tracts "for use in this Diocese," to the value of £10.0.0, on application of Bishop Kingdon, who also obtained Books for Messrs. Holloway and Titcombe.

4. The Diocesan Girl's Friendly Society (Fredericton); St. Andrews; Christ Church, St. Stephen; Trinity Mission, St. Stephen, have also received Tracts or Sunday School Library Books.

5. Only one Parish—Carleton—has availed itself of the Society's offer of free grants of the "Tracts for the Holy Seasons of the Church." Clergymen desiring to avail themselves of this offer should write to the Secretary for a form of application; they should state: (1) the name of the Parish; (2) the number of the population; (3) whether there is a considerable proportion of poor in the Parish; and should give instructions how the Tracts can be forwarded.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS, For The Year Ending June 30th, 1884.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society :

The Board of Home Missions submit the following Report:

During the past year the following alterations have been made in the Schedule adopted by the General Committee last July:

BAIE DES VENTS.—The assessment has been reduced \$40.00, and the grant increased \$40.00.

PRINCE WILLIAM.—Under the resolution of the General Committee last year the grant to this Mission expired upon the resignation of the Reverend LeB. W. Fowler.

The Reverend A. E. G. Lowndes, who is in Deacon's orders, having been appointed to the Mission, the Board made a grant of \$380.00, conditional upon a contribution of \$300.00 by the Mission.

WATERFORD.—The Missionary in charge having received Priest's orders, the grant to this Mission was increased \$100.00 to bring the total stipend up to \$700.00.

GRAND FALLS AND MADAWASKA.--Arrangements having been made whereby these Missions will be served together, the Board have made a grant of \$350.00, conditional upon a contribution of \$350.00 by the people.

SPECIAL GRANTS.—A grant of \$30.00 was made to Rev. H. T. Parlee for services as lay reader in the Mission of Richmond during several months that the Mission was vacant.

A grant of \$30.00 (the people having paid \$20.00) was made to the Rev. G. H. Sterling for services in the Mission of Newcastle during the vacancy.

PARSONAGE HOUSES.—Grants of \$100.00 each, upon the usual conditions, have been made to the Missions of Baie des Vents, Petersville, and Sackville,

TRAVELLING EXPENSES.—\$211.42 has been paid out of the S. P. G. Grant towards the travelling expenses of the Missionaries who have come from England to the Missions of Albert and Weldford, and to Mr. Williams, who is working at Newcastle, Grand Lake, under the direction of the Rector of Mangerville.

DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIP'S FUND.—A grant of \$60.00 from the income of this Fund has been paid to Mr. Niels Hansen, and the balance of the income \$12.00, has been paid to Mr. S. Neales.

DEPUTATIONS.—During the year deputations from the Board have visited the Missions of Douglas, Petersville, Stanley, and Weldford.

The Bishop Coadjutor, during his recent visit to England, waited upon the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, to thank them for the generous assistance they have given in the past, and to lay before them a statement of the present position of the Diocese. His Lordship has reported to the Board that the S. P. G. urged very strongly that every effort be made here by meetings and otherwise to raise the Diocese into the rank of a self-supporting Church, as their grant must gradually be withdrawn to help to plant and maintain the Church in newer and poorer places. The Bishop Coadjutor was also requested by the Society to urge upon those Missionaries, who were on its list, the duty of making a Yearly Report.

The S. P. C. K., with their accustomed liberality, granted £30 sterling to aid in paying the passage of three Missionaries engaged by the Bishop Coadjutor for work in the Diocese. The Board having learned from His Lordship the Bishop how much the Diocese was indebted to his Commissary in England—the Reverend Dr. Hicks—for assistance in procuring Missionaries to work here, requested His Lordship to convey to Dr. Hicks their warmest thanks for his valuable labours on behalf of the Diocese.

Of the four gentlemen who agreed to come out, three have already arrived and proceeded to the work assigned to them:

The Reverend A. J. Cresswell, to Albert.

The Reverend H. Holloway, to Weldford.

Mr. E. J. P. Williams to work at Newcastle, Grand Lake, under the direction of the Rector of Mangerville.

The Reverend J. C. Titcombe, who is to take charge of the Mission of Canterbury, is expected to arrive in about a month.

TRAVELLING OUTFIT.—The Board, believing that it is very desirable that some provision should be made whereby young men commencing work in this Diocese may be enabled to purchase the requisite travelling outfit without becoming involved in debt for the same, recommend the General Committee to adopt the following resolution, to remove a difficulty which has many times been found very serious.

When a man is ordained Deacon, and commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the D. C. S., the sum of \$250.00 may be advanced to him for the purchase of necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to serve at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be repaid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of the three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

STATEMENT FOR S. P. G.—The Board submit herewith a copy of the statistical return furnished during the past year to the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

As this return is now required every year, and is in every point a matter of great interest to the Diocese, the Board recommend that it be included in the Annual Report of the Society.

The Board desire to point out to the General Committee, that the whole number of Missions at present requiring aid cannot be maintained unless the voluntary subscriptions to the Society amount to \$8,500 annually, in addition to any sum required to make up reductions that must soon be made in the grant from S. P. G. As the amount received last year was only \$7,200, great effort must be made in every Mission or we must again be compelled to abandon some of the present work. This estimate does not allow for any new work to be undertaken.

There also remains due of the unpaid balances reported last year, from Kingsclear \$3.85, all the others having been paid.

ASSESSMENT FOR NEXT YEAR.—The Board, having considered the depressed state of business all through the Province at present, believe that it would be very undesirable to make any general increase in the assessments for next year. On the other hand, in view of the fact that the reduction of the S. P. G. Grant cannot be much longer postponed, they think it desirable that notice should now be given that all the assessments must be increased in July, 1885. With respect to the mode of such increase the Board believe that it will be much easier to make a small increase in the assessments every year than to get a larger sum each fourth year. They, therefore, recommend the General Committee to adopt a resolution providing for an increase of \$500 annually, and a like reduction in the D. C. S. Grant, to commence on 1st July, 1885.

In order to prevent monies so received appearing in the Treasurer's accounts as surplus income, until they are required to meet the S. P. G. reductions, the Board recommend that a separate account be opened to be called the Reserve Fund, to which these sums shall be carried, and in which they shall be kept until required.

The Estimate of Income and Expenditure for next year, the Schedule of Grants recommended, and the Returns, Correspondence, and Minutes of Business transacted by the Board during the past year, accompany this Report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO INTEREST SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN THE WORK OF HOME MISSIONS.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Society :

Your Committee beg to submit the following Report :

The number of Boxes now out is 1,076, being 25 more than in July last. Of this number, however, only about 700 are actually in the hands of the children. The number of Missions to which Boxes are issued is 42.

The amount returned for the year ending 1st January, 1884, is \$824.57, of which \$818.89 has been paid, but only \$758.58 in time to appear in the Treasurer's Accounts.

The Committee have, however, to report that 14 Missions having Boxes, have made no return for the half year ending 1st January, 1884.

The paid expenses of the Committee, a detailed account of which is appended hereto, have been \$42.11 (including \$19.50 belonging to the expenses of the previous year), leaving a balance of \$716.47 for the general purposes of the Society.

One "Leaflet," by Rev. F. W. Vroom, was issued in the year past.

In February last, the Rev. F. S. Sill, who, as a member of this Committee, so faithfully discharged the duties of its Secretary, left this Diocese to take a Parish in the State of New York, and in consequence this Report is not as complete in detail as it would otherwise have been.

To the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Glebe Land Committee of the Diocesan Church Society beg to submit the following Report in addition to the matters reported at the General Meeting :

That application has been made for a deed of a portion of the land situate at Hopewell, in the County of Albert, alleged to have been sold to one Solemn Woodworth, and after investigation, it appears that this is a portion of the tract described in the Act 34, Vic., Cap. 76, of the Statutes of New Brunswick, as the twenty-seventh tract, and situate in the Parish of Hopewell, Westmorland County, and it further appears that the sum of fifty dollars was paid by Mr. Woodworth for such portion of the said land to the Lord Bishop in November, 1869, and we are informed this amount is now on deposit in the Savings' Bank at Fredericton.

From a letter received from Mr. S. G. Morse, and which is submitted herewith, we learn that other parties in Hopewell lay claim to other portions of the above tract, but we are unable to report conclusively as to the justness of these claims, but in some cases we have reason to believe the claims are not tenable.

That from reliable statements received from various quarters, we gather that there are valuable Glebe Lands in different parts of the Province which have been conveyed to the Society by the above Act, and are now occupied by trespassers, claiming a possessing title, but which might be recovered by means of the Act above referred to, and if the Society desire to protect their rights some immediate action should be taken to prevent the operation of the Statute of Limitations; we therefore suggest that the Glebe Lands Committee be enlarged and full power be delegated to them to deal with these lands, and in their discretion, but only with the unanimous consent of such Committee, to bring actions and take legal measures for the recovery of the possession and protection of the Society's interests in such lands without reference to the General Committee, as the Glebe Land Committee with its present limited powers is totally unable to take any effective or decisive steps, and occasions frequently arise when prompt action is desirable.

General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:*

The Committee appointed last year to promote the interests of the Incapacitated Clergy Fund beg to report that they find that since the Committee, with a similar object, reported in 1873, very little has been done in the matter.

Indeed so much has the Fund been overlooked that two small sums, one of \$17.00, and another of 92 cents, which were limited to this Fund, have been absorbed in the General Funds of the Society, and have not been credited to the object for which they were intended.

Your Committee have issued the accompanying appeal to the Society of the Diocese for which they hope a greater success than has at present been obtained. In the appeal they recommend that a special fund be started which shall not be broken in upon for five years, so that from the accumulation of subscriptions, donations, and interest, a considerable addition to the principal of the fund may be expected.

Your Committee hope that this recommendation will meet with your approval.

Donations to the extent of \$1,401.50 in aid of "The Incapacitated Clergy Special Fund" (as per statement herewith) have been received by the Treasurer.

Your Committee recommend that a permanent Committee be appointed to watch over the interests of this very important and necessary fund, and that every Incumbent of the Diocese be requested to make some effort during the year in aid of "The Incapacitated Clergy Special Fund" either by personal canvass or collection in Church.

THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

AN APPEAL.

To the Laity of the Diocese of Fredericton:—

One of the objects for which the Diocesan Church Society was formed, was declared to be "the creation of a Fund towards making provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated

by age or infirmity." The necessity for such a Fund will scarcely be questioned by any one. But amidst the pressing needs of the Diocese for active Missionary work in all directions this Fund has been permitted to lie almost dormant; the enfeebled or worn out ministers of the Church have been passed by unheeded; and in the half century which the Society has nearly completed, the accumulations of the Fund have only reached the sum of \$5,600, the income from which is insufficient to pay the only pension as yet charged upon it. Recognizing however, as some did recognize, the great importance of this branch of the Society's work, a code of rules was, some years ago, prepared and adopted, not merely to regulate the administration of the Fund, but also to promote, as was hoped, an interest in increasing it. These rules appear at length in all the later reports of the Society; but, as they are probably not often read, it may be well to give here an abstract of their provisions: The Fund is to consist of the accumulations already in hand, with such as should accrue, and "of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions" to or for this special object; the interest of the Fund, only, to be applied to the relief of "disabled clergy of the Diocese;" all surplus moneys to be added to the capital; the management of the Fund to be vested in the Executive Committee; any clergyman duly appointed in the Diocese "being unable to discharge the duties of his office, through mental or bodily infirmity," to be at liberty to apply to the Executive Committee, and, at their discretion, to receive such yearly pension not to exceed \$400, as they shall see fit, every application to be accompanied by the recommendation of the Bishop. Other provisions follow to guard the Fund from undue claims and for matters of detail, which it is unnecessary to cite. Here then we have the machinery for working the Fund however large, and how many soever the demands upon it. But up to this time we have the machinery only. *The Fund has not materially increased!* In order to bring the matter more prominently before the members of our Church, and to provoke, if possible, more concern about it, the following resolution was moved and adopted at the last meeting of the General Committee:

"Resolved, That a Special Committee be now appointed to whom shall be entrusted the duty of promoting the interests of The Incapacitated Clergy Fund."

The Committee appointed under this resolution have given the matter referred to them their serious consideration. They feel that its importance cannot be too gravely stated. They desire by this appeal to bring it home to the hearts and consciences of their fellow-Churchmen, very many of whom fail to support such a work as this, merely from lack of observation. How much stress, amongst all classes of society, is laid upon the prudential maxims by which, from various points of view, men are urged to make provision in health for sickness, and in youth for age. Yet how vain are such maxims for the great majority of the clergy! With their slender stipends, and comparatively heavy expenses, how impossible must it be to lay by any store for their own future. For their widows and orphans, in case of death, many do make a scanty provision; but for themselves and their families, should they live to become "incapacitated," how can they provide! Thus the prospect of life, prolonged amidst the infirmities of sickness or old age, is, in a prudential point of view, more depressing than the prospect of premature death. But there is another side to the matter, and, so far as the welfare of the Church is concerned, a more serious side still. What does the incapacity of a clergyman mean? It means less work and feebler work. It means less power over the younger and more active part of the flock. It means lack of progress, and almost certainly of retrogression! And yet the incapacitated Priest for whose retirement the Church makes no provision, *must* struggle on, in very many cases, whatever the consequences may be to his people. What a miserably painful position both for pastor and for flock! To be compelled to witness the work of a lifetime, perchance, dwindling away, and to have no other alternative but to struggle on, or starve? Surely no one can seriously contemplate possibilities so calamitous, without a sincere desire to do what lies in his power to avert them. What then can be done? In order to answer this, it is necessary to consider what is likely to be required, and how the requirement must be met. The Committee feel that it is not easy to answer positively either of these demands. There are in the Diocese sixty-seven officiating clergy. How many of these are likely at any one time to become claimants on the Fund, it is almost impossible, without any past experience, to determine. Suppose, however, the number should average four. This, at \$400 a year each, would require an income of \$1,600, and to get this income, would, even at 6 per cent., require a capital of nearly \$27,000,

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or \$21,400 more than the present amount of the Fund. On the other hand if it were advisable or practicable to depend upon annual contributions, instead of an endowment, it would be necessary to raise \$1,264 annually, in addition to the present income of the Fund. To do either of these things can only be attempted by the hearty concurrence of priests and people throughout the Diocese. Reader, into whose hands this appeal may fall, will *you* do what you can? If every one to whom it may come will answer "yes,"—see how easily the whole thing might be done, at least, within *five* years. Suppose this paper should reach five hundred heads of families; that is not a large proportion of the forty-seven thousand persons who profess to belong to the Church of England in this Province. Well, the Committee estimate that there are at least three Churchmen in the Diocese who could give \$200 a year each for five years, which would amount to \$3,000.

This may appear a large estimate, but as it only requires eighty-three of the five hundred to make it up, there is a wide margin left for possible shortcomings. Could this amount be raised in five years the Fund would slightly exceed \$20,000; give an income of \$1,200; and provide for three pensioners upon it. If a fourth claimant should appear we might hope that the \$100 required for him would be made up by annual subscriptions among the great bulk of remaining Churchmen, who had not contributed as above; or, what would be far better, that all should contribute something at once, to meet the claim when made.

The Committee urge this appeal most earnestly upon their fellow-Churchmen; they are simply discharging a duty cast upon them by the Church, though they do it with a deep conviction of the necessity for immediate action. They entreat every individual who may read this paper, faithfully and prayerfully to ponder it, and then to make answer either to

his or her pastor, or to one of the Committee, what he or she will do, be it little or much, for THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

REPORT OF THE AUDITORS

Upon the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society for the Year ending 31st May, 1884.

We have had submitted to us by the Treasurer the various Accounts for the past year, and we beg to report the same correct.

We have examined the Securities, Debentures and Disposal Receipts, as stated in the Treasurer's Accounts, and find them to agree with his Report.

APPENDIX.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

As one means of increasing the Contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable.

The Weekly Offerings, upon the Envelope System, have been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish, is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this being done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishoners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards. to be given in an Envelope, at the Services on each Sunday.

2. A package of Envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishoners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year, will also present all the last Year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan, the following objects are sought to be accomplished:

1. That not only heads of families, but *all in the Parish*, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute, *according to their ability*, to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible at the appointed time, *bring their pledged Weekly Offerings to Church*, instead of paying them at the call of the Collector.

[NOTE.—The Principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A FORTNIGHT, or at any other stated period within the Quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrears and Debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be *materially increased*, so that, mainly from this source, sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be generally adopted.
