(Nominated by North York Conservatives)

## Standing on Public Rights Issue

Nationalization of Our Tele-  
phones and Telegraphs  
and Reduction of Ses-  
sional Indemnity Pledges  
of Candidate—Conser-  
vatives Enter Upon By-Elec-  
tion Campaign With a Man  
and a Platform the Peo-  
ple Should Vote For.

Newmarket, Nov. 1.—(Special)—It is  
a farmer and an advocate of the rights  
of the people against a Toronto man,  
a corporation lawyer, in the North York  
by-election. Archie McCallum of King  
Township was the nominee of the Con-  
servative convention to-day. The elec-  
tion was not large, due to the gloom-  
y weather that kept many of the  
rural electors at home, but it was  
remarkable for the enthusiasm that was  
manifested for the candidate, and still  
more for the splendid stand he has  
taken in the interests of the people.  
Mr. McCallum was the choice of the  
convention on the second ballot. Three  
North York Conservatives aspired for  
the honor of opposing Hon. A. B.  
Aylesworth in this contest—T. H. Erwin,  
Danford Roche and Archie McCallum,  
but when the vote was announced the  
two first named graciously  
accepted the verdict and enthusiastically  
praised the support of the  
candidate and of his platform.

### JUST A FARMER.

# RUSSIAN REIGN OF TERROR COSSACKS WARRON PEOPLE

Terrible Deeds of Violence Reported  
From Odessa and Kiev, Where  
Casualties Are Placed in  
Many Hundreds.

### JEWS OBJECT OF ATTACK AND PILLAGE

Police Encourage Lawlessness—Lib-  
erals Refuse to Assist Witte's  
Program—Revolutionists De-  
clare Republic is Wanted.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 1.—The to-day  
passed in comparative quiet here and  
in Moscow, despatches from all parts  
of the empire report disorders in many  
cities with a heavy toll of dead  
or wounded. The people, while cele-  
brating their new found freedom, were  
in many instances set upon by  
Cossacks and police, while in other local-  
ities the spirit of mob violence broke  
forth and the members of the police  
population have themselves up to pil-  
lage and destruction.

The most serious disorders appar-  
ently occurred in Odessa where hundreds  
of persons are reported to have been  
killed or wounded and where a rioting  
mob is expected to flare into  
a repetition of the slaughter of last  
July, and at Kazan, where a three days  
reign of terror was ended only by the  
retirement of all Cossacks to their bar-  
racks.

A deplorable feature of the news  
from the interior is that anti-Jewish  
uprisings have occurred in many  
places, especially in South Russia,  
where the people vented its hatred  
of the Jews by sacking their stores  
and clubs, the members of the police  
in some cases resorting to the torch.  
The attacks on the Jews are reported  
to be the most cases of the kind  
since the Jews were expelled from  
Russia in 1881, and many times  
were left upon the people without  
direction or authority.

In St. Petersburg to-day General  
Trepoff was in the city, and the  
announcement of last night, prevented  
the resumption of revolutionary de-  
monstrations by having the crowd  
dispersed whenever and wherever they  
gathered. Kazan places and the Nev-  
sky Prospekt were several times cleared  
by Cossacks and police and the  
crowds were driven from the streets  
of the university with water and  
tears. General Trepoff was aid-  
ed by the police in clearing the  
streets and which kept many per-  
sons of the streets.

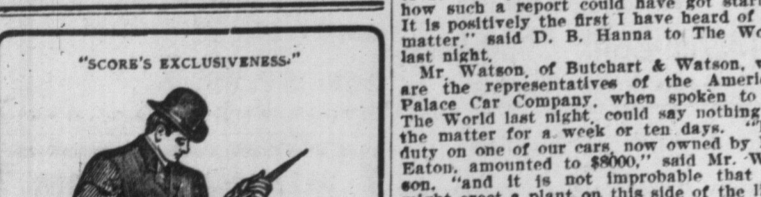

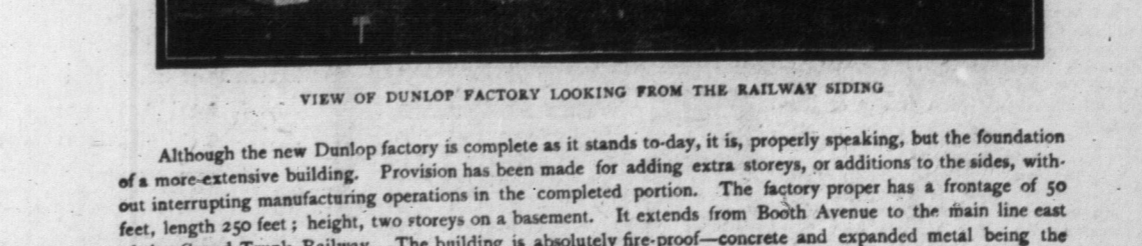
