WOULD DEPLETE WELLAND POWER BILL THROWN OUT

Real Purpose of Western Power Co.'s Bill Revealed and Government Backs Down.

Ottawa, July 4 .- (Special.) -An at-tempt to divert Lake Erie water and to exploit the public works of Canada for the benefit of a private conporation, was held up in the house to-night. The government opposed the measure ostensibly in the public interest, altho it is a fair surmise that other influences were brought to bear.

The bill, which had passed the senate, and had been reported by the private bills committee, sought to incorporate the Grand River and Western Power Co. Its real purpose and effect was pointed out by W. F. Maclean UTTIVEN O 1111 BLU (South York). The Grand River was to be the ostensible source or supply, but the scheme was to divert the water from Lake Erie. One direct result would be to depiete the Welland Canal. That was already being done on a considerable sca,e by the Cataract Power Co. There was a systematic effort to cover Niagara power with franchises. It was high time that the government adopted and maintained some definite policy.
