Among other things Richards says: "When we had worked a month we were told that we had to pay one cent per mile for railway fare from Halifax, which left us largely in debt after working that time, having to purchase blankets, bedding and other things we did not expect. Six weeks later the sub-contractor skipped out and left us without a cent, but it did not matter much, as it would, under favorable circumstances, be taken six months to have got clear of debt. We left in debt and had to leave clear of the line for fear of being arrested. All were afraid of Haney and did not give proper evidence before the commissioners. The commissioners were not in a position to report as to the true state of affairs."

FORESTRY COMMISSIONERS. Matters of Interest—Charcoal Manufacture—Saw Dust for Smokeless Powder—The Seals and White Pine.

A meeting of the Forestry Commission was held on Tuesday evening. Those present were: E. W. Rathbun, Deseronto, chairman; John Betram, J. H. McWilliams, Peterboro; A. Kirkwood, Thomas Southworth.

Regarding the measures to be taken this summer, it was decided to await the decision of the Commissioner of Crown Lands. Mr. Rathbun reported the establishment at Deseronto of a smelter by an American company. The company would manufacture its own charcoal, which was of interest to the commission, since it would mean the consumption of large quantities of timber waste.

An enquiry had been received from an American as to the possibility of securing Canadian sawdust in quantities for the manufacture of smokeless powder to the United States.

A report from Prescott stated that the seals which were thought to have attacked spruce and red pine only had in that district attacked the white pine.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

H. M. S. Indefatigable Announced Very Suddenly to Depart for the Yukon—A Trouble There.

Halifax, April 20.—A report this afternoon that H. M. S.
