IT'S THE GARDEN OF CANADA

The Fruit District Living Between St. Catharines and Hamilton.

An Abundant Crop of All Kinds of Fruit is Promised This Year--The Cold Wave of the First Week in April Did No Harm to the Fruit.

Average for Fruit Harvest Increased--and Jose Scale Scarc Not Warranted--and Storage Shipments.

A World reporter paid a flying visit to the fruit district lying between St. Catharines and Hamilton, and was convinced beyond a doubt that this is really the garden of Ontario, if not of the whole Dominion.

After enquiries made, The World man states that the prospects at the present time are that there will be an abundant crop of all kinds of fruit this season.

It was feared that the wave of frost and cold that passed over the province about the first day would have materially damaged a well advanced crop of fruit, but the very fine March weather of this season, but such is not the case. The frost that was done, and everything points to a bountiful supply of all kinds of fruit, green and small.

Times are changed. In the past when there was a large crop of any one kind of fruit, it was expected that there would be a dearth of that particular fruit the following season. But times are changed, and the increase in the acreage of fruit is so great year by year that it will have to be an extraordinarily unfavorable season to cause a scarcity.

In this district the acreage in fruit was largely increased last year, principally in peaches, pears, cherries and small kinds of berries. Last season the weather being wet, causing much injury to small fruit, but otherwise would, but in answer to the question, have, and, fruit-growers making money? The answer was invariably "yes!"

Indeed the whole district from St. Catharines to Hamilton, bears out the truthfulness of this answer.

The land is valuable. To give the reader an idea of the value of this land the reporter asked an old settler, on whose property he could rely, what land was worth in the vicinity of Fruit Park. He related to him a farm with a comfortable brick house and a barn, but not large barn upon and said the owner refused an offer of \$5500 in cash. Land that could have been bought for \$100 or even less ten years ago, is worth from \$250 to \$300 per acre now. The majority of the farms are from 5 to 25 acres in size, but there are many much larger.

The small farmers complain about owners of large farms going in for fruit. They say the large farmer will plant 5 or 10 acres in peaches, pears, cherries and small fruits, paying little attention to the other crops. He will plant a few acres of fruit, which has cost him little or nothing for raising, and he will keep his small farm clean so that he can reap a crop from year to year.

On the other hand the large farmer can under the small farmer, who is compelled to keep his small farm clean so that he can reap a crop from year to year.

The fruit shippers spoke of Montreal as being their best market, speaking very unfavorably of Toronto.

O'Brien, who has about 400 acres under cultivation, about equally divided into fruit, grain and stock, and at the present time 120 men are employed in picking fruit. He has many different points of the Dominion. Mr. O'Brien's nursery is situated on the 11th and expected to be through on the 20th of April, having 30 inches square, using over 40,000 feet of lumber in manufacturing.

The trees and plants that were being shipped from Heidelberg are in excellent condition and he will be prepared to ship double the quantity next year.

HEALTH OF THE PROVINCE.

What is Being Done to Safeguard it in Many Respects.

Second Day's Session of the Provincial Board--Dr. Bryce's Instructive Quarterly Report--The Work of the Local Boards Summarized and Criticized.

The Provincial Board of Health continued in session yesterday and spent most of its time in the consideration of water supplies and sewerage systems for various municipalities.

Secretary Dr. Bryce reported favorably upon the establishment of a proposed cemetery in Meaford, and the report was adopted.

Diphtheria at Chisholm. An outbreak of diphtheria was reported from the Toronto district. The outbreak was due to a school teacher coming from Mattawa with a mild form of the disease.

### THE JUDGE'S CRIMINAL COURT.

**Case of Interest Before Judge McDougall - Jackson's Point Housebreaker Gets Six Months.**

Several criminal cases came before Judge McDougall yesterday.
