Mr. Moorish said that there was ample ore in sight in the mine to justify shipping to the coast for exportation. He had received instructions, he said, from the Board of Directors of the Velvet Mine, limited, in London, to construct a wagon road from the mine to the coast.

O. B. Robinson of the Foley Mine and Don Taylor of the firm of Taylor, Grano & Co. were seen by a Herald reporter on Tuesday. CONVENTION HALL BURNED.

The Monster Auditorium Built by the Democrats at Kansas City Gone Up in Smoke.

OTHER BUILDINGS DESTROYED. The Loss is \$350,000—Hall Was Well Insured and Will Be Immediately Rebuilt.

Kansas City, Mo., April 4.—Convention Hall, the mammoth auditorium in which the Democratic convention was to have been held on July 4, was burned to the ground yesterday afternoon.

At 1.30 the fire jumped two ways, attacking a half block of three-story residences in the rear of the hall on 12th street, and across Central-street, where it seized upon the Second Presbyterian Church, one of the finest edifices in the city, and the Lathrop Public School.

At 1.50 the fire was estimated at \$350,000, approximately \$200,000 of which was covered by the Convention Hall, \$225,000 by the Second Presbyterian Church, \$200,000 by the Lathrop School, \$200,000 by residences on 12th-street, \$80,000 by the hall.

The hall is well insured, and will be rebuilt immediately for use for the National Convention of the Board of Trade, and the hall was known to be doomed members of the Commercial Club, thru whose efforts the property had been built, began soliciting funds, and it is stated the rebuilding will begin as soon as the rains can be cleared. The foundations remain intact.

A Number Named in the South Perth Election Must Appear at the Stratford Assizes for Trial.

TELEGRAPH SUIT IS DISMISSED.

Mr. W. H. K. McGe's Action Against the Toronto General Trusts Co. Also Dismissed.

After many months the law has been set in motion against seven of the bribers, who were reported in the South Perth election

Crown Attorney Idington of Stratford yesterday obtained from Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Meredith, who annulled the election, and so unseated Mr. Moscrop, chiefy because of the badly-printed ballots, an order for the issue of summonses, by which the bribers will be ordered to appear at the Stratford Assizes next month.

Their names are John Graham, Patrick Graham, Richard James, William Leitch, William Tobin, Frank Lyons and R. J. Ferris. Edward O'Neill, who was on the list since died.

The Telegraph Action Dismissed. Mr. Justice Meredith yesterday dismissed the action of Morrow against the Toronto General Trusts Company, holding that the plaintiffs by single delay, acquiescence and inaction had deprived themselves of the right to call upon the court to grant them equitable relief.

McGe's Suit Dismissed. By consent the action brought by W. H. K. McGe against the Toronto General Trusts Company, executors of his mother's estate was yesterday dismissed. The suit was set aside a month ago, when the defendant had a share in her \$25,000 estate, consisting chiefly of Winnipeg property.

A Cobourg Case. Mrs. Catherine Taylor of Cobourg last week obtained an injunction from the local judge at Cobourg, Ontario, against her husband, Dwan Taylor, from withdrawing a sum of money from the Dominion Bank there, which she claims belongs to her, and which he deposited in his own name. Yesterday, on motion by Judge Taylor, the injunction was made absolute, and the defendant was ordered to pay the costs of the motion for two weeks, and to continue in the meantime.
