DISPLAYS WILFUL MALICE
Hon. Mr. Tarte Says He is Not
Astonished at Globe's Language
Toward Him.

BUT BELITTLES ITS INFLUENCE
On September 19 He Will Be in
Orillia on a Special
Invitation.

Montreal, Sept. 16.—Hon. Mr. Tarte
has given out the following reply to
the Globe's peculiar article of this
morning:

"I am not astonished at The Globe's
language towards me.
"As to the influence of that paper,
however you can see it in the result of
its efforts during the electoral cam-
paign of 1910. It spoke in support of
the Liberal cause. The elections came,
and Hon. Mr. Mulock was the only
Liberal candidate who returned victo-
rious out of fourteen seats in and
around Toronto.

Mr. Tarte succeeded Mr. N. Clark Wal-
lace who was elected after saying exactly
what I said, not for the first time,
but ten times before the Prime Minister
and his colleagues. The Globe is
absolutely free to say what it likes
about me. I know it represents influ-
ences which for a long time have
been hostile to me.

In a Canadian Sense.
"It is astonishing to me to see how
some people refuse to notice and ac-
cuse me of the condition of the public
mind. What I ask, what I sincerely
believe the majority of the country
demands, is a readjustment of the
tariff in a truly Canadian sense. Dur-
ing the last session Hon. Mr. Fielding,
speaking on behalf of the government,
announced a revision of the tariff for
the next session.

"The general situation vividly re-
calls to my mind the situation of the
country in 1898, 1897 and 1898, at an
earlier period just after confederation.
"A group of young men, including
Louis A. Jette, L. O. David, Georges
Beauséjour, Wilfred Laurier, Henri
Joly, Hector Fabre and others had
founded the Parti Nationale, the na-
tional party, and were advocating the
protection of national industry. They
stirred public opinion during two or three
years. Sir John Macdonald was
beaten on the Canadian Pacific ques-
tion, and Mr. Alexander Mackenzie
formed his cabinet. The merchants of
the Province of Quebec were forced
to renounce their ideas for protection.

"What happened?
"The Conservative party took pos-
session of the policy of the Liberals
of Lower Canada, making of that
policy their own and confederation. You
know the result of the elections of
1878.

Wilful Malice.
"The Globe displays wilful malice
in attacking me because I travel a
great deal. With the exception of my
trip to the Great Lakes, which I made
for the purpose of studying the coun-
try, I have not made an official visit
to any place in Ontario or Quebec
without having been invited and
pressed to do so. On Sept. 19 I shall
be at Orillia on the invitation of the
Liberal Association. Mr. Calvert, the
chief Liberal whip, has invited me on
behalf of the Middlesex Exposition
Company to be at a visit of inspection
of the Province of Quebec on Sept.
22. I have also been invited to visit
Ontario. Shall I refuse them because
it displeases The Globe?"

TO GO TO WHITBY.
Whitby, Sept. 16.—Hon. J. Tarte is
shortly to pay a visit of inspection
to Whitby harbor and action was taken
by the Town Council last night direct-
ing the Mayor to invite the Minister of
Public Works on the occasion of his
visit to address a public meeting in
the Music Hall upon national ques-
tions.

WHAT TARTE ONCE SAID.
Winnipeg, Sept. 16.—Hon. George E.
Foster, formerly Minister of Finance,
arrived in the city this morning. Asked
if he had come west to join the Bor-
don party, he replied that his visit was
entirely on business, and had nothing
to do with politics. Mr. Foster, in dis-
cussing Federal politics, mentioned
that Hon. Mr. Tarte is furnishing in-
formation for the whole Dominion. He
did not think, however, that the Min-
ister of Finance was the best person
to cabinet by any means. The utterances
of Hon. Messrs. Stinson, Fisher and
Fielding showed that he does not voice
the sentiments of the party, and that
somebody certainly ought for some-
thing. "Mr. Tarte is a Conservative,"
said Mr. Foster, "and always has been."
Shortly after he entered the cabinet he
told his fellow ministers that he was
there to represent the Conservative in-
terests.

ONLY HOMELY WOMEN.

Hungarian Law Forbids Employ-
ment of Females Under 40.
Buda-Pesth, Sept. 16.—Since the first
of the month a thousand or more ex-
cessively homely females were let loose
on the patrons of Hungarian hotels
and restaurants, according to a de-
claration from the Minister of the Interior,
they dare not employ waitresses and
chambermaids below the age of forty.
To get the obnoxious law abolished
the landlords engaged the ugliest women
they could possibly hire—the uglier the
higher the wages. Hunchbacks and
pook-mashed girls are particularly fa-
vored, and the Minister is receiving
hundreds of letters daily accusing him
of spoiling the artistic atmosphere of
the country.

SOL'S FACE WAS DIMMED

No Clouds in the Sky, But There
Was a Peculiar Haze in the
Upper Regions.
PROBABLY DUE TO VOLCANIC DUST

Real Cause Will Be Known in a
Day or Two, Says Director
Stupart.

The look-out in Queen's Park on Tues-
day was directed towards a solution of
an unusual appearance of the sun's
rays. All day there appeared in the
sky a haze which obscured the face of
Old Sol to some extent. There were
no clouds, but the rays which filtered
through the obscure something up above
were so unnatural as to cause comment.
Between 9 and 10:30 in the evening the
phenomenon was quite marked. R. F.
Stupart, director of the Observatory,
cannot account for the phenomenon. It
might have been haze, or it might have
been due to the eruptions in the West
Indies. If the latter explanation proves
to be correct it means that a great cloud
of dust is floating in the highest
regions of the atmosphere, which the
sun's rays have difficulty in penetrat-
ing. The real cause of the dimness of the
sun ought to be known in a day or two.
If haze is responsible it ought to
disappear speedily; if volcanic dust it
will probably be several days before
the atmosphere is cleared.

health.

Jurors Stamp Charles King With Guilt Villagers Wonder He Was Good So Long

Born in the Gutter, Bound as
a Slave Animal, Now
in Prison.

Rodney, Sept. 16.—(Special.)—Without
visible emotion Charles King today
heard the jury's verdict, which formally
accuses him of having shot and
killed Willie Freeman. As the prisoner
was taken away to jail the wis-
dom of Rodney gathered around the
village church and vented their theo-
ries on different versions of the case.
The revolting crime is partially ob-
scured by the extraordinary circum-
stances surrounding the case and lead-
ing in a clearly defined way to in-
evitable violence. Stripped of its il-
legal verbiage the jury's conclusions
charge the prisoner with having mur-
dered the 15-year-old son of his em-
ployer, Sept. 9, by firing a lead from
a shot gun into his victim's head.

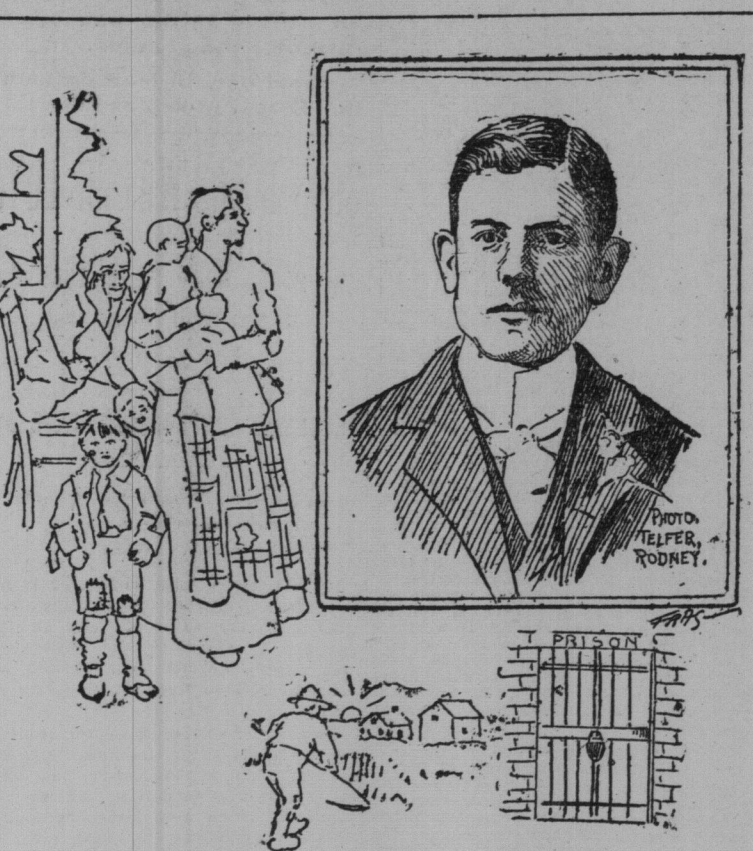
GUILT ESTABLISHED.

The evidence heard today was brief
and largely a repetition of the testimo-
ny offered Monday. Mrs. Schlie-
hauf, sister of the victim; Colan Mc-
Pherson, a neighbor of the Freeman
family; Farmer Hedges and Under-
taker Cullen were on the stand. Their
evidence related to the confession of
King that he had fired the shot, the
position in which the little body was
found in the stable loft and the ab-
sence of powder stains on the corpse.
Detective John Murray was not called
upon for evidence.

The witnesses established beyond
question all the material circum-
stances that the prisoner had said he
shot the boy because he was jealous
of the family favors he received, and
with the hope that if he was removed
the affections and property of the
Freemans would be transferred to
him. Crown Attorney Donahue said
that the preliminary trial would prob-
ably be correct in the Crown's argu-
ment, but he said that the case hur-
ried to the regular docket.

STEEL MILLS TO COME TO CANADA

English Syndicate to Move U.S.
Plant to Collingwood.
Indianapolis, Sept. 16.—Within a few
weeks the material of what was known
as the Premier Steel Mills, will be en-
tirely removed. Sixty-five carloads of
iron have already been shipped to Col-
lingwood, Canada, and the remainder
is soon to follow. The material con-
sists of the old iron rolling mills, the
Blooming mill, the Bessemer and open
hearth plants, and the gas plant.
The material has been bought by an
English syndicate. It will be set up
at Collingwood, and put into running
order. The Canadian government is
furnishing subsidies to enterprises of
this kind.

STOVE IN PLATES IN CANAL LOCK

Four of the Turret Steamers
Bound for Upper Lakes to En-
gage in Grain Trade.

About 5 o'clock on Tuesday after-

TARIFF TROUBLE

The Globe has set out to minimize Mr. Tarte by ridiculing him. It had an article yesterday, the sum and substance of which was that he was the Busy Izzy of the cabinet. It says that if he is not the master of the administration he is the articulator of its policy, and that his enthusiasm is eager and his energy exuberant.

Another feature of the discussion is that Mr. John Charlton, Liberal member for one of the Northwest, has sent to write to the Globe expressing his opinion on the Sifton-Tarte discussion. We read Mr. Charlton's letter to be that he is in line with Mr. Tarte.

The important part of the whole incident, so far as the Globe, Mr. Sifton's organ "Events" at Ottawa, and a number of politicians and other newspapers, are trying to drive Mr. Tarte out of the cabinet, because of his professional views. The fan is only beginning. Mr. Tarte out of office has a following; Mr. Sifton out of office couldn't get a seat for himself, let alone command a single follower.

Those who are talking of a coalition government for Ontario do not seem to appreciate the true condition of affairs. Their arguments for coalition are based on the claim that the parties are practically equal and that neither party alone could carry on a government. That is not the true situation.

Some time ago The World drew attention to the fact that top prices paid for cattle at Chicago average from \$2 to \$3 per hundred weight above the top prices paid for cattle at Toronto.

And since then several reasons for the discrepancy have been advanced. One man says that the difference is due to quality; that the best American cattle are much superior to the best Canadian cattle.

Others again blame the poor condition of the Canadian cattle market on the fact that Canada exports live cattle rather than dead meat. But the hope of this alleged handicap being removed is negated by men who say that a Canadian dead meat industry could not compete with the giant American organizations which have established their own agencies in the centres of population over sea.

And the last critic we hear from is an English cattle dealer who has crossed the ocean to investigate Canadian conditions. He is now in Toronto, and in another column he scathingly condemns what he calls the wantonly wasteful methods employed here by the wholesale butchers and abattoirs.

But one thing is known, and that is that the American live stock and meat trade has shown a heavy falling off this year. Live stock receipts at Chicago for August, 1902, showed a decline as against August, 1901, of 48,731 head of cattle and 128,436 hogs. For the first seven months of this year the receipts of cattle at Chicago totalled 181,069 head less than for the corresponding seven months of last year.

THAT STRIKE AT GUELPH

The heavy falling off in live stock receipts at Chicago is due partly to the decline in the corn crop failure of 1901, which rendered difficult the feeding of cattle for this year's market.

It is in consequence thereof, no doubt, that the meat trusts across the line would like to secure the Canadian sources of supply. If they can get hold of these they will be able to better fill the demands of the United States domestic market, and at the same time reinvigorate their export trade.

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Growth of Unionism Commented on and Legislative Matters Discussed.

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Growth of Trades Unions.

The report of the Executive Committee referred to the steady growth of trades unionism in Canada, which, however, has not been rapid as in the United States, and the tendency to combination by large employing corporations. The committee thought that every Trades and Labor Council in Canada should be chartered by the Congress, and recorded a protest against the chartering of Councils by other bodies as inimical to the interest of the Canadian organizations. In regard to the annual interview with the Dominion government, the committee reported a direct effect of their efforts, and suggested that Ministers controlling the great spending departments should attend those interviews. The Postoffice Act of 1902, dealing with the wages of letter carriers, was reported unsatisfactory, in that it takes the staff outside the Civil Service Act and puts it on a par with the government employees, a condition which they now bear. Other objections were also noted. On the question of Chinese and Japanese immigration it is admitted that there is a good deal to justify the government's view that the people of the east require time to be educated upon the recommendations made by the commission.

Progress in Ontario.

In Ontario 80 or more labor organizations have been formed in the province since the last session. Labor has increased during the past year. The committee reported upon eight bills passed by the provincial government, in which the interests of labor were advanced. The Executive for Quebec reported Mr. Mulock's bill for the settlement of railway labor disputes as a measure conducive to happy results. A protest was made against the granting of subsidies to the Ontario and Quebec communities of Montreal and Quebec, which exercise unfair competition against Quebec school books and the unfair occupation of their property from taxation.

A protest was entered by the freight carriers of Vancouver against the action of John Fleet, vice-president of the Canadian Union of American Federations in Canada under the American Federation of Labor.

The Executive of Manitoba referred to the desertion of the United Brotherhood of Railway Employees by the trainmen as traitorous.

President Smith's Address.

In his address to the Congress the president, John Smith, outlined the program of reform, which he called the "New Deal."
