



MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

WALL STREET METHODIST CHURCH, BROCKVILLE.

ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE, MAY 28th, 1884.

THE ELEVENTH SESSION of the MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church of Canada was opened in the Wall Street Methodist Church, in the Town of Brockville, Province of Ontario, on Wednesday, May 28th, 1884, at 10 a.m.—the President, the Rev. Thomas G. Williams, being in the Chair.

The President announced the 747th hymn, after which the Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., Secretary, read the 95th Psalm and the 4th Chapter of 2nd Corinthians, and the Revs. W. Scott and Professor Shaw led in prayer.

The Secretary called the Conference Roll, and ninety responded to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election by ballot of a President, whereupon the Rev. WILLIAM GALBRAITH, LL.B., was chosen.

The President delivered an address and directed the Conference to proceed to the election of a Secretary. The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. James Allen, M.A.

The Secretary nominated the Revs. W. J. Crothers, M.A., and Jos. H. Chant, Assistant Secretaries; and the Rev. Wm. Jackson as Journal Secretary.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

QUESTION XIII. Who have died since last Conference?

1.—REV. ROBERT W. McKECHNIE.

Robert W. McKechnie was born in the year 1848, in the township of Bristol, Province of Quebec, now a part of the Clarendon Circuit. He was favored with Christian and Methodist parentage. For over thirty years his father was a class-leader and local-preacher.

Brother McKechnie was converted in the year 1873. While engaged in the lumber business in the Pembroke District, amid the impressive

solitudes of our Canadian forests, where many another has found peace with God, he humbled himself before the Almighty and was lifted up into the light of God's favor and the consciousness of renewing grace. His soul was filled with heavenly peace, and at once he began to tell what great things the Lord had done for him. When afterwards teaching school he felt that his life-work was to proclaim the glad tidings of redeeming grace, and to this end he directed all his studies. He was accepted as a probationer for the ministry in the year 1876, and appointed to the Aylmer and Eardley Circuit, where he labored with great acceptance and success. In 1878 he attended the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, in which he prosecuted his studies conscientiously and with encouraging success. He enjoyed there the esteem and confidence of both his instructors and fellow-students on account of his sterling integrity and persevering fidelity. After leaving College he entered upon his Circuit work, but was soon compelled to desist on account of the development of bronchial and pulmonary disease Through this failure of health he was obliged to remove to California in hope of improvement in a milder climate. Here, again, it is probable that his zeal tended to shorten his days. He was engaged in business about eight miles from the coast. There was a village on the coast without any evangelical preaching. For some weeks he walked there each Sabbath to preach Christ unto the people. Then for a few months a conveyance was provided for him, but through the colder temperature on the sea coast he was attacked with inflammation of the lungs, and last January he was obliged to return to Canada. On February 20, 1884, he entered into rest calmly and intelligently, trusting upon Christ; aged thirty-six years and in the eighth year of his ministry.

2.—JOSEPH L. A. MAHER.

Joseph L. A. Maher departed this life on the second day of July, 1883, at Tadousac, Saguenay, at the age of twenty-five years and four months. Born at Chicoutimi, he was early sent to the schools of his native town. Showing special aptitude for his studies, he was subsequently sent to the monasteries and colleges of the Roman Catholic Church, of which he was a sincere and faithful member. He was intended for the priesthood of that Church.

While yet a young man, a kind Providence brought him in contact with the evangelistic and reformatory movement which, by means of missionaries, teachers and colporteurs, is exerting a saving influence upon French Canadian society. In 1879, at Montreal, he accepted the gospel of salvation, and soon became a zealous co-laborer with those who,

through grace, had been the instruments of bringing him out of darkness to God's "marvellous light."

The following year he was received on probation for the ministry in the Montreal Conference, and was sent to Boucherville. During a few months of the year he studied at the French Institute in Montreal, where he made exceptional progress.

In 1881 he was appointed to our mission at Ottawa and Hull. There he proved himself an earnest and useful missionary, winning the respect of Roman Catholics as well as that of Protestants, who together mourn his early demise. In December, 1882, he began to feel the pressure upon his delicate frame of the relentless hand of consumption. However, such was his native energy that he continued his work and pursued his studies until the May following, when he acquitted himself so well with his examination that he obtained a certificate of the first class with honors. These were his last earthly laurels.

He then repaired to Tadousac, with the hope that, under the paternal roof, with tender, maternal care, he might regain his wonted strength. But the sovereign Dispenser of events had destined for him something better.

On his arrival at Tadousac, the priest of the village and our late brother's many friends, former co-religionists, some with every species of artifice, and others, especially his dear mother and sisters, with many tears, sought to bring him back to the Romish fold. All in vain. He remained true to his own conscience and firm in his allegiance to God. His last words to a younger brother were: "Telegraph to Pastor Beaudry, of Montreal, whom I regard as my father in the Gospel, that all is well. Tell him to come and bury me in Quebec."

All was done as he requested. His mortal remains, denied interment alongside the graves of his kindred, were solemnly deposited in the Mount Hermon Cemetery of Quebec, followed to their final resting-place by only three mourners, his younger brother, the Rev. J. W. Sparling, M.A., and Louis N. Beaudry.

First of our French mission band to fall in the brunt of the battle with thy face to the foe, counting not thy life dear unto thyself, but "faithful unto death," of thee will we ever delight to sing:—

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

3.—REV. JOSEPH CARR.

Brother Carr was born in the town of Ballyellis, County Wexford, Ireland, in 1847, came to Canada in 1868, and settled at Irish Creek. He was converted to God and joined the Methodist Church under the ministry of the Rev. Mr. Coleman. In 1874 he was received on trial, having travelled one year under the Chairman of the Ottawa District. North Gower, Melbourne, and Carleton Place were his fields of labour during his probation. His superintendent found him a most worthy and estimable colleague. He was kind, thoughtful, and earnest. He was much beloved by the people to whom he ministered. His meek and gentle spirit, his zeal for the salvation of souls, and his untiring energy as a pastor were prominent characteristics of his ministry. The seals to his ministry were many. After ordination he was stationed at Chelsea, Valleyfield, and Franklin Centre. During this period he attended to his duties with much success, considering the difficulties with which he had to contend—difficulties arising from a delicate constitution and protracted Last Conference he asked for a superannuated relation. He literally rested from his work to die. Taken severely ill in January, he who was accustomed do to the will of God, was called to suffer it for seven His devoted wife, who assiduously nursed him through his long illness, writes: "He bore it all with fortitude, though he never thought from the first he would get better. His mind, after the first few weeks, was composed. Latterly he longed for the end to come, often praying, 'Come, blessed Jesus, come quickly.' Referring to his two little children, so soon to become fatherless, he said he felt assured the dear Lord would not let them suffer."

A few days before his death he repeated the declaration of the dying and almost seraphic Cookman: "Death is the gate to endless glory; I am washed in the blood of the Lamb." His last words were, "Praise the Lord, Jesus is here." So saying he fell asleep in Jesus, aged thirty-six years.

Brother Carr's remains lie in the Melbourne Ridge burial-ground, Melbourne, P.Q. At the funeral four of his brother ministers were pall-bearers. An appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. Wm. Galbraith, LL.B., of Montreal. A memorial service was subsequently held at Valleyfied.

Brother Carr loved to exhibit the sunny side of the Christian life, his gentlemanly spirit and kindness of heart in no small degree helping to invest it with brightness and beauty. Joseph Carr, in what an able writer terms the Johannean spirit, in his trust in Christ—

[&]quot;Leaned, learned, and loved."

4.—THE REV. GEORGE HENRY SQUIRES, B.A.

He was born in Cornwall, England, on May 12th, 1838. parents were godly, and their beautiful lives largely moulded his character after the heavenly. They brought him up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. With profoundest reverence he always thought of his pious home. However, not till he had reached the age of twenty did he fully decide for God. His conversion, the starting-point of a divine life, brought with it the conviction that he ought to preach the gospel. To his mind, this work presented the grandest attraction, at the same time that it humbled him in view of its tremendous responsibility. To assist himself in preparing for the work, he entered the University of Toronto, where he took the degree of B.A. He then entered upon his life-work. He was stationed at Napanee, Newburgh, and Wilton during the four years of his probation. On these circuits he gave fullest proof of fitness for our work, and was then received into full connection with the Conference and ordained. He was a faithful pastor in these fields of ministerial toil, and what of love for the souls of perishing men, faithfulness to the Church of his choice, and zeal for the glory of the Divine Master, whose he was and whom he served, he blended in his character and experience, as beautifully as the colors are in the rainbow, to abide with him to the end of his life.

He was a superior preacher, had originality of a high order, splendid thoughts, appropriate diction, and the unction of the Holy One frequently appeared in the sermons which he preached. During the last three years of his life he enjoyed the blessing of entire sanctification. This doctrine he made prominent among the subjects of his pulpit efforts, and in this way has, doubtless, done a large amount of good.

His life, so pure and holy, did not need for its perfection in the memories of the surviving friends, a cloudless sky and triumphant death scenes, and God did not give these. He died of brain fever, at Wolford, on the 17th of May, 1884, in the forty-seventh year of his age, and the nineteenth year of his ministry. He leaves a devoted wife and five children to mourn their loss. May God's blessed smile be to them as perpetual sunshine.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee is gratified to report an improvement almost all along the line. It is to be regretted, however, that a number of circuits are quite unrepresented in the report, owing to the neglect of their Superintendents to return the schedules.

The band of workers has increased 307 during the year, while the number of scholars has advanced 1,609.

There is a most gratifying advance in the temperance work in our schools; 4,237 are reported as having signed the total abstinence pledge, which is an increase of more than 500 per cent. over last year.

The circulation of our Sabbath school papers has more than doubled during the year. Your Committee, however, expresses its deep regret that some 4.300 copies of other papers are still permitted to usurp the place which rightly belongs to our own excellent publications.

The increase in the number of conversions is exceedingly encouraging. The number has reached 991 during the year, which is an increase of 251 above the returns of last year.

From some cause the study of the catechism is still greatly neglected. Not twenty per cent. of the scholars in our schools are required to give their attention to this study. Some steps should certainly be taken to ensure attention to this subject.

All of which your Committee respectfully submits.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee recognize with devout thanksgiving the growing interest everywhere manifest in the cause of temperance. And especially are they grateful that the efforts now being put forth by temperance workers are assuming more systematic form, since in united and intelligent action they perceive the greatest promise of ultimate success. desire to express their high appreciation of the labors of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and all other temperance organizations, and, while wishing them a hearty God-speed, would urge the members of this Conference everywhere to give them their cordial sanction and support. But while commending heartily all temperance organizations to the sympathy and helpfulness of the members of this Conference, the Committee beg leave to remind them that the Methodist Church is itself a temperance organization, and should ever be found in the future, as it has been in the past, in the van of all movements that tend toward the rescue of our country and race from the terrible evils of the liquor traffic. To this end they would respectfully suggest that the pulpit of our Church continue to frequently and earnestly present the subject of temperance to

the congregations, and that special and constant attention be paid to the scholars in our Sabbath-schools, so that they may be fortified in every way against falling a prey to this devourer. They would also suggest the advisability of forming in connection with every congregation some special organization, the object of which shall be to put forth special effort to rescue the intemperate, and protect those exposed to the power of this great evil. Your Committee desire to commend in warmest terms the laudable efforts of those who control the literature of our Church, to give the subject of temperance the prominence it deserves. They recognize as powerful in their influence on the development of public sentiment, not only the periodicals issuing from the Methodist press, but also those occasional publications which deal with the subject so successfully.

They also desire especially to express the high gratification with which they regard the effort to introduce temperance literature into the day-schools and pray that there may be a universal adoption of this scheme. Your Committee respectfully beg leave to submit the following resolution:

"That the Conference reaffirm its approbation of, and confidence in, the Canada temperance Act of 1878, commonly known as the Scott Act, and not only pledges its hearty co-operation, but strongly urge upon the laity to concur in such action as may be put forth to secure the passage of the said Act in the several counties to which it may be submitted."

In concluding their report, your Committee cannot refrain from expressing their profound conviction that the day is rapidly approaching when the power of this destroyer of our race shall be broken and humanity delivered from its degrading thraldom.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee begs leave to make the following report:—

I. Memorial from the Kingston District asking for an early adjustment of the Children's Fund, in order that the claims of children whose fathers were not in the work included in the Montreal Conference may be transferred to the Conferences to which they belong. Your Committee recommends that the matter be referred to the United Conference.

II. Memorial from the Quebec District, praying that, in consequence of the great inconvenience and loss sustained by the very late publication of the Missionary Report, the Conference take such action as shall enable it to publish its own Report. Your Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That in order to remedy the evils complained of in the preamble of this memorial, Conference urge upon all Superintendents of Circuits and Missions the necessity of making returns of missionary income at the proper time.

2. That the Conference most earnestly requests the Central Board of

Missions to publish with greater promptness the Missionary Report, so that it may be on hand for use at the fall missionary meetings.

3. With regard to this Conference publishing its own Missionary Report, your Committee recommends that Conference take no action in the matter.

III. Memorial from the Perth District asking that, in consequence of the large deficiencies in the salaries of the missionaries within its bounds, arising principally from the very small grants from the Missionary Fund, the Conference take some action to secure a direct control over parts of the Missionary income. Your Committee desire to express its regret that such deficiencies have to be borne, and its hope that by an increase in the income of the Missionary Society larger grants will be made in future, but cannot recommend Conference to take such action in this matter as the memorialists desire.

IV. Memorial from the Pembroke District, asking that the Committee of Consultation and Finance be requested to make a grant from the Missionary Fund retrospectively, to the Rev. A. A. Radley, on the Combernere Mission, in view of the heavy deficiency sustained by him last year. Your Committee recommends Conference to forward this memorial to the abovenamed Committee for its most favorable consideration.

V. Memorial from the Ottawa District, asking that the case of Brother M. Pratt on the Aylwin Mission, who has not received any monies as salary for the year last past, be brought before the Missionary Committee. Your Committee recommends Conference to forward this memorial to the Committee of Consultation and Finance for its favorable consideration.

VI. Memorial from the French District requesting the purchase of a property in Actonvale for Mission premises. Your Committee requests the Conference to recommend the memorial to the favorable consideration of the Central Board of Missions.

VII. Memorial from the French District, bearing upon an improved and increased supervision of the French work. Your Committee recommends that this memorial be referred to the Conference for full consideration.

VIII. Memorials from the Waterloo District, asking the appointment of Rev. D. Winter as an Evangelist for the ensuing year. Your Committee recommends Conference to accede to this request.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee are happy to report a year of gratifying progress in every department of Church work. There has been an increase of 1,221 within the bounds of this Conference.

During the past year the special blessing of God has rested upon us as a This we are persuaded is owing in some degree to the Divine approval of the Methodist union, which has been legally consummated

By his untiring labors, the Rev. D. Winter, Conference Evangelist, has largely contributed to the happy numerical results we are able to

Although the secular and religious papers of the day abound with reference to the prevailing forms of scepticism, it is our conviction that they have reached their zenith, and that upon the higher platforms of thought the battle has virtually been fought and victory won for Christian Theism; and we would recommend the brethren to preach the word of God alone with simplicity and fulness, in the demonstration of the Spirit, knowing that our faith stands not in the wisdom of man, but in the power of God.

In view of increasing the efficiency of our laymen in connection with the spiritual work of our Church, we very urgently make the following recommendations:-

I. That a course of study be founded for local preachers, upon the completion of which a suitable diploma will be issued.

II. That leaders' meetings, as provided for in the Discipline, be vigorously maintained, and that at these meetings a very important part of the exercises consist of instruction by the pastor and conversation concerning the best method of leading a class, in order that our leaders, by increased effectiveness, may attach the members to this time-honored institution of

III. That an agency be formed upon each Circuit, if possible, consisting of bands of devoted members of our Church, who shall be specially trained in practical theology by the pastor, and shall act under his direction in aggressive evangelistic work.

We congratulate this Conference and the people of our Church upon the quality and cheapness of the periodical literature supplied from our Book Room, and recognize its important influence in the formation of the character of our young people. At the same time, we are far from believing that our Church is doing its full duty in reference to the mental improvement of its youth, and we heartily recommend the formation of lyceums, or of classes for such systematic study as will impart wider intelligence and, at the same time, ground in the evidences of our divine religion.

Your Committee feel that it would be satisfactory to know not only how many have been added to the Church below during the year, but also how many of our members have gone to join the Church above.

We therefore suggest the importance of publishing in our printed Minutes the number of members deceased during the year.

We rejoice, that in the remarkable temperance revival which is now moving our land, our ministers are found in the front of the battle and the thickest of the fight, and we urge upon our people that they enthusiastically support every movement for the decrease of the evils of intemperance.

One section of our work demands special mention at the present time.

The population of the Nipissing District is rapidly increasing, and our work there is developing very hopefully. The Canadian Pacific Railway men number between two and three thousand, the lumbermen about three thousand, and the lands open for settlement are quickly being occupied. These people are in much need of the means of grace, and we hope the Conference may adopt more effective means of ministering to their spiritual wants, else they will drift into other Churches or relapse into impiety. The progress of the past and the promise of the present lead us to believe that large success awaits well-directed effort in this field.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE STANSTEAD WES-LEYAN COLLEGE TO THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, BROCKVILLE, JUNE 2ND, 1884.

Your Trustees, in presenting their Annual Report, desire to express their deep gratitude to the Divine Master for His mercies extended to the institution during a year of great difficulty. A fierce epidemic of scarlet fever has raged within the vicinity of the College, but we are glad to say only three slight cases occurred within its walls, and these soon recovered.

The attendance has suffered somewhat from this cause, but a medical commission has carefully inspected the building and given unqualified assurance that its hygienic arrangements are complete and its sanitary condition unquestionable. We appeal to the brethren to help us by a kind word on their circuits, as we are assured that we can give as thorough educational training, as complete accommodation, and as careful religious oversight at as low a cost as any similar institution of learning in this Dominion.

The Governor's report this year is encouraging, and shows a slight balance in favour of the Treasurer for the year. But it must be borne in mind that one item of income was extraordinary and cannot be calculated upon for next year. We regret also to learn from the last Budget speech of the Province that the Government grant to such institutions as ours will not be continued after this year. This is an additional reason why the warm sympathy and earnest prayers of the Church should be thrown around this important institution.

The general conduct of the students has been most praiseworthy, and the teachers have been faithful and efficient in the discharge of their duties.

The Principal's report shows that the attendance of the students has been regular and encouraging, the total number of students for the year being 170.

The course of study has been somewhat changed so as to lessen the cost of tuition and bring it into more perfect harmony with the course of study prescribed by the Provincial Board of Education.

The report of the Executive and Advisory Committee recapitulates their actions during the year, and demands especial attention in one particular, viz.:—

A Special Committee of the Trust Board was appointed to inquire carefully into the financial condition of the general working of the institution. Their report was presented to the Executive Committee and carefully considered by them. Its wise suggestions were adopted by them except in one matter. The Special Committee suggested the propriety of uniting the offices of Governor and Principal in one person. The Executive Committee felt that this would be desirable, but did not see their way clear to carry out the suggestion for the present.

Your Trustees recommend that the Rev. J. B. Saunders be appointed

as Governor, and the Rev. A. L. Holmes, B.A., as Principal, and that the following gentlemen be appointed as a Committee to meet during the year and make arrangements for securing the proper person and uniting in him the offices of Governor and Principal after this year, if on careful examination they deem the proposed change to be necessary or expedient, viz. :-

Rev. Wm. Galbraith, President; Rev. T. G. Williams, ex-President,

and Rev. C. A. Hanson.

Your Trustees recommend that the staff proposed by the Executive Committee be secured, with the amendment that an assistant master be secured, if possible, at a salary not exceeding \$300 per annum and board in the College.

Your Trustees recommend that the wife of the Governor be authorized to oversee the domestic department and the Lady Boarders,

with a view to making the College attractive as a home.

Your Trustees recommend that any power or control which the Trustees may have over the Library now in the College be delegated to the Executive Committee.

We also recommend that teachers, before they are engaged, shall be communicated with by both the Governor and Principal, so that their duties in both departments may be explained to them.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

TRUSTEES' REPORT, PRESENTED BY REV. J. M. HAGAR, SECRETARY pro tem.

The Trustees of Stanstead Wesleyan College beg to report to the

They regret that in the absence of the Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. Mr. Hardie, in England, and also in absence of some of the records of the College indebtedness and payments on account of the Debt Fund, they are unable to give as full and particular a statement of the financial condition of the College as they could desire.

However, from a report made to the Trust Board last November, and from a report of Mr. Hardie's Attorney of money received and disbursed since that time, we are able to report very nearly approximating correct-

We find that the debt when Mr. Hardie left for England was \$10,000, secured by mortgage on the College property. This debt has since then been reduced by \$595.75, collected from the Subscription to the Debt Fund. This leaves the present indebtedness \$9404.25, with accrued interest of about six months, say, \$350—making the present liabilities of the College on debt acct. \$9754.25.

To meet this indebtedness there is an unpaid Subscription List of \$5670.65, which is variously estimated to be worth from \$1000 to \$5000,

the true value being probably about midway between the two. Besides this Mr. Hardie is making collections in England, having secured at last accounts, about \$900.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees be appointed by the Conference.

(The Report of the Trustees of the Stanstead Wesleyan College was adopted so far as it relates to the past year. The report as it relates to the future was referred to the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee on Church Property beg to submit the following Report :--

RICHMOND CIRCUIT.—The Trustees of the Wesley Church, Richmond, ask permission to sell one acre of land on the south-east corner of lot 23 in the 10th concession of Goulbourn. Your Committee recommend that the request be granted.

Also lot number twelve on the west side of McBean street, in the village of Richmond, proceeds to be applied to Church purposes within the bounds of the Circuit. We recommend that the request be granted.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

 ${\bf A}$ request to permit the Trustees of the North Augusta parsonage, to sell the old parsonage property, proceeds to be applied to the purchasing of another parsonage. Your Committee recommend the selling of the same.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

COMPTON CIRCUIT.—The Trustees of the old parsonage at Compton desire to sell the old buildings and lot, the proceeds to assist the building of a new parsonage. The Committee recommend that their request be granted.

With reference to Mr. Pomeroy's request, that the Trustees of the new parsonage at Compton be permitted to execute a special deed to him, promising that if the property be sold or diverted from its use as a parsonage, the same shall revert to him or to his heirs, or that the sum of \$150 be paid him or to his heirs.

Your Committee desire to express their appreciation of Mr. Pomeroy's generosity in giving a valuable lot to our church, and would recommend the Conference to grant permission to the Trustees to execute a bond securing to Mr. Pomeroy or his heirs the amount asked for; feeling assured that Mr. Pomeroy's object is simply to prevent the property falling into the hands of those hostile to the Methodist Church.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

The Trustees of the old church property in Pembroke desire to sell the lot on which the church stood, the proceeds to be applied to the new church. Also that the lumber and material of the old church be donated to the Mattawa misson.

Your Committee recommend that their request be granted, and would also express its very great satisfaction and pleasure at the liberality of the Trustees in assisting so generously the Mattawa mission.

ARNPIOR CIRCUIT.—The Trustees of Dewar's church, McNab Township, ask permission to sell said church, proceeds to be applied to the church in Arnprior. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

Owing to certain circumstances the financial returns from the circuits have not been all that could be desired, hence the members of the Society were called on to pay the full amount of the Guarantee Fund, viz., \$4.00 per member, and when this call is responded to by all the members the year closes with a small amount in the hands of the Treasurer.

Further, the Society begs to present the following resolutions which were adopted:—

1st. That we recommend this Conference to perpetuate this Evangelistic Society in the Union Conference.

2nd. That the Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., be the Secretary-Trea surer of the Society for the coming year.

3rd. That the Membership Fee for the Guarantee Fund shall be \$4.00, to be paid at the call of the Secretary-Treasurer in instalments of not more than \$2.00 at a time.

4th. That the Conference be requested to re-appoint the Rev. D. Winter as agent of this Society for the coming year.

5th. That the management of the Society be in the hands of the Methodist Ministerial Association of Montreal.


