NEW YORK HAS DOUBLED IN LAST FIVE YEARS.

Washington, May 5—Announcement is authorized by the department of labor that in five years the cost of living in New York city has more than doubled. The increase was 103.81 per cent. in the five-year period, which began December, 1914, and ended December, 1919.

Statistics showed in detail changes in the cost of living during this five-year period for fourteen industrial centres on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts and the Great Lakes. The highest percentage of increase was 107.87 for Detroit. The next highest was -106.98 for Norfolk. New York ranked third. The total increase in each of the other cities listed is given as follows:

Portlandfi, Maine, 91.59; Boston, 93.20; Philadelphia, 96.49; Baltimore, 98.40; Savannah, 98.68; Jacksonville, 102.14; Mobile, 94.54; Houston, 101.70; Chicago, 100.61; Cleveland, 95.05, and Buffalo, 102.65.





Owen Sound Veteran Dies of Carbolic Poisoning.

Owen Sound, May 5—A fatal mistake was made by Robert Ward, who died from the effects of carbolic acid poisoning. He and his wife had been at a dance, returning home about 3 a. m. Mrs. Ward went at once to her room, but hearing her husband groan a few minutes afterward, returned to the room where she had left him, to find him writhing in agony and almost unconscious. Though all possible haste was made to call a doctor, Mr. Ward was dead before anything could be done. The surmise is that he had intended to take some medicine and got hold of the wrong bottle. Mr. Ward, who was a war veteran of the Great War, is survived by his widow, two children, his parents, two brothers and five sisters.

VALUABLES SEIZED. German Customs Authorities Busy at Dutch Frontier.

The Hague, May 5—During the last two weeks the German customs authorities at Oldenzaal, on the Dutch frontier, have seized precious stones to the value of seven million marks, bank notes valued at 600,000 marks and £400 which passengers endeavored to smuggle out. Detectives resort to all sorts of schemes, mingling and talking with passengers on trains in order to seize the valuables at the frontier. Control measures are becoming increasingly strict.

# OVERCOMING THE

Dr. T. G. MacNamara Urges

London, May 5—Dr. T. G. Macnamara, speaking at the annual dinner of the Camberwell and Dulwich Pensions Society, said that the problem of problems was the excessive cost of living. People, he continued, must look the problem before them squarely in the face. The high cost of living was the immediate result of the ravages and the devastation of the greatest war in history. In war the man who previously had made useful articles for exchange, either fought or made munitions to be blown into the air. 

CANADIAN TRADE

Tariff on Basis of Imperial Preference Urged.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 5—An important decision has been reached by the legislative council. In a message from the governor attention was drawn to the conference which is to be held at Ottawa, Canada, this month, to which it was proposed that Jamaica should send a delegate, accompanied if necessary by expert advisers.

At this conference there is to be considered the question of trade relations and transport facilities between Canada and the British West Indies. Since the preference granted in 1897 by Canada, and particularly since 1912, when Canada made a reciprocal arrangement with most of the West Indies (although Jamaica stood out), there has been a marked growth of trade between these two areas. The recent meeting of the Associated West Indian Chambers of Commerce passed a resolution urging the assembly of representatives of imperial Canadian and West Indian governments, to consider the development of trade relations and cognate matters.

To the present conference each separate West Indian administration will send one representative. The Canadian government has the right to declare that any proposal not acceptable to it shall not be entertained. Questions discussed will be decided by a majority of votes. This movement is quite in line with public feeling here, which, although either hostile or indifferent to the proposal for closer political connection with Canada, is very willing to develop business relations with the dominion.

After a long discussion the council decided to instruct the Jamaica representative to urge that a tariff on the basis of imperial preference should be adopted between the Dominion of Canada and the British West Indies, and that the classification of the tariff should be uniform, that as extensive a free list as possible be obtained from the dominion, and the support given to a plan for improv-




