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## ADMISSION.

Students are admitted under the "Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction relating to County Academies.
(a) By passing an examination upon the following subjects :
(1) -Englisl Grammar and Analysis.
(2)-Arithmetic and Algebra.
(3)-Drawing and Simple Accounts.
(4)-Geography and History.
(5) -Useful Knowledge.

The scholarship required is that prescribed for Grade VIII, of the Common School Course. Copies of questions set at previous examinations may be obtained from the P-incipal.
(b) If they have been admitted to full standing in any County Academy subsequent to Nov. Ist, 1885.
(c) If they hold Teachers Licenses, Provincial High School Certificates or Normal School diplomas.

Those also may be exempt from examination who shall present certificates of scholarship from any institution, which the Principal shall deem equivalent to the passing of the entrance examination.

The Supplementary Examinations mentioned in the calendar are for such candidates as can show good reason for not having presented themselves at the regular examination.

## SPECIAL STUDENTS.

Students who do not take the full course are not recognized under the regulations of the Council of Public Instruction. They nay however, in special cases be admitted on payment of the regular fee, if deemed advisable by the Principal, providing there is no encroachment thereby on the accommodation or privileges of the regular students.

## CLASSIFICATION.

All admissions to the Academy are to the First Year, or "D Class, unless the candidate shows ability to enter a higher class.

Teachers Licenses and High School Certificates of Grades B, C and D will admit to the A, B and C classes respectively. Others are required to pass a Classification Examination on entrance. One such examination is held at the beginning of each term.

Note.-No student shall be eligible for a prize who does not show approved proficiency in all the subjects of the regular course.
Note.-A. student may forfeit his right to a prize or certificate, if he withdra $/$ previous to the end of the term without special permission.

Note.-Prize collections of Local Flora shall be the property of the Academy. All collections must be handed in on, or before the I8th of June.

Note.-The medals of the Fourth and Third years shall be known respectively as the Senior and the Junior Graduation medals.
The results of this examination will be announced and the prizes distributed at the annual Convocation to be held on the closing day of the term. The names of all prize-winners will be published in the local newspapers, and the names of the winners of the more important ones will be recorded in the annual catalogue.

## PROVINCIAL EXAMINATIONS AND CERTIFICATES.

The Provincial Examinations will be held in the Academy at the end of the term in accordance with the regulations of the Council of Public Instruction in regard to the examination of High School students. Each candidate will receive from the Superintendent of Education a certificate containing the marks given in each subject by the examiners and the High School Grade which the candidate has successfully passed.

## DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY.

A Certificate from the Pictou Academy will admit the winner to the University of Dalhousie, Halifax, Nova Scotia, without passing the Matriculation Examination.

## DISCIPLINE.

Under the School Law of the Province of Nova Scotia, the Academy is subject in its particular management to the "Rules and Regulations of the Public Schools of Pictou Town," as published and amended from time to time. Students are accountable to the ordinary disciplinary authority, even to suspension or expulsion, for any conduct in their boarding houses or elsewhere, which tends to affect injuriously Academic discipline or the principles of sound morality. Liability to discipline exists for any offence prior to a regular withdrawal from the institution.

## BOARD.

The Pictou Academy is not a Boarding School. Board is obtained in private bouses, where the rate of ordinary accommodation is about $\$ 3.00$ per week.

## STUDENTS' ORGANIZATIONS.

The Pictou Amateur Athletic Association is open on special terms to students. It includes cricket, football, baseball, quoit, and
boating clubs. The fine grounds of the Association are about 300 yards from the Academy building, and the Academy has always a strong representation on the managing committees and in the various clubs.

## PICTOU ACADEMY Y. M. C. A.

This constitutes a branch of the Inter-collegiate Y. M. C. A.and meets weekly in a room of the Pictou Y. M. C. A. buildiag, with privileges of library, reading-room, and co-operation. The officers, elected annually, are for the year 1894-95:

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To pass Grade A (classical) a minimum aggregate of 1000 must be made on twenty papers, including all in groups (A) and (B) and any other four papers.

For Grade A. (classical and scientific) all the subjects in group D. must have been taken as well as those in A. B. and C.

## SCIENTIFIC WORK.

In practical Botany, Entomology, Chemistry, \&c.,students may join some one or more of the "clubs" of the "Pictou Academy Scientific Association." The Association is made up of sections called clubs, having organizations independent of each other, each devoted to the practical study of some branch of Natural Science. The clubs meet generally once a week in some room of the Academy building, and have the aid of the Academy Staff, and the free use of the Laboratory, Museum and Library.

## PICTOU ACADEMY SCIENTIFIC ASSOCIATION.

Includes a number of separate working sections or Clubs. The Principal is ex-officio, President. The Academic Faculty, with Superintendent A. H. McKay, Li.. D., is the Executive. It exercises general supervision and direction over the Scientific work of the Sections, and has special charge of the collections in the Museum, Libraty and Laboratories.

Entomological, Club,-About 2000 specimens of local insects in collection.

Ornithological Club.-About 250 specimens of local birds and mammals mounted.

Botanical. Club.-Herbarium of local flora.
Chemical Club-Work in Chemical Laboratory.
Mineralogical and Geologicai, Club.-Extensive collection in Museum.

Choral Club.-Has a piano and a small musical library.
The General Museum contains collections of scientific apparatus, illustrating all subjects in the course of study, including physiological models, skeletons, specimens preserved in alcohol, \&c.

The connection of these departments with the Academy consists in their being conducted in the same building under the control of the same Principal. They are supported by fees. Certificates, presented quarterly in these departments are marked on the following basis: Maximum for Drawing and Painting, 100; for Pianoforte:Harmony or Vocal Culture, 100; for Violin, 100; for Stenography or Type-writing, 100.

MUSIC.
PiANOFORTE.-It is intended that a student in the Musical Department of the Pictou Academy shiall pursue a course of studies marked out by the institution. This course is divided into four grades or classes. A graduate in this department will have gone over all the work required for the flrst three grades in the New England Conservatory of Music, and will therefore be able to enter the fourth grade of the institution. A student in finishing the course is expected to give a recital, without which a certificate will
not be granted. The following list of music to be studied in each grade will give an idea of the course.

First Grade-New England Conservatory Method, ist part; Bertin's i2 Petits Morceaux and Preludes; Czerny's ior Preparatory studies, ist Book; Richardson's Method,ffrst part; Burgmullar,opus 1оо. Simple exercises are selected from Baumbach,Lichner,Lauge, Emery and others.

Second Grade-New England or Boston Conservatory Method, 2nd part; Plaidy, Czerny's ior Preparatory Studies, 2nd Book; Studies in Velocity, ist Book; Bortini op. 100; Loeschorn op. 65, ist and 2nd Books; Duvernoy, studies in velocity and 4th Books; Selected pieces from Lange, Croizes, Soderman, Richner, Reisch, Pacher, Schumanu's "Kinder Sucenen;" Spindler and others.

Third Grade-Czerny's Etudes de Velocitie, 2nd Book. Progressive studies by Loeschorn, Berger, Bertini, A. D. Turner's Octavs studies. A. D. Turner's Pedal studies. St. Heller op. 47, Selected works from Clementi, Beethoven's Sonatinas, Mendelsshon's "Leider ohne Worte," Scharvenka, Gotschalk and others.

Fourth Grade-Etudes Kalkbrennen, opus 20; Cramer's Etudes Celebre; Clementis "Gradus ad Parnassum;" Mendelsshon's Preludes and Fugues; J. S. Bach's Inventions and Preludes; Krause op. 15; Czerny, Finger Fertigheit op. 174; Mocheles op. 70; Hayden's Fantaisie in C; Rheinborger "Chase;' Beethoven Sonatas ; Mendelsshon's Andante and Rendo Caprtccio; Chopin, Waltzes, Nocturnes and Impromptus; Schubert's Impromptus; Moscheles' Studies, op. 7o, \&c., \&c.

Miss Thompson has made a special study of the Lechetitsky system of technique.

Vocal Culture.-The system of vocal culture adopted was studied by the instructor during the year 92-93, under Signor Rotoli of the New England conservatory of Music. The Lamgurti system of voice culture is followed altogether by studies in melody by Nara Vacai Bordogni and others. It treats of (1) breathing; (2) proper placing of register; (3) articulation; (4) correct musical rendition.

Scale of Fees-The same as for Pianoforte.
Violin :-The scale of fees is the same as for Pianoforte.
The terms of the Musical department commence during the first weeks of November, February and May. Special arrangements are made for the interruption of holidays.

## DRAWING AND PAINTING.

Time of Session-From $2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. to $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. (three hours) on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Drazuing-A course of Freehand and Perspective.
Painting-A course of Oils and Water Colors.
Fees Per Quarter-Drawing, \$2.50. Painting, \$5.00.

## STENOGRAPHY AND TYPE-WRITING.

Classes for instruction in Stenography and Type-writing are conducted in one of the rooms of the Academy by a competent teacher. Students will have an opportunity of receiving instruction in these branches without interfering with their attendance on the regular classes. Fee per quarter for each subject, $\$ 6.00$.

Shorthand.-Ben Pitman or American Standard system of Phonography.

Corresponding Style-Manual of Phonography, (Ben Pitman,) spelling by sound, formation of sentences and vocalizing logograms and simple sentences, writing in position, aneedotes and business letters from dictation.

Reporting Style-Reporter's Companion, Principles of Abbreviation and Contraction, Phrase Writing and Intersected Phrases, Business Letters, Dictation and Reporting exercises.

Typewriting.-Bates Terry system of fingering words and sentences, Business Letters and Forms, Law wórk and Tabulating, Punctation, Proper use and care of machine, Writing from Dictation.

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## Alumni Association.

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The Pictou Academy Alumni Association was organized on the tenth of November, 1893. The purpose of the promoters was to have a society similar to the Alumni Association of a College. That the design was feasible was most obvions, because few similar institutions had as long a role of students that had won position and renown in the various walks of life. That such a society would foster the esprit-de-corps of all educated within the Academy's historic walls, help to keep alive the remembrance of pleasant and profitable days spent therein, and be advantageous in many ways to the Academy at present was generally acknowledged. The replies to the circular letters, sent to those residing without the town, unanimously agreed upon the desirability of such an organization, and thus encouraged the promoters were able, in an enthusiastic representative meeting, to make the proposed Association a fact.

The objects of the Society are to promote the interests of the Academy, to collect and preserve the historical facts in connection with its growth, to adorn the walls of its halls with the portraits of the founder and the more famous teachers and graduates, to encourage the present students by prizes, and to foster an esprit-decorps among its graduates.

For the Session of 1893-94, the Association donated prizes to the amount of $\$ 75.00$; and for $1894-95$ the same amount for the same purpose has been given. The example of the Association has been followed by others, and this year, the prize list includes two gold medals, a silver medal, and $\$$ 35.00.

Under the auspices of the Association, on the 16th of February, 1894, a public meeting that crowded Convocation Hall to the doors was addressed by three of the older graduates, Dr. A. H. MacKay, Rev. D. M. Gordon, and Rev. Anderson Rogers. It is the wish of the Executive to have similar meetings held yearly.

The annual public closing exercises on June 22, were also under the auspices of the Association. The presence of Chief Justice MacDonald of the Supreme Court added grace and dignity to the occasion; and the presentation of the gold and silver medals by him preceded an interesting and kindly address to the students.

The Annual General meeting was held on July 4, 1894. The report of the Executive, touching upon the facts mentioned above, and the financial report of the Treasurer were read and adopted. As the officers and Executive had not held office a full year, they were re-elected with the exception of ex-Mayor Hamilton, who resigned in favour of Mayor Sutherland. A congratulatory letter was voted to John D. Logan for the honor brought to himself, and the Academy by his brilliant career at Harvard. Seventy-five dollars was voted for prizes for ' 94 ''95. Auditors were appointed.
