

University of Bishop's College.

The 26th session of this Faculty will commence on Monday, the fifth day of October, 1896, and will be continued regularly until the end of March, the usual Christmas vacation intervening.

The course leading to the degree of C.M., M.D. extends over four years and consists of four winter sessions of six months each, and three summer sessions of three months each.

The lectures and demonstrations in each Annual Course are given during a period of nine months, beginning in October.

Only one summer session is compulsory (in the third year), but the Faculty strongly recommends all students who can, to attend the summer session during their first and second years also, as more extended opportunities are thus afforded for becoming familiar with practical clinical work at the various Hospitals and Dispensaries.

The Faculty of Medicine of Bishop's College aims at imparting a thoroughly practical medical education, and its facilities for doing so are in many respects unequalled in Canada. In addition to the regular course of didactic lectures, students have the advantage of extensive and varied hospital privileges.

The Montreal General Hospital, Royal Victoria, Western Hospital, Hotel Dieu Hospital, and Dispensaries afford every opportunity to students of this College to receive clinical instruction in Medicine and Surgery. At the Women's Hospital special advantages are afforded for the practical study of Obstetrics.

The College building contains large lecture rooms, several smaller lecture rooms for Practical Chemistry, Practical Physiology, Histology, Bacteriology, etc., and large, airy, well-lighted dissecting rooms at the top of the building, isolated from the rest of the

class-rooms. Under the new Anatomy Act of the Province of Quebec, ample material for dissection is provided at moderate rates.


The Histological, Physiological and Bacteriological Laboratories are supplied with a complete outfit of Microscopes, Microtomes and of Bacteriological and other modern apparatus. The Pharmacological Laboratory, besides possessing a very complete cabinet of crude drugs and their preparations and alkaloids, has all the necessary appliances and means for the making of B. P. preparations and every facility for teaching practical dispensing. Recently the Faculty has expended a large sum for apparatus in several departments, to facilitate practical teaching.

The Faculty is recognized by the Royal College of Surgeons, England, and the Royal College of Physicians, London. Class tickets for the various courses are accepted by these Colleges as qualifying candidates for examination. The Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, and the University of London, also accept the class tickets of Bishop's College, and the Diploma of this University exempts its holder from being examined on the subjects of the Primary branches and Matriculation. Such candidates are therefore only required to pass in the subjects of the Final Branches, including Hygiene. The Scottish colleges acting conjointly grant only one examination, and therefore confer a triple qualification.

The Degree of Medicine and Surgery of this University, being accepted by the licensing bodies of Great Britain, its possessor is entitled to the same exemptions as are allowed to all other holders of recognized colonial degrees. The College of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec accepts the degree without further examination, provided the holder of such degree has, previous to beginning the study of Medicine, passed the preliminary examination exacted by that Board.

The class tickets for the various courses are accepted as qualifying for the examination of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, and the Matriculation examination of this Faculty is recognized by the General Medical Council of Great Britain and Ireland provided that all the subjects are passed at the same time.

The Medical degrees of this University are—Master of Surgery (C.M.) and Doctor in Medicine (M.D.). The degree of Master of Surgery is not conferred upon any person who does not at the same time obtain the degree of Doctor in Medicine.

The Dental College of the Province of Quebec is now affiliated to the University of Bishop's College, and the medical lectures of the Dental Course are given by its medical Faculty. The degree granted is that of Doctor of Dental Surgery (D.D.S.) (for announcement see page 63).

Convocation for the conferring of Medical and Dental degrees are held in Montreal immediately after the close of the

winter session.

HOSPITAL PRACTICE.

Montreal being the most populous city in the Dominion of Canada, as well as the commercial metropolis, affords in its large and well-equipped hospitals, greater opportunities to the medical student for acquiring practical experience with disease and accident, medical and surgical, than can be obtained elsewhere in the Dominion. Unfortunately, the larger the city the greater the extremes of wealth and poverty, and Montreal forms no exception to this rule. This condition of things adds to the opportunities of the medical student, for the wards of our numerous hospitals are in a chronic state of over-crowding with the sick and suffering, affording examples to the teacher and student of a great variety of diseases. Being a large manufacturing centre, and at the head of navigation, the greatest variety of accidents are daily presented to the student for illustration and instruction, and students are most urgently requested to spend as much time as possible in the hospital wards and in the out-door rooms of the hospitals and dispensaries, to familiarize themselves with the work for which they are preparing. The best students are thos who spend as much time as is consistent with proper attention to their other work in reporting and dressing in hospital wards.

The Western Hospital is now a general one, receiving patients of both sexes. It is attended by a staff of fourteen physicians and surgeons, most of whom are members of this Faculty.

In addition to general medical and surgical cases, in the department for diseases of women, the various gynæcological operations are frequently performed. The large number of abdominal sections which are performed in this institution affords abundant opportunities for witnessing the recent advances in abdominal surgery. Members of the staff are in attendance daily at 12 noon, when clinics are held, which afford special advantages to students desirous of studying in detail the essential clinical elements of the cases in the medical, surgical and gynæcological wards.

In the departments for diseases of the eye, ear, nose and throat and of the skin, ample opportunities are afforded for studying these specialities in the out-door department. The large number of patients enables the physicians in attendance to impart instruction, by selecting cases for demonstration, presenting points for comparison and contrast. Practice can be obtained in auscultation and other means of Physical Diagnosis.

The positions of resident House Surgeons are open to graduates of this College.

The Women's Hospital is entirely under the control of Bishop's College, and is directly under the superintendence of the Professor of Obstetrics, and from the large number of patients admitted affords greater facilities for acquiring a practical knowledge of midwifery than can be obtained in any other medical school in Canada.

The position of acting Resident Assistant Accoucheur in this Department is open to senior students of Bishop's College.

The Montreal General Hospital (200 beds) is situated within a few minutes walk of the College, and is visited daily by two physicians and two surgeons, besides two ophthalmic surgeons, two gynæcologists and two laryngologists. It has at great expense been thoroughly renovated and modernized and its pathological department and clinical laboratory fully supplied with the most recent equipments for teaching purposes. This is essentially a hospital for acute diseases, as evidenced by the large number of patients treated annually—2342 Medical and Surgical last year, besides 40,000 consultations in the out door department. It affords equal advantages to students of all medical colleges for obtaining a practical knowledge in every department of

Medicine and Surgery. A ward used as a Children's Department will also greatly assist students in the study of diseases of children. A special department for the treatment of the diseases of the eye and ear, under the care of the Ophthalmic Surgeons, affords students facilities for their study. Clinical instruction is given daily, and all operations performed in the presence of the students. Regular Clinical Lectures on Clinical Surgery and Clinical Medicine, open to students of this University, are delivered during the winter. In addition, clinics are given every Monday and Thursday by Dr. F. W. Campbell, Dean of the Medical Faculty of Bishop's College. Annual fee, \$5.00, perpetual, \$15.00.

The Royal Victoria Hospital. This hospital is situated on Pine Avenue, corner of University Street.

The erection of this magnificent pile of buildings in commemoration of the jubilee year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, was rendered possible through the great liberality of two of the city's greatest benefactors, Sir Donald Smith and Lord Mount Stephen, each of whom gave half a million dollars; the city having contributed a large piece of ground for the use of the hospital. The hospital receives all classes of medical and surgical cases, and has special wards for Gynæcological and Ophthalmic Diseases. It can accommodate about 250 patients, and extends its charity to the afflicted from all parts of the Dominion as freely as to those from the city. There are three main buildings, a central administration block and two large wings, one for surgical, the other for medical cases; each has three large wards, 126 ft. by 26 ft. 6 in., besides several smaller ones; medical and surgical theatres capable of seating 250 students. There are laboratories for Clinical and Pathological Chemistry, Pathological and Bacteriological investigations and a mortuary. Students from all colleges are admitted on equal terms.

Annual fee, \$5.00. Perpetual tickets are obtained when the third annual fee is paid. Tickets are given at the hospital.

The Hotel Dieu Hospital (200 beds) is within a short distance of Bishop's College. Attention is directed to the large amount of Surgery to be seen in this institution. Clinical lectures in Surgery and Medicine are delivered.

The Montreal Dispensary, with a staff of six attending physicians and an Oculist, Gynæcologist, Laryngologist and Dermatologist has an average daily attendance of about fifty patients. Being in close proximity to the manufacturing districts of the city, it has a large number of minor accidents brought to it for attention, thus giving an excellent opportunity for the practice of minor surgery—such as dressing wounds, bandaging, strapping, application of splints, etc. The student will have every advantage afforded him for acquiring practical knowledge in diagnosis and methods of treatment. A very large number of cases of diseases of the eye, ear and throat are treated at this institution, and students will be practically taught the use of the ophthalmoscope, laryngoscope, etc.

The dispensing department is in charge of a licensed pharmacist, and students are permitted to dispense under his supervision. Many useful and practical hints in the compounding of drugs, and a knowledge of their doses are thus acquired.

MATRICULATION.


According to the Medical Act of 1879, in order to register a diploma in Medicine in the Province of Quebec, and to obtain a license, it is necessary that all students must pass a preliminary examination before the examiners appointed by the Board, or produce a certificate of having passed an equivalent preliminary examination before a College or Licensing Board, recognized by the "Provincial Medical Board," elsewhere than in the Province of Quebec. It is also absolutely necessary that students shall attend at least four full six-months' sessions at College, and of these they are obliged to attend their first session during the first year succeeding the obtaining of certificate of qualification to study. The student before obtaining a diploma must have been engaged in the study of Medicine for a period of not less than four years after having passed the preliminary examination. Students who intend practising in other Provinces of the Dominion should pass the Matriculation examination accepted by the several registering boards of these Provinces.

examination before commencing the study of Medicine. Those having the degree of B.A. and Matriculants of any University, and of most of the Medical Colleges and Boards in Her Majesty's Dominion, and not requiring the license of this Province, are exempt from this examination in this University. The B.A. degree is now accepted by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Quebec. Students who do not desire the license of either Province must pass the Matriculation examination of this University, or present a certificate of an equivalent examination before a body authorized for that purpose, if not otherwise qualified as above indicated.

Attention is particularly directed to the importance of passing the Matriculation examination in the spring, as four full years of professional study are required from the date of Matriculation before a provincial license is granted either in Ontario or Quebec.

Students who do not desire the license of either the Quebec or Ontario College of Physicians and Surgeons, and not otherwise qualified, will be examined by this University on October, 16th and 17th, 1896, and in March, 1897, on the following subjects. Fee \$5.00.

COMPULSORY SUBJECTS.

(a) English language, including Grammar and Composition.


(b) Latin, including Grammar, Translation from Cæsar de Bello Gallico, Book I. and II., or Virgil's Æneid, Book I., and Translation of easy passages not taken from such authors.

(c) Mathematics, comprising (a) Arithmetic; (b) Algebra, as far as Simple Equations, inclusive; (c) Geometry, the subject matter of Euclid, Books I., II. and III., with easy deductions.

(d) One of the following Optional Subjects:—(1) Greek, (2) French, (3) German, (4) Italian, (5) any other Modern Language, (6) Logic.

(e) Botany as in Gray's School and Field Book of Botany. The General Medical Council of Great Britain will only enregister students whose certificates show that all the above subjects, Botany excepted, have been passed at the same time.

PROGRAMME OF PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR 1896.

- LATIN.—The Commentaries of Cæsar, Books I., II., III., IV., V.—The Æneid of Virgil, Books I. and II.—The Odes of Horace, Book III. A sound knowledge of the Grammar will be required.
- ENGLISH.—A critical knowledge of Shakespeare's play of Antony and Cleopatra, Questions of Grammar, Etymology and analysis. French-speaking candidates will translate passages from first eight books of the Life of Columbus, by Washington Irving. They shall also answer questions in English Grammar, and translate into English some paragraphs from Telemachus.
- FRENCH.—Translation into English of passages from *Telemachus* with questions of grammar and parsing. Also translation into French of easy English sentences. French-speaking students will be required to have a critical knowledge of *Bourgeois Gentil-homme de Telemaque* and the three first books of Lafontaine's Fables. They shall be examined on grammar, etymology and grammatical analysis.
- BELLES-LETTRES.—Principles of the subject and of Rhetoric, also History of the Literature of the age of Pericles in Greece, of Augustus in Rome, and of English and French Literature of the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.
- HISTORY.—A general knowledge of the History of Greece and of Rome, and a more particular knowledge of British French and Canadian History.
- GEOGRAPHY.—A general knowledge of the subject, and more especially of England, France and North America.
- ARITHMETIC.—Must include vulgar and decimal fractions, simple and compound proportion, interest, percentages and square root.
- ALGEBRA.—Must include fractions and simple equations of the first degree.

- GEOMETRY.—The first three books of Euclid and the sixth, or the part of plane Geometry corresponding to these books in Eysseric and Pascal. Also the measurement of the lines, surfaces and volumes of the regular geometrical figures.
- CHEMISTRY.—A general knowledge as in Roscoë, Wurtz or Troost.
- BOTANY.—A general knowledge as in Gray's "School and Field book of Botany," or Moyen, Provancher, Laflamme or Spotton.
- PHYSICS.—A general knowledge. Text book, Ganot, or its translation by Peck.
- PHILOSOPHY.—A general knowledge from French-speaking students.
- N. B.—Candidates must produce certificates of good moral character.

The examinations will be held in September, 1896, at Quebec, and in July, 1897, at Montreal. Applications to be made to Dr. Brosseau, Montreal, or Dr. Belleau, Quebec, either of whom will furnish schedule giving text books and percentage of marks to be obtained, and exact date of examination.

Examination fee, \$20. Should the candidate be unsuccessful, one-half of the fee will be returned.

ENREGISTRATION, ETC.

At the commencement of every session students are required to enroll their names and residence in the register of the Medical Faculty, and obtain from the Registrar a ticket of enregistration. The Registration books shall be closed on the first day of December in each year.

An annus medicus, or medical session, is constituted by at least two full courses of 120 lectures each, or by one such course, and two courses of 60 lectures each, with previous enregistration.

Students of this University who do not reside in the city, on application to the Registrar, will be furnished with certificates, which through the kindness of the railway authorities, will entitle them to return tickets to Montreal at greatly reduced rates.

COURSES OF MEDICAL STUDIES TO BE TAKEN UP EACH YEAR, AND EXAMINATION REQUIRED.

The course of studies and examinations are divided into primary, and final branches. The former are taken during the first and second years, and the latter during the third and fourth years. The marks for second course of Materia Medica and Therapeutics being included among the final branches.

The primary subjects are Chemistry, Practical Chemistry, Descriptive and Practical Anatomy, Physiology, Practical Physiology, Histology, Materia Medica and Therapeutics. jects included in the final course are:-Practice of Medicine and Neurology, Surgery, Obstetrics, Clinical Obstetrics, Pathology and Bacteriology, Gynæcology, Medical Jurisprudence and Toxicology, Hygiene, Ophthalmology and Otology, Laryngology and Rhinology, Diseases of Children, Psychiatry, Clinical Medicine and Clinical Surgery.

The student will attend the course of Medical studies and take the examinations as follows:

FIRST YEAR.

ANATOMY, PRACTICAL ANATOMY, PHYSIOLOGY, PRACTICAL PHY-SIOLOGY, HISTOLOGY, CHEMISTRY, HOSPITAL ATTENDANCE.

The pass examination is held in Histology, and the sessional in the other branches.

SECOND YEAR.

ANATOMY, PRACTICAL ANATOMY, PHYSIOLOGY, PRACTICAL PHYSI-OLOGY, MATERIA MEDICA AND GENERAL THERAPEUTICS, CHEMISTRY, PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY, HOSPITAL ATTEN-DANCE.

The sessional examination on Materia Medica and general Therapeutics is taken, and the pass examinations on the remaining primary subjects.

THIRD YEAR.

MEDICINE AND NEUROLOGY, SURGERY, GENERAL PATHOLOGY AND BACTERIOLOGY, OBSTETRICS, CLINICAL OBSTETRICS, GYNÆCOLOGY, DISEASES OF CHILDREN, MATERIA MEDICA AND GENERAL THERAPEUTICS, MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE AND TOXICOLOGY, PSYCHIATRY, HYGIENE, AUTOPSIES, CLINICAL MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

The pass examinations in Materia Medica and General Therapeutics, Pathology, Medical Jurisprudence and Hygiene are held and the sessional in the remaining branches.

FOURTH YEAR.

Medicine and Neurology, Surgery, Autopsies, Obstetrics, Clinical Obstetrics, Gynæcology, Diseases of Children, Ophthalmology and Otology, Laryngology and Rhinology, Clinical Medicine and Surgery.

The final pass examination are held. By attending and finishing the courses as above, a definite amount of work is accomplished each year, and an equal division is made between the primary and final branches, and the student is required to work energetically from the beginning of the course.

MEDALS AND PRIZES.

The following medals and prizes will be offered for competition during the ensuing Winter Session:

The Robert Nelson Gold Medal (value \$60).—Presented annually for the best special examination in surgery, open to all candidates who have taken honors in the aggregate on the final branches, and who have attended at least two sessions at Bishop's College.

The David Medal.—In 1880 the Faculty founded a Scholarship, which was afterwards named the "David Scholarship," in honor of their late Dean. Owing to changes having occurred in the arrangement of lectures, it has been decided that in future this prize shall consist of a silver medal, to be known as the "David Medal," which will be awarded to the student who obtains the highest number of marks in the primary examinations.

R. W. Heneker, Esq., Chancellor of the University, to the student who passes the best final examination. (This prize is not open to the "Wood" Gold Medalist.)

The Wood gold medal, the Nelson gold medal, the David silver medal, and the Chancellor's prize are awarded to those who have attended at least two sessions at Bishop's College.

Prizes in books will be given for:-

- 1. Best examination in Histology.
- 2. The best dissecting and examination in the Practical Anatomy course in the first year.
- 3. The best dissecting and examination in the Practical Anatomy course in the second year.

No student can receive a medal or prize who has not taken honors in the examination.

EXAMINATIONS.

Written or oral examinations will be held from time to time by each professor upon the subjects treated of in his preceding lectures, and every such examination shall be counted as a lecture. Each professor shall, at intervals, call a roll of the names of the students attending his class. Tickets which have not a certificate of regular attendance will be rejected when presented as testimonials previous to examination.

On all subjects in which attendance on one course of lectures only is required, pass examinations will be held at the end of the course.

On subjects where two courses of lectures are required, a sessional (written only) examination will be held at the end of the first session, and the pass examination on that subject at the end of the second course. The student will not be allowed to go up for his pass examination on any subject until he has passed the sessional.

Students who fail to pass any sessional examination or the primary pass examination, may make application to the Faculty for a supplemental examination, which, if granted, will be given at the beginning of the following session, said application to be accompanied by a fee of five dollars for each subject. Marks taken at supplementary examinations count for pass only, not for honors.

Students must have passed all their primary examinations before being permitted to go up for the pass examination in the final subjects.

The total number of marks given for any subject in which two courses are required will be divided as follows: One-third for sessionals and two-thirds for pass examinations.

To obtain first-class honors at least seventy-five per cent. of the marks must be taken; second-class honors, at least sixty-five per cent.; to pass the ordinary examination at least fifty per cent.

Students rejected in their final year on Medicine, Surgery or Obstetrics must attend another session and pass all the final subjects again on which they were examined that year, when they take a future examination; but if they fail on a minor final-subject, then a supplementary examination on that subject alone may be allowed at the discretion of the Faculty, and at such time as may be determined upon.

Certified Class Tickets from recognized Medical Schools are accepted.

Certificates of pass examinations from recognized Medical Colleges must be submitted to the Faculty for decision as to acceptance.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE DEGREE OF C.M., M.D.

Candidates for graduation in Medicine and Surgery must give sufficient evidence by certificates :-

Of having matriculated or possessing equivalent qualifications.

That they have attended two six-months' courses of lectures in each of the following departments in Medical Science: -General of Descriptive Anatomy, Principles and Practice of Medicine and Neurology, Surgery, Obstetrics, Chemistry, Physiology, Materia Medica and Therapeutics.

That they have attended one six-months' course in General Pathology and Bacteriology; two three months' courses in Gynæcology and Diseases of Children; one three months' course in Medical Jurisprudence and Toxicology, one three-months' course each of Hygiene, Practical Chemistry, Ophthalmology and Otology, and also a course of not less than twenty five demonstrations in Practical Histology.

That they have attended two six-months' courses of lectures on Clinical Medicine and Clinical Surgery.

That they have attended two six-months' courses of Practical Anatomy. That they have taken two courses of Clinical Obstetrics of twenty-

four lessons each or one of forty-two.

7. That they have attended for at least twenty-four months, or four periods of six months each, the Medical and Surgical practice of a hospital in which are contained not less than 100 beds, under the charge of not less than two physicians or surgeons, and that they have been engaged for at least six months in compounding medicines at a hospital, dispensary, or with a duly licensed practitioner.

That they have attended at least twelve cases of Midwifery, either in a lying-in hospital, or in a private practice, under the supervision of a regular

medical practitioner.

10. Courses of lectures and demonstrations in Laryngology and Rhinglogy, Neurology, Psychiatry, Medical History and Ethics. II. They shall furnish evidence of having reported at least six Medical

and six surgical cases.

Candidates for the degree must, on or before the first day of March deliver to the Registrar of the Medical Faculty a declaration, in their own handwriting, that they have completed twenty-one years of age (or that they will have done so before the day of graduation).

LECTURES.--SESSION 1896-97.

PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE AND NEUROLOGY.

PROF. FRANCIS W. CAMPBELL.

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR, J. BRADFORD McCONNELL.

It is proposed in these lectures to give a definition and history, with the etiology, symptoms, diagnosis, prognosis, complications, sequelæ, pathology, and treatment of the more important constitutional affections, as well as of the diseases which attack the principal organs of the human body. The distribution of the course will have, as far as possible, some reference to the different systems and organs, the diseases of which will be considered in separate groups.

The lectures will be illustrated by plates, diagrams, pathological specimens, microscopical preparations, &c.

A few lectures will be given on Medical History and Ethics.
Particular attention will be given to the special Pathology
of the different diseases and their therapy.

Some of these lectures will be given at the Western Hospital where Clinical material will be used for practical demonstration.

The course of lectures on Diseases of the Nervous System will constitute a special department of the lectures in medicine. It will include, first, an outline of the various methods and tests employed in the diagnosis of these affections, the use of the ophthalmoscope, electricity, æsthesiometer, &c.; then a general consideration of the chief Diseases of the Brain and Spinal Cord, and of their membranes and nerves. The application of electricity and hypnotism as therapeutic agents, &c.

Books recommended.—Osler, Strümpell, Flint, Roberts, Page, Fagge; for reference, the American System of Medicine; Hirt's Diseases of the Nervous System, Gowers, Gray, Dercum.

PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF SURGERY.

PROF. FRANK R. ENGLAND.

This course of lectures will be practical and will include the principles on which the science of Surgery is formed, and also the chief rules for its practice.

It will be divided into three parts, General, Special and Regional. General surgery will embrace the following subjects: Surgical Bacteriology, the process of repair, the traumatic fevers, Inflammation, Suppuration, Ulceration, Abscess and Fistulæ, Gangrene, Septicaemia, Pyaemia, Erysipelas, Tetanus, Scurvy, Tuberculosis and Scrofula, Rhachitis, Contusions and Wounds, Syphilis and Tumors.

Special Surgery.—Surgery of the Vascular and Osseous Systems, Fractures, Dislocations, Diseases of Muscles, Tendons and Bursae, Surgery of the Nerves, Glands, Lymphatics and Joints, Surgical Diseases of the Skin and its appendages.

ORTHOPEDIC SURGERY.—Regional Surgery—Diseases and injuries of the Head, Neck and Spine, Surgery of the Digestive and Respiratory tracts, and on account of the great progress recently made in Abdominal Surgery, special attention will be given to that region; Diseases and Surgery of the Genuto—Urinary organs, Venereal and Rectal Diseases. When required, charts, specimens, and instruments will be shown, and the uses of the latter fully explained.

Text Books.—Erichsen, Bryant, Walsham, Treeves, Martin, Moulin, American Text Book of Surgery, Warren's Surgical Pathology.

Books of Reference.—Gant, Agnew, Gross, Hammond on Fractures, Berkley Hill, Keyes, Allingham, Gerster's Surgery, Senn's Principles of Surgery, Dennis' System of Surgery.

OPERATIVE SURGERY.

Operations will be performed on the dead body, the different forms of surgical instruments, apparatus, etc., shown, and their uses explained.

Senior students will have the opportunity of performing operations themselves on the dead subject under the guidance of the Professor.

Text Books.—Kocher, Jacobson, Treeves.
Books of Reference.—Holmes' System, Gant, Gross, Agnew.

DISEASES OF THE EYE AND EAR.

Professor J. W. Stirling.

The course will consist:

1. Of systematic lectures delivered daily at 8 a.m., at which the symptoms, diagnosis and treatment of the more important, diseased conditions of the eye and ear and their appendages will be discussed.

The lectures will be illustrated by drawings, diagrams, etc.

2. Of clinical instruction in the eye and ear department of the Montreal Dispensary on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 2 p.m., where opportunities will be afforded for practising the use of the Ophthalmoscope.

Text Books.—Swanzy's "Diseases of the Eye" and Field's "Diseases of Ear."

OBSTETRICS AND CLINICAL OBSTETRICS.

PROFESSOR REDDY.

W. BURNETT, M.D., DEMONSTRATOR.

This subject will be considered in the following order:

GENERAL PATHOLOGY, PATHOLOGICAL HISTOLOGY AND BACTERIOLOGY.

PROFESSOR MACPHAIL.

The instruction in these subjects extends over a period of nine months, namely, one Winter and one Summer Session. The lectures will deal with the principles of General Pathology, and the Pathological Histology of the diseased conditions of the human body. The demonstrations will be upon the material acquired at the autopsies of the week, and the lectures will be illustrated as well by recent specimens, sections and preparations, of which a large number have been obtained.

The following practical courses are obligatory upon all students:—

The performance of post-mortem examinations. Each student is required to perform or assist in performing six autopsies.

2. Bacteriology. All students are required to be familiar with the common forms of Bacteriæ and to make themselves proficient by practice in the staining and detection of them.

3. A practical course in Pathological Histology during the Summer Session, in which students will learn the methods of preparing, staining, mounting and examining diseased tissues.

Text Books.—Joseph Coats' Manual of Pathology, Delafield and Prudden's Handbook, G. Sims-Woodhead's Practical Pathology. Crookshank's Bacteriology. McFarland's Pathogenic Bacteria.

PHYSICAL DIAGNOSIS.

PROF. W. G. STEWART.

In this course the various methods of eliciting the physical signs of disease will be taught; the use of the stethoscope and other mechanical aids in diagnosis. The topography of the

chest and normal physical signs will be demonstrated on the living subject. Disease in selected cases, occurring at the Western Hospital, will also be demonstrated from time to time, and the students will be examined in rotation upon the work done.

Text Books.—Loomis, Brown, Fenwick. Books of Reference.—Vierordt, Da Costa.

GYNÆCOLOGY

PROF. PERRIGO.

This course will embrace the following subjects:

- 1. Abnormalities.
- 2. Diseases of the external Genitals, including the injuries of the Perinæum.
- 3. Diseases and injuries of the Vagina; Vesico and Recto Vaginal Fistulæ.
- 4. Diseases and injuries of the Uterus, including Stenosis, Subinvolution, Metritis, Endometritis and Fibroids; Deformities, Displacements and Lacerations.
- 5. Diseases of the Fallopian tubes, including Salpingitis Hydro and Pyosalpinx and Tubal Gestation.
- 6. Diseases of the Ovaries, Ovariotomy and other forms of Abdominal Surgery.
 - 7. Pelvic Peritonitis, Pelvic Cellulitis and Pelvic Abscess.
 - 8. Diseases of the Female Bladder and Urethra.

At the out-patient department of the Western Hospital there will also be a course of instruction in practical diagnosis and treatment.

MATERIA MEDICA AND GENERAL THERAPEUTICS.

PROF. ROBT. WILSON.

This course comprises:—

1. The consideration of the source, properties, composition, preparations, physiological actions, toxicology and therapeutic applications of the various substances used in medicine. The lectures will be illustrated by colored plates, dried preparations and a complete cabinet of drugs and their preparations.

This includes (a) The actual making of many of the more important preparations of the Pharmacopæia, together with the dispensing of prescriptions, under the direction of a graduate in Pharmacy; (b) The delivery of a course of short lectures on special Therapeutic measures, such as Electrotherapy, Sero-therapy, Dietetics, Massage, Hypnotism, &c.

Text Books—Bruce's Materia Medica, Shoemaker's Materia Medica, Hare's Therapeutics.

PRACTICAL HISTOLOGY.

PROF. ARTHMAN BRUERE.

The course will consist of fifty meetings for practical work in the laboratory of the College. Students will be instructed in the methods of preparing the tissues and organs of the body for examination with the microscope. Special attention will be paid to comparative histology.

Text Books.—Stirling's Histology, Schafer's Elements.

CHEMISTRY AND CHEMICAL PHYSICS.

Prof. J. T. Donald.

The object of this course is, in brief, to teach the general truths of Chemistry, in order that the student may be prepared to pursue in an intelligent manner the intimately related professional course, e. g., Physiology, Materia Medica, Hygiene, etc. At the same time the more important elements and compounds are discussed, special attention being paid to those of hygienic and dietetic interest and of importance in medicine and pharmacy.

Diagrams, charts, specimens and experiments are freely used with a view to making the course as practical as possible.

Text Books.—Balfour Stewart's "Lesson in Elementary Physics," Attfield's Chemistry, Remsen's Introduction to the Study of Chemistry, Bartley's Medical Chemistry, Wilthan's Medical Students, Manual of Chemistry, Remsen's Organic Chemistry.

PHYSIOLOGY.

PROFESSOR ARTHMAN BRUERE.

Lecturer, - - A. J. Richer, M.D.

The lecturer's aim will be to impart a good general know-ledge of Human and Comparative Physiology. The lectures will be largely illustrated, and numerous experiments will be performed before the class. Electro-physiology, the physiology of the sense organs and of the central nervous system will be especially dwelt upon. Practical instruction in the use of Physiological instruments and in Physiological Chemistry will be given to senior students.

Text Books.—Foster's Physiology, McKendrick's Text Book, Kirke's Hand-Book, Yeo's Manual, Landois' Human Physiology for senior students, Waller's Human Physiology.

DESCRIPTIVE AND SURGICAL ANATOMY.

LECTURERS.

DR. ROLLO CAMPBELL. DR. F. J. HACKETT.

Five lectures, weekly, are given on this subject.

The course will be illustrated by diagrams, models, plates, moist and dry preparations, blackboard drawings, and special recent dissections, etc.

Written examinations are held upon each of the completed sections of the course. Comparative Anatomy, Anomalies and Malformations will be fully discussed in their relation to the subject.

Embryological points of interest will be dwelt upon when necessary.

The College is in possession of a complete collection of moist and dry preparations, viz., dissections of the central Nervous System, various regions of the body and of cross sections of the entire cadaver.

These specimens are open for study by the class.

Special attention will be directed to Abdominal and Pelvic Anatomy.

HYGIENE OR STATE MEDICINE.

PROFESSOR WM. BURNETT.

The lectures on this subject, the importance and value of which are now universally admitted, are intended:—

To teach the application of Sanitary Science to questions concerning Public Health.

To afford rules for the conduct of the Medical Practitioner in Sanitary Inquiries, Municipal Sanitation, School Hygiene, etc.

To inculcate the use of suitable Hygienic Measures in the prevention and arrest of Contagious Diseases.

To confer such knowledge of the principles of State Medicine as it is desirable that every medical man should possess.

Books Recommended.—Traite d'Hygiene, par M. Levy: Wilson's Handbook of Hygiene; Practical Hygiene, by Parkes; Rohe's Text Book.

PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.

PROFESSOR JOSEPH BEMROSE.

Work in the Laboratory for Practical Chemistry is continued throughout the Winter months, and is intended to afford to the student a knowledge. by personal experiment, of the more important elements and compounds used in medical practice, special attention being paid during the first half of the session to the reactions of those of a poisonous nature, both inorganic and

organic. Afterwards the preparation of the volumetric solutions of the British pharmacopæia and quantitative estimations of the fixed and volatile Alkalies, Oxalic, Arsenious and Hydrocyanic Acids, Iodine, Bromine, and their compounds: also the separation and recognition of the alkaloids in the tinctures and extracts of Nux Vomica, Cinchona and Opium, &c.

To each student is allotted a working space furnished with a full set of reagents; also the necessary apparatus, for which a deposit of \$5 will be required, to be returned at the end of session, less an amount sufficient to cover breakages.

Special students who desire the course of Chemistry only will be admitted to the Lectures and Laboratory on enregistration, and payment of fees.

Text Books.—Attfield or Odling.

DISEASES OF THE THROAT AND NOSE.

Prof. Geo. T. Ross.

This course will impart a general knowledge of the diseases commonly met with in these organs. Inflammation, growths and injuries of the Throat, Nose, and Naso-Pharynx, will be dwelt upon and their effect on the general system explained. Interesting cases attending the Clinic at the Western General Hospital will be lectured upon. Colored plates, photographs and diagrams will be used to make the course thoroughly practical.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE.

(Including Toxicology.)

PROFESSOR W. H. DRUMMOND.

The purpose of these lectures is to bring as far as possible, within a reasonable compass, the application of medical knowledge to medico-legal investigation.

Text Books.—Guy's Forensic Medicine; Taylor's Medical Jurisprudence; Blandford on Insanity; Allan McLane Hamilton's Legal Medicine.

This course will include a series of lectures on the Diseases peculiar to Infancy and Childhood. The dietetic and hygienic management of children will also be considered. Surgical operations will be demonstrated in so far as they specially concern this period of life.

Text Books.—Lewis Smith's Diseases of Infancy and Childhood, American Text Book of the Diseases of Children.

MENTAL DISEASES.

PROFESSOR J. V. ANGLIN.

Insanity in its various forms will be lectured upon in this course and the subject treated from both a Medical as well as a Medico-legal basis.

PRACTICAL ANATOMY.

Dr. Rollo Campbell, Lecturer and Demonstrator. Dr. F. J. Hackett, Lecturer and Demonstrator. Drs. Herbert Tatley, Geo. Fisk, Demonstrators.

The dissecting room is open daily from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., except on Saturday, when it is closed at 5 p.m.

Ample opportunities are afforded for dissecting fresh subjects. The Demonstrator will be in attendance daily, to direct and assist students in their dissections, and examine their work. The dissecting rooms are supplied with every requisite for the comformal convenience of students, due regard being observed for sanitary measures. Every possible facility will be afforded students in this most important department.

Students during dissection of each extremity are examined on the muscles, arteries, nerves, etc., of the extremity as they are exposed. Certificates are granted as soon as the student shows by examination a thorough knowledge of the anatomy of the part and its practical bearing in relation to Medicine and Surgery.

CLINICAL MEDICINE.

CLINICAL SURGERY.

FRANK R. ENGLAND, M.D., LECTURFR.

Daily clinics will be given in the above subjects and one or more lectures weekly at the Western Hospital. Ample opportunity will be afforded here for the reporting of cases, surgical dressing, and practice in Clinical Chemistry and Microscopy; but owing to lack of the required number of beds at present in the Western Hospital, in addition to the above, students of this University are required to attend the Clinical Courses, Autopsies and other Hospital work at the Montreal General, Royal Victoria, or Hotel Dieu Hospitals, where our students receive the same attention, and are accorded the same privileges as those from other teaching bodies, but the pass examinations will be conducted by the above Lecturers at the Western Hospital.

Books Recommended — Vierordt's Medical Diagnosis, Wethered's Medical Microscopy, Purdy's Practical Urinalysis and Urinary Diagnosis.

Heath's Guide to Surgical Diagnosis and the text books recommended in the Course on Surgery.

CLINICAL GYNAECOLOGY.

PROFESSOR LAPTHORN SMITH.

At the Montreal Dispensary, every Monday and Thursday, at 3 p.m.

During the summer, students of the third and fourth years will be taught bi-manual examination and minor gynæcological operations, as well as other methods of treatment; two students being taken in turn each day. Every Saturday, at 10 a.m., from April to October, major operations will be performed in their presence at the Western Hospital, and clinical lectures given on the cases.

UNIVERSITY OF BISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The course of instruction in this College is in accordance with the requirements of the National Association of Dental Faculties of the United States, and extends over three (3) years.

MATRICULATION.

All candidates for admission, except those who hold a degree in Medicine or Arts from a recognized British or Canadian University, must pass the matriculation examination of the Dental Association of the Province of Quebec, before they can register as students of this College.

INDENTURES.

Those students who intend to practice in the Province of Quebec must sign indentures before a Notary Public with a Licentiate of Dental Surgery in active practice in the Province, at the *beginning* of the College course; the dental act requiring three (3) full years as an indentured student after the matriculation has been passed.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Histology and Embryology are taken in the Medical Department of Bishop's University, the remainder of the course is given in the Dental College building on Phillip's Square.

First year—Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Histology and Embryology.

Second year—Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Operative and Mechanical Dentisty, Dental Technique, Dental Pathology and Therapeutics, Surgical Pathology, Dental Surgery and Anæsthetics, Orthodontia, Dental Materia Medica.

Third year—Operative and Mechanical Dentistry, Crown and Bridge work, Practical work in Infirmary, etc.

EXAMINATION.

Examinations are held at the close of each session; the student is not allowed to advance with his class unless he has passed in a majority of the subjects of his year.

The College year begins on the first of October and ends on 31st of March, with a vacation of ten days at Christmas.


