

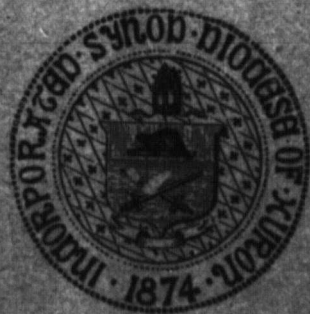

PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE OF HURON

TWENTY-FOURTH SESSION.

(Being the Seventh under the Act of Incorporation of 1874.)

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, 21st June, 1881.

Morning prayer was said in the Chapter House, commencing at 9 a. m.

The Ordination Service began at 11 a. m., when the Bishop admitted nine candidates to the Diaconate.

The sermon was preached by the Rev. Frederic Courtney, Rector of St. James' Church, Chicago, from 2 Tim., iv. 5.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop to the Clergy and Lay Representatives.

The Synod assembled at 3 p. m., in the Chapter House.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

The usual prayers having been offered up by the Bishop, the rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were called by their respective Secretaries, when 83 Clergymen and 93 Lay Delegates answered to their names.

Arrears of Assessment.

Admission to Seat in Synod.

The Lord Bishop then introduced, in complimentary terms, and invited to a seat on the platform, the Rev. Frederick Courtney, and in his own behalf and that of the Synod, thanked him for his excellent sermon at the opening of Synod.

The Rev. F. Courtney thanked the Bishop and Synod for their kind and complimentary words.

The Bishop's Address.

His Lordship the Bishop then delivered his Annual Charge to the Synod, as follows :—

BELOVED BRETHREN :—

Once again in the gracious providence of God we are permitted to meet as a Synod, to review the state and position of our Diocese, to deliberate how best to promote the Church's welfare, and to stimulate one another to renewed efforts in the discharge of the great and important work committed to our trust. To my mind there is something in a gathering like the present incomparably august and sacred. I appear to myself to be surrounded, not by a company of mere individuals, but by representatives of our Diocese, met here to assert their allegiance to the King of Kings, who claims the whole human family for His inheritance, and to bind themselves, with hands and hearts upraised to the heaven wherein He dwelleth, to fulfil to the utmost His benevolent command—"Go ye into all the world and preach the *Gospel to every creature.*" Under this impression, I look around with no common interest and reverence on this assembly—and oh! that God would vouchsafe to us, not only a certainty of His presence by the Holy Ghost, derived from His infallible promise, but also a consciousness of it, from the experience of His love shed abroad in our hearts.

THE RIGHT REV'D BISHOP ALFORD.

During my absence in England, my kind and Right Rev'd friend, Bishop Alford, most efficiently and acceptably administered the affairs of the Diocese. Personally I need not say how much I appreciate, with thankfulness to God, his disinterested labors for nearly a year in this our Diocese; and I truly rejoice to learn from all sides, how his labors of love have gained for himself the affectionate esteem of all with whom he came in contact. I deeply regret that he could not prolong his stay with us, to take part in our Synod-work; yet, I feel sure, you will join with me to put on record, in our Synod Journal, our deep and grateful sense of the timely

and valuable services he was good enough to render, and our united prayer that God may continue to bless his labors everywhere for the extension of the kingdom of Christ.

EPISCOPAL ACTS.

As usual, a detailed statement of these will be printed in the appendix to the Journal of the Synod.

LAY SECRETARY.

In accordance with the constitution, I have appointed Mr. Lawrence Skey to act, *ad interim*, as Lay Secretary, Mr. Complin having resigned during the year.

OBITUARY.

It is my sad duty to record that, during the year, two of our clerical brethren,—the Rev. W. Brethour, M. A., and the Rev. H. Bartlett,—have been removed from our midst by “the one event which happeneth unto all.” By the demise of these brethren, the one full of years, and the other in the prime of life, we are forcibly reminded of the memorable words of the Master:—“Be ye also ready, for in an hour that ye think not, the Son of Man cometh.”

LONDON THAMES DISASTER.

I cannot, my brethren, on an occasion of this kind, refrain from alluding to that terrible calamity which has desolated so many of our homes, and brought such grievous affliction to so many families in this city and neighbourhood, viz: the wreck of the steamer “Victoria,” in connection with which nearly two hundred of our fellow creatures were hurried into eternity within a few yards of the shore, and in many instances within the sight of their agonized and despairing friends.

It was as if a great cry went up from this city of woe—such a cry as that of Egypt, when “there was not a house where there was not one dead.”

I feel sure we have had your deepest and truest sympathy in our season of great sorrow and distress, for it is one of the most beautiful and blessed effects of the Gospel on the human heart, that it makes man sympathise with his fellow beings, and leads us to “bear one another’s burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ.” We have, indeed, in this city, passed through a period of gloom such as we have never experienced, and were it not for the sweet and abiding consolation of God the Comforter, the lot of many would, at this moment, be pitiable indeed. But, we thank God that His grace is always sufficient for His people, and His strength is made perfect in our weaknesses, so that even “in the fires” we may yet praise Him, and beneath the heaviest dispensations experience His gracious and ready help.

I confidently commend our sorrowing and bereaved fellow-citizens and friends to your continued prayers, that it may please God to

sanctify this affliction for their spiritual benefit, and that they all may realize the precious promise that "all things work together for good to them that love God."

It is but right that we should place on record, in our Synod Journal, a fitting expression of our heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved sufferers.

We must, I am sure, all deplore the fact that this calamitous event should have occurred on the anniversary of the birthday of our beloved Queen, whose heart, we know, was deeply moved when she heard of the suffering and distress of her loyal subjects in this distant part of her empire; and join in the desire, that in the future, such expeditions as that which has recently resulted so disastrously, may be subject to more vigilant oversight, and the lives of our people more carefully guarded.

SUPERANNUATED CLERGY.

Two of our brethren have been compelled to retire from active service,—the Rev. T. E. Sanders and the Rev. E. A. Miller; both have long and faithfully labored in this Diocese.

We have now eleven of our clergy on the superannuation list. I cannot adequately express in words my deep thankfulness to God that these dear brethren thus no longer able, by reason of age or bodily infirmity, to continue their active labors in the vineyard of their Lord and Master, have not been left without some provision for their support; but, on the contrary, as the result of your just and wise legislation in the administration of those funds which a kind Providence placed at your disposal, we are able to render them timely help to which they are entitled, not as a matter of charity, but as a claim for long and faithful service in the Church of this Diocese.

DIOCESAN PROSPERITY.

Gratefully do I rejoice with you in the many evidences of prosperity which our Heavenly Father has been pleased to vouchsafe to our united labors.

The manifold evidences of vigorous and healthy growth presented by a review of the past year are especially encouraging to myself as chief pastor and overseer of the flocks committed to my charge; and you, my brethren, will, I feel assured, heartily rejoice with me that we can mark this Synod of 1881 by once again raising our Ebenezer:—"Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

The large number of persons who have been confirmed during the last few years is an evidence of much faithful and successful labor by the clergy of the several parishes and missions. The large amounts expended, in the improvement of church property, in the liquidation of church debts, and the unusually large number of new

churches and parsonages—many of them substantial and costly structures—either already built or now in the course of erection, are proofs equally indisputable and gratifying of the zeal and liberality of both clergy and laity. We can only pray that the Holy Spirit, Who, we trust, inspires these “labors of love,” may abundantly bless them for the spiritual good of His people; for, “Except the Lord build the house, their labor is but lost that build it.”

DIOCESAN INCOME.

God has again crowned the year with His goodness. Once more we are permitted to rejoice with thankfulness in the fact of a large increase in the free-will offerings of our people for Diocesan and missionary purposes. Two years ago the Diocesan income was \$11,809.46; last year it had increased to \$13,300.25; this year it has risen to \$15,007.86; an increase of \$1,707.61, as compared with last year, and an increase of \$3,298.40 as compared with the income reported at our Synod of 1879. This large increase of the past two years, which I am confident is but an earnest and pledge of yet greater things to come, is largely owing to the suggestion made in the “financial report of the Standing Committee, for the year ending March 31st, 1879,” as follows:—

“Your Committee feel that the Synod ought to take into serious consideration the advisability of appointing a thoroughly qualified Missionary Agent whose entire time should be given to this special mission-work, and who should endeavor during the year to visit every parish and station in the whole Diocese.”

The result was the appointment, in the autumn of 1879, of the Rev. W. F. Campbell. Since that time Mr. Campbell has been twice throughout the whole Diocese, each time with the most satisfactory results. Not only has there been a clear and substantial gain to our various Diocesan funds, but also an increased interest has been aroused throughout the whole Diocese in both Diocesan and Foreign Missions, which with God's blessing will unquestionably lead to greater and still more encouraging results, affecting favorably every department, both of Diocesan and of parochial work. In the report which Mr. Campbell has given to me of his labors, he speaks gratefully of the kind and cordial reception he has everywhere met with in his journeyings, and more especially of the hearty co-operation of all the clergy, which contributed so greatly to render his visits successful. I desire here publicly to thank my brethren, both clerical and lay, for this assistance which has been so cheerfully given to our accredited agent. The assistance is not so much given to Mr. Campbell, much as it is appreciated by him, as rather given to the cause of our common Lord, as represented on the one hand by the hard-working and deserving missionaries for whom he pleads, and on the other by the large number of settle-

ments in this extensive and rapidly growing Diocese, which of necessity largely depend on mission-fund aid for those privileges which are so unspeakably important both with regard "of the life that now is, and of that which is to come." Mr. Campbell has thus far faithfully and diligently performed the duties of his arduous and most responsible position; duties which demand great self-denial, ardent zeal, and an entire and unreserved consecration of all his mental and physical strength to that cause—the cause of missions—which is so dear to the heart of Christ, and so essential for the Church's growth and life.

SUPPORT OF THE MISSIONARY CLERGY.

With reference to the support of our Missionary Clergy, I must again express my heart's desire that there shall be no slackening of our united efforts to provide each and every one of them with an income, which shall be in keeping with the increased cost of living in the present day, and commensurate with their Christian professional calling—a calling requiring not only high education and culture, but also high character; in a word, the best and rarest endowments, mental, physical and moral, and therefore demanding not only a social and moral, but also a *material* recognition proportioned to its arduous labors and weighty responsibilities. Much have I rejoiced to learn that at the last Easter Vestry meetings several of our leading parishes have voted an increase of salary to their respective pastors. While this speaks volumes for the faithfulness of pastors, and for the affectionate appreciation by the congregations, of the labors of these servants of Christ, it speaks much more for the grace of God which enables pastor and people to work together in that loving unity—the fruit of the Spirit.

I believe that the heart of the Diocese goes with me, when I repeat what I said last year:—"That I can see no difficulty in securing to every Missionary clergyman a stipend of not less than one thousand dollars per annum, if you will only put forth unitedly your prayerful working efforts to increase the income of our Mission Fund." Only the will is needed. A little wise organization, and a thorough canvas in each and every congregation would soon double or treble our present Diocesan income. How any clergyman can excuse himself—under any pretence—to his Missionary brethren, or his own congregation, much less to his own conscience, from making his very best efforts to increase the Mission fund of the Diocese, or omit any of the stated collections for Diocesan purposes, is something which, I confess, I cannot comprehend. The want of such efforts, manifested by diminished returns to the Diocesan treasury, not only cuts off those supplies which are absolutely needed for the support of our Missionary work, but reacts in all cases most injuriously upon the spiritual life of the parish, which, generally without any fault of its own, is thus deprived of the blessing:—"He that

watereth others shall also, be watered himself." It has been truly gratifying to me to learn, that in nearly every case, the clergy of our older, self-sustaining parishes in our leading towns and wealthier agricultural districts, have been foremost in their efforts to increase our Missionary income, thus entering into the very spirit of the Apostolic injunction:—"Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ."

I cannot conclude this portion of my address without reminding you, that, in order to maintain the Missionary character of this Diocese; supply the demands of an increasing population in the remoter parts of it; and respond encouragingly to the petitions from the Missionary clergy to divide their large and unwieldy Missions, the most strenuous efforts must still be made by the members of our Church.

Our Diocese embraces many new townships which are being rapidly filled with an industrious population; new villages are springing up in every direction; while in the older districts large towns are flourishing in the midst of thickly peopled townships. The day is not far distant when we shall require at least double our present staff of clergy, in order to adequately supply this large Diocese.

ORDINATION.

Although you witnessed this morning the ordination of eight gentlemen to the Diaconate; yet this large increase to our working Missionary staff by no means meets the demands of very many congregations, which at present can only receive occasional services, from a clergyman already occupied in ministering to too large a district.

I refer to these increasing obligations in the fullest confidence, that, as in the past, so in the future "My God shall supply all your need, according to his riches in Christ Jesus."

In the last report of the S. P. G., the withdrawal of all further aid to this Diocese is thus referred to:—"Huron, the Garden of Canada, no longer needs assistance from the Mother Country;" and in a letter which I have lately received from the Rev. Henry W. Tucker, the Secretary of the Society, dated May 23rd, 1881, the same subject is thus referred to:—

"MY DEAR LORD—The Diocese of Huron is now in the honorable position of being able to stand alone so far as temporal matters are concerned. The Standing Committee, while recommending the discontinuance of the Society's grant after this year, congratulate the Diocese on its position, and the Society on the happy results of the very liberal grants made to Huron in times past."

The Colonial and Continental Church Society, whose aid has been so valuable, has likewise recently notified us of a further reduction in the grant hitherto apportioned to this Diocese. Both these Societies justly claim a large share in building up the Diocese—a

claim which, I am sure, every one amongst us will most unhesitatingly and gratefully acknowledge.

The Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge continues to make grants to assist in building churches in the poorer districts of our Diocese, and I need not say how deeply grateful we feel for this pecuniary assistance and how necessary it is for the continued efficiency and growth of our work. In a letter from the Secretary of the S. P. C. K., dated the 1st of this month, and addressed to me, their readiness to continue assistance to our Diocese is thus referred to:—"I need not assure you that the Committee will always be ready to consider applications, supported by your Lordship's recommendation, for grants towards suitable objects, for which the Society's aid is wanted, and of the attainment of which within a reasonable time there appears to be good prospects."

The time, however, has come when we may no longer look for pecuniary aid to the Mother Country for the prosecution of our ordinary Diocesan work, but will have to draw from the resources of our own people those supplies which are needed to support our own Church work. How thankful should we be, that, notwithstanding the growth of our population has during recent years been greater than in any other section of the Dominion, our people are so nobly rising to the emergency, and are showing themselves both able and willing to meet not only the spiritual wants of our own Diocese, but are striving likewise to make known the unsearchable riches of Christ in "regions beyond."

NORTH-WEST MISSIONS.

Nothing has given me greater pleasure than to mark the annually increasing contributions to fields of Missionary toil lying outside our own immediate bounds. Especially in our own "*North-West*," so rapidly being filled with settlers, there is, at the present time, a call for liberality for the support of Missionaries to which no churchman can refuse to listen. Our Provincial Synod in September last recognized the great and urgent importance of this work by the formation of a "Board of Missions," whose duty it should be to stimulate interest and collect funds to aid in supporting Missions in those vast Territories. I hope, beloved brethren, you will generously assist in this great work, and that this Diocese will not only take part, but a leading part in this movement, which in so many ways appeals to the best and holiest impulses that stir within us.

The "Central Board" asks \$2,000 per annum from this Diocese, and I most cordially endorse their appeal, in the fullest expectation that they will not be disappointed so far as Huron is concerned. When we look back a few years and see the increase in the free-will offerings of our people—from \$10,002.91 in 1871, to \$15,007.86 in 1881, an increase of one-half in our Diocesan Income, we may well

feel encouraged to look for even "greater things than these," in His name and for His cause, "Who gave Himself for us, and who left us an example that we should follow His steps."

How encouraging the past and the present! When this Diocese was first set off from the mother Diocese of Toronto, the whole clerical staff consisted of only forty clergy, including the Bishop! What hath God wrought for us since? The number is more than trebled! To God be all the praise and glory who alone "giveth the increase." The past and the present are indeed precious pledges that our God is with us, and will remove every obstacle, and cause us to grow and abound yet more and more. We have but to "stand fast in one mind, with one spirit, striving together for the faith of the Gospel, and in nothing terrified by our adversaries."

Already, when the cry is for men to supply new Missions, and when all the signs of the times combine to emphasize the fact, that men of superior learning and high culture are required for the ministry of the Church, we have the most cheering response, in the fact that Huron College is so speedily to be developed into a chartered University, with the curriculum in the Arts course of the Provincial University. To one who said: "God does not need the aid of human learning," it was well answered: "God does not need the aid of human ignorance." And at this time, when all other Christian bodies around us are raising the standard of education required for their ministers, surely we must desire to see the Church of England occupying no inferior position. As was stated in that admirable sermon delivered at the opening of the Synod in June, 1877, by the Rev. Dr. Potter, Rector of Grace Church, New York:—"This Church is of old, the friend of learning and learned men, the mother of teachers and the source and fountain of profound attainments and devout scholarship."

As Bishop of this Diocese, and fully recognizing the need of a well-educated clergy to maintain the character of our Protestant Reformed Church and extend her influence, I hail with unmixed pleasure and gratitude to God the near accomplishment of my dearest and best hopes for the future of this Diocese in the speedy opening of our Western University.

THE WESTERN UNIVERSITY.

Since our last Synod I have felt it my duty to visit again the mother land in the interest of our Western University. The kindness and sympathy which I have ever experienced during my visits in the Old Country are far beyond what I am able to express in language. The assistance I have already received towards the Western University, and the pledges for further help in this important educational effort, are not only of an encouraging character, but so substantial as to enable us soon to inaugurate this great work.

When, a little more than four years ago, I was waited upon by my very rev. friend, the Dean of Huron, Principal and Divinity Professor of Huron College; the late Rev. Prof. Halpin, and by many clergymen—Alumni of Huron College—and solicited by them to place myself at the head of a movement for establishing in this city a University with which Huron College should be affiliated; although I fully concurred in the views of that influential delegation, and notwithstanding their assurances of sympathy and pledges of hearty co-operation in the furtherance of the undertaking, I was, nevertheless, quite conscious of many perplexing difficulties to be overcome before the consummation of so great an enterprise. But, notwithstanding these difficulties, I was greatly encouraged to go forward in this work when, at the Synod of the same year, I was presented with an address, which was read by His Honor, Judge Kingsmill on behalf of the members of the Synod, and which began as follows:—

“We, the undersigned, members of the Synod, desire most heartily to congratulate your Lordship on the prosperous condition of the Diocese, as set forth in your annual address. We rejoice that you have again enunciated those Protestant and Evangelical principles for which the fathers of our Reformed Church suffered martyrdom, and which, since your Lordship’s advent to this country—more than thirty years ago—you have ever maintained and set forth, in public and in private, and through good and evil report. We are thankful that God has put it into your Lordship’s heart to give your strength to what we will regard, when consummated, as the crowning act of your life—the establishment of a University and University College for the instruction in Evangelical truths of the future clergy of the Diocese, as well as providing for the educational wants of Western Canada.”

And even when at our last Synod, owing to encouragements received from many friends on both sides of the Atlantic, I felt myself justified in predicting “that within a very few years” our Western University would be a living reality, I scarcely dared to hope that we were so near the consummation, and least of all did I imagine that, at this time, after the lapse of only one year, I would be in a position to announce that the affiliation of Huron College with the Western University is now a fact, and that in a very few months from this the University will be in active operation. I may here repeat what I said on this subject in a former address to the Synod:—“I believe that no undertaking having for its object the establishment on a permanent basis of a thoroughly Protestant University education has ever been submitted to the Christian public which is more fairly entitled to their sympathy and co-operation, and more calculated to yield an abundant return in present and prospective fruits of usefulness than this our Western University.”

APPEAL.

And, once more, I would publicly appeal in its behalf to the many friends of intellectual advancement, who independently of locality and other external conditions, desire the education of our people in those Protestant and Evangelical principles which constitute the only sound foundation of Christian character, and the surest guarantee for the future spiritual and moral welfare of the country at large.

You, beloved brethren, who have so much at heart the prosperity of our Church, will I trust render that substantial and effectual assistance which you have in your power both by word and deed. Your liberal response on Good Friday of this year to the appeal on behalf of Huron College shows how highly you appreciate the benefits which that institution has already conferred upon the Diocese at large, and how much you desire its increased efficiency. That the affiliation with the University, will place Huron College in a better position in every particular than it has hitherto held does not admit of any doubt. Huron College has already done a great work during the past twenty years in supplying able ministers of the New Testament, not only for this but for other Dioceses also. Nearly eighty clergymen have gone forth from its halls, "workmen that need not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." About sixty of these are now laboring efficiently and successfully in our own Diocese. Truly, no pains should be spared, no gifts withheld which may serve to extend and strengthen, and as far as possible, to perfect the machinery of an institution with which the very prosperity of the Church in this Diocese isso vitally connected.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, beloved brethren, we must not slacken in any effort of duty which is marked out for us. We must "stand upon our watch and sit upon the tower and watch to see what the Lord will say unto us, and what we shall answer when we are reproved." And if it be our duty to contribute for the maintenance of the Church's work, by every wise and provident arrangement of a temporal nature, let us ever remember that we can neither look for a blessing upon such endeavors as these, nor be engaged in directing them to their proper object, unless we have directly and incessantly in view, and that with a single eye, the glory of God, the saving of precious souls, and the blessed extension of Christ's kingdom.

Our vocation is to turn men from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God; to beseech men in Christ's stead to be reconciled to God; to preach the Word, being instant in season and out of season, warning every man publicly and from house to house. Our glory is to "Magnify the name of the Lord Jesus;" our hope and reward to present before God and the Father, at the last day, those whom we shall have been instrumental in winning to

Him from an ungodly world. In all the difficulties of the Church ; in all the discouragements which we encounter personally, in our ministry ; in all the embarrassments arising from the machinations of our adversaries ; in all the deficiencies and disappointments experienced at the hands of men who love the Church just so far as will not interfere with their worldly gain ; in all the oppositions of the carnal mind to the faithful exhibition of "the Word of Life"—what have we to do, but "putting on the whole armor of God, and over all taking the shield of faith" that we may "be able to withstand in the evil day and having done all to stand" ?

With such a charge committed to us, and in such times as these, how earnest, how constant, ought we to be in prayer ! How familiarly stored, as scribes instructed unto the Kingdom of God, with treasures of the Word of Life, and how prompt to improve our opportunities for such studies as help to the knowledge of the same ! How mindful of the warning, in all our holy ministrations :—"Be ye clean that bear the vessels of the Lord" ! How assiduous in every department of pastoral duties ! How conscientious in carrying out faithfully the work entrusted to our management : the cause of the Master, reposed in our hands, so as to remember that it is for *this* that we *live* and *labor*, and for *this*, that, if we were called to it, we should be prepared cheerfully to die.

The Synod having resumed business,

V. *Resolved*—That the members of this Synod have had great satisfaction in listening to Your Lordship's annual charge, and would desire most heartily to congratulate Your Lordship on the still-increasing prosperous condition of the financial as well as spiritual position of the Diocese; and this Synod cannot but feel that in the Providence of God this measure of increase is greatly due to your indefatigable zeal in the cause of Christ and our beloved Church in this part of the Province; and have to thank God that you have been again vouchsafed a safe return to us from your recent visit to our Fatherland; and our fervent prayer is that you may be long spared to administer the Episcopal affairs of this Diocese. This Synod would further congratulate Your Lordship on the success that has attended your efforts to establish a University and University College for the instruction in evangelical truths of the future clergy of the Diocese, as well as additionally providing for the educational wants of Western Canada. Your Lordship has been ever foremost in promoting the higher branches of learning based upon sound Church principles, and contributed, we know, largely of your private means in furtherance of these objects; and while this Synod has no power at present vested in it to assist Your Lordship in further promoting these objects, it may fairly pledge itself to give you every legitimate aid tending to the final completion of this undertaking, and trust you may be spared to see this great work carried to a most successful termination. *Carried unanimously.*

WEDNESDAY, June 22, 1881.

The Litany was said at the Chapter House at 9 o'clock.

The Synod assembled in the same place at 10 o'clock.

The Bishop in the Chair.

Minutes.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read by the Clerical Secretary, and being approved by the Synod, were signed by the Chairman.

Petitions.

The Clerical Secretary read a petition from certain members of the Church of England, in Woodstock, praying for the maintenance of the services in the old church of St. Paul.

Reports of Committees.

The Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. E. B. Reed, presented the Annual Report of the Standing Committee of the Incorporated Synod. (*Vide Appendix.*)

Mr. Reed gave notice that he would move the adoption of the report of the Standing Committee ; also

That the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted with regard to the appropriation of the monies on hand for Domestic Missions and Huron College, and the proposed arrangement for the distribution of the collections on the Day of Intercession and at the Annual Missionary Meetings.

Report of Diocesan Sunday School Committee.

The report of the Special Sunday School Committee was read by the Secretary, Rev. Jeffrey Hill, as follows :—

Whereas at the annual Session of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron, held in the city of London in the month of June. 1880, a Committee was appointed by the Synod ;

1st. To draw up and prepare a Code of Laws governing the Diocesan Sunday School Association.

With regard to this, the Committee would recommend that the Constitution of the Synod be accepted as a sufficient code of laws for the government of the Synod as a Diocesan Sunday School Association.

2nd. To provide for the election or selection of officers and teachers for Normal Classes and general Sunday Schools, and to provide for the formation of Normal Classes for the mutual improvement of teachers, to be, as far as practicable under the superintendence of the clergyman of the parish.

With regard to this, the Committee would recommend :—

1. That the rules of management issued by the Committee be recommended for adoption by the different Sunday Schools of the Diocese, and that a copy of them be hung up in every school for general consultation.

2. That the publications of the Church of England Sunday School Institute bearing on the lesson for the next Sunday be recommended for use at such classes, and in the preparation of the lesson at home by the teachers.

3. (a.) That the Synod make an annual grant of \$50, part to be expended in prizes to be awarded in books to successful Sunday School Teachers, part towards incidental expenses.

(b.) That a simultaneous examination, by printed questions, be held on Easter Tuesday at various centres throughout the Diocese to be conducted by appointed managers; the answers to be sealed and forwarded at once to a Committee of Examination, whose duty it shall be to arrange the candidates according to merit in three classes; in the first class the names to appear according to marks given, in the other two classes alphabetically. The result to be made public before Whit Sunday; the prizes to be conferred at the Synod.

(c.) That it be recommended to the Clergy and Superintendents of Sunday Schools, not only to encourage teachers, both male and female, to study for the above prizes, but also to assist them in their studies.

(d.) That a Committee be appointed yearly to give effect to the above prize scheme.

3rd. To provide for the adoption of uniform lessons, special and Bible for each year, so that all schools will have the same lesson each day; and to distribute such lessons to every parish in the Diocese, after the same shall have been approved by the Bishop.

With regard to this, the Committee recommend that the Bishop be requested to communicate with the Church of England Sunday School Institute, to recommend the publication of a Sunday leaflet, based upon their Bible and Catechism publications, issued in monthly or quarterly parts: and in the mean time recommend the use of the Lesson leaves for the children of our Church, senior and junior, in use at present (Address box 2502, Toronto, Ont.), in conjunction with *Sinclair's Notes on the Church Catechism*, and the *Church Catechism broken into short questions*, respectively; together with some primary lesson paper in conjunction with the *Calvary Catechism* for infant classes.

4th. To provide for the institution of new schools in small parishes and rural districts that are now destitute of schools.

With regard to this, the Committee would recommend :—

1. That the Rural Deans and other Clergy be urged to use every effort towards the accomplishment of this object.

2. That the Superintendents of such schools, when instituted, be referred to the list of Sunday School requisites recommended by the Committee. (Address E. A. Taylor, London, Ont.)

Report of Sunday School Teachers' Examination Committee.

The Rev. Canon Innes presented and read the report of the Sunday School Teachers' Examination Committee, as follows:—

Having been appointed by the Sunday School Committee a sub-committee to prepare the questions for the examination of Sunday School Teachers, and to examine and decide upon the relative merits of the papers, we beg to present the following report: The questions, having been prepared with great care, were placed in the hands of a reliable printer, and by us forwarded to those clergymen who had previously signified in writing that one or more of their teachers desired to compete for the prizes. These brethren were advised that the examination papers were not to be opened, except in the presence of the candidates, and on the day fixed for examination—that the competition was to be commenced and concluded on the same day and at the same hour throughout the Diocese, and the answers folded and sealed in the examination room in the presence of the candidates, and forwarded at once. We believe that these directions were in all cases adhered to. Eighteen papers were received. The full value of the papers was fixed at 125 marks, each question in proportion to its character. The highest number of marks obtained was 99, and descended as low as 15.

The following remarks of the Right Rev. Bishop [Alford, the Chairman of the Examining Board are worthy of careful attention:

"There is considerable ability in the case of some of the candidates, but in all that ability needs cultivation; and if another year the clergy should form their teachers into classes, and study the subject with them, and exercise them in replying to given questions by setting them examination papers, and correcting their replies, I am sure a very great improvement will be apparent; moreover the character of the teaching in the Sunday School lesson will become distinct and accurate. The examination papers under the head of 'Notes of lesson' show scarcely any knowledge of professional teaching. It would be a great gain to the schools to lead the teachers (according to Eugene Stock's admirable lessons, which might be studied as models) systematically to arrange their lessons, and so present their teaching graphically and orderly to the class."

Your sub-committee thought it best to confine the awards to three—first prize, \$20; second, \$15; third, \$10—thus making the prizes worth competing for.

Presentation of Prizes.

The Lord Bishop presented, through their respective pastors, the prizes awarded to the successful S. S. teachers in the recent examination.

Minutes Signed.

The Secretaries' notes of the day's business were read by the Clerical Secretary, and being confirmed by the Synod, were signed by the Chairman.

The Bishop then rose to dismiss the Synod, and addressed them as follows:—

BELOVED BRETHREN,—Before dismissing you at the close of another Synod, and while thanking you sincerely for your hearty co-operation and support in our Diocesan work, and in this legislative hall, permit me to offer you a word of counsel, as you leave for your respective homes and fields of labor. First, and above all things else, let me entreat you to aim at raising the standard of personal holiness. This is the secret of ministerial influence and success. Apart from this, human wisdom, ability or eloquence are of little or no avail. Court earnestly, if you will, the best gifts, but still there is "a more excellent way." Grace is more than gifts. As the standard of our own spiritual life is raised, we shall be stronger and stronger for the work which lies before us.

To this end I need not observe how necessary it is to secure time for prayer and meditation and the study of God's Word.

My next counsel is, do all in your power to advance the mission cause of the beloved Master. In this important work all, both clergy and laity, can aid by means, by influence, by example and by prayer.

Let me entreat you to cultivate to the utmost a spirit of brotherly union. In the presence of the common enemy—irreligion, ignorance, vice, infidelity and intemperance—is it not a time to lay aside all hatred and prejudice and whatever else may hinder us from godly union and concord? I thank God for that brotherly union which has ever characterized this Diocese, and which, no doubt, under God, has tended so largely to the successful results of our labors here; but I want to see this brotherly union not only continued but deepened by the power of the Holy Spirit.

And now, beloved brethren, one word more. For a season we depart, some of us, probably, never to meet again at a similar session. We go to resume our wonted duties in that part of the vineyard in which Christ has appointed us severally to labor. May we go with an increased sense of the magnitude and responsibility of our work, with fixed resolve to apply ourselves with redoubled energy to the fulfilment of the task which God has given us to perform. For myself suffer me to say, I long to be more and more your

fellow-helper by prayer, by counsel, and by sharing, so far as it may be permitted to me, in all your efforts for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. Ours is a glorious embassy; to be the torch bearers of light to a dark world; the messengers of pardon to the guilty; peace to the troubled conscience; salvation to a world lying in ruins. The work is indeed one of incomparable difficulty, but we are not left alone in its execution. Our sufficiency is of God. The presence of the Redeemer is never wanting to His faithful servants. "Lo, I am with you alway," is the unchanging, precious promise given to His faithful followers. The same grace which made apostles valiant in faith even when confronted by opposing forces; the same divine aid which upheld the noble army of martyrs and sustained confessors amidst the tortures of the flames is freely offered to each one amongst ourselves. Let us be faithful and diligent while the time lasts. "The night cometh when no man can work." It needs no prophetic insight to perceive tokens of a coming consummation. In the stir of upheaving of nations and systems; in the development of anti-Christian heresy; in the march of infidelity; we may almost hear the distant sound of the chariot wheels of the Son of Man returning in glory to judge the world. Yet a little while, and the long-delayed, long-expected Advent will come. The Chief Shepherd will appear, and we, if we have been faithful to the trust confided to our keeping, shall share His triumph and receive the welcome of the Master, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

The Bishop then pronounced the Benediction, and adjourned the Synod at 1 p. m.

Annual Diocesan Missionary Meeting.

The Annual Missionary Meeting of the Diocese of Huron was held in St. Paul's Church, London, on Wednesday evening, June 22nd, 1881, at 8 p.m.

His Lordship the Bishop of Huron in the Chair.

On the platform were seated Very Rev. Dean Boomer, Revs. Canon Innes, W. F. Campbell, F. Courtney, of Chicago, and Messrs. H. J. Eberts, of Chatham, and V. Cronyn.

The meeting was opened by singing "The Church's One Foundation." After which, prayer was offered by Rev. Canon Innes.

His Lordship congratulated his hearers that they were once more permitted to assemble on the occasion of their annual missionary meeting. He confessed that he had no words to give expression to his feelings of gratitude to Almighty God for the manner in which He had blessed the efforts to extend His kingdom. If time permitted he could interest those present with facts concerning the growth of the Diocese, under God's blessing, making it one of the foremost in the Dominion for work and fruitful efforts for Christ. The clergymen had been trebled in numbers since the separation from the Toronto Diocese, and the same increase applied to the various funds. The chief object, however, of missionary gatherings was not only to speak of what God had done, but to awaken a deeper missionary spirit, and learn to concentrate our united forces to carry on the blessed work of preaching the Gospel to every creature. This Diocese was bound not only to do this, but to sustain that spirit which had brought martyrdom to so many of the Church's early advocates. The light which had now burned for three centuries, he trusted, would grow in brightness until the very darkest corner had been penetrated. Not only in foreign fields was labor requisite, but in our own Northwest, where there remained much to be done. He would now call upon

Mr. H. J. Eberts, of Chatham, who stated that he was a layman speaking to the laity, and was present at the Synod as a representative of the laity who had assisted in bringing the Diocese to such a high state of perfection. But great as had been the success, the more was to be looked for as the result of united effort. The great hindrance lay in inherent selfishness on the part of the laity. And this was of two forms—one, illiberality, or stinginess, and the other, congregationalism. This spirit, especially in the more wealthy congregations, was the great hindrance to the mission cause, and if all would come out from themselves and learn a wider breadth for charity, working shoulder to shoulder, the Diocese would soon be in such a position that not a single family in it would be without the privileges enjoyed by those in better circumstances. The speaker then paid a warm tribute to the work of Rev. Mr. Campbell, the indefatigable agent of the Mission cause. Rev. Mr. Courtney had said that all were not given talents alike, and surely Mr. Campbell had a peculiar talent for the work which the Standing Committee had assigned him to do. In speaking of His Lordship's labors to extend the mission work of the Church, Mr. Eberts expressed the belief that the laity would cheerfully support him.

Rev. W. F. Campbell, Missionary Agent for the Diocese, then pointed out that every Christian people have a special mission, some special part of the world to which their attention should be directed, and our great object should be to

find out where that special mission is, because then we can have the help of God in carrying out our work, and he would desire to remind them that the rapidly-growing settlements throughout our own Northwest Territories and the spiritual destitution which there exists, and the utter impossibility of supplying those wants except through outside help, make a call upon Canadian churchmen, as if God from Heaven by a distinct voice committed that work to our charge. The extent of this enormous North-west Territory is still comparatively unknown. Mr. Campbell dwelt at length upon the nature and extent of our Domestic Mission field, especially upon the work already done by the Bishops of Rupert's Land and Saskatchewan, and forcibly pleaded for a cordial and loyal support of the Central Board of Missions, established by the last Provincial Synod.

The Choir sang the anthem "Plead Thou My Cause," (*Mozart*).

Mr. V. Cronyn, Chancellor of the Diocese, briefly pointed out that the clergyman who had preached so eloquently on the previous day had referred to privileges and responsibility. The remarks were applicable to the present occasion. It was a privilege to carry on the mission work, and at the same time it was a responsibility which the Church could not shirk. From all parts of the Diocese there came the demand for men, and up to the present but very little had been done towards education. The University scheme, developed by the Bishop through many difficulties, was calculated to meet this need.

Rev. F. Courtney, Rector of St. James' Church, Chicago, had a very wide subject to deal with—an address on mission work. When invited to come and speak, he ventured to say that he was at a loss to know what department of missions to take, seeing that there are so many. Digressing for a moment, he spoke of the good which would spring from parochial missions, and trusted they would be established in the Diocese. Looking at the great mission work, however, it had struck him that all successes were not of the same character and at the same rate of speed. In the very first instance, the progress of Christianity was not the same time at different places. On the day of Pentecost three thousand were baptised, and it had been hoped many times that such days would return. Again, in the Acts, a company of five thousand converts were spoken of, and other instances given of rapid and sudden conversion. It had struck him at one time that this had been because the Gospel was new. Was it not this that had moved his hearers in the early days of their conversion? They looked back upon their actions then as being almost fanatical. Peter, and James, and John, when they spoke of the Stranger who came along the Gallilean coast and said "follow Me," could also say that they arose and followed Him. Having a Teacher who spoke to common people and the great with equal acceptance, they were thus able to say "it was us whom He commissioned to preach the Gospel."

Another reason was that the people who preached the Gospel had fervent faith in Christ's speedy return. When St. Paul wrote that consolatory chapter, which has been read so often over the dead, he had included himself among the spoken to. He was always looking for the Heavens to divide and Christ to return, and that was another reason why the Gospel had spread so rapidly. In other countries, where the Reformation began, this principle of newness had worked similar results among those who expected that a great effort was required to gain the desired Life. It had been the same in that curious movement conducted by Moody and Sankey, who had converted hundred and thousands of men—because the news was new to many. Was this the only progress of the Gospel? No. It was sometimes slow. There was St. Paul, who had spoken on one occasion for a long time and opened the heart of but one woman. He had gone through Cyprus, and there very little had been done. Other illustrations were given of the tardy progress of Christianity, and a comparison made with the slowness with which it gained ground in foreign missions where great difficulties lay in the way. The experiences of several noted men, Henry Martin and

others, were related, together with their successes in foreign lands, and the rev. gentleman asked why the progress of the Gospel was so slow? Because only little by little was the heart reached and principles sown. Why, nineteen centuries had been taken up in the abolition of slavery, and the lusts of the flesh had opposed Christianity so much that even now temperance was not general. He met a general assertion of lack of interest in mission work. In the States it had been said that a meeting could be gotten up with a fair attendance for the discussion of almost any subject but missions; and here he had no doubt that there was a feeling that something should be done to first convert the great mass at home. The answer came readily. Christ did not tell the Disciples to remain at Jerusalem, although they were to begin there. In addition to this, those who did not know Jesus themselves could not realize the needs of others in foreign lands. In the olden days there was a monopoly of knowledge, but now it was more widely diffused—though, perhaps, a little thinner. He looked back to father and mother and older people of his early acquaintance who were so devout in their religious convictions; but now, although there was not that depth of piety, there was more of it. A comparison had been drawn in this way:—Our fathers believed they had the truth, and were willing to die for it; we believe we have the truth, but are not willing to die for it. It was alarming to notice the reckless liberality of religious opinion—an unbridled license in religious matters which amounted to a religion for every individual. Thus, when it was said, "Send the Gospel to the heathen," each one wanted his own Gospel to go. The very spread of knowledge, although good in itself, had brought about such questions as "Don't you think Buddhism was an anticipation of Christ? Wouldn't it be better to give them a re-translation of their Bible?" Then, again, in such a pushing, business life as the speaker saw in Chicago, it was said, "Leave us alone; we cannot be very good. What we have to do is to make Chicago the great wonder of the world." When they were approached about missions they—well, they didn't know what it meant. But little was known of the superstition of heathenism, its immorality and depravity. The speaker then drew a graphic picture of the dying millions without a knowledge of the Christian's hope, and passed on to deal with the feeling abroad, that every heathen dying without a knowledge of the Gospel was not lost. On these grounds it was said—"Then let us leave them alone." The intention of Christ, when he gave His mission to the Disciples, was not then carried out. The rev. gentleman concluded an able address with a glowing reference to the comforting influence of the Holy Ghost and the Scriptures; to the fact that the Diocesan resources and work were larger than ever before; and the necessity for every one doing all in his or her power and doing it together.

At the close of the addresses a very liberal collection was taken up, after which the pronouncing of the Benediction brought to a close one of the most successful missionary meetings ever held in the Diocese.

THE ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
STANDING COMMITTEE of the INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE of HURON
For the Year Ending March 31, 1881.
(Being the Seventh under the Synod Act of Incorporation.)

In presenting their Annual Report of the results of the past year, the Committee rejoice that they can satisfactorily assure the members of the Synod of the marked progress of the work committed to their charge.

The increase of support and co-operation from the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, for both Home and Foreign Mission work, gives renewed encouragement, and acts as an additional incentive to their exertions in the very best of causes, and calls forth their heartfelt gratitude to Him who is "the author and giver of every good and perfect gift." To Him, therefore, they would give all the praise and the glory for the continued prosperity He has been pleased to vouchsafe to their humble endeavors to help forward the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

DIOCESAN INCOME.

The Committee have much pleasure in reporting a large increase for the past year. The income derived from the voluntary contributions of the Diocese, amounted to \$15007.86, being an increase of \$1707.61 over the previous year's income, which, it will be remembered, was then reported as being the largest received since the formation of the Diocese. It may be necessary to explain, for the benefit of those who are not thoroughly acquainted with our system of working, that the above mentioned income of \$15007.86 does not include interest on the invested capital of the various funds or grants from the English Societies.

While the Committee rejoice at this successful result of the year's work, they are convinced that this is but an earnest of what the Church in this Diocese is capable of doing; and they confidently expect that, with God's blessing and the hearty and united prayerful work of the members of the Church, the annual contributions will continue to increase year after year.

CANADIAN MISSION BOARDS.

At the last meeting of the Provincial Synod in 1880, Boards of Missions for the whole Ecclesiastical Province were formed to further the interests of the Church in her various operations outside the limits of the respective Dioceses composing the Provincial Synod.

The work was divided into two departments—Foreign and Domestic—the former being confined to Church work beyond the limits of the Dominion, and the latter comprising all work not purely Diocesan, such as the North-west Territories, Rupert's Land, Manitoba, Algoma, Sabrevois Mission, etc.

Large Committees have been formed to take charge of each department in the several Dioceses, and the work is being carried on vigorously.

The Standing Committee anticipate the hearty co-operation of the Synod in the work of these Boards, and they especially request that all contributions to these objects may be sent through the Synod office, so that a proper record may be kept in our journals of what the Diocese, as a whole, is contributing for the

promotion and extension of Christ's Kingdom, beyond its own Diocesan limits.

In accordance with the above organization, the Committee have this year reported on these three branches of Missionary work—Diocesan, Foreign and Domestic.

DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The amount received for this work during the past year was \$10,373.35, being an increase of \$577.77 over the previous year.

The arduous work of the Missionary meetings has been most ably and successfully carried on by the Missionary agent, Rev. W. F. Campbell; and the Committee feel that, under God, much of the last year's continued progress has been due to the energetic and systematic method adopted by Rev. Mr. Campbell in his work.

Two hundred and fifteen meetings were held, and the attendance has been very large.

The Committee rejoice to learn that the Clergy and Laity have so cordially assisted the Missionary Agent in his difficult work.

The expenditure of the past year for Missionary salaries was \$17,286.61, a large increase over former years.

The services of the Church are still fully maintained in our Indian Missions.

There is a balance on hand of \$648.77 to be distributed for the Children's Fund, according to the amendment to the Mission Fund Canon passed last year.

There is now at the disposal of the Synod for Domestic Missions the sum of \$718.69, being one-half of the proceeds of the annual missionary meetings held during the past year; and the sum also of \$486.48, being the balance in hand at the credit of the thanksgiving collection account.

The Committee further recommend that in future the collections made on the Day of Intercession be devoted to Foreign Missions exclusively; and that the half of the collections at the annual meetings be given to Domestic Missions in Algoma and the North-west (including Manitoba and Rupert's Land), the amounts to be apportioned each year by vote of Synod.

REVIEW OF THE PAST YEAR'S MISSIONARY WORK.

A review of the contributions for the past year will show that the large sum of \$12,720.32 has been received for the promotion of Church Missionary work alone, being an increase of \$1518.01 over the previous year's receipts for similar objects:—

The Committee feel pleasure in submitting the above as an evidence of the vitality of the Church, and the continued progress and prosperity of the Diocese at large.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The quarterly collections were \$1051.02, being \$49.08 in excess of the previous year.

During the year 21 widows received pensions from this Fund, amounting in the aggregate to \$4220.

The sum of \$850 was added to the capital account, which has now a total of \$56,129.75.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The amount paid during the year was \$3325.06.

Ten Clergymen received pensions during the year, and there are now eleven on the pension list.

HURON COLLEGE.

The Good Friday collections, so far as received, amounted to \$448.46.

The Committee recommend that the proceeds of this collection be placed at the disposal of the Bishop, to distribute in accordance with the pastoral. The Committee have every reason to believe that a hearty response will be made each year to this praiseworthy attempt to promote the welfare of those studying for Holy Orders, for whose benefit this appeal has been made.

REV. J. T. WRIGHT.

At the meeting of the Standing Committee, held in March, 1881, the Commissary Bishop Alford in the Chair, the Sec.-Treasurer reported that he had been served with a Bill in Chancery, at the instance of the Rev. J. T. Wright, and that he had placed the matter at once in the hands of the Chancellor, and had taken all the means in his power to protect the interests of the Synod.

The Commissary requested the Chancellor to give them some information respecting the case.

The Chancellor explained briefly the history of the Commutation Fund, and the award that was made between the two Dioceses of Toronto and Huron; he also gave to the Committee a statement of the charges made by Mr. Wright in his bill, and of the answer which had been prepared in reply thereto.

After some further explanation and discussion, it was moved by Judge McMahon, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Davis,

Resolved—That having been informed by the Sec.-Treas. that the Rev. J. T. Wright, a Missionary Clergyman of this Diocese, has filed a Bill in Chancery against the Synod, to set aside the award made over twenty years ago between the Dioceses of Toronto and Huron, whereby certain securities were given to this Diocese in trust for the Clergy Commutation Fund and the Episcopal and Archdeacons' Fund, and also to set aside the Canons of the Synod passed in relation thereto, especially those passed in the sessions of 1875 and 1876; and having heard the statement of the Chancellor of the Diocese respecting the said Bill, the Standing Committee hereby approves of the action taken by the Chancellor and the Sec.-Treas. to defend the said suit.

This resolution was carried unanimously by a standing vote, every member voting.

At the meeting of the Standing Committee, held June 20, 1881,

On motion of Judge McMahon, seconded by Mr. Wm. Grey,

A vote of censure was unanimously passed on the conduct of the Rev. Joel T. Wright, in filing a Bill in Chancery against the Synod, without first having brought the matter in question before the properly constituted tribunals of the Church, which motion is recorded in the minutes of the Standing Committee, and was added to their annual report.

ACCOUNTS.

The printed audited accounts shew, as usual, the position of the various Funds. All of which is respectfully submitted.

COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

From each Rural Deanery, appointed by the Bishop under Canon 24, Section 5.

5. To carry out the above plans and objects, there shall be appointed annually by the Bishop, during the session of the Synod, for each Rural Deanery, two Clergymen and two Laymen, being Communicants, who, with the Archdeacon and Rural Dean of the locality, shall constitute a *Committee on Missions for that Rural Deanery*, of which Committee the Archdeacon or Rural Dean and any two appointed members shall form a quorum. The Rural Dean shall be the Convener; and the Archdeacon, or in his absence the Rural Dean, the Chairman.
