## Shall We Be Laggards?

(B. C. Province.)

The story of the survivors of the Newfoundland disaster is an epic of the toilers of the sea which reminds the reader of Captain Scott's struggle back from the South Pole. There, off the Island of Fogo, about 160 miles north west of St. John's, was the great game played out once more. The same elements which destroyed Captain Scott destroyed over fifty of such men as he would have loved. As he and his four comrades stood by each other to the end, so over 100 of these Newfoundland fishermen stood together, fighting for each other the last grim battle with death. Captain Scott had to go eleven more miles to reach his next depot. These fishermen had to go ten miles to reach their ship. They faced the storm and a peril they knew full well and staked their lives against nature. Nature fought for her prey and grasped them one by one. A few hours more and none would have lived to tell the tale. Those who survived came out of the jaws of hell and only one of all that gallant company seems to have come through unscathed.

It is possible now to picture that last march. Apparently about 170 men left the herd of seals to make their way to the Newfoundland, which was ten miles away. The other men working on the same pan were nearer their ships when the storm broke and reached safety. Out of the 170 about fifty of the Newfoundland's crew found their ship after battling their way through the storm. The rest lost their way. Night came down and the storm grew worse. Snow and a freezing wind lashed their bodies, open water spaces between the ice floes trapped their feet. They had no food, and shelter there was none on that stricken icefield. For the next thirty six hours they

struggled to keep moving was their only chance and the stronger helped the weaker. They stood by each other to the end. While life flickered in the body of a comrade they fed the flame with their own vitality. When it died, they turned to help others who have never fought such fights, true realization of that march is impossible. Dearly we may imagine the terrors of that struggle, but physically we can not understand its horror, any more than most of us could even attempt it. At first to those men it was a commonplace of their existence. At last it was only one more tragedy of their calling. Scores of them have died singly or in twos or threes under similar circumstances before—this time death took them wholesale. Yet not one flinched. Whatever they felt they kept to themselves. They chafed each other on and even when sanity forsok some, the others would not let them fall out and die. If the strongest had held together and let the weaker die they might have saved themselves much agony. But that is not the way of these Newfoundland fishermen. They share their good luck and bad together—always together.

It is a magnificent story of heroism of which we may well be proud. It is a fine thing to know that there are men left in the world who can live and die like this. Civilization as we know it is a poor thing compared to the primitive way of life as led by such men. Madness struck many of them, but never panic. Exhausted, tortured almost beyond human endurance, they fought on not for their own lives but each for his comrades. Who can tell of the simple heroism

of those men struggling on hour after hour, when to lie down and die was after all the easiest way out. It needed real courage to keep on and by so doing help others to do the same thing. Face to face with death may make life seem a precious thing and well worth a great struggle, but these men fought not only for their own lives but the lives of their comrades. And thus out of the gloom caused by this disaster there breaks the glory of self sacrifice. What those men did for their comrades surely we, who live in security and comparative ease, can do for the women and children who have suffered such grievous loss. These simple fishermen were ready to give their lives—may save of their own vitality and health to succor their comrades. We are asked to give material help which at most means perhaps some small sacrifice on our part. Shall we be laggards with such an example before us?

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## "The Church Fallen and Restored"

A very interesting though necessarily brief outline of the history of the Church was given by Elder Young last Sunday night, which he endeavored to prove that the mere banishing by any denomination of its antiquity was by no means evidence that it is the true Church. He maintained that those who proclaim and practice the great truths sustained by the Apostles constitute the Church of Jesus Christ. This, the speaker said, agrees with John 16:14. Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you.

Accordingly, Elder Young laid down some of the plain doctrines of the Bible fundamental to true religion, such as The Mediation of Justification by Faith, State of the Dead, the Sabbath, etc., and showed by the citation of many texts that these were held by the Apostolic Church.

That the Church was early on concentered with men speaking reverent things, substituting truth with error, was proven from Acts 20: 29, 30; 2 Thess. 5: 3-7, the latter being a prophecy of a falling away from the standard set by Christ and the Apostles. Mr. Young showed how fully this prophecy was fulfilled in the history of the Church as evidenced by the most eminent and reliable of church historians. It was during this spiritual decadence that one after another of the doctrines of Holy Writ became the object of Satan's attack until all were trampled under foot and supplanted by traditions of human invention. This, said Mr. Young, was what necessitated the Reformation. Men with hearts fired with zeal and devotion determined to restore to the world that imperishable treasure, the Bible. With the restoration and study of the Bible, truths long buried were again unearthed and the children of God began again to trace the old paths of the Apostles and prophets.

That the Reformation was not completed in the 16th century was very evident from the speaker's remarks. He honored the work of the Wesley's and others of recent years whose fidelity to God made them the target for insult and abuse. Mr. Young said that a message of reform is due this generation which will embrace and declare all the truths of the Apostolic Church, not excepting the Sabbath of the 4th commandment.

The Adventists profess to have this reform message which proclaims a restitution of all things spoken by the Holy Prophets, and maintain that when it is given to the world Christ will come, Acts 3: 19-21. That they have advanced light on the Bible cannot well be denied, and that there is an investigation on the part of the people is evidenced by these services.

Public Notice

The following sections of Chapter 26 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished or posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest in the first instance on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

- Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts
- Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 30 cts
- Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 cts
- Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 - 40 cts
- Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 cts
- Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 - 50 cts

## Christian Socialism To-day

By R. H. MERCER.

(Continued.)

SECONDLY, Socialism would fail because government is corrupt to-day, and would be more so if it controlled all things.

To this objection by the anti-Socialists the reply is that the cause of corruption today is the fact that the power of money is amassed in a few private hands.

THIRDLY, Where is the capital to come from? From where it comes to-day, from the workers.

Then, lastly, Is not Socialism contrary to Individuality? Does not the pushing for number one that we have today, whatever of evil it may entail, at least develop character, self reliance, personal power—moral results that vastly more than counterbalance any of the possible material good results of Socialism. This is, indeed, the weightiest fear men have of Socialism.

Herbert Spencer thinks that Socialism is coming, and calls it 'the coming Slavery.' People read 'Looking Backward,' and find in it a striking picture of an ideal state, but they think it lacks in life, variety, personality, and they say: 'In place of that dead monotony, give me, with all its drawbacks, the life, and push, and dignity of the nineteenth century.'

This is of infinite moment. If the objections are valid, let Socialism perish. No material gains can come

## Boys' Brigade Founder Dead

London, May 10.—Sir William Alexander Smith, founder of the Boys' brigade, died here to-day. Sir William Alexander Smith was born in Thurso, Caithness, Scotland, in 1831. He was educated at the academy there and entered the First Leinstershire rifle volunteers in 1854. He retired from this regiment as honorary colonel in 1908. Sir William founded the Boys' brigade in 1883, and visited the brigade of Canada as the guest of the Earl of Aberdeen, governor-general, in 1895. He also commanded the parade of 10,000 boys before Prince Arthur of Connaught on the semi-jubilee of the brigade at Glasgow in 1908.

## for the loss of personal character.

'But is the objection valid,' asks the Christian Socialist. As for 'Looking Backward,' it pretends to be only a fanciful picture of the social state; it aims simply to awaken thought; to give people an idea of Socialism in the concrete. It probably does that work better than any book yet. But it makes no attempt to present the life and personality that would attend Socialism.

The struggle for existence has ever taken higher and higher forms. Once with modest weapons or with naked hands, later with poisoned arrows or with hurling spears, men fought for existence. Today men fight, not with physical weapons, not with poisoned arrows, but with poisoned groceries, with business sharpness, and with trick of trade, they struggle to make money. The struggle for existence ceases not, it simply assumes a higher and less material form.

Socialism would not end the strife, but simply lift it up one grade higher; men would contend not for money but for attainments in the Arts, in Science, in Learning in Character. (O learned judge.) And in every grade the struggle for existence has produced individuality according to the nature of the struggle.

Early warfare produced the giant, the physical individuality; later warfare the consummate general, or the skilled warrior, an Alexander, a Richard Cour de Lion. Business competition today produces a Bushchild, a Jay Gould. Struggles for higher aims under Socialism will produce a nobler individuality. This is one of the greatest fallacies of Socialism. We shall have a renaissance in Art, a revival of Learning, a reformation of Religion. This is the law of evolution. What a fool Darwin was that he didn't discover in Socialism the missing link.

Professor Edward Caird has warned us against being carried away by either Socialism or Individualism. He says that those so carried away 'will never do much good in building up the future. They will simply be parts of that mob which is always carried away by the popular abstraction, and cries out today for social unity, as a century ago it cried out for individual liberty.'



(Continued from page 2) in his short line route, and now proposed to attempt a modified scheme, for which he had formed a Company in London. That Company now asked certain concessions in the way of land for a railway line and for terminals, and these it was proposed to give them, to become theirs if and when the proposed railway was built and not otherwise. If they did succeed in establishing themselves it would be of the greatest benefit to the Colony and well worth what we were offering them. If they did not we had lost nothing. The scheme might be considered by some to be impracticable, but modern changes were so rapid that there was no telling whether it was or was not possible. Mr. Thompson had in this case been able to interest one or two people of means in England and Scotland. The Committee rose, reported progress and asked leave to sit again on Monday. The Premier gave notice of a bill relating to Municipal Affairs. The House then adjourned till Monday at 3 p.m. (To be Continued.) Capt. J. Winsor, of Wesleyville, was a visitor to Bay Roberts on Thursday. We learn that Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Whiteway, of St. John's, who formerly had charge of the staff house for the Dominion Coal and Steel Co., Bell Island, will manage the staff house for the Western Union Co. here.

A number of citizens worked hard, while others it is said, stood back and looked on, while they watched women carrying water. The origin of the fire is unknown. We understand the house and contents were insured. This is another example of the need of a proper fire fighting apparatus, for which the Guardian has been agitating for the past three years.

NOTICE.

The Attention of the Public is Called to the Following Provisions of the Act Respecting Saw Mill, 1914, Namely:—

Sec. 1.—Any bona fide fisherman who wishes to operate a saw mill for the purpose of preparing staves for heading, for making barrels, for fishery requirements, or for the making of shingles, lobster laths, or lobster boxes, whose whole cut of timber for other purposes does not exceed 10,000 feet, board measure, in any one year, may obtain, free of cost, a license to operate a saw mill for such purposes, and any other purposes in such quantity subject to the following conditions:—

(a)—The license may be granted by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines for one year from the 30th November upon the application of the bona fide fisherman as aforesaid, who shall set forth in his application that he is such fisherman, and also the situation of his mill, its capacity, and the period during which it has been in operation. The Minister of Agriculture and Mines may in his discretion, renew the said license annually.

(b)—No person without obtaining a license as hereinbefore provided shall operate a saw mill of the class described in this section after six months from the passing of this Act, under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under said license shall be due and payable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be lawful for the Minister of Agriculture and Mines to issue licenses to persons or companies who are at present operating mills on what is known as the 'Three Mile Limit' and are not the holders of timber or pulp licenses under the Crown Lands Act, to cut timber to operate saw mills for one year from the 30th November, which said license shall be renewable at the discretion of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines on the payment of a fee of Five Dollars. The licensee of any such license shall pay as a royalty the sum of one dollar per thousand feet, board measure, on all lumber sawn or manufactured in the mill operated under authority thereof.

(c)—Application for such license shall be made to the Minister of Agriculture and Mines accompanied by fee of Five Dollars, and before the issue of such license the Minister of Agriculture and Mines shall cause to be published for a period of thirty days, by affixing the same at a Post Office or other public building in the neighbourhood of the situation of the mill proposed to be operated under such license, a notice setting forth the fact that such license has been applied for.

(d)—No person not being the holder of a timber or pulp license under the Crown Lands Act shall, without the issue of a license as in this Act provided, operate after one month after the passing of this Act a Saw Mill for the manufacture of timber cut on Crown land under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under such license shall be due and payable.

Sec. 4.—The Governor in Council may when it shall be made to appear to him to be for the interest of the Colony by proclamation to be published in the Royal Gazette, prevent the ridding of growing or standing trees on the public lands of the Colony or portion of the same, or lands held under license, lease or grant, for the purpose of taking away the rinds of the said trees for any purpose whatever.

Sec. 5.—The penalty for the infraction of any of the provisions and conditions of this Act, where such penalty has not been fixed by any preceding section of this Act, or by the Crown Lands Act, shall be a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each infraction thereof. All penalties under this Act may be sued for in the name of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace by any Timber Inspector or other person authorized by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines.
