

The following are the objects for which the General Assen:bly appoints collections annually through the Church:

1. Home Missions.—The Home Mission field of the Church

extends from Newfoundland to the Pacific Ocean.

For purposes of administration it is divided into two sections. Eastern and Western. In the Eastern Section (embracing the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland) there are 45 Mission Fields and 170 Preaching Stations. In the Western Section (with Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, and North West Territories and British Columbia) there are 276 Mission Fields and 820 Preaching Stations, making in all 321 Mission Fields and 990 Preaching Stations where work has been carried on during the past year.

The total expenditure on the part of the Church in support of these fields was \$66,475. The amount contributed by the Mission Stations themselves was \$65,739. The amounts asked for the current year are: For the Eastern Section, \$12,000:

for the Western \$55,000. Total, \$67,000.

2. Augmentation of Stipends.—The aim of the General Assembly is to secure to each settled minister a stipend of at least \$750 per annum with a manse. Congregations receiving aid from this fund are required to contribute for the support of their ministers at the rate of at least \$4.50 per communicant. As a matter of fact they contribute in very-many instances at a much higher rate. In 1883 there were 256 congregations giving less than \$750 and manse. While 100 weak congregations have been added to this list during the past seven years, no fewer than 216 have been removed, of which 174 have become self-sustaining. There are at present 137 congregations on the augmented list. The amounts asked for this fund for the current year are: For the Eastern Section, \$9,000. For the Western, \$30,000. Total, \$39,000.

3. Foreign Missions.—Six fields are occupied by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, (1) among the Indians in the North-West; (2) in Fornosa; (3) in Honan; (4) in Central India: (5) in the New Hebrides; (6) in Trinidad. The amount required for the current year for the prosecution of the work in

these fields is \$118,000.

4. French Evangelization.—Missionaries, colporteurs and teachers are employed, under the direction of the General Assembly's Board, in spreading the light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ amongst the French-Canadians. The school at Pointeaux-Trembles and Coligny College at Ottawa are well-conducted educational institutions. The amount asked for the current year is \$70,000.

5. Colleges —While the Theological Colleges are looking forward to permanent endowment, none of them has yet reached the stage at which the assistance of the Church to meet annual outlay can be dispensed with. The estimated requirements for the current year are: For Knox, Queen's and Montreal Colleges, \$15.200; for Manitoba College, \$10,000; for Halifax and Morrin Colleges, \$10,000; in all, \$35,200.

6. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—The highest annuity which the present contributions of the Church allow to be paid is only \$200 per annum. An effort is being made to secure an Endowment Fund of \$200,000 in order to increase the annuities to \$300 or \$400. The number of beneficiaries is \$6, and in very many cases these aged brethren have had exceedingly small stipends during their ministry. The arrount required for the current year to enable the committee to pay the insignificant annuity is \$18,000.

MANAGERS' REPORT for 1890.

The Board of Managers in submitting their annual report gratefully acknowledge the blessing of God upon the financial affairs of the Congregation during the past year.

The Treasurer received the following amounts, loose collections, \$1,023.12, offerings per envelope \$3,674.41, total \$4,697.53, an increase of \$315.38 over that of 1889.

The figures used in this comparison do not include any

The Treasurer of the Building Fund received from all sources special collections. the sum of \$368.50, a decrease as compared with 1889 of \$1,722.55. But it will be remembered that a special effort was made towards the close of 1889 on behalf of the Building Fund. The r. sult of that effort was cash subscriptions amounting to \$1,000.00. The total receipts of the Congregation for 1890 from the decrease of \$354.15. General Revenue and Building Funds combined were \$5,066.03, and the total expenditure was \$4,822.66, leaving a balance of \$243.37, of this balance the sum of \$195.96 has been applied in

The average collection per Sabbath was \$97.42. reducing the debt. 740 members in the Congregation; the average contribution per member for the year was \$6.84.

gat app sta sat There is still a good deal of irregularity in the envelope system. There are 266names on the offering book, yet there was only an average of 165 envelopes received per Sabbath.

The Board early in the year decided that in order to simplify the financial affairs of the Congregation, it would be wise to unite the General Revenue and Building Funds in one, to be known as the General Revenue Fund. The Congregation was consulted and found almost unanimous in favor of the plan which was partly acted upon during the last half of the year. Should it be further endorsed at the Annual Meeting it can be carried out in full during the present year. It might here again be stated that the plan is for each contributor to the Building Fund to increase his or her weekly offering enough to make up amount of yearly contribution, for instance a member giving \$10 per year to the Building Fund would increase their weekly offering twenty cents.

At the meeting of the Board held in May last, a deputation from the Young People's Association was present and informed the Board that their Society was willing to become responsible for the erection of a pipe organ in the Church, at a cost of \$3,000.00, provided the managers would agree to negotiate the necessary loan, the Young People's Association to furnish the

The Board decided to accept the offer of the Young People and as all are aware the organ has since been erected. The Board confidently hope that the organ will be the means of increased interest in attendance at the Sabbath services and thus materially benefit our weekly offerings.

In concluding this report the Managers feel that as a Congregation we have every reason to be thankful that the balance appears on the right side, and it is earnestly hoped that the statement laid before you at the close of 1891 may be still more satisfactory.

REPORT OF BIBLE CLASS.

ATTENDANCE AND COLLECTIONS FOR 1890.

The total attendance of the class for the year was 2197, an increase over the preceding year of 530. The largest attendance was on the 30th November, 67 present. The smallest attendance was on January 12th, 24 present. The average attendance during the year per Sabbath was 46 members.

The total collections of the class for the year were \$79.25, or an average of per Sabbath for the year of \$1.53, or a little over 31/2 cents per member per Sabbath. The largest collection was on the 4th May, \$4.65, and the smallest on August 17th of 60 cents. Of these collections \$15.55, the collections of the last Sabbath of each month, goes to the furnishing fund for a new class room. The balance, \$63.70, goes to whatever schemes the class wishes.

Notwithstanding the dulness of commerce in general and the prevalence of "La Grippe" at the beginning of the year, the amount contributed was more than anticipated. The aggregate amount received by the Association was \$756.26 against \$632.64 of last year, which shows an increase of \$123.62 for the year. We have now on hand for missionary purposes the sum of \$459. It must be remembered, too, that we had a special collection by envelope to the amount of \$64.64 in 1889 which we did not have for 1890. Taking everything into consideration the Association has done remarkably well.

Since presenting last year's report this society has undergone a radical change in its formation. 


