In the absence of the Grand Junior Warden, Patriarch G. B. Rush, the M. W. Grand Patriarch appointed the Grand Marshal, Patriarch Jos. Oliver, of Toronto, to fill his place, and Patriarch J. M. Reynett, of Stratford, as Grand Marshal.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE M. W. GRAND PATRIARCH.

TO THE OFFICERS'AND MEMBERS OF THE R. W. GRAND EN-CAMPMENT, I. O. O. F., OF ONTARIO:

PATRIARCHS.—Our tent has been once more pitched within the bounds of this beautiful and prosperous Queen City of Ontario, which has been rendered ever memorable in the History of Oddfellowship in Ontario, by being the only city beyond the boundaries of the United States in which the Supreme Parliament of our order, the Sovereign Grand Lodge, has Eyer assembled. I am sure you will all agree with me, that this event has done much to bring our order prominently before the public, awaken additional interest among our members, and lead them to form resolutions and put forth vigorous efforts to keep it foremost among the societies that have for their object the alleviation of human distress and the promotion of peace, good-will and fraternity among mankind.

PATRIARCHS I extend to each and every one of You present at this our thirteenth annual session, a fraternal and hearty greeting. We have met to review the work of the past year, to correct the errors of former legislation and form plans and adopt such legislation as you, in your capacities of representatives of the various subordinate Encampments throughout our jurisdiction, may in your wisdom consider best calculated to promote the interest and well-being of our beloved order. has now arrived when I must render an account of the trust which you, a year ago, so generously confided to my keeping. It is with much pleasure that I now, in compliance with constitutional usage, submit for your consideration the following report:

#### GRAND PATRIARCH'S ADDRESS.

As the subordinate Encampments are now so numerous and so widely scattered over our jurisdiction, I regret that it was impossible for me, owing to the innumerable demands upon my time, to visit them all. I therefore issued an address to the officers and members of the subordinate Encampments of Ontario (dated Sept. 10th, 1881), extending to all, as head of the order, a fraternal greeting, and urging each and every one to do all in his power to increase our membership and preserve peace and harmony within our borders.

A copy of the address is herewith submitted :

# NEW ENCAMPMENTS.

I am pleased to be able to report that during the year one new Encampment has been added to our number.

On the 3rd of May, 1882, I instituted Ridgely Encampment No. 52, at Jarvis, with seven charter members. On this occasion I was ably assisted by J. C. Boligan, D. D. G. P.; John H. McCabe, C. P., of Royal

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Encampment of Uniformed Patriarchs No. 36; Samuel Thorne, P. C. P., and Patriarchs O. S. Hillman, G. E. Lawson, S. G. Troble, S. G. Wright, all of Hamilton.

This Encampment should receive support from several Lodges and there is reason to believe that it will do well. I would recommend that a charter be granted to it.

# MONTREAL ENCAMPMENT, No. 1, MONTREAL.

At the last meeting of this Grand Encampment the M. W. Grand Patriarch recommended that an extension of time be granted Montreal Encampment during which to re-open.

I am happy to be able to report that this Encampment has taken a new start. I appointed Alexander Allen Murphy, D. D. G. P., and I am pleased to say that this Brother has taken a deep interest in the Encamps ment. Returns were received early in the year and work was resumed with very satisfactory results during the past term, and very encouraging prospects for the future of the Encampment branch of our order in Montreal.

#### BOOK OF LAWS, I. O. O. F., 1882.

In October, 1881, I received a communication from Bro. C. L. T. Campbell, Grand Representative, Chairman of the Special Committee appointed by the Grand Lodge, at its last session, to prepare and publish the Constitution and Laws of the Order in Ontario, asking if I thought it would be advisable to have the Constitution, laws and decisions of the Patriarchal branch of the Order inserted in the work, and if thought ad-Visable to do so, that the Grand Encampment bear a portion of the expenses. I quite agreed with the suggestion, believing that such a work would supply a want long felt, and be extremely useful to, and much sought after, by members of our Order in their efforts to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with our laws and judicial decisions. I would therefore, recommend that as our proportion of the cost of publication this Grand Encampment purchase 200 copies at the cost price (30c. each,) and that they be placed among its stores to be sold to the Subordinate Encampments or members thereof.

#### DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

A number of Encampments have applied for dispensations to enable them to confer more than one degree on the same brother at the same meeting. Believing that the convenience of the brothers and the good of the Order would be promoted in so doing, I have granted all that have been applied for.

I also granted dispensations to enable Royal, Adelphian and Toronto Encampments of Uniformed Patriarchs to appear in Uniform in the procession and exhibition of drill in Dundurn Park, Hamilton, on July 1st, 1882.

#### DISPENSATIONS FOR CHANGE OF NAMES.

On the 20th October, 1881, I granted a dispensation authorizing a change of name from "Royal Encampment No. 36, I. O. O. F." to ROYAL ENCAMPMENT, No. 36, UNIFORMED PATRIARCHS, I. O. O. F." and

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on March 8th, 1882, I granted a similar dispensation to authorize "Burlington Encampment No. 7, I. O. O. F." to adopt the name of "Burlington Encampment of Uniformed Patriarchs; No. 7, I.O.O.F.," and would recommend that the Grand Encampment do authorize the necessary amendments to the charters of these Encampments.

AUDITORS.

I have re-appointed as Auditors Patriarchs James Smith and W. D. Riddell, of London. These Patriarchs have discharged the duties of the office in a highly satisfactory manner for several years past.

(8) ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF COURTESIES.

It is with unfeigned pleasure and real gratitude that I acknowledge the fraternal co-operation and kindly assistance extended to me by my brother officers and the members of the Order generally wherever I have met them. I desire to refer particularly to the valuable aid and advice rendered me by our Grand Scribe Dawson. He has been faithful in his advice, prompt in his co-operation, and has afforded me valuable assistance in the discharge of my duties. I also take much pleasure in referring to the valuable assistance and useful instruction given me, from time to time, by Grand Representative John Donogh, Grand Secretary J. B, King, and P. G. P., James Woodyatt, to whom I desire to tender my sincere thanks for their kindness.

VACANCIES FILLED.

Meno Kaufman, D. D. G. P., of Saugeen Valley Encampment, No. 49, having removed from Walkerton, resigned his commission, and on the 29th January, 1882, I appointed Alma Pengelly, P. C. P., D. D. G. P., to fill the vacancy thus created. On March 2nd, 1882, I appointed John Turner, P. C. P., D. D. G. P., for Chatham Encampment, No. 10, to fill the vacancy caused by the removal and resignation of the commission of D. D. G. P. by Patriarch John M. Parsons. I am sure the Order, in their several localities, will sustain a heavy loss by being deprived of the valuable services of these two energetic Patriarchs.

OFFICIAL VISITS.

November 22nd, 1881.—I visited London at the invitation of Adelphian Encampment of Uniformed Patriarchs, No. 38. In addition to the pleasure of meeting the Patriarchs of London, I had the additional pleasure of meeting Bro. J. B. King, Grand Secretary, and our venerable and esteemed brother James Woodyatt, P. G. P., and grand Representative of the Grand Lodge, and our esteemed Grand Scribe M. D. Dawson. I attended, in company with these brothers, the anniversary entertainment of this Encampment, at the Grand Opera-House, which was in every respect a success, yielding the handsome profit of nearly \$200 to be added to the funds of the Encampment. One pleasant feature of the entertainment was the presentation of a P. G. P.'s jewel to Bro. E. R. Robinson, P. G. P. and P. C. P.'s to Bro. E. Beltz, by the Patriarchs, and another was the presentation of a beautiful Banner to the Encampment by two well-known ladies of London. The presentation was made through Bro. James Woodyatt, P. G. P. The members of the Encampment branch in London are deeply interested in the work.

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Friday, May 12th.—I visited Victoria Encampment, No. 25, of Port Hope, accompanied by Bro. J. B. King, Grand Secretary. good attendance of Patriarc s on the occasion. Three Patriarchs were exalted to the Royal Purple Degree during the evening, the work being performed by the Chief Patriarch, B. D. Deering and the other officers of the Encampment, in a manner that gave me very great pleasure to witness. The progress of this Encampment during the past year has been exceptionally great, having increased its membership by over 100 per cent.

July 1st, 1882.—I visited Hamilton at the invitation of Royal Encamp ment of Uniformed Patriarchs, No. 36, to be present at an exhibition of Drill in Dundurn Park. I was cordially received by J. C. Boligan, D. D. G. P., and the energetic and able Chief Patriarch, Jno. H. McCabe, and the other officers and members of the Encampment.

This Encampment has made very rapid progress during the past year by largely increasing its membership, and by becoming proficient in drill. There was a very fine exhibition of Encampment drill during the afternoon by the Rochester Encampment, under Col. Eddy, and by Adelphian, Royal and Toronto Encampments of Uniformed Patriarchs. Such exhibitions are productive of much good by creating an increased interest in the Order.

July 13th, 1882.—I visited Toronto Encampment of Uniformed Patriarchs, No. 8, and was most cordially received by Bro. W. G. Happer; D. D. G. P., and the officers and members of the Encampment.

This Encampment has a large membership, and is in good working condition.

The officers have been very fully accounted with most of the condition. very fully desupied with work during the past term, and have added largely to their numbers. I installed the officers of the Encampment in due form, assisted by D. D. G. P. Happer, and Bro. J. B. King, Grand Secretary, P. C. P., Thomas Colby, P. C. P.; J. Kidd, P. C. P., and A. McGregor, P. C. P.

August 4th, 1882.—I visited Whitby Encampment, No. 13. This Encampment has not been holding meetings regularly for some time, but the Patriarchs have resolved to take a fresh start and are fully determined to succeed. I admitted one brother to the Patriarchal Degree.

#### (11)CORRESPONDENCE.

The correspondence in connection with the Grand Patriarch's office has been very considerable during the past year, and I have done my best, in the circumstances in which I was placed on account of ill health during the winter, to reply to all correspondence requiring answers. It has been at all times a real pleasure to have official intercourse with my brethren, and the kind, courteous and fraternal spirit exhibited by all of them in their communications with me will never be forgotten.

All letters received with copies of replies are herewith submitted.

### DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND PATRIARCHS.

I desire to acknowledge with sincere gratitude the obligations under which I am placed to the District Deputy Grand Patriarchs for the praiseworthy, faithful and zealous manner in which they have discharged their duties—duties which require the combination of rare tact and good judgment, as well as a thorough knowledge of the laws and usages of the Order. I have reports from thirty out of forty-four Deputies, many of these reports being replete with valuable information and useful hints. 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STATE OF THE ORDER. It gives me much pleasure to be able to report that, while a few of the Encampments are in a dormant condition, the Patriarchal branch of the Order in this jurisdiction is, on the whole, in a very satisfactory condition, the net increase in membership for the past year being over 200; the financial condition of the Encampments generally sound, and harmony prevailing throughout the jurisdiction. Nearly all the reports of the District Deputy Grand Patriarchs speak very hopefully of the prospects of increased membership in their several Encampments during the coming year. I sincerely trust that their most sanguine expectations may be more than realized, and that my successor may enjoy a term of unexampled prosperity. (14)

PERMISSION GRANTED.

Iu April, 1882, I received a request from the Recording Secretary of International Lodge, No. 228, I. O. O. F., asking permission for several members of that Lodge to join Mount Vernon Encampment of Buffalo, N. Y. The reasons given were that Buffalo was so convenient to them, and Niagara Falls the nearest Encampment, at such an inconvenient distance, that the expense of attending would be burdensome to them. They also stated their intention of organizing an Encampment at Fort Erie, as soon as they had sufficient members to insure success. I granted their request on behalf of this Grand Encampment.

(15)OUR INDEBTEDNESS TO THE GRAND LODGE.

At the last session of this Grand Body a select committee consisting of the R. W. Grand Patriarch, the R. W. Grand Treasurer, and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, was appointed to confer with the Grand Lodge as to the Finance Committee, was appointed to condition the Grand Lodge. The Committee presented the matter to the Grand Lodge, and that R. Grand Body, I am happy to be able to report, very generously cancelled the debt, leaving this Grand Encampment free from a burden which has been hanging over us for years.

QUESTIONS AND DECISIONS.

Few questions of consequence have been submitted, and generally a reference to the law bearing on the case was all that was necessary.

I, however, submit the following as being of some interest ;-

By H. Bolton, D. D. G. P., of Huron Encampment, No. 28.

Is it right for the same Patriarch to hold the offices of Trustee and Treasurer at the same time?

Answer, -I regarded the holding of both offices by the same Patriarch as being inconsistort with strict propriety, and would recommend that only one of these offices be held by the same Patriarch during the same term.

By Wm. Pierce, N. G., of Gore Lodge, No. 34, Brantford, and formerly a member of Brant Encampment, No. 4, Brantford, some years ago. He was expelled from Gore Lodge, No. 34, and was consequently dropped in Brant Encampment. Subsequently he was re-admitted to the Lodge. Does the re-storation to membership in the Subordinate Lodge restore him to membership in the Encampment?

I answered through H. B. Adams, D. D. G. P., that the action of a Subordinate Lodge reinstating an expelled brother does not reinstate him in his Subordinate Encampment, but that his application must be presented and acted upon in the same manner as in the Subordinate Lodge. (See Proceedings of Sovereign Grand Lodge of 1880, page 8371,)

From Brant Encampment, No. 4, being an appeal to me from the decision of H. B. Adams, D. D. G. P., in the following case:—A Patriarch took the R. P. Degree on the 5th August, 1881. It is held by himself and other members that on the same evening he was appointed 2nd G. of T., that office not having been filled at the commencement of the term. There is no record of this appointment in the minutes of the Encampment, his name was entered on the roll book of officers, and attendance marked present from August 5th to the Is the Patriarch entitled to the honors of the term and end of the term. eligible to be elected J. W.?

I answered that there is no evidence furnished me either from the minutes, by the D. D. G. P. or any officer of the Encampment, that the Patriarch was regularly appointed and installed into the office of Second Guard of Tent, and I must therefore, adjudge that he is not entitled to the honors of the office, and consequently not eligible for election as J. W.

#### (17)UNIFORMED ENCAMPMENTS.

A pleasing feature in the progress of our order is the great interest taken in several localities in Encampment drill, and the progress made in adopting Two Encampments, as you have already seen, have applied for amendments to their Charters, to enable them to change their name in such a manner as to embody the fact of their having adopted Uniform—and I look for other similar applications to follow in the near future. It is a noticeable fact that in nearly all places where a drill association has been organized, and the adoption of a uniform decided upon, that the progress has been most markedand I look forward to the time when most of our leading Encampments will have adopted the Uniform.

#### (18)THE PATRIARCHAL CIRCLE.

The Patriarchal Circle " is composed entirely of Encampment members in good standing, possessing a complete uniform, and having for their object the advancement of the Patriarchal branch of our Order in drill, and the cultivation of friendship. It has already made considerable progress in many States of the American Union, and on the 24th of May last, a Temple was instituted in Ontario "Hamilton, No. 1." As the promoters of this Degree will, no doubt, be applying to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, at the coming session, for recognition, Lhave no doubt that our Representatives to that grand body would be obsessed to have an expression of opinion by this Grand Encampment regard. be pleased to have an expression of opinion by this Grand Encampment regarding the desirability of such a step.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE R. W. GRAND SCRIBE AND TREASURER.

To the Officers and Members of the R. W. Grand Encampment of Untario, I. O. O. F.:

PATRIARCHS,-In accordance with the duties of my position, I have much pleasure in submitting this my thirteenth annual Report of the condition and work of the subordinate Encampments during the past year. In reviewing the work we are enabled to congratulate ourselves on the steady success we are meeting with in this jurisdiction, and the amount of good that is being accomplished. . For some years past the interest appeared to be gone, strong tents becoming decimated by suspensions for non-payment of dues, and weak ones, with difficulty, getting a quorum on their regular meetings. The lengthened period of depression in trade and commerce, was assigned as a cause, and no doubt was one of many that assisted most materially in keeping the good work back. Other Orders, with like fraternal claims, and charitable demands, also felt the pressure of the times, and a sort of alarm was expressed by many that our day of usefulness was gone, that the old time-tried institutions, gray with age, that had come down from the past generations, freighted with deeds of charity, and honored by the good and great, was about to pass away, and make place for those of more modern ideas, and attractive claims. Organizations are springing up every day, many of which are good, and their objects of mutual relief, fraternal features, and charitable acts commend them to public attention, and in a measure attract society men. There is room for all, and as Oddfellows, educated in our Lodge Rooms and Encampments, we can welcome all kindred Societies, influenced with the same spirit for They will help to teach men to be brotherly, charitable, and loving to one another, and in place of being a hindrance, only act as stepping stones or schools to our higher and more experienced councils.

STATE OF THE ORDER.—The current year has brought us, as we anticipated a good increase in membership, with more than a corresponding increase in amount of relief, and to-day in many parts of the jurisdiction, there is a boom going on that is unprecedented. Victoria Encampment, No. 25, Port Hope, which has always been weak in numbers, and at one time almost ceased to work, and had even made overtures to give up their Charter, persevered in the good work, and to-day they report the largest increase made in six months in the entire jurisdiction. Bro. B. D. Deering, under date of May 2nd, writes, "Our Encampment has now 60 members, with four applications received last meeting, which is not a very bad showing for a one-horse town like Port Hope. I expect that our next return will show about 70, if we can find time to do the work. now seven to initiate, and 11 to confer the R. P. degree on, so that you can see that we have our hands full. We have had to call special meetings every week from the beginning of the year, and have now refused to take any more applications until we get all the old work cleared up." In the six months they conferred 83 degrees, and more than doubled their entire membership, making a net increase of 32. Quinte, No. 19, Belleville, added 20 during the term, conferring 62 degrees, which is the next highest. F. M. Clarke, the D. D. G. P., writes, under date of July 12th, 1882:— The Encampment is working harmoniously, and the best of feeling prevails among the members." This will verify the prediction of our esteemed P. G. Patriarch, Bro. Donogh, in refusing to grant a dispensation last year: "That a second Encampment would not conduce to the good of the Order," especially when there was a feeling in the present Encampment against it, they having presented a memorial protesting against the institu-The Patriarchs in Belleville deserve the tion of a second Encampment. greatest credit for the sensible manner in which they have healed their differences, and their rapid increase is the best proof of their success.

Adelphian Encampment, No. 38, London, has made the largest increase in the jurisdiction, for the year. The December term they took in 15 initiates, and the past term, 18, and have now a membership of 79, mostly young men, full of life and energy. Every member is uniformed and a Dill Association was activitied as a second to the control of the contro Drill Association was established some time since, and they have now be come so perfect in Eddy's Tactics, that the celebrated Rochester Regiment, under the command of Col. Eddy, himself, are beginning to feel their laurels slipping from under them. They have a competent instructor, who takes a delight in his work, and the Patriarchs are determined to be second to none on the Continent. They march with the precision of old line soldiers, and make occasional exhibitions in public, on the streets and in the Park, in the presence of thousands of gratified and amused spectators. This has done them, as an Encampment, a great deal of good, attracting membership into their fold, and making Harmony, No. 3, which has always been the banner Encampment of Ontario, tremble lest the rivalry was a little too healthy. They also exhibit remarkable business enterprise in getting up an annual public entertainment, which has been in every instance an unqualified numerical and financial success. Their position to-day is a most enviable one, and certainly worthy of imitation by Encampments in other places.

Both Burlington Encampment, No. 8, and Royal Encampment, No. 36, Hamilton, have prospered—the former with 15 and the latter with 23 new members, during the year. Frontier, No. 2, comes to the front with an increase of 20; Brant, No. 4, with 18, and Toronto, No. 8,

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with 19. Montreal Encampment, No. 1, Montreal, that we all thought last year, dead and buried, has been resuscitated and through the untiring efforts of the D.D.G.P., Alex. Allen Murphy, John J. Reed, and other eminent members of the Order, in that Metropolis, bids fair to rival some of our strongest Encampments. We will have the pleasure of welcoming the latter P. C. P., as the Representative at our session, and I amonly sorry that we cannot also greet the former. My correspondence with both, during the year, has been of the most pleasant and profitable character. They have reported 19 initiates during the year, with a total membership of 53. I trust Montreal Encampment may long remain enrolled upon the Banner of the Grand Encampment of Ontario.

The Encampments that have prospered the most, are those that have given attention to a street uniform, and are brganizing Drill Associations. It is something for young men to learn to hold themselves erect, to march correctly, and know how to carry swords, if they do not intend to use them against an enemy. Nothing looks nicer than uniform, and in following the remains of a deceased brother to his last resting place, if love for the virtues of the departed brother does not bring the member out, a martial spirit of pride compels him to be present in uniform, at roll-call, and the beat of the drum, and slow, measured tread of the dead march, will accomplish the balance. The funeral processions of Oddfellows, to-day, are a plish the balance. The funeral processions of Oddfellows, to-day, are ingredefined improvement on those of days gone by, when seldom two marching together, were dressed alike. By all means encourage Encampments, as far as possible, to adopt uniform, and realize how pleasant a recreation it is to drill after the toils of the day are over. It certainly has great attractions, and will be productive of much amusement and pleasure.

In Wisconsin, some intelligent and eminent Oddfellows have produced, or perfected an organization called the Patriarchal Circle, which they claim is becoming a great success. It restricts its membership to R. P. D. members, in good standing, and wherever it has been introduced, has worked wonders for the Patriarchal branch. In all places where Temples have been established, the membership has increased, and the interest revived. It is now distributed over sixteen States, and one Circle has been started in Hamilton, Ontario, under the fatherly care of the Patriarchs there. claim that it is a great help to them, and would like to see Patriarchs in other places encourage is for their own benefit. A notice of motion has been introduced into the Sovereign Grand Lodge to add to the Patriarchal branch one degree opmore, for the benefit of Uniformed Patriarchs, which is a questionable undertaking, as we are now over-burdened with degrees. The Patriarchal Circle is a separate and distinct organization, perfectly optional with Patriarchs, and not under the control or sanction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and does not desire to have them adopt or parcel it out to suit their own peculiar views. If it does good to the Encampments in its present isolated position, leave it alone, and it is to be hoped our Representatives, in their wisdom, will take that view of it.

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The instructions of the Grand Encampment expressed by resolution, or otherwise, I have carried out to the best of my ability. Four hundred copies of the journal were printed, and distributed in the usual way. From sister jurisdictions in the U. S., I have received return copies.

A copy of the Journal of the R. W. Grand Encampment of the State of Illinois, from the year 1850 to 1880, inclusive, has been received from the Grand Scribe and Treasurer, J. C. Smith, Esq., and is now on fyle in the Grand Scribe's office, for reference. It is a beautifully printed volume, bound in cloth, of 760 pages, and containing a digest of the laws of that body.

Duplicate copies of By-laws are in hand, from Wellington Encampment, No. 31, Guelph, for confirmation.

There are no appeal cases to be disposed of, and I am pleased to report harmony and good feeling throughout the jurisdiction.

Only one new Encampment has been added to our roll, Ridgely Encampment, No. 52, which was instituted by the Grand Patriarch at Jarvis, on the evening of May 4th, 1882. It started with about 10 members, but at present writing there is no report from them, and I cannot tell what progress they have made since.

Seaforth Encampment, No. 27, and Peel Encampment, No. 34, have not reported for two years. The Scribe of the last named Encampment wrote me, two weeks since, for a record of their arrears, stating that they were endeavoring to resuscitate. I have not learned whether anything has been accomplished. The former Encampment, although once in a flourishing condition, and in a good locality, appears to have totally collapsed.

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Statistics.—It is important that our statistics should be accurate. The Return blanks are simple, and if correctly filled out, and an exact copy was kept by Scribes, there would be no difficulty in furnishing the membership just as it is. Many of those worthy officials slash their figures in, and never look over them the second time to see if they are correct. Some neglect to fill in the first, and most important blank—"number of members last report,"—and place admissions and deductions in a confused heap, entirely overlooking the fact that there is a column for each, and a place for the total. I have now completed a new form of Return, defining, if possible, more clearly and simply, the modus operandi, and if that will not answer, the last resort will be to get the D. D. G. P. 's to stand out them with a pointer when they are filling them in. By the way, if the latter individuals examined the Returns, with "CARE, before installing the officers, it might be productive of good. I have also completed a new form of Return Book to be kept by the Encampments, which will be found far superior to the one now in use, and would strongly advise every Encampment to procure a copy. The Representatives can examine it during the Session.

FINANCE.—There has been a considerable increase in the receipts for dues etnance.—There has been a considerable increase in the receipts for dues over other years, while the sale of supplies have been much lower. Our stock of necessary blanks, stationery, &c., having been very much reduced, it was found expedient to replenish it in many particulars. All our debts have been paid, with the exception of amount in hand, and due to the Ridgely memorial Fund, \$23 80. The debt of \$200 to the Grand Lodge which has been generously cancelled by resolution of that standing for several years has been generously cancelled by resolution of that body at its last session. The Finance Committee of the Grand Lodge reported in substance:—"That the loan to the Grand Encampment was an offer from the Grand Lodge; that it was not expected to be repaid; that the Grand Lodge never considered it a valuable or an available asset. Therefore to carry out the original intention of the Grand Lodge at the time the loan was made, out the original intention of the Grand Louge at the time the loan was made, and confirmed, at each session, the matter in question be adjusted by Cancelling the Item in the Grand Lodge Books, and all evidence of the indebtedness be returned to the Grand Treasurer of the Grand Encampment." So it will not be necessary to trouble you any further with that item.

And if only one-fourth responded, out of the half a million of members on the globe, a monument to the memory of that noble Oddfellow could be erected, that would be looked upon with pride, by all future generations of Oddfellows.

I have not yet forwarded the amount to the proper quarter, as only ten Encampments have contributed, out of fifty, so that in place of five cents on our membership, we have succeeded in getting one cent. It does not speak well for the liberality of Canadians, and thinking that if the representatives present from Encampments who have not participated in the contribution, would only represent the matter in their own way, and bring the attention of the membership to so worthy an object, at their first meeting, the Grand Jurisdiction of Ontario will not be compelled to make so paltry an exhibit. It is desired to transmit the amount received as soon as possible, as the Sovereign Grand Lodge will take action on the monument at the approaching session of that body.

D. D. G. P., W. N. Ford, of Beaver Encampment, No. 6, St. Mary's, expresses pleasure at being able to report an increase in membership, and adds:—

"I find the great draw back to progress, with us, is the reckless manner of conducting the business, and the great, and as it seems, uncontrollable tendency to tomfoolery, rough and ungentlemanly usage in doing the work. This is foreign to the Order, and if it could be stopped, its capacity and standing would be augmented."

He also condemns the working of the new departure; that both dramatic and scenic effect is tiresome, and that the changes generally are sadly disappointing. Many others express similar opinions.

Encampment in Toronto, hoping that it will be a pleasant and harmonious meeting, and that the deliberations and doings there will result in benefit to the Order."

The Grand Junior Warden, George B. Rush, writes from Brandon, Manitoba, under date of July 18th, as follows:—

I heartily thank them for the past honors which have been conferred upon me. # REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES TO THE SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE, I. O. O. F.

To the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario :

Your Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge respectfully submit the following report of the proceedings at the late 58th annual session.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge assembled in Baltimore on Monday, September 18th, there being present representatives from thirty-two Grand Lodges, and twenty-six Grand Encampments, Luther J. Glenn, Grand Sire, presiding.

The reports from the various jurisdictions show that the Encampment branch has, during the past year, made very gratifying progress as compared with former years. Still the increase in membership of this branch is not at all commensurate with the growth of the subordinate Lodges.

# DEATH OF JAMES L. RIDGELY.

During the past year the Order suffered its greatest loss, by the death of the venerable and beloved James L. Ridgely, for forty-one years Grand

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decease of our distinguished brother appears in the Journal of the Grand Encampment, we cannot do better than offer the following eloquent tribute from the pen of the Grand Sire:

"Hardly had the sound of the gavel, that pronounced the business of the session concluded, died away, when the world of Odd-Fellowship was

"Hardly had the sound of the gavel, that pronounced the business of the session concluded, died away, when the world of Odd-Fellowship was startled with the sorrowful intelligence, flashed across the continent and to foreign lands, that our beloved Grand Secretary, James L. Ridgely, had ceased to live.

This sad event, though not unexpected, was a terrible shock to the great Institution with which the distinguished Brother had been identified for half a century, and it was universally felt that one of the greatest pillars of the Order had fallen.

It seems almost unnecessary, in view of the fact that the death of our beloved Brother has been mourned, and his services recited in every city, town and village in which Odd-Fellowship has found an abiding place, to more than record his decease, yet I cannot refrain from paying a slight tribute to one who, as your faithful officer for many years, and as my friend from the time I first met him in this body, in the year 1852, was bound to me by more than ordinary ties.

To him, more than to any other, not excepting the founder of the institution, who labored for its welfare "in season and out of season," is the Order indebted for the proud position it has attained.

Initiated May 27th, 1827, when 22 years of age, in Columbia Lodge, No. 3, Baltimore, when Odd-F llowship was comparatively unknown—having a feeble existence in but five of the United States—he found the field a congenial one, and Odd-Fellowship the nucleus of a grand enterprise, for the benefit of his fellow-men.

That he was not lukewarm in the cause, but espoused it with his whole heart, is evinced by the fact that on the 14th day of October, less than six months after his initiation, he was elected Vice Grand, and on the 17th of February, 1830, was chosen Noble Grand of his Lodge, and admitted to the Grand Lodge of Maryland in May, 1830. The three months' terms of Subordinates and quarterly sessions of Grand Bodies prevailing at the time, permitting this rapid advancement.

On the 20th day of July, 1830, he was chosen Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, and in 1831, and for many successive years represented that Body in the Grand Lodge of the United States.

He was elected Grand Master of Maryland, January 17th, 1834, and was twice elected Grand Sire of the Grand Lodge of the United States, but declined the honor of the exalted position.

On the 24th of April, 1840, he was elected Grand Corresponding Secretary of this body, and on September 24th, 1841, Grand Recording Secretary, and these offices, subsequently united in 1844, he held until his eyes were closed in death on the 16th of November, 1881.

This is a very brief record of the life of our Brother as connected with the Order—a mere outline of his labors for more than fifty years—for his facile pen and his eloquent voice were always at command for the good of the cause with which he had early identified himself and loved so well.

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ed with the s facile pen cause with Of his position as a civilian in the community in which he was born and resided until his death, I need only say he made an enviable record as a faithful citizen, a wise counselor, a man of unquestioned integrity, who honored the important offices to which he was elected and appointed, with strict fidelity and a conscientions discharge of duty.

But, my Brethren, he has gone from our midst! His eloquent voice will no more be heard in our deliberations; the hand that wielded the skilful pen is cold in death; the heart that throbbed for others' woes is sileht; we shall meet and grasp hands with him no more in the Lodge room, or in the ordinary walks of life; but it is consoling to reflect that we may meet and mingle with him and others who have gone before, and who will follow us, away over the dark river, under the green trees, where perpetual spring and youth abound.

### DECISIONS.

The Grand Sire during the year made the following decisions all of which were approved:—

- 1. At the last session the following resolution was adopted:
- "Resolved, That hereafter, until otherwise ordered, the price of Charge, Degree and Encampment Books shall be \$2.00 each to Grand Bodies, and \$2.50 to subordinates under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge,"—Journal 8680.

I decided that the same was such a general law that it did not go into opertion until the first day of January, 1882.

- 2. The Grand Sire has no power to authorize a Lodge, working under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to change the place of meeting from that designated in its Charter.
- 3. When a Grand Encampment has been chartered in a State, or Territory, or any country, all the Subordinate Encampments to which the Sovereign Grand Lodge had issued Charters in that jurisdiction become subordinate to the Grand Encampment, and they should surrender their Charter and receive new Charters from the Grand Encampment, which new Charters should be granted without charge.
- 4. A Brother was elected Noble Grand, served five months, and resigned on account of business engagements. Was again elected Noble Grand, and served five months, when he was again compelled to leave the city; the Lodge, however, granted him leave of absence. Is he entitled to the honor of Past Grand?

Answer--He is.

5. A Brother is elected Noble Grand, serves a majority of nights, and is then given leave of absence for ten weeks by the Lodge. Is he entitled to the honors of Past Grand?

Answer .- He is.

6. Is it legal for a Subordinate Lodge to limit the payment of benefits to 13 weeks, or any other time?

Answer-It is not.

7. After benefits have accrued, can a Lodge, by its action, reduce the amount?

8. Is it legal to refuse to pay benefits until one week after a Brother has been reported sick?

Answer—As the Sovereign Grand Lodge has prescribed such a rule for the Subordinates under its immediate jurisdiction, and such a provision is almost universal in the Order, it may be considered as established that a Subordinate has the right to provide that benefits shall not be paid for the first week's sickness of a member.

- 9. To suspend or drop a member for the non-payment of dues, the *time* fixed by law must be regarded, and not the *amount due*. A Brother clear on the books on the 1st of January, for instance, cannot be suspended or dropped until a year thereafter, no matter to what amount his dues may accumulate in the intermediate time, by fines or otherwise.
- 10. A Card of Withdrawal having been granted to a member of a Lodge, and before its expiration charges are duly preferred against him, and the card annulled, and the Brother, after trial, was acquitted, his position in the Lodge is the same as if the card had never been granted.
- 11. A petition for a Charter for a Subordinate Lodge must be signed by 5 Third Degree members in good standing.
- 12. Question—Must all the Work of Subordinate Lodges be transacted in the Third Degree, after July 1st, 1882?

Answer-Yes; except the conferring of the Initiatory, the First and Second Degrees.

- 13. The law in reference to the Lodge in which Withdrawal Cards shall be deposited (Old Digest, section 263; New, 626,) has not been repealed or modified.
- 14. The law which prevents the name of any person, while living, to be used as the chartered name of a Lodge, cannot be evaded by dropping the given name of the person.
- 15. A Lodge owns a three-story building. The third story only is used for Lodge purposes. The other two stories can be rented and used for any legitimate business without a violation of the law, "excluding all spirituous, vinous and malt liquors from the Lodge room and ante-rooms or halls connected with or adjoining thereto," &c.
- 16. The Grand Sire is not authorized by law or precedent to charge the holding of meetings of a Subordinate Lodge under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, from weekly to semi-monthly.
- 17. A Grand Lodge has no power to make it obligatory upon the members in its jurisdiction, to subscribe for and take a paper founded by the Grand Lodge, and devoted to the interests of the Order.
- 18. Although the By-Laws may be silent on the subject, yet, when appointed on a committee, it is the duty of a member of a Lodge to serve, unless excused by the Noble Grand or the Lodge.
- 19. January 25th, 1882, the following question was submitted Are the Cards bearing the name of JAMES L. RIDGELY, Grand Secretary, legal, and can Subordinate Lodges issue such Cards since the death of Brother RIDGELY? To which I gave an affirmative answer.

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d Are the , legal, and er RIDGELY? 20. Is it legal to take from the treasury of an Encampment the expenses of a supper (or banquet) given on the night of the installation of its officers?

Answer-It is not.

21. The Grand Lodge of New Jersey, at its last session, adopted a resolution authorizing Subordinate Lodges to confer the three Degrees for \$1.50; provided, the brother taking them should not be entitled to a higher rate of benefits than he was entitled to receive as an Initiatory member, under the By-Laws of his Lodge.

The By-Laws of the Lodge fix the price of the three degrees at \$7.00.

Question—Can the Brother, by paying the additional \$5.50, after he has received the degrees, entitle himself to the increased rates of benefits, or must he pay the \$7 00?

Answer.—The Lodge must decide the question. The Brother in neither event would be entitled to the increased benefits, unless the Lodge by proper action consents thereto.

- 22. After the 1st day of July, 1882, balloting for the degrees must take place in the Third Degree, and a separate ballot for such degree must be had.
- 23. There is no agreement or recognition for intervisitation between the Manchester Unity and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, therefore it is not admissible for a Grand Master of the latter to visit a Lodge of the former, either as an officer or member of the I. O. O. F.
- 24. Can a Brother hold both offices, Recording Secretary and Treasurer of a Subordin te Lodge?

Answer—In the absence of any legislation by the Sovereign Grand Lodge on the subject, I decide on principle that a Brother cannot hold the two offices at one and the same time.

- 25. A Subordinate Lodge, under the jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, cannot make a By-Law providing that a Brother shall not receive benefits until he has been a member six months —See Sec. 2, Article III., Constitution for Subordinate Lodges.
- 26. A Subordinate Lodge, upon charges duly preferred, tried a member, found him guilty and expelled him. The Constitution for Subordinates provides; \* \* "from which decision he may appeal to the Grand Lodge within twenty days after the service-of said notice, by filing with the Secretary," etc.

The expelled member did not avail himself of the right to appeal within twenty days, in fact has never appealed.

The Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction, after one or two years had passed, adopted a resolution that the Subordinate be requested to reinstate the expelled member and restore him to all his rights and privileges, and in case the Lodge declines to comply with the request, it be directed to send to the Grand Lodge, at its next session, a duly certified copy of the charges, specifications, pleadings, papers and minutes of the Lodge relating to the trial and expulsion of the member, so that the same may be reviewed, and the judgment of the Grand Lodge be taken thereon.

Question (1).—Was it legal for the Grand Lodge to pass such a resolution?

Question (2).—Had the Grand Lodge any control over the matter, the expelled member having failed to avail himself of the right to appeal?

Answer—Under the circumstances detailed the Grand Lodge had no right to request reinstatement of the expelled member, backed by a demand for the papers, with an expressed intention to review the case.

27. A Subordinate Lodge requires its members to pay their dues quarterly in advance. A Brother failed to pay his dues for the quarter ending October 1st, but his dues to July 1st were paid, and on the 1st of September he was taken sick. Is he entitled to benefits?

Answer—The law of 1877 (Journal, 7370; New Digest, Sec. 391,) permits Grand Bodies to authorize their Subordinates to require the payment of dues in advance, "provided, such requirements shall not work a forfeiture of any rights now guaranteed to members by the law of this Grand Body." The law of 1848 (New Digest, Sec. 373,) declares that "the dues to a Lodge accrue weekly; \* \* \* it is therefore, at any time, the right of a Brother to pay his dues:"

The right to require advance payment would seem to confer the power to enforce the law by providing a penalty for not paying the dues quarterly in advance, yet the general custom of the Order has been to allow benefits to members who owed less than three months dues, and, as in the case mentioned, the Brother owed only two months dues, I decide that he is entitled to benefits.

28.—Rule 5, Section IV., Article V., Constitution for Subordinate Lodges, repeals former legislation on the subject, and it is not required that the record in appeals from the action of Subordinates under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge shall be printed.

### NEW LEGISLATION.

Under this head we give a summary of the legislation of the session which especially deals with the Encampment Branch.

### UNIFORMED PATRIARCHS' REGALIA.

Resolved, That when a Battalion of Uniformed Patriarchs visit an Encampment in a body, accompanied by either of their first two officers, they shall be deemed to be in proper regalia when clothed in full uniform."

### ENCAMPMENT REGALIA IN SUBORDINATE LODGES.

Art. 24, By-Laws S. G. L , was amended to read as follows :-

"Past Officers of every description, and members in possession of the Encampment Degrees, and all other members of the Order, when visiting Grand or Subordinate Lodges, are entitled to wear the regalia and jewels pertaining to the highest degrees which they may have taken."

### APPLICATIONS FOR ENCAMPMENT CHARTERS.

Art. 2, By-Laws, S. G. L., was amended to read as follows :-

"Upon the petition of five qualified members of the Order, in good standing praying for a warrant to institute an Encampment in a State, District Territory where a Grand Encampment has not been established, this Grand Lodge may grant the same, Every Encampment receiving a warrant from this

Grand Lodge who shall del instructions a once a year b purpose, or b

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n good stande, District or d, this Grand rant from this Grand Lodge shall be instituted by the Grand Sire, or a qualified Patriarch, who shall deliver to such Encampment the warrant and charge books, and such instructions as may be necessary. Such Encampment shall be visited at least once a year by the Grand Sire, or by some Patriarch deputized by him for that purpose, or by the District Deputy Grand Sire.

### SUPERFLUOUS TITLES

It is recommended that the several jurisdictions subordinate to the Sovereign Grand Lodge abolish all prefixes to the titles of the State Grand Bodies and the officers thereof.

### SUPREME TEMPLE—PATRIARCHAL CIRCLE,

The Grand Sire, in his report, having called the attention of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to the progress and spread of the organization known as the Patriarchal Circle, the matter was referred to a special committee, who made the following report:—

"The Grand Sire in his report referred to us, says:—"I am informed that since your last session 'Temples' have been established in many of the States from New York to California, but express no opinion on the subject."

It must be admitted that the organization of the "Temples" referred to, are not authorized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which is the supreme authority in Odd-Fellowship.

In adopting a uniform for members of the Encompment, the Sovereign Grand Lodge has attempted to meet the entire requirements of the Brotherhood in that particular: and in the appointment of a committee to prepare a Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, the Sovereign Grand Lodge has given encouragement in the Order in that direction. Under these circumstances, it seems at least of questionable propriety for brothers of this Order to encourage the organization referred to.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge at this session having established a Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, it is but reasonable to expect that all loyal members of the Order will take pleasure in making their actions conform to the Ritual and Laws ordained by the supreme authority in Odd-Fellowship.

Your committee offer the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Grand Sire be requested to issue a circular letter to the Encampment Branch of the Order, calling attention to the adoption of the Degree for Uniform Patriarchs, and of the impropriety of members of this Order forming organizations outside of the Order, and the illegality of wearing the Regalia of the Order under any direction, or regulation, not recognized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

### UNIFORMED PATRIARCH'S DEGREE

At the session of 1881 a special committee was appointed, with instructions to prepare for the consideration of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, a new degree for Uniformed Patriarchs.

The committee reported at the late session, and the degree was adopted as also the legislation necessary to put it into active operation. The following was enacted.

Resolved, That the Grand Encampments Subordinate to this Sovereign Grand Lodge are hereby authorized and empowered to institute uniform Degree Camps for Uniformed Patriarchs at such places as they may deem proper within their territorial limits, to possess the powers and enjoy the previleges following:

To Confer the Uniformed Degree, on such members of the Royal Purple Degree as present certificates from an Encampment located in the district designated in the charter of such Degree Camps, on their being elected members of such Uniformed Degree Camps, pursuant to law.

To elect and appoint their own officers in the manner prescribed by their By-Laws, the elective officers to consist of a Commander, a Vice-Commander, an Officer of the Guard, a Secretary and a Freasurer, whose terms of office shall be for one year, ending with the installation of a successor at the first meeting in January of each year.

The appointed officers to consist of a Picket, whose station shall be upon the inside of the onter door: a Guard whose station shall be upon the inside of the inner door: a Guard of the Tent, whose position shall be at the door of the Commander's Tent. Each of these officers shall be detailed by the officer of the Guard, each evening to serve for that evening. The officer of the Guard shall detail from the ranks, four or more to act as a Guard over the cadidate during initation, whenever the Degree is conferred. To elect to office in any Uniformed Degree Camp, any actual contributing member of that Uniformed Degree Camp in good standing. To hold regular and special meetings, as may be provided by By-Law. To fix and establish dues to be paid monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually, as the By-Laws may provide, and to provide by By-Laws, when those in arrears shall be dropped from the roll of members. To establish such By-Laws and Rules of order not inconsistent herewith, or with the rules, usages and general regulations of the Order, as they may deem proper, subject, however, to the approval of the Grand Encampment, to which they are Subordinate. The Grand Sire is authorized to institute Uniformed Degree Camps in any State or Territory under the immediate Jurisdiction of this Sovereign Grand Lodge, and such Uniformed Degree Camps shall possess all the powers, and privileges of other Uniformed Degree Camps. The quorum of a Uniformed Degree Camp shall considered to the content of the content of the Grand Encampment of the Grand Encampment of the Grand Degree Camps of the Grand Degree Camps.

Each Grand Encampment is hereby authorized to issue Charters for Uniformed Degree Camps, Good Standing in a Subordinate Encampment as a Royal Purple Degree member, is necessary in order to obtain or retain membership in a Uniformed Degree Camp.

Uniformed Degree Camps are authorized to ballot on all applications for membership, as now provided in Subordinate Encampments.

The manner of voting (except upon application for membership), in a Uniformed Degree Camp shall be "Yes," and "No." Whenever a Uniformed Degree Camp shall have been instituted in any city, town or village, no other Uniformed Degree Camp shall be instituted in such place, until the consent of all previously instituted Uniformed Degree Camps in that city, town or village, be first had and obtained.

Resolved, That the Committee on Printing Supplies be instructed to have printed and bound 300 copies of the Degree-for Uniformed Patriarchs, and that said committee fix the price at which said books shall be furnished, but not exceeding 50 per cent. above cost.

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ucted to have archs, and that ed, but not exResolved, That said committee be, and they are hereby authorized to prepare form for charter for Uniformed Degree Camps, and to have printed such number as they deem necessary.

Resolved, That the Grand Secretary be authorized to transfer from the Secret Journal to the Revised Journal the fact that a degree for Uniformed Patriarchs has been adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Resolved, That the price of a Charter and three books, for a Uniformed Degree Camp, issued by the authority of the Grand Sire to a Uniform Degree Camp, subordinated to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, be, and the same is hereby fixed at five Dollars.

Resolved, That the unwritten work of the Uniform Degree be communicated only to the Grand Patriarchs and Grand Scribes of the Grand Encampments of the several jurisdictions.

Resolved, That the Special Committee on Uniform Degree be instructed to prepare an installation service for installing the officers of the degree, the same to be published with the Ritual, but subject to the approval of this Body at its next annual session.

Resolved, That the Special Committee on the Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs, be continued, and that they report at the next annual session such changes, if any, that they may deem necessary to perfect the work of said Degree.

Resolved, That the Grand Patriarchs of Subordinate Jurisdictions are hereby authorized to confer the Degree for Uniformed Patriarchs upon petitioners for a charter for a Camp of said Degree, whenever the petitioners are not in possession of said degree, and it has been determined to grant a charter; provided that such petitioners are Royal Purple Degree members in good standing of an Encampment located within the jurisdiction of such Grand Patriarch.

### GENERAL LEGISLATION.

Under this head we submit a summary of the legislation, which is of general interest to both branches of the order.

### VISITING CARDS.

Resolved, That when a member of the Order in possession of a Visiting Card from a Subordinate Lodge or Encampment, obtains money either from a Lodge, Encampment, or a from a Relief Committee, the amount so obtained shall be endorsed upon such card, with the date, and by what Lodge, Encampment or Relief Committee furnished, attested by the proper officer.

Resolved, That it shall not be lawful for any Subordinate Lodge or Encampment to grant to any member or Patriarch a Visiting or Traveling Card who has heretofore applied for and obtained a Visiting or Traveling Card until such card shall have been returned to the Secretary of the Lodge or Scribe of Encampment, or until such brother or Patriarch shall produce satisfactory proof of the loss or destruction of the same.

Resolved, That the Committee on Printing Supplies be required to have printed on the back of all Visiting Cards a proper blank to be filled by Scribes of Encampments, and Secretaries of Lodges, upon the visitation of a Patriarch or Brother, embracing date, name, and number of Encampment or Lodge.

A very full and elaborate report on this subject was presented by Representive Campbell, of Ontario. It deals to a large extent with the Subordinate Lodge Branch of the Order, but the question is an important one for the consideration of Encampments as well. The report in its entirety is an interesting one, and should be carefully perused by every member. The conclusions of the Committee are included in the following extracts:—

### BENEFITS IN ENCAMPMENTS.

Your committee have not been able to secure sufficient returns from the Encampment jurisdictions to provide any further information than is contained in the usual reports to the Sovereign Grand Lodge. In this branch of the Order, however, benefits do not occupy so prominent a place, and though always paid are by no means high. Yearly dues in Encampments range usually from \$2 to \$4, and weekly benefits from \$1 to \$2. There does not appear to be any great danger of the Encampments becoming impoverished from the payment of extravagant benefits.

### DUTIES OF GRAND BODIES.

While there can be no doubt of the constitutional authority of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to legislate on the subject of dues and benefits for the entire Order, and to fix the rate that shall be applicable to every jurisdiction, yet, inasmuch, as it has been customary to remit this matter largely to local legislation, it would seem advisable, at the present, for this Body to confine itself to recommending to the several State juriedictions such action as it may think proper, reserving to itself always the right to future legislation in cases where the Subordinate Grand Bodies may prove negligent. The duties that seem to your committee, under these circumstances, to be imperative to State jurisdiction are these:—

1st. To investigate the financial condition of their Subordinates. In doing this, they should require from each Subordinate a full report of its transactions, embracing these items:—1st, the number of members at each age; 2nd, the number of sick members at each age; 3rd, the number of weeks' sickness at each age; 4th, receipts for dues; 5th, receipts for initiation and degrees; 6th, receipts from all other sources; 7th, total receipts; 8th, amount paid for sick benefits; 9th, paid for funeral benefits; 10th, paid for relief of widows and orphans; 11th, paid for other relief or charity; 12th, paid for management and working expenses; 13th, value of furniture, regalia or other property, specifying each kind; 14th, funds in cash or investments; 15th, nature and description of investments. By a comparison of these items, they will be enabled to understand the financial condition of the individual Subordinates and of the jurisdiction; and to estimate how nearly they may safely approach the standard of dues and benefits approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

2nd. Having gained the necessary data, Grand Lodges and Encampments should, by legislation, enforce upon their Subordinates a maximum as well as a minimum limit of dues and benefits. The maximum

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ges and Enbordinates a he maximum rate of benefits should not exceed that approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, but might be as far below it as the circumstances of the jurisdiction would seem to require.

This course has already been pursued in some jurisdictions; it ought to be in all.

### RESOLUTIONS.

In view of the conclusions reached by your committee, the following resolutions are submitted:

1st. That Grand Lodges and Encampments are advised to investigate the financial condition of their Subordinates, and to define for them within certain limits the rate of dues and benefits.

2nd. That in the opinion of the Sovereign Grand Lodge the only classes of benefits advisable are weekly payments to a sick brother, and a funeral benefit on the death of a brother; all other relief to take the form of special grants, made as circumstances may require, within the limits fixed by the several State jurisdictions.

3rd. That the ratio of dues and benefits should be the following:—If the graded system of dues be adopted, then for sick benefits of \$4 weekly, and a funeral benefit of \$40, the dues should not be lower than those in the Table H. If uniform dues are charged, the rate should be less than \$8 per annum for the same amount of benefits—that is to say the weekly benefits not to exceed half a year's dues; funeral benefit not to exceed five times a year's dues. Provided that this rule shall be held to be practically in force if the Lodge receipts per member from dues and permanent investments equal the amount called for as dues.

4th. That it is advisable for Subordinates to have at least three separate funds, viz.: a Benefit Fund, from which shall be paid sick and funeral benefits; a Relief Fund, from which shall be paid all sums for charity and special relief; a Management Fund, from which shall be paid the expenses of working and maintenance.

5th. That the receipts of Subordinates should be appropriated to their funds as follows (assuring the rate of dues and benefits to be as recommended in this report): To the Management Fund the admission in degree fees and \$2 from each member's yearly dues, the remainder of the dues to be appropriated, three-fourths to the Benefit Fund and one-fourth to the Relief Fund; interest from investments to the fund which has been invested, when the admission fee granted according to age, instead of placing the entire fee to the credit of the Management Fund, only a sun equal to that charged for an initiate of twenty-one should be so applied, the remainder to be divided between the Benefit and Relief Funds in the same proportions as dues. Other receipts to be applied as the Subordinate may determine.

6th. That the Special Fund of a Subordinate should be kept separate and intact, and that when a deficiency occurs in any one of them it should be replenished by assessments or otherwise, but not by drawing on or borrowing from other funds.

7th. That a copy of these resolutions be sent to each Grand Lodge and Grand Encampment.

### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

A number of amendments to the Constitution were taken up for consideration, but with one exception all were either lost on a division or indefinitely postponed.

Section 3, Article xiv. of the Constitution, was amended so as to read as follows:—

Section 3.—Dues from Subordinate Lodges or Encampments working under the immediate jurisdiction of this Sovereign Grand Lodge, five per cent. on their receipts.

At the next session of the Grand Lodge the following proposed amendments will be considered:—

- 1. To meet annually on the first Monday of October.
- 2. To meet annually on the first Monday of May.
- 3. To meet annually on the fourth Monday of May.
- 4. To admit to membership civilized Indians residing in the Indian Territory.
  - 5. To provide for biennial sessions.
- To require Grand Representatives to be entitled to the Grand Encampment degree, by reason of previous service in office.
- 7. To permit Past Grand Sires to serve on committees relating to the work of the Order.
- To increase the membership of the Sovereign Grand Lodge by providing for the election of additional representatives.
  - 9. To allow Past Grand Sires to serve on committees.
  - 10. To allow Past Grand Sires to serve on special committees.
- 11. To provide that in countries not on the continent of North America qualification for membership, as to age and color, shall be left to local legislation.

### RIDGELY MEMORIAL FUND.

The Grand Treasurer reported, that in response to the circular issued by Grand Secretary Ross, calling for subscriptions of five cents per member towards the erection of a monument to the late Grand Secretary, Ridgely, the following jurisdictions had contributed:—

- 3. Resolved, That none of said fund shall be drawn from the treasury, or any liability involving its disbursement assumed, until the further action of this Grand Lodge.
- 4. Resolved, That the Grand Sire, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer are hereby requested to take such measures to increase said fund as they may deem proper.
- 5. Resolved, That the communication of the Grand Treasurer upon the subject of the Ridgely Monument Fund, together with the list of the amounts contributed be spread upon the records, and printed in the Journal of proceedings.

Your Representatives would suggest in this connection that our Encampments might with propriety be called upon to assist in the formation of this fund.
