Washington, July 31.—A cyclone storm of wind, rain and hall whipped back and forth across the capital to day, leaving death and rain in its wake. Out of the blaxing sky, with the temperature at the 100 point, came the storm, roaring from the north driving a mass of clouds that cast a mantle of total darkness over the town. The gale, reaching a velocity of nearly seventy miles an hour, swept the streets clear, unroofed houses, tore detached small structures from their foundations, wrecked one office building, overturned wagons and carriages in the streets, and ewept Washington's hundred parks, tearing huge branches from trees, and even uprooting study old elms, the landmarks of a century.

Washington's well-kept streets, with their wealth of trees were littered with broken follage, roots, debris and dead birds, as if a playful glant had carelessly swished his club up and down the city.

Two Messages on Wire.

In the C.P.R. telegraph department two of the wires between Montreal and Toronto have been equipped recently with a device which is proving a matter of great interest to telegraphers. Each circuit is worked duplex, so that on the two wires two messages can be sent in each direction simultaneously.

At the sending end is a keyboard somewhat similar to a typewriter and all that has to be done to transmit a message is for the sending operator to depress the keys in the same manner as though writing a letter or telegram on the typewriter. With the instrument is a recorder which shows exactly what keys have been depressed and whether any mistake has been made. At the receiving end the operator simply feeds in ordinary message blanks as required and the messages are printed automatically on them.
