The expression "In the opinion of my advisers" is ac-cipted as having been inserted in the speech by the King with the palpable object of disassociating His Majesty from the views' expressed on behalf of the government. The appli-cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of in-tending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-ed and occupied 'by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
