MR. PUGSLEY'S POSITION AT OTTAWA

Some apologists for Mr. Pugsley say that the insinuations against his rectitude as a public man should not be considered now that he is a Federal Minister. The transactions in which he was a figure were Provincial affairs and should not be discussed in Ottawa. That is a curious doctrine. Mr. Pugsley, when a Minister of the New Brunswick Cabinet, was as much of a King's Minister as he is now. He had taken the oath of office. As Attorney-General he was supposed to represent the Crown in the Courts, to see that the law was properly enforced. If, as is charged, he was culpably negligent in New Brunswick, there is immediate proof that he is not a suitable person to expend money granted to the Crown by the Dominion Parliament. If he could disregard his oath of office in one instance he might do

There is evidence to show that in the handling of nearly \$1,000,000 by Mr. Pugsley and Mr. Tweedie, more than \$134,000 went astray. There was a loss of 13 per cent. of public money. The expenditure of these funds was not recorded in a proper business manner. Yet they were trust funds, and it is a basic principle of morals as well as of finance that the st careful accounting of trust funds is necessary. What if Mr. Pugsley were to do without book-keeping in the Public Works Department? What if he were to inform Parliament that an expenditure of \$180,000 was made for a certain purpose when only \$140,000 was spent?

There is no evidence that he has changed his nature since he and his facile colleague juggled with the funds of the Central Railway. He was a King's Minister then. He is a King's Minister now. Surely his record as Attorney-General of New Brunswick is material when he is Federal Minister of Public Works.

OF OUR FORESTS

Forestry in Western Canada (as everywhere else) means far more than the planting of trees. The first step in forestry is the preservation of forests already existing, and, as far as Canada—east and west allke—is concerned, that means the keeping out of fires. Something in this direction has already been done in Canada, but much remains to be flavors and fancies, call at

direction has already been done in Canada, but much remains to be done.

Forest fires in the Rockies, their effects and means of preventing them, are discussed by Mr. H.R. Mao. Millan, assistant inspector of Dominion Forest Reserves, in the December issue of the Canadian Forestry Journal. His article gives the result of investigations made by him during the season of 1903 in the Crow's Nest district of Southern Alberta, more accurately defined as the valley of the middle fork of the Old Man river between the Livingstone range and the western boundary of Alberta. Originally this whole region was heavily timbered, so the reports of explorers and other early visitors to the district say, with the exception of a small area (18 square miles in extent) situated above the timber line. "So numerous and so disastrous have been the fires following in the wake of travellers, settlers and railways," Mr. MacMillan writes, "that at present, of the original 312 square miles of forest, only 33 square miles remain." Moreover, the timber which is easiest to get at is always the first destroyed, and what is left is situated on high levels and in other places where it is hard to get at.

Not only has the timber originally on the land been destroyed, but in some cases all possibility of producing, without going to an enormous expense for artificial planting, more timber, or anything else) on the land has been taken away. In this Crow's Nest valley alone there are, out of the 212 square miles of its total area, \$85 square miles of its total area, \$15 square miles of such land. Originally covered by a heavy forest of fir, it is now but a "poor, gravelly prairle, unfit for agriculture and of very little use for grazing." One fire alone does not usually have this effect, but "a second or third fire rarely falls to kill all the forest reproduction" (i.e., the little trees) "to destroy the remaining seed trees, to burn off the upper layer of soil, and leave a desolate waste," such as the country just spoken of.

On portions of this area nature has already made a good start towards creating a new forest. Sixty square miles of the area are covered by a dense growth of young trees, the land so covered lying too high stony and gravelly to be fit for agriculture or valuable for grazing. All that this area requires in order that on the hillsides and being too rough, it may again be covered with dense forests is protection from fire.

Thus fire protection is obviously the great need of the region, and the department of the interior, through its forestry branch, is devising means to this end. So far, the measures used for the protection of forests by rangers, who constantly travel over the forest teritory and keep a lookout for fires (often discovering and extinguishing in their beginning ires which, if neglected, would burn over miles of territory), fight fires and warn campers and travellers against the carless use of fire. This actrol will in all probability form the basis of the system of protection to be put in operation, supplemented by the use of "look-outs" and the telephone.

POLITICAL IDEALS REVOLUTIONIZED

(From the Winnipeg Telegram.)

Hon, Wm. Pugsley's desire to remain in the cabinet after the exposures of the New Brunswick royal commission is not half as remarkable as Sir Wilfrid Laurier's willingness to allow him to remain.

Mr. Pugsley's record is perfectly in accord with the free and easy notions of public honor and public decency which he now manifests. From the Prime Minister of Canada something better is expected. He got rid of ministers like Tarte and Blair whose outstanding of fence was to differ with him on questions of public policy.

That apparently was an unpardonable sin. Yet Sir Wilfrid's ministers of today may indulge themselves to their hearts' content in colorable transactions without incurring the risk of being invited to leave the cabinet.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier evidently proceeds on the principle that a minister can defy every principle of political honor provided he remains acquiescent in his (Sir Wilfrid's) public policies. That is the most lamentable feature of this Pugsley affair. It places all the members of the Government on the same plane from the Prime Minister who tolerates Mr. Pugsley's presence in the cabinet to the colleagues who are content to sit with him at the council

The so-called Langevin scandals were admirable, compared with the Pugsley scandal, yet Sir Hector Langevin was retired from the cabinet following revelations which entirely acquitted him of any suspicion of personal misappropriation of public funds. Hon. Wm. Pugsley remains serenely in the cabinet, although there is the report of the royal commission which brings him into suspicious relationship with the misappropriation of at least \$35,000.

Political ideals seem to have been revolutionized at Ottawa since the people were taught to regard the Langevin scandal as something to be abhorred by honest people.
