London, April 11.—Copies of a report on the cost of living in American cities based on linquiries made in twenty-eight representative towns by officials of the British Board of Trade, were circulated in parliament this evening. The report makes a voluminous budget of 533 pages, and covers the questions of working class rents, housing, retail prices of commodities, and rates of wages in the United States compiled for purpose of comparison with the conditions of workers in Great Britain and other countries. The conclusions reached are: "Tho cost of food and rent combined is 52 per cent, greater in the United States than in England and Wales, but these heavier relative charges on working class income have been accompanied with weekly wages which are as 230 to 100."





General Manager McNicoll, of C. P. R. Writes to Mayor Frink, Agreeing to Meet City's Terms on Some of the Points -- What City has Gained by Holding Out.

Yesterday Mayor Friesk received a communication from General Manager McNicoll of the °C. P. R., making, on behalf of the company, a proposition looking to the solution of the question at issue between the city and the C. P. R. in connection with the West Side transfer, which it is believed will be satisfactory to the city council and enable the agreement to be completed. Mr. McNicoll writes that the company will undertake to fill in the land to be acquired by it as rapidly as the government proceeds with the construction of the docks and break water, and to complete the filling in work within a period of ten years after the government has completed its work. The government will fill in the 400 feet strip; the C. P.
