CRUSHING TEUTON DEFEA

Important Centre of Chateau-Thierry and Nearby Towns New in Hands of Allies Who Are Steadily Pressing Back Enemy Between Marne and Aisne Rivers Despite Desperate Resistance.

British Enter General Fighting in Section Named and Make Good Progress--Americans, Italians and French Fighting Gallantly - British and Italians Take St. Euphraise and Bouilly.

Victories for the allied arms in France continue to multiply. Over the entire sixty-mile front, running from Soissons to Rheims, the allied troops are fighting with a determination that brooks no denial of their efforts. The Germans steadily are giving ground, though stubborn resistance is being offered on some sectors.

Further goodly-sized indentations have been made in the German line between Soissons and Chateau Thierry by the American and French troops, and almost all the gains made by the Germans in their recent drive south of the Marne and toward the vicinity of Rheims have been blotted out under the counter-attacks of the Americans, French, British and

Chateau Thierry, which represents the point in the battle line where the Germans had driven their wedge nearest to Paris, has been recaptured by the French troops, and almost simultaneously the village of Brasles, two miles eastward, and the heights to the north of the village fell into their

Chateau-Thierry Now In Hands of Entente And Germans Routed

With the French Armies, July 21 - Chatean Thierry has fallen into allied hands. Its re-capture was the natural result of the great successes of General Mangin's drive to the north, by which the road from Soissons to Chateau Thierry had been cut.

New York, July 20.—Between thirty and forty men lost their lives when the United States cruiser San Diego was sunk ten miles off Fire Island yesterday, according to semi-official estimates made here last night.

Washinston, July 20.—Belief that the cruiser San Diego was sunk by a torpedo is expressed in a despatch today from the chief of staff of cruiser forces to the navy department.

The despatch follows:

"The captain of the San Diego reports that he is inclined to the belief that the ship was sunk by torpedo. There is no conclusive factors, however, on which to base a definite opinion at present, however, in view of following circumstances:

1. No torpedo wake was seen.

2. No convincing evidence that pertscope was seen.

3. No submarine appeared, in spite of the fact that three unarmed rescue ships were in the vicinity for about two hours.





A FOURTEEN YEAR **OLD GIRL HEROINE**

reda Ebbett in Absence of Parents Extinguishes Fire Started in Home By Lightning Bolt-Debris Falls on Sleeping Children, But None Injured.

Gagetown, July 20.—While Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Ebbett were motoring home from the Firemen's picule at Gageaown on Wednesday evening, lightning struck their house at Lower Gagetown, shattering parts of it very badly and setting fire to one of the rooms. The storm, although not lengthy, was very severe, and as they drove through it Mr. and Mrs. Ebbett commented on the severity of the boit which later proved to have struck their house. On arriving home they found traces of the lightning in almost every room. The boit struck the north chimney and in running down, had scattered plaster on the children asleep, in bed, without harming them in the slightest.




