### CARLETON'S M. P. SOME SPEAKER

Full Text Here Given Sounds Like Old-Time Liberal Gospel—To Consider all Classes.

Mr. Speaker, after having listened to so many eloquent and able speeches in the last few days, it is with a certain amount of trepidation that I rise at this time to address the House. That feeling is all the more marked because I am the first member of the group of hon. gentlemen located on what is styled "the cross benches" to break the ice at this session, and judging by the remarks of some of the speakers who have preceded me the water will be fairly cold. The impression seems to exist among some hon. members of this House, especially among those sitting on the Government side, that the independent group in this House are here to represent solely the farmers. I would like to correct that impression and to warn hon. gentlemen who entertain such an opinion that while our numbers, as far as this Chamber are but few, I believe we represent a majority of the public of Canada today. I believe that fact is realized by the hon. gentlemen to whom I refer, and that if it were not for it they would not be quite so concerned about our appearance in this Parliament. It is not our "contemptible little army" they are worrying about; they are apprehensive of the public opinion they must meet at the next general election.

Regarding the amendment before the House, I believe that if the electors of Canada were asked to pronounce upon it they would support it by an overwhelming majority. They would do that not because it was moved by the leader of the Liberal Party or because it is a liberal motion at all. In the first place the Union Government was formed to carry on the war, and its term of office was to be during the war and until demobilization was completed. The Union Administration was also to be composed of fifty per cent Liberals and fifty per cent Conservatives. I may say that I was a supporter of the Union Government at that time and on those terms. Now the war has ended, demobilization has been completed, and it looks to me, Mr. Speaker, as if the Union Government was done, too, as a Union Government, because nearly all the Liberal members of the Union Cabinet have resigned, giving as their reason for so doing that they believed the term for which the Union Government was elected had expired.

In the next place, I do not feel that this Government has been consistent in its policy. It has preached greater production, and has not enacted legislation to encourage production; and although it promised to appoint a committee to prepare tariff legislation to be brought before the House at this session, we have no intimation in the speech from the Throne that this will be done. In fact, the inspired press of the Government has stated that no tariff legislation would be brought down this session.

Some of the greatest economists in the world today claim that the most important factor in restoring the world to normal conditions is "Production and Economy," and I believe we will all agree with that statement. As I have said, the present Government

has preached greater production but has not passed tariff legislation that would have that result, especially in regard to the necessities of life. As for economy, I never heard the present Government accused of that. At the time the war was in progress, the Government instituted a campaign for the greater production of food, which was very necessary at that time, and is even just as imperative at the present moment. One would have expected that at a time when the food shortage was so acute the Government would have reduced the duty on fertilisers, which are so necessary, especially to the potato growers of the Maritime Provinces, if the yield was to be increased, and that it would also have lowered the duty on machinery.

### Son of Dr. Beairto Dead.

William N. Beairto, who died on Feb. 4, was born at Hartland, June 10, 1892. He was a life long sufferer from epilepsy. He died at the home of Mrs. G. W. Crandall, Ayondale. The funeral services were held from the home of Harry Gillis, Lakeville, and was conducted by the Rev. D. Fiske. The body was laid to rest in the Willamstown cemetery beside his mother and brother. A son of Dr. James and Belle F. Beairto, he leaves to mourn: His father, three brothers—Gerald E., Robert K. and Harold K. all of Norgate, Manitoba; and two sisters, Mrs. C. M. King, of Franklin, Manitoba, and Miss Mae Beairto, of Norgate.

### HIGH COST OF LIVING IS STILL GOING UP

Greater Advances in Every Commodity But No Good to Worry.

The high cost of living, the ogre that has haunted the earth during the past five or six years, is still on the job and the necessities of life are reaching new record prices every day. The fact, however, that nearly everything has advanced so that the proportion of prices remains about the same makes "the times" really no harder—and it is true that never were the people so eager to spend their money.

This month the papers of the United States are facing the most critical situation they have yet been called on to work through. It is certain that hundreds of the weaker papers—daily and weekly—will pass out of existence, while in the large cities scores of the great journals are amalgamating. One source of their difficulty is the unheard of high price of news print, which has gone from \$35 a ton to \$510. The wages of mechanical men in the New York offices have raised from \$24 a week to \$60.

The situation is not so bad in Canada, since two years ago the government took over control of the paper mills output and fixed a price that was within reach of the home consumer. This arrangement comes July 1 and then Canada and United States will be on the same footing as regards news print.

This article is meant to treat particularly of The Observer and its high cost of living.

Here are some figures concerning the business and which, it is presumed, apply to Canadian weeklies generally:

Increase in three years:  
Male employees, wages 60 per cent.  
Female " " 125 "  
Newsprint, 3.25 to 5.15 per cwt.

Everything else has increased accordingly. Our newsprint costs each week exactly five times what it cost two years ago, the circulation having increased largely and the use of the paper by 50 per cent. The weekly expense of running The Observer is exactly three times what it was only two years ago.

If this be the case—and it is—the reader will ask, "How do you make ends meet?" The chief answer to this is that the appreciative disposition of the readers themselves is the greatest help we have in "getting by." Two years ago the price of The Observer was 75c. Today it is \$1.50 and not one subscriber has left because of the rise in price. New subscribers come every week. Last Saturday there were five. Then, again, both the volume of advertising and the rates therefore have greatly increased. In the job printing department prices average 100 per cent more than five years ago, and this branch of the business is steadily growing.

We have mentioned these facts, not at all boastfully, but as the figures of one business, at least, that we know thoroughly. And the figures of our private business, which we here give to the public, is intended simply as proof that it does no good to worry over the high cost of living for if one pays more for what he buys he is getting more for what he sells. And there you are.

a very necessary step for the farmers to accomplish greater production, more particularly in view of the very great scarcity of labour. Instead of doing that the Government placed a seven and a half per cent war tax on machinery. Thus while the Government preached production, its own policy has been to penalize production.

But your High Protectionist will say, "How will you raise the revenue?" While nobody would deny that the customs duty produces some revenue, I believe it is the most extravagant method on earth of raising

a revenue.

Take fertilizers, of which we use large quantities in New Brunswick. I speak particularly of conditions in that province because it is that part of Canada I know most about. As I have already said, large quantities of commercial fertilizers are used in New Brunswick; they are devoted to the growing of potatoes, which is a staple crop in that province. The duty on mixed fertilizers, Mr. Speaker, is, as you know, ten per cent; and while the Canadian manufacturers of fertilizers import the raw material, or the chemicals, practically free of duty, they appraise against it the cost of the materials and the cost of mixing—manufacturing as they call it—plus the amount of the duty—and charge us the net result. The result is that you can buy a car of American mixed fertilizers, bring it into any part of Canada and pay the ten per cent duty, at as cheap a rate as it would cost for the purchase of the Canadian mixed material. There are a large number of so-called Canadian mixed material. There are a large number of so-called Canadian fertilizer companies that are merely branches of American companies. These concerns are therefore in the position of charging the consumers of fertilizers in this country with this ten per cent duty. That duty really does not reach our revenue at all; it does not even stay in Canada, it goes to swell the banking account of the American companies.

There are also a number of machinery firms in Canada which are merely branches of American concerns. In some cases they have factories in Canada but in other cases they have not; they merely have assembling plants where the partly manufactured American parts are assembled and put on the Canadian market. These firms also collect the duties on their machinery from the Canadian consumer and the same result happens; it does not go into the revenue of Canada; it does not even stay in Canada, it goes to swell the

American bank account. In this way it is manifest that many thousands of dollars are lost to the revenue of Canada.

Now take the Ford car, which is the poor man's car. In singling out the Ford car I have no criticism of it to make; I have a Ford which is pretty well worn out but it has given me excellent service. What I have said in reference to the Canadian mixed fertilizers and the Canadian assembled machinery applies perhaps more forcibly to the cheap Canadian made car, especially that type produced by American firms. This year in New Brunswick we are paying for Ford cars \$240 more than our American neighbours just beyond the boundary line. Take the case of two men living on each side of the International boundary: The American pays only \$660 for his car while the Canadian has to pay \$900 for exactly the same car manufactured by the same firm. The Canadian car is assembled and put together in this country and sold as a Canadian car but it does not pay any duty into the revenue of the country—that goes to swell the American bank account.

Mr. Speaker, the party to which I have the honor to belong has no desire to "submarine the tariff." I believe that was the term applied with respect to our policy by a Cabinet minister speaking in Montreal a few days ago. We all know that the minister in question (Mr. Meighen) is very apt at phrase making and forming expressions that attract the public ear. But we have no desire to submarine the tariff or anything else. The features of the tariff that we object to are those to which I have made allusion and which permit the Canadian consumer to be robbed without any benefit to the country. These features of the tariff in their operation work exactly the same today as the adverse exchange on Canadian money. No doubt the Canadian manufacturer will hail this adverse exchange as a God-send to Canada, for it will effectually shut out American competition. It works exactly the same way as the items in the protective tariff, to which I have alluded. If you buy American made goods there is a discount on your money of nearly as much as the tariff will amount to—not as much as it would amount to on a Ford car, more than it would amount to on a mower, and as much as it would amount to on some other farm machinery.

Your high protectionist will say, "Oh, yes, it is just as I thought. Your plea is all for the farmers. You want free entry for fertilizers, farm machinery, and the cheap car that the farmers use." And perhaps some people will say, "What does the farmer need with a car?" Mr. Speaker, in this day of high wages and scarcity of labour the farmer in the back concessions needs a car more than his city brother does. It is an absolute necessity when he has to leave his work to go on any errand of business for him to be back home as soon as possible. The old-fashioned method of locomotion by foot or by horseback or by horse and buggy is too slow for this

## WORDS FROM BIBLE.

Has Contributed Phrases to Our Ordinary Language.

The contributions from the Bible to everyday speech is commented upon in an interesting article from the popular new literary publication, "John o' London's Weekly," by E. E. C., who says in part:

"Leaving aside all theological and ecclesiastical terms and phrases, it has enriched our vocabulary and contributed more to our language than any other book. And whilst the words and phrases of the scientist and philosopher are upon the lips of the few, those of the Bible have become the current coin of the everyday language of life.

"The story of Eden has given us 'Forbidden Fruit,' and that of the Flood has contributed the 'Olive branch' as the symbol of peace. The confusion of tongues has bequeathed 'Babel,' whilst 'Ishmaelite' has a far wider meaning to-day than a single tribe.

"The mark of Cain, 'Naboth's vineyard,' the mantle of Elijah, and the handwriting on the wall have become common figures of speech.

"To tell one's birthright found its origin in Esau's transaction with Jacob; and we should never have had the idea of Jubilee but for the laws of Moses.

"If Matthew Arnold borrowed Philistinism from the Germans, they or somebody else borrowed it from the Bible, and if he borrowed 'sweetness and light' from Swift, that eminent divine probably got the idea from the same source, for the terms are more than once associated there. 'The oil for light and sweet incense' (Numbers iv.16); or the phrase may have been suggested by the familiar words of the Psalm, 'Did Burke, who knew his Bible well, get 'light and leading' from 'Send out Thy light and Thy truth; let them lead me?'

"The characters of the Bible have

suggered us with a host of words and phrases. 'As old as Methusalem,' 'the patience of Job,' 'the love of David and Jonathan,' as a synonym for friendship, 'the strength of Samson,' and 'the wiles of Delilah' have all passed into the currency of our language and helped to make it forceful and picturesque. Judas will ever serve as an epithet to fling at a traitor, and Ananias at a liar. Simon, who would have bought the Divine gift for money, has given us simony. Jeremias and Magdalen, Pharisaical and Laodicean, with many others are from Bible names.

"To the Psalms we owe some beautiful and expressive phrases: 'three score years and ten,' 'a tal that is told,' 'the quiverful,' 'the olive plants,' and 'the snare of the fowler,' are a few. And they have given any amount of mottoes to guilds and towns and institutions and families.

"The words of Christ, especially his parables, have largely enriched our language: 'to strain at a gnat and swallow a camel,' to 'hide light under a bushel,' to 'take up the cross,' 'Talented' sends us back to one of the parables, 'a good Samaritan,' and 'a prodigal' to others. 'Loaves and fishes,' 'the eleventh hour,' and 'the widow's mite,' are common expressions with us. Probably 'blowing your own trumpet' found its origin in the action of the Pharisees."



Like everything else, blue furs are going up. A good skin of this much-prized animal will cost you at least \$200 in the coming winter.

It should not be confused with the silver fox, which is a phase or variant of the common red fox; the same animal, that is to say, with a froak color (black with white-tipped hairs), which may be perpetuated from generation to generation by selection and breeding.

The blue fox is, in the same way, a variant of the white Arctic fox, which has a brown and tawny pelage in the summer time. In other words, its color, which is a dark blue-gray, is abnormal and rare. But, for some unexplained reason, most of the foxes on the Pribilof islands, in Bering sea, are of this color.

**Spray to Discourage Mites.**

The farmer who sprays his chickens roosts thoroughly three times during the season, beginning in April, will have little cause to worry about mites, say experienced poultrymen.

The troublesome poultry house mite is almost sure to appear when warm weather comes. The most common means of control is kerosene sprayed upon the perches each week; some farmers give the roosts an occasional coat of whitewash. These methods, however, are not always effective, unless thoroughly done, for the mite is a very hardy creature.

Stronger liquids such as crude carbolic acid or some of the coal tar preparations which will not mix with water are much better. They last longer and do the work better. It is well to dilute the acid or coal tar products with kerosene, so that a spray pump can be used to apply them.

A common formula is one part of acid to three parts of kerosene.

The Chinese make use of fire-crackers for all occasions, and besides the home consumption they export about \$5,000,000 worth annually.







day and generation. So it is absolutely necessary as a matter of economy that the farmer should own a cheap car.

On the other hand, if the duty on farm machinery and on fertilizers increases the cost of production of farm produce more than it should, does it not do the farmer wrong? I claim that it does not. If on account of this high rate of duty on his machinery and the raw material that goes into the production of his crop it costs the farmer more than it should to produce that crop, who suffers most? I claim that the farmer is not the principal sufferer, because perhaps he does not use five per cent of the crops that he produces on his farm. The labouring man, the city man—even I imagine my good friend the member for Brantford (Mr. Cookshutt) uses some of the products of the farm. Of course, I do not suppose he would lose as much on the farm produce he uses as he would gain, say, by the duty on ploughs—and he manufactures good ploughs, too, I can assure you; I have used them—but I believe that this very feature of the tariff is a big factor in the present high cost of living and the unrest to which it gives rise. I believe that the high cost of living could be materially lowered by making the very changes I have just spoken of.

I do not wish to take up very much of the time of the House, Mr. Speaker, because I find as I travel through the country that the people believe Parliament wastes too much time in discussion on the reply to the speech from the Throne. But before I sit down I wish to assure the Government of my appreciation of the honour

they conferred upon me in my recent election by sending three of their ablest cabinet ministers all the way down to New Brunswick to help my opponent to lose his deposit, especially at a time when Parliament was in session and such very important matters were before it for consideration. I believe that one of those ministers, the hon. Minister of the Interior (Mr. Meighen) could hardly be reconciled to the statement which I made at that time that I considered that this visit or visitation of these Cabinet ministers to my constituency increased my majority by at least one thousand votes.

Well, Sir, I will try to enlighten him. I was nominated and ran as an Independent candidate, pledged to support any measure which I believed was for the best interest of Canada, irrespective of which party should introduce it. So that this very decided opposition of the Government to my election seemed to the electors of my constituency to be an admission by the Government that they did not intend to introduce any legislation that would be in the best interests of the people, and my electors resented it. Some of the electors were even mean enough to say that this assistance to my late opponent was for services rendered in the last general election.

Now, Mr. Speaker, I wish to correct the false impression, which, as I have said before, some hon. members seemed to have or were trying to have: That the Independent party in this House is here to subvert the fiscal policy of Canada in the interests of the farmers, regardless of all other industries or people in this Dominion. I wish to assure this House, so far as in me lies that we are here not to tear down, but to give what assistance we can towards the building up of a Greater Canada, so that not only the people of this Dominion but the people of the whole world may say, "Surely Canada is a bit of God's own country."
