Distinctions In the Old Hatfield Meeting House. Around three sides, about on a level with the pulpit, in the old meeting house at Hatfield, Mass., extended the galleries, seached by staircases on the northeast and southeast corners, where, in the front seats, sat the singers, trebles on the north and basses on the south and counters and tenors on the east. The next two rows of seats were occupied by children, girls in the north and boys in the south, and frolicsome youngsters they were, if we may judge by the frequency with which the town was obliged to renew the brass tips to the staves of the tithing men, three of whom were always on duty to keep the youth from disorder.

A Native African Food. The native food of the Malunda country, in southern Africa, comprises manioc and that alone. It is a plant particularly adapted to wet, marshy soil. says the author of "In Remotest Barotseland." It takes two years to arrive at maturity and while growing requires very little attention. The root when full grown is about the size and has very much the appearance of a German sausage, although at times it grows much larger. One shrub has several roots, and the extraction of two or three in no way impairs the growth of the remainder. When newly dug it tastes like a chestnut, and the digestion of the proverbial ostrich can alone assimilate it raw, but when soaked in water for a few days until partly decomposed, dried on the roofs of the huts and stamped it forms a delightfully white soft meal, far whiter and purer than the best flour. Then it is beaten into a thick paste and eaten with a little flavoring composed of a locust or a caterpillar, which the natives seek in decayed trees. Another way of eating this native luxury is by

Hundreds of thousands of peasants and factory operatives who voted in the late election have been disfranchised, and liberal leaders who show a disposition to become active in the forthcoming election campaign are being arrested and either imprisoned or exiled under the laws of "extraordinary and reinforced defense.'







THE FIRST DIRECTORY.

Quaint Olden Time New York Busi-ness and Social Addresses. In the first directory of New York city, which was issued in 1786, there are some peculiar and quaint entries. For instance, in those days it was not uncommon for medical practitioners to sell drugs, as is shown by the following address, "Samuel Bredhurst, physician and apothecary, 64 Queen (now Pearl)

Clergymen of that period were exceedingly precise regarding their titles. Thus, "Abraham Bache, reverend of the Church of England, 29 Smith street," and "Joze Phelan, clergyman of the Church of Rome, 1 Beekman street."

Leon Rogers, tailor, of 5 Broadway, was described as a "breeches maker;" John Bean, 60 Broadway, as "surgeon and tooth puller;" S. Crygler, 69 Cherry street, "punch and porter house;" Jo Deleplane of 132 Queen street, "Quaker speaker;" D. Hitchcock, 89 Queen street, "house carpenter and undertaker;" John Hogland, 95 Queen street, "fiddler, etc.;" Henry H. Kip, 25 King street, "Inspector of pot and pearl ashes;" John Nitchle, 7 Garden street. "starch and hair powder maker;" Samuel B. Webb, 29 Lower Dock street.

In those days, too, there were a great many "gentlewomen" and a few "washwomen." All teachers were then addressed either as "schoolmasters" or "schoolmistresses." The retail dealers on Broadway and Wall and Queen streets called themselves "shopkeepers," the hotel men were "tavern keepers," and the policemen were "watch-
