

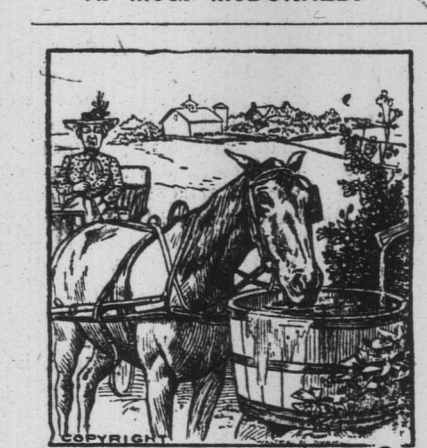

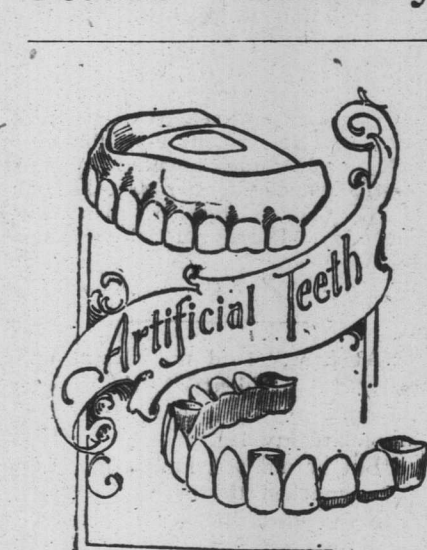

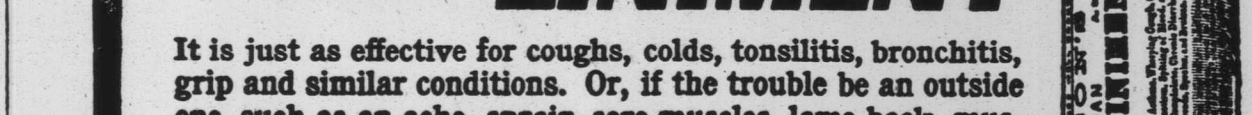

PREVENTION OF CRIME.

There is now going on at Hope-well Cape the trial of a young man, charged with a crime, for which, if pronounced guilty by twelve of his fellow-citizens, he must die. There is much uncertainty as to whether he committed the foul deed. If convicted, the evidence must all be purely circumstantial. And many innocent men have been hanged on such evidence.

The person who takes the life of another is not in his right mind, and should be treated as other insane people are—confined and restrained sufficiently to protect all others from a similar fate at his hands.

Society is not fair to its criminal classes. It lets them run wild, without proper supervision, until a tragedy occurs, and then arrests and imprisons or kills them. The time is coming—should be here, now—when expert alienists will be commissioned to regularly visit the public schools to select those children, whose dispositions are such as to make certain they will turn out bad, and take them to places where they will receive the education and restraint necessary to develop what is good in them and eradicate, as far as possible, the evil tendencies. Many could be reclaimed; the others could be kept from injuring the normal members of society.

The annual penitentiary report for 1906 shows that there are 400 men, who would otherwise be dependent upon the state, now earning a living as respectable members of society, because of their being allowed their liberty on parole, instead of being kept in prison. Many persons may be saved by the parole system who would by confinement become hopeless criminals. Much of the crime committed is due to the education and surroundings of the culprits. Give them a chance to reform.

The government measure for the pensioning of J. C. R. employees has met with no opposition in parliament, so rapidly is the idea of old-age pensions growing among the thinkers of both the Liberal and Conservative parties.

Robert Pringle, M. P. for Cornwall, has a motion on the order paper for old-age pensions generally. His motion will not pass this session, but the supporters of such a measure will not have to wait long, before the country concurs in their opinion.

UNHAPPY RUSSIA.

The Czar's manifesto of October 30th, 1905, guaranteeing freedom of conscience, freedom of association, freedom of public assembly, and real inviolability of personal rights, is still nominally in force. But how has it been kept?

During last year, 1235 persons were sentenced to death for political or revolutionary crimes, 2029 condemned to servitude in the mines, 186 were sent to Siberia for life, 5945 were imprisoned for various offences, 563 newspapers were suspended, and 732 responsible editors were prosecuted; and all for offences that in Western countries are recognized rights of all citizens.

The Constitutional Democratic party, which had a majority in the late Duma; has now been outlawed, and all of its leading members, including its president and vice-president, are under indictment for treason. Hundreds of thousands of peasants and factory operatives who voted in the late election have been disfranchised, and liberal leaders who show a disposition to become active in the forthcoming election campaign are being arrested and either imprisoned or exiled under the laws of "extraordinary and reinforced defense."

Of the representatives of the people in Russia's first parliament, one (Professor Herzenstein) has been murdered by "Black Hundred" assassins, one has gone insane, two have been cruelly beaten, ten are hiding, five have been exiled, twenty-four are in prison, thirty-three have been arrested and searched, and one hundred and eight-two are under indictment on the charge of treason.

Yet there are still a few people in this country who blame the Russian revolutionists? What would we do in their place? What did our Ancestors do when their kings, who were no worse than the Czars, tried to ride roughshod over an awakened people?

OUR BOYS IN THE WEST.

Maritime Province men, and especially New Brunswickers, are taking a leading part in far western politics. Among the Vancouver candidates for Legislative honours are, on the Liberal side, J. W. DeB. Farris, son of Hon. L. P. Farris of Queen's Co., N. B.; and on the Conservative side are, J. F. Garden, formerly of Woodstock, N. B., and W. J. Bowser, a native of Kent Co. Dr. King, son of senator King of Chipman, is again the Liberal Candidate at Cranbrook, defying both Conservatives and Socialists to oust him from the seat he has held for the last three years.

A. H. B. McGowan, of P. E. I., is another Conservative Candidate in Vancouver; and Hon. W. W. B. McInnes, a Liberal candidate, is the son of a Nova Scotian.

In the bye-election campaign in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, the Liberal Standard bearer is another New Brunswicker, Alphonse Turgeon, son of the popular M. P. for Gloucester Co.

Wherever they go our Eastern boys make their presence felt. Too bad we cannot keep more of them at home; but there is satisfaction in knowing that their services are not lost to Canada.

The outcome of the provincial election now pending in British Columbia is awaited with more than usual interest by people all over Canada, for the reason that in the forty-three constituencies in the province, more than a score of the candidates are confirmed Socialists. Other candidates have been chosen by the Labor element and are putting up a stiff fight. Never a night goes by that a Socialist meeting is not held, and in the city of Vancouver they are being allowed the use of the city hall. This is perhaps significant. At any rate it shows that Socialism is fast gaining ground in the West.—St. John Star.

Because of the Lethbridge Coal Dispute, which closed the mines all last summer and fall, the people of Alberta and Saskatchewan are in desperate straits, now, for fuel. In many places, several families are compelled to cook, eat and sleep in one room, because of scarcity of coal; while some are obliged to leave their homes and move in with others.

All this suffering could have been avoided by public ownership of the mines. The government of Saskatchewan are now considering the advisability of buying a coal area from the Dominion for the purpose of averting future coal famines by operating mines on the public ownership principle. If the people are wise, they will take over the direct control of all the fuel supply.

There were, in 1906, about 74,589 miles of railway in the British Empire, of which 30,000 were owned by the Governments concerned.

Opponents of Woman Suffrage often say that women would not vote, if given the right. But in the last election in New Zealand, 75 per cent. of the registered women voted, and 76 per cent. of the registered men. Not much of a difference.

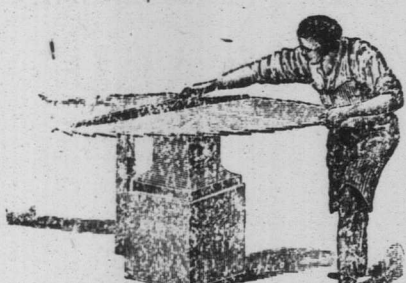

THE FIRST DIRECTORY.

Quaint Olden Time New York Business and Social Addresses.

In the first directory of New York city, which was issued in 1786, there are some peculiar and quaint entries. For instance, in those days it was not uncommon for medical practitioners to sell drugs, as is shown by the following address, "Samuel Bredhurst, physician and apothecary, 64 Queen (now Pearl) street."

Clergymen of that period were exceedingly precise regarding their titles. Thus, "Abraham Beebe, reverend of the Church of England, 80 South street," and "Joie Phelan, clergyman of the Church of Rome, 1 Beekman street."

Leon Rogers, tailor, of 5 Broadway, was described as a "freeshee maker." John Bean, 60 Broadway, as "surgeon and tooth puller." S. Crygier, 60 Cherry street, "punch and porter house." Jo Delaplaine of 122 Queen street, "Quaker speaker."

D. Hittcock, 80 Queen street, "house carpenter and undertaker." John Hogland, 95 Queen street, "dialler, etc." Henry H. Kip, 25 King street, "inspector of pot and pearl shales." John Nitchie, 7 Garden street, "starch and hair powder maker." Samuel B. Webb, 29 Lower Dock street, "gentleman."

In those days, too, there were a great many "gentlemen" and a few "wash-women." All teachers were then addressed either as "schoolmasters" or "schoolmistresses." The retail dealers on Broadway and Wall and Queen streets called themselves "shopkeepers," the hotel men were "tavern keepers," and the policemen were "watchmen."

THE COLD WATER ORDEAL.

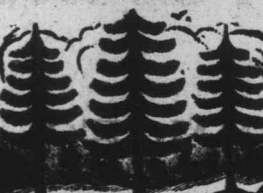

A \$75,000 MILL FOR BC ESTOWN

Miramichi Lumber Company Will Start Big Enterprise.

From Boiestown comes the report that the Miramichi Lumber Company have decided upon the erection of a new mill of a very extensive nature on what is known as the flat of the town. It is said in connection with the report that a meeting of some of these mainly interested in the management of the Miramichi Lumber Company was held this week in Boiestown and that it was then decided to petition for permission to dam the South West branch of the Miramichi at Boiestown and there erect a mill at a cost of about \$75,000, such as has been talked of for some years past.

It is said that the mill when built will saw both long and short lumber and both soft and hard wood. There will be about 16 single machines in the mill so the story goes, and employment will be given to between 75 and 100 men.

The Frederick Giesner which publishes the story has made efforts to have the story denied or confirmed by officials of the Miramichi Lumber Co., but so far has been unable to get either denial or confirmation.—North Shore Leader

STERN RULE IN MEXICO

City of Mexico, Jan. 12.—Late advices from the Orizaba strike district are to the effect that 5,562 of the 7,033 men who were out, have returned to work. Although everything is quiet at present swift punishment was inflicted by the government upon the men who were the leaders in the late strike.

The seven leaders were shot today in the sight of hundreds of witnesses. The shooting of these leaders, among whom were Rafael Moren, vice-president, and Manuel Juras, secretary of the Working men's Organization, was dramatic. It occurred at 5.30 o'clock on the morning that the thousands of the already half starved strikers determined to turn back to work.

The factory whistles were blowing and throngs of men were about to enter the open door, when they saw a squad of soldiers leading the condemned men to the ruins of the store that had been razed by the mob. Placing the men on the piles of smoldering rubbish, the soldiers stepped back the desired number of paces and the volley that followed closed this dramatic chapter of the strike.

The throngs of dazed workmen who unwillingly witnessed the horrible sight, waited for a moment until the smoke cleared away and then entered the mill.

Later, a workman, who apparently had been drinking, came to the door to resume the work within, and as he entered he thickly shouted: "Muerto" (death). Instantly he was fired on and killed by a squad of soldiers. All of the executed men were speedily buried.

The Interstate Commerce Commission's inquiry concerning B. H. Of steamship companies Mr. Harriman controls the Pacific Mail, Occidental and Oriental, Asiatic, Pacific Coast, and the McAlister. He is thus master of the sea routes. Such an aggregation of power in the hands of one man is doing much more to lead people to think of public ownership of railways than have all the speeches made by reformers in the last ten years.

The Miramichi lumber cut this winter will be about 100,000,000 feet. The Miramichi Lumber Co., will cut from 15 to 25 millions; T. Lynch & Co., 7 or 8 millions; Michael Welsh, 6 millions; the Wm. Richards Co., from 2 to 3 millions; making over 40 millions on the South West branch.

On the Northwest, D. Hutchinson will cut 5 or 6 millions; the Ritchie Co., about 8 millions; Hon. Mr. Birchill, 3 million; McKane & Sinclair, 7 million; the Sulphate Fibre Co., and the Dominion Pulp Co., about 7 million; James Robinson, on the Renous, 4 million; and J. B. Snowball Co., from 1 to 16.

The heaviest operators on the Restigouche this winter are the Dalhousie Lumber Company (the Hilyard concern), the William Richards Company and the Shives Lumber Co. Messrs. Hilyard will cut 8 to 10 million; the Shives Lumber Company will cut about 15 million, while the Richards Company expects to get out about 12 million of cedar and spruce.

Of the other concerns, the Bay Chaleur Lumber Company are expected to cut from 6 to 8 million while W. H. Miller will cut about 3 million and the B. A. Mowatt operation will take out 3 million.

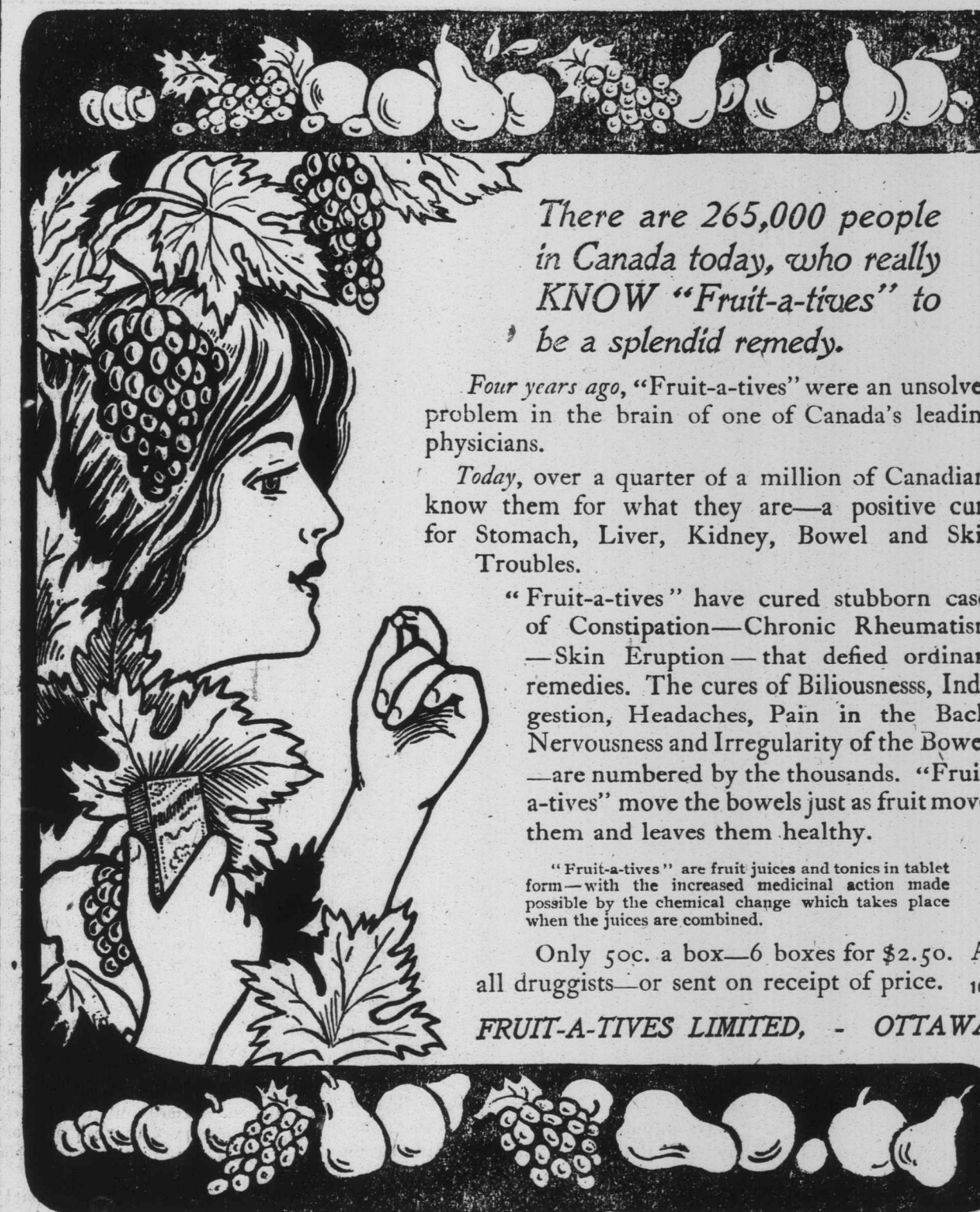

B. C. POLITICS

Five Distinct Parties are in The Political Field in British Columbia.

Premier Richard McBride appeals to the province as leader of a straight Liberal-Conservative party, and in so doing, divorces from his support the Socialists following, headed by Hawthornthwaite, of Nanaimo, by grace of which the government has been maintained in power during the past three sessions, having a majority of but one over all parties in the just dissolved house, but an actual working majority of seven through alliance with the Socialists.

The Liberals, headed by J. A. Macdonald, K. C. of Rossland, will meet with solid battalions the forces of Conservatism, and with such champions in their ranks as W. W. B. McLean, "Hon. John" Oliver, Smith Curtis, and T. W. Paterson, are under little if any disadvantage in comparison with the Government brigades. Only in the possession of the ground and control of the treasury, have Premier McBride and his colleagues a tactical advantage, offset, the Liberal leaders believe, by the millstone attachment of certain of their public acts.

But the political battle in British Columbia is not between the marshalled forces of Liberalism and Conservatism—a straight fought contest to a decisive end. The Socialists will also have candidates in virtually all constituencies, and expect to gain at least four seats from the established parties.

There is the embryo labor party evolved out of the last annual convention of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, which holds aloof from Liberals and Conservatives and Socialists as well. And to complete the babel of tongues, there are also the Martin Independents.

The new party which Joseph Martin is to lead to the fray, Mr. Martin himself running in both Victoria and Vancouver, with strong prospects of election in the latter, is merely a Joe Martin party, nothing more and nothing less. It aspires to recognition as a new political party of Canada, the birth notice of which was first published in Winnipeg about two years ago, its champions being W. P. McLean in Ontario, R. L. Richardson in the middle west, and Joseph Martin on the coast.

The retirement of Hon. R. F. Green, Minister of Lands and Works, immediately preceded the announcement of dissolution has placed the Premier in an unenviable position. Those in touch with political affairs do not believe his act was voluntary, in fact it may be regarded as a throwing overboard under compulsion to propitiate transactions through the lands department.

The blizzard is raging in Southern Alberta, the centre of the cattle country. More than one thousand head of cattle have been found dead on ranches, which are covered with deep snow.

During the year, 361 persons had been killed in railway accidents, 16 of whom were passengers, 139 employees, and 206 others. There were 1,365 injured, of whom 235 were passengers, 890 employees and 240 others.

On the \$14 miles of electric roads there were 12 passengers, 2 employees and 33 others killed; and 1655 persons injured.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—At last the railway lands in Alberta and Saskatchewan have been apportioned and great areas are open to settlers. Homesteaders will also be allowed to buy, at \$3.00 per acre, adjoining lots not applied for by new settlers.
