COUNCIL ORDERS ELECTRIC PUMP

Will Install 600 Gallon Centrifugal Pump at Walker Brook.

A meeting of the Town Council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. The meeting was called for the purpose of considering the offer of a pump received from different firms. After discussion it was decided to purchase a Dume type B. B., two stage centrifugal pump, equipped for belt drive, capacity 600 gallons per minute, together with one 75 H. P. electric motor to run same. This pump will be installed for the present at the Walker Brook near the race track. This outfit with power line, etc., will cost a little over \$2,000. On account of Architect Swain for \$700.00 for preparing plans and specifications for the new fire station, being three and one-half per cent on the estimated cost of \$20,000. After some discussion the bill was passed. The council then adjourned.

ANNIVERSARY OF TEMPORARY HOSP.

One Year of Work By Hotel Dieu in Temporary Quarters.

Tuesday next, the 16th inst., will be the anniversary of the opening of the Temporary Hotel Dieu Hospital in the building formerly occupied as the Intercolonial Hotel. The year has been a busy one in the institution and the nurses have found their work hampered by the lack of proper hospital accommodations and equipment. However it is gratifying for them to know that the object of their organization has been fully realized during the year despite the many drawbacks. Many lives have been saved and much suffering relieved as is evident from the remarkably low percentage of deaths and the "unimproved" discharged. The Reverend Sisters are now looking forward to the occupation of their new hospital early in the New Year. Orders are being entered for the equipment of the various departments. This implies a vast amount of purchasing as practically all the hospital furniture was lost in the fire, and since then the Sisters have bought only what was absolutely necessary. Already friends have come forward with offers of help. Rooms have been selected and provided for by the local Knights of Columbus. The Ladies' Hospital Aid Society of Jacques River, Messrs. Robert St. Onge, Campbellton and Alexis Levesque of St. Quentin. There are still seven private rooms to be furnished, together with Kitchens, Utility rooms, Reception and dining room, Operating suite, etc. Ward beds and furnishings, costing \$75, have also been promised by several persons. The value of this assistance is realized when one considers that there are between 40 and 70 different rooms in the Hospital alone, over two hundred window shades are required and as many electric light fixtures. Add to this the chairs and tables, the labor appliances, the special requisites and we have a list whose name is legion. Why not be one of the sixty or seventy to furnish that many rooms within the next few months. It will be a great help to the Hospital and we are prepared to guarantee that the individual will receive much happiness in the thought of being an aid in so great a philanthropic enterprise as is this Hospital.

If it continues, we must organize co-operative stores, where the public will be served at living profits. The War Veterans were compelled to this action in Winnipeg and other places, also Fredrickton has the United Farmers Co-operative Store, which is spoken of in the press as a great need in that community.

Campbellton is blessed in being free from strikes and the Bolshevik agitators, but we have unrest here to no small degree, and the cause is, high cost of living, and the retailers high profits is chiefly to blame. Fredrickton markets prices this week are as follows. What are Campbellton prices?

Butter	70c. to 75c.
Yeast	8c. to 12c.
Veal	14c. to 20c.
Lamb	17c. to 23c.
Pork by the quarter	23c.
Carrots by bbl.	\$1.50

Apples	\$4.00 to \$6.00 per bbl.

We are told by grocers we will have to pay 75c. for turkeys this Christmas, while they are quoted in the Toronto market at 31 to 36c. for 13 lbs and young at 36c. to 41c. per lb.

The talk is broad east that Campbellton is the dearest town in the Maritime Provinces in which to live and I am told that a family that moved to Moncton from here, say they can save at least thirty dollars per month on their family needs.

We believe the press is keeping silent on this matter in fear of the public saying they are knocking our own town, but is this the best policy in the long run? I believe not.

**WORLD SHORTAGE
OF PAPER REPORTED**

Warning to Publishers on This Side of the Atlantic.

MONTREAL, Dec. 9.—A clear warning to newspaper publishers on this side of the Atlantic about the prodigious consumption of paper was uttered yesterday by Mr. George F. Steel, president of the Canadian Export Paper Company, Ltd., who has just returned from a visit to the Old Country that was just as brief as it could be, since he only spent two days on the side.

"There is a world shortage of paper, everywhere it is the same tale," he said. "There is plenty of opportunity to sell paper, but the difficulty is to meet the demand. Publishers on this side will have to face the situation, otherwise there are going to be some suspensions of papers very soon if they don't take warning."

In such instances, one cross will be issued to the widow and one to the mother.

LESS BIG GAME IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Moose Scarce in Parts of the Miramichi Country—Caribou Nearly Extinct.

Fredrickton Mail: The open season for game which came to a close on November 26th has undoubtedly been one of the most successful seasons in the history of the province. Although a great many moose have been killed by both resident and non-resident sportsmen there is no doubt that this splendid game animal is on the decline in New Brunswick, and they are not soon given greater protection. They will only exist if they will be entirely extinct. Moose were scarce in New Brunswick twenty-five years ago, but ten years later they were again becoming scarce more particularly in that section of the country watered by the Miramichi. The time will soon come when the drastic steps will need to be taken for their conservation. It can be done by reducing the length of the open season. It begins now on September 15th and if it were to start a month later the hunting or hunting season would be over and the big bulls would have a better chance to avoid the hunters. If the moose is to be conserved something has got to be done soon.

Caribou Scarce.

In regard to Caribou they seem to have become extinct in the central and southern districts of the province. Some small herds have been seen in the region of Bald Mountain in the northern part of the province, but there have been seen elsewhere. Deer are said to be more plentiful now in New Brunswick than in Maine and some guides declare that this is largely responsible for the scarcity of Caribou.

Bears Plentiful.

Bears have become very plentiful in New Brunswick in recent years. The fur went down in price a few seasons ago and less trapping was done than in former years. Bears have recently advanced in price and it is likely that more attention will be paid to them by trappers and hunters. Bears are scarce this fall and the bears caught their dens earlier than usual. While there has been a decline in the number of non-resident sportsmen to the province since the past season, few if any come from the old country. They are likely to come next year in large numbers as also will the Americans and there will need to be changes in the game laws, with a view of conserving our resources.





TO TUNNEL TO THE DEAD SEA

Norwegian Engineer's Project
to Provide Water and Power
For Palestine.

Christiania, Dec. 8.—A Norwegian engineer has devised a plan to provide water and electric power for Palestine at an initial cost of \$40,000,000. Albert Hjorth, of this city, proposes to utilize the variation of the level between the Mediterranean and the Dead Sea, and, by means of a tunnel for water, to provide electric power to be used for pumping stations, irrigation and general purposes.

Mr. Hjorth proposes to dig a tunnel thirty-seven miles long, from the Mediterranean to the Dead Sea, passing under Jerusalem. This tunnel would carry water from the Mediterranean to the western slopes of the lower end of the Jordan Valley. Thence the water would pass through pipes down to the Dead Sea, where a power plant would transform the water power into electricity, to be distributed as light and power through the country. This power would be used to drive a pumping station at the southern end of the Sea of Galilee (Lake Gennesaret).

The surface of the Dead Sea is about 1,300 feet below sea level; that of the Sea of Galilee 650 feet below sea level.

Preliminary estimates, Mr. Hjorth says, show that tens of thousands of horse-power might be developed in this way by means of a tunnel carrying twenty tons of water per second. He estimates the rise of the Dead Sea caused by this at not more than part of a yard per year. The surface of the sea which is now about 4,000 square miles would be allowed to increase to about 4,800 square miles. Two canals would be built, running parallel with the river Jordan and from these canals water could be distributed among the fields sloping toward the Jordan sufficient, it is claimed, for the irrigation of many thousands of thousands of acres.

Mr. Hjorth claims it would be no more difficult to build this tunnel than the proposed railway tunnel under the English Channel and estimates the cost of a Dead Sea tunnel (double) with a minimum area of 135 square feet at \$10,000,000, to which must be added the cost of the power plants, factories, canals and irrigation works. It is pointed out that the estimated cost involved in this plan does not compare unfavorably with the irrigation work constructed in Asia and America during the last decade.

Mr. Hjorth's plans have met with great sympathy among leading scientific authorities and practical engineers in Norway. It is proposed to send out a Norwegian technico-scientific expedition which, with the anticipated support of the governments of the great powers interested, will proceed to Palestine and make a year's thorough investigation of all the conditions relative to the realization of this project—topographical, hydrological, geological, hygienic, etc. If the matter reaches such a stage that the realization of this great project can seriously be contemplated the resources of Norway will not suffice alone, but the aid of international capital will be invited.



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



St. John City and County subscribed a total of \$5,598,500.

2 CHRISTMAS DAYSIsland of Madagascar the Only
Country Thus Favored.Queen Ranavalona II on Ascending
Throne Became First Christian
Ruler and Adopted "Glory to
God in Highest" Motto.

There is only one spot in the whole world where Christmas is celebrated twice each year and that is the island of Madagascar, off the eastern coast of the southern end of Africa, and which dominates that part of the Indian ocean.

Marco Polo, the great traveler, first made this island known to medieval Europe in 1293. It was nearly two hundred years later when a Portuguese traveler obtained the first authentic information about the island, in 1497. From that time on there were attempts by the Portuguese, French and English to settle the island, and they met with defeat at the hands of the wild and savage Hovas, who controlled the island, and many died from malaria fever in the lowlands of the coast. On Christmas eve in 1672 all the Frenchmen at Fort Dauphin were murdered by the natives. In 1810 a Hova chief, Radama I, a young man, allowed the Christian missionaries to teach their Bible doctrines in the island, and by 1820 Protestant Christianity was effectively introduced among the Hovas.

First Christian Ruler.
Radama died in 1828, and one of his wives became Queen Ranavalona I. She was bitter against the Christians and persecuted them in many cruel ways, and she had her warriors from the interior mountains of the island massacre the native Christians, who refused to renounce the Christian God and go back to the worship of idols. The cruel queen reigned until her death in 1861—a wicked record of 33 years. Then her son, Radama II, became king, and although he was a great drunkard and led a wild life himself, he allowed the Christian missionaries to come into the island again. He was assassinated in the palace in 1863, and his widow, Rasoherina, was proclaimed queen. Upon her death in 1868, a niece of Ranavalona I ascended the throne as Ranavalona II. When a girl, her gentle charities and sympathy with the Christians during their persecutions had won respect and love, and when she became queen it was understood that Madagascar would be a really Christian ruler on its throne. Between 1830 and 1835 the entire Bible had been printed in the Malagasy language, and a copy of the Malagasy Bible placed near the throne; while on the canopy above, in golden letters, were the words: "Glory to God in the Highest, Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men." With one hand on the Bible, the queen addressed the people, expressing the hope that they would adopt the Christian faith, but added: "In this matter you shall not be compelled."

Ordered Idols Destroyed.
She ordered her own household idols and the chief national idol to be burned and gradually her example was followed by the general destruction of household idols among the Hovas. She married the prime minister the following year and made a public profession of her faith, and from that time on the Christian religion has been growing fast in the island.

The words over the canopy at her coronation the queen knew to be spoken by the angels in the sky when the shepherds heard the noise of wings at the time the Christ was born in Bethlehem. Christmas is celebrated all over the island now. But the Hovas have a different way of computing time and by their system Christmas falls some time in November, and they celebrate it then. The Christian date of December 25 is also celebrated by the natives along with the missionaries. But it is not a Christmas of snow and sleighbells. It is a tropical country and Christmas day is under a torrid sun, but the sky is brilliant and the magnificent flowering trees of many vivid colors are filled with many peculiar birds of brilliant plumage, while the grounds beneath is bespangled with wild blossoms of varied hues.

Too Late.
It was Christmas eve. Staring at the dying embers of the fire was a beautiful woman. Her face was worried, and she clasped and unclasped her hands in nervous excitement. "Christmas eve," she murmured, "and no money to buy baby a Christmas gift!"

Mechanically her eyes wandered around the room until, with a guilty start, they rested on something standing on the mantelpiece. It was baby's money-box. "If I only dared!" she thought; "but what would John say?" For a few moments she stood debating the awful question in her mind, and then reached for the box. "John need never know," she said. With trembling hands she broke open the box and emptied on the table a collection of buttons, nails, and so on. John had been there first!





NEW GOLD FIELD RICHEST IN WORLD

Situated 30 Miles from Dawson, According to Prospectors.

Vancouver, Dec. 5.—The statement made in the Liverpool Post that "It is whispered one reason for the Chancellor of the Exchequer's present optimism is a vast discovery of gold on the British side of the Yukon," possibly refers to the discovery made by Donald Mackinnon, of Vancouver, in the early spring of 1900. This is, at least, the claim of Mr. Mackinnon, who in a statement states that the field is one of the richest in the world, and, in his own words "one of the claims alone will produce as much gold as ever came out of the whole of the Yukon."

Mr. Mackinnon states that last summer, a well-known mining engineer visited the claims and reported favorably upon the prospects, and that word of the discovery has been sent to England. It is situated within thirty miles of Dawson City.





THIEVES ENTERTAIN AND PAY CAPTIVES

Burglars Pay Captives—Feast, Dance and Sing in Omaha Store After Stealing \$63,000.

Omaha, Neb.—Robbers blew the safe of Hayden Bros' store, one of the largest retail houses here, at midnight Saturday after they had bound and gagged two watchmen and escaped with \$63,000 in cash, securities and other valuables.

After satisfying their monetary desires the thieves feasted on "Dutch lunch" from the grocery department, sang and danced for their captives for three hours, paid each \$20 "for his trouble," and departed at daylight. It is believed that the safe-blowers secluded themselves in the store during the rush hours Saturday and remained there when the place closed at night. After overcoming the watchmen they took rugs from the draper department to muffle the "explosions" and blew the safes with nitroglycerin. Joseph Hayden, president of the firm, asserted that the cash in the vault amounted to \$30,000. Among the loot also were many Liberty bonds belonging to employees.

The Germans are making a big effort to capture the British trade in certain articles. Already silk, cotton and other manufactured articles are arriving in large quantities. Samples of German toys also have been received, and it is believed the object of the samples is to test the markets before making delivery in bulk.

Godfrey Cheesman, general secretary of the National Union of Manufacturers, says:—"Though the popular idea is that German goods are still marked 'Made in Germany,' there is good reason to believe that enormous quantities of German-made goods are being shipped here through neutral countries without anything to indicate the origin."

Mr. Cheesman suggests that to overcome the difficulty all foreign goods might be marked "Not British Manufacture."

Washington, Dec. 1.—Since the signing of the armistice the United States and Great Britain have resumed trading with Germany, as shown in reports made public to-day by the Department of Commerce. Exports from the United States to Germany for the first ten months of the year totalled \$52,420,000, and imports from Germany \$4,914,787. Great Britain, from the signing of the armistice to Oct. 1, exported to Germany goods valued at more than \$80,000,000 and received imports from Germany valued at \$1,885,000.
