

SUDDEN DEATH OF

Had Retired Feeling Unwell - All Efforts to Resuscitate Him Were Fruitless.

Brownville Junction, Me., April 14.-Senator Arthur Hill Gillmor died suddenly on a Canadian Pacific train last night at 10:30, while on his way to Ottawa. He got on at McAdam Junction. He complained of feeling unwell and had retired for the night, when the attention of the passengers was attracted to him by his springing from his berth and falling heavily on the floor of the car. Every effort was made to resuscitate him, but without sensation among the passengers. He was to meet his wife at Montreal, to which city the body was taken. A short time before his death he was talking cheerfully to those about him.

The late senator was born at St. George, N. B., in 1824. He became a member of the Legislative Assembly of his native province in 1854. In 1865 he became provincial secretary. In 1874 he unsuccessfully contested Charlotte in the Liberal interests for the House of Commons, but was elected at the general elections in 1884, and held his seat through successive elections un-til 1896, when he was defeated. He was called to the Senate in April, 1900.
