The German Socialist Vote Doubled. BERLIN, Feb. 21.—There was tremer voting in the afternoon yesterday. One great point was the complete absence of the anti-Semetic faction in Berlin. The great fact of the election is the large and unexpected increase in the Socialist vote. The Socialist vote in Berlin is increased 20,000; the Deutsche Freissinige 30,000, and the Conservatives have lost 34,000. and the Conservatives have lost 34,000. The election of two Socialists in this city is certain. The latest apparent result is that the Government parties have lost fifteen seats, and the Socialists throughout Germany have doubled their vote. Liebnecht and Singer, Socialists, are elected. Those received up to midnight show the election of five Socialists, three members of the Carrel Union, two Poles and six Centrists. His senses were muddled for a short time, but when he recalled himself he called his wife. Mr. Liston and his wife were badly burned and received other injuries. Mrs. Liston, in jumping out of the window to save herself, broke her right ankle. They were conveyed to the hospital and are now in as favorable a condition as could be expected. The case is one of the saddest the city has ever known, and recalls the sad affair on Princess street some nine years ago, when Mr. Johnston had two of his grandchildren destroyed. The painful scenes of last night were heartrending.

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

This will put the enterprise absolutely beyond par-tisan control, for, as the Board will consist of 104 members, no important ques-tion can be passed upon without the affirmative action of 70 of them. There is therefore every prospect that the New Yorkers will be able to convince Congress that they will carry the Columbus Exposition to a successful issue, and in that case it is believed the site to be chosen will be New York, and the great exhibition of the west will continue to be the Western Fair of London, only the people will not have to wait till 1892 to enjoy its attractions. OUR RELATIONS WITH UNITED STATES.

Ex-Governor Foraker of Ohio made a peech the other night from which it appeared that in his opinion the fishery ques-tion came very near to precipitating a war three or four years ago. The story as told by Mr. Foraker is that he had been requested by the authorities at Washington to report how many men the State of Ohio could rush to the Canadian frontier at an hour's notice in the event of war being delours notice in the event of war being declared. It is very much to be regretted that no serious attempt is made to dispose of it peacefully and finally; and especially is it to be regret-ted that the Government of Canada does not move in the matter. We in this country have more at stake than either Great Britain or the United States, for should war unfortunately break out we would inevitably be the greatest sufferers. And the province upon whom the direct misfortune would come is our own Ontario, which so far as material interests go has little to gain or lose no matter how the question of the fisheries is settled. A settlement on the lines of a commercial treaty or of uprestricted trade between the two countries is perfectly feas ible, and besides removing all causes of friction it would tend to very greatly advance the commercial prosperity of both

countries.

The farmers of Ontario have just rea to complain of the way in which they have been treated by the Dominion Government during the past ten years, in being oblige to pay millions of dollars every year for the nefit of a few favored manufacturers and to find money for the Government to expend extravagantly on a hundred needless enterprises. Thirteen million dollars a year is what is exacted now over and above the amount required in the time of Mr. Mackenzie's administration, and of this amount the people of Ontario contribute at least one-half. But this is for money paid to the Government, while nearly as much more goes to the favored manufacturers and sugar refiners in whose behalf the tariff was framed. We do not mean all the manufacturers, for more than one-half of them would be better off without the tariff duties; we mean the pets of the Govern-ment, who respond to Macdonald's call when election funds are wanted. The farmers have great reason to complain of this state of things, by a they would have infinitely greater cause & complain were war to break out between the United States and Great Britain as a consequence of the refusal of the Canadian Government to make terms on a fair basis and upon free trade lines. Here in Ontario we are half surrounded by three States having a population of 3,000,000 that could in a week's lation of 3,000,000 that could in a week's time pour an army 200,000 strong across our borders to carry fire and terror into every county from the Ottawa River to Lake Huron. Can we afford to talk the fool in the face of such odds, or can we hesitate to demand that all disturbing causes be set at rest while our neighbors are in the humor to make an honorable settlement on a basis mutually advantage-

INSTITUTIONS.

Every year—we were almost inclined to write from time immemorial—the Tory Opposition in the Ontario Legislature has indulged in carping criticism of the money expended for running the public institutions of the country. They have been at it again this year. They do not descend to particulars. They merely take the ground that the expenses should be so much less. Hon. Mr. Hardy gave them their answer in the Legislature the other evening, and it was an effective one. He pointed out that it was quite within the range of possibilities to bring down the average cost of main-tenance of patients in public institutions, especially in such places as asylums for the insane. It would be easy to give the patients less food and make it of a poorer quality. It would be easy to reduce the bill for fuel, by giving them less heat; the bill for supervision and medical oversight, by shutting the patients up in pens as was the custom in less enlightened days. The Government, however, takes the ground that it is its duty to treat the poor un fortunates in a humane spirit, and put them as far as possible in the way of recovery. But, as Hon. Mr. Hardy points out, the fairest way to meet the arguments of the objectors is by comparison with neighborobjectors is by comparison with neighbor-ing institutions of a similar descrip-tion. In the more costly of the Ontario asylums the following are the returns of the cost for maintenance, fixed on the average of the last seven years Toronto, \$2 92 per capita per week; London, \$2 69; Kingston, \$2 54; Hamilton, \$2 65. In the New York State Asylum, on the other hand, the cost per head per week is \$4 56; and in the Hudson River State Hospital it is \$5 62. Then in a similar institution in Buffalo the weekly cost pe patient, not including clothing and official salaries, is \$6 04. At the Willard Hospital the per capita cost is \$3 40. This proves that so far as economy of management is concerned the Ontario Asylums are away ahead of those in the neighboring States The same may be said of the salaries paid to officials. Mr. Meredith hints that these are too large, but he does not show in what respect they can be reduced. THE problem of making rooms at once healthful and comfortable during cold weather is not an easy one to solve general rule as to the temperature of living noms limits the degree of heat to 68 degrees rooms limits the degree of heat to 68 degrees or 70 degrees Fahrenheit. But the lean, the aged and the invalid often demand a higher degree of heat than this to be really comfortable, while those who are young, adipose, in health, going in and out of doors constantly and taking abundant exercise, find rooms so heated almost intolerable. Those who require a higher temperature, higher than 70 degrees, should put on extra flannels rather than more fuel into the range or furnace. The question of ventilation is even more difficult than that of heating. If one uses a stove the oxygen in the room must supply the fire as well as the lungs of the inmates, and unless it is constantly re-inforced from the outside it will become exhausted, and the air of the room will be unfit to breathe, both from the exhaustion of the oxygen and from the exhalations from the bodies of those who live in it. A good way to ventilate is to close the doors between the living room and the one adjoining; then close the windows and open the connecting doors. This has been used with success in the case of invalids. Another way is to raise one of the sashes a few inches, and have a strip of wood fitted snugly in below the sash. Condition of Port Stanley Harbon Discussed by the Board of Trade,

A Deputation to Visit Ottawa on the Subject—Postal and Railway Facil-ities—The Port Stanley Railway Lease.

The Board of Trade met last night, there being present: Messrs. T. H. Marsh (presi dent), J. W. Little, John Bland, W. M. Gunn, S. Grigg, E. Cleghorn, M. Masuret, J. S. Pearce, S. F. Glass, W. M. Gartshore, John Bowman, J. Houston, J. Glass, J. S. Pearce, G. Cameron, L. H. Ingram, L. K. Cameron, John Green, John Campbell, Mayor Taylor, C. B. Hunt, A. Beck, A. E. Pavey, F. Wright and others.

The following nominees for membership were balloted for and elected: Messrs. O. E. Brener, J. T. Jeffers, W. H. Heard, H. A. Kingsmill, Geo. F. Burns, P. H. D. Broderick, W. C. L. Gill.

Mr. Marsh said that Mr. Cowan and himself had attended a call for a meeting of the Societies, Committee, but as no one else was

The Chairman then said that the object of the meeting was to consider the question of repairs to Port Stanley harbor. Capt Pollock had promised to be present, bit was unable to come owing to sickness.

Mayor Taylor then described the condition of the harbor, which he said was going to pieces, and it was impossible for vessels to enter during rough weather, there being only nine feet of water, in place of fifteen feet as formerly. The Mayor then went on to explain the advantages of the port, and suggested a deputation to wait on the Government.

Mr. Bland asked what would be the use of fixing the harbor if the railway had a lease and would not collect freight.

Mayor Taylor said the lease would expire in two and a half years.

Mr. John Campbell believed that the value of the harbor to London had not been appreciated. It was easy to see the advantages of a seaport town. If the London and Port Stanley road were controlled by the city it would be better. He himself had opposed the leasing of the road, and since then the city had to pay \$75,000 for another railway into the city. As citizens and as a good thing to have the harbor put in repair. He would recommend that the President and Mr. W. J. Reid should be the deputation, along with the Mayor and Council and the other parties interested, to go Ottawa.

Mr. Wm. Gartshore seconded the motion. Mr. Campbell thought it would not. Mr. Green supported the remarks of Mr. Campbell said that with the harbor open freights would be much cheaper.

Mr. Beck asked what amount of freight was brought in when the vessels were running.

Mr. Campbell said there were three large vessels of the transportation company run-

ning.

Mr. Gartshore moved in amendment that it be referred to the Railway Committee. Carried.

Mr. S. F. Glass moved to have some action taken in the matter of jurisdiction of Division Courts. The Division Court could not deal with an account for goods sold outside the city. At present it was necessary to go to the town where the defendant resided with all the witnesses. It would be better if the defendant could be tendered mileage and brought to the local court

court.

The Secretary was instructed to confer with the Division Court Clerk and draw up a scheme for reforms in the matter.

Mr. Gartshore gave notice of motion as follows: That before making any new contracts for lights the City Council be recommended to have provision made for putting all electric light wires under ground; also, that provision be made for private service combining the arc and incandescent systems, as may be preferred for private use. In view of the improvements and developments in electric lighting, it is recommended that the greatest care should be exercised and action deferred if necessary until the best and least expensive system is fully demonstrated. Adjourned.
