The Constitutionality of the McKinley
Tariff Doubted-A Strong Legal
Protest in Preparation.

Protest in Preparation.

New York, Oct. 23.—The Times says:
"The protest against the operation of the McKinley tariff law is being prepared by counsel acting for a large number of the most prominent merchants of this city. They have been in correspondence with Senator McPherson, Senator Carlisle and the best legal talent of the country, the result of which is that they have determined to fight the bill on the following grounds:

1. That by the passage of the McKinley Bill the old tariff law of 1853 was not repealed.

2. That the alleged act, entitled "An act to relieve the revenue and cyulze duties on imports and for other purposes, purporting to the house of Representatives and the Senate has never been presented to the Presiden, according to the constitution, and has never been approved or signed by him.

§ This determination was arrived at after

s This determination was arrived at after a careful comparison of the law as alleged to have been passed and the law as it left the hands of the Conference Committee. It is claimed by the merchants who are preparing the protest that the restored clause of section 30, relating to drawbacks constituted an easential part of the bill as finally adopted by the Conference Committee, and that the document signed by the president of the McKinley Bill was not in fact the bill as it passed the House and Senate, and consequently the act is null and void.







Her mother was Lady Charlotte Gordon, daughter of Alexander, fourth Duke of Gordon—a title which was revived in 1876 in favor of her grandson, the present Duke of Richmond. Lady de Ros married, on June?, 1824, William Lennox Lascelles, twenty-third Baron de Ros, who died in January, 1874, when he was succeeded by his son, General Lord de Ros, who formerly commanded the First Life Guards, and is a Lord in Waiting for the Queen and the commanded the First Life Guards, and is a Lord in Waiting for the Queen and the Premier Baron of England. Two of Lady de Ros's sisters also survive—Lady Louisa Tighe, who will be 87 on Oct. 2, and Lady Sophia Georgiana Cecil, widow of the late Lord Thomas Cecil, who is in her 82 year.
