Lady Dufferin's New Book. London, July 18 .- The publication next Monday of a volume of songs and verse by Helen, Lady Dusserin, with a memoir by her son, the present famous statesman, will be interesting not only because a collection has never been made before, but because considerable new and intimate matter about the Sheridan family is expected. Lord Dufferin, it is said, has long dallied with the notion of writing a book about his far more diverting aunt, the Hon. Mrs. Norton, which would fill an even more conspicuous, long-felt want.

British Parliamentary Programme. London, July 18 .- The House of Commens was crowded today in anticipation of Sir William Harcourt's announcement of In an interview, Sir Charles Mills, delethe Government's programme for the remainder of the session. The Chancellor of the Exchequer was greeted with prolonged cheers as he arose to make the promised announcement. The time had come, he said, when it was necessary to consider how business could best be expedited and the session of Parliament closed. It was clearly impracticable to proceed with some of the great measures to which the Government was pledged, such as the Welsh Church Disestablishment Bill and the Local Veto Bill. The passage of these bills would constitute part of the work of the next session. Sir William Harcourt thought that the House, before being prorogued, could deal with the Evicted Tenants Bill, the Equalization of London Rates Bill, the Scotch Local Government Bill and the Miners' Eight-Hour Bill. The first of these, the Evicted Tenants Bill, was of pressing importance, and next in point of urgency was the Equalization of London Rates Bill. In addition to the foregoing measures he mentioned a number of minor bills, which, he said, the Government was hopeful of passing in season to enable the Parliament to

rise at the end of August. Mr. Balfour said he thought the Government's programme as outlined was better suited to the beginning than the ending of the session. There still remained about a month's business in dealing with the Suppiles Bill, which would leave four days for the consideration of four great measures, and many other which, though of lesser consequence, were still full of material for debate. Besides this, several members had prepared a series of questions concerning other measures which required careful attention.

Sir William Harcourt declined to make any other statement, and the House proceeded to the consideration of the army

Japs Assault a British Consul.

SHANGHAI, July 18 .- Advices from Seoul give a statement concerning the attack upon Consul-General Hillier, furnished by the Consul-General himself. Mr. Hillier war stopped by a crowd of Japanese soldiers, who demanded to know who he was and where he was going. Mr. Hillier replied by giving his official titles, whereupon several of the soldiers rushed upon him, beat him with their fists and dragged him almost 50 yards in the dirt. Mrs. Hillier, who was being borne in a chair, witnessed these indignities to her husband, and protested vehemently. Her remon-strances further enraged the soldiers, who scattered the chair-bearers and pushed the chair with Mrs. Hillier in it into the ditch. Consul-General Hillier made a formal complaint to the Japanese Minister at Seoul, at no apology was offered, nor can it be learned that the offending soldiers were

punished. From this statement it would seem that the report that an attack was made on the British consulate at Seoul is erroneous.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 18 .- Within a very few minutes after the conferees on the tariff bill met this afternoon Mr. Voorhees announced that it was apparent that the two Houses were unable to agree, and it was decided to report a general disagree-

Watterson, of Columbus, O. During the last Lenten season Bishop Watterson addressed a letter to the clergy of his diocese to be read before their congregations. The letter dwelt wholly with the temperance problem, and in the course of this pastoral communication Bishop Watterson said:

"I hereby withdraw my approbation from any and every Catholic society or branch or division thereof in this diocese they are forced to do so the pangs of that has a liquor dealer or saloon keeper at its head or anywhere among its officers, and I suspend every such society itself from the rank and privileges as a Catholic society until it ceases to be so officered."

To many of the people in the diocese of Columbia, this attitude of Bishop Watter. son seemed arrogant and unjust, and one of the societies laid the matter formally before Mgr. Satolli. After a time the apostolic returned an answer, upholding

the position of the bishop. Still the society was not satisfied and it was said that the delegate did not understand the case. The bishop heard of the expressed discontent and asked another society to take the matter up and present it once more at Washington, agreeing himself to sign the appeal from Archbishop Satolli's decision in order that the matter might be presented in the strongest light possible and that there might be no mis-

taking the outcome. To this second appeal the apostolic delegate has just responded. He reaffirms his first judgment, sustaining the position of Bishop Watterson, and says:

"1. Bishops have the right and duty to guard faith and morals within the limits of their diocese. They are divinely appointed judges in such matters and hence no mere society or individual layman has the right to set such decision at defiance. The mere fact that such decision may be the cause of temporal loss does not justify opposition, as the temporal must give way to bound Northern Pacific tr, the first the spiritual good and private good must give way to public good.

"2. The liquor traffic, and especially as conducted here in the United States, is a source of much evil; hence the bishop was acting within his rights in seeking to restrict it.

"3. Therefore the apostolic delegate sustains Bishop Watterson's action and approves of his circular letter and regulation regarding saloons and the expulsion of saloon-keepers from membership in Catholic societies."

Rev. Alexander P. Doyle, of Paulist fathers, general secretary of the Catholic Abstinence Union of America, said yesterday that the declaration of the apostolic delegate in the case of Bishop Watterson is the most important ever announced by the Ogden. They were jailed and entified as | Catholic Church in this country, and he thought its effect would be far reaching. Never before in the history of the Catholic Church in the United States, he said, had such an unqualified principle on the temperance question been laid down.

WORKINGMEN'S PLATFORM,

As Indorsed by the Glassworkers' Convention in Montreal.

MONTREAL, July 18.-The American Glaseworkers in convention here adopted the following resolution: "That the resolution passed at the labor convention in Chicago this year be adopted, laying down the following principles:

"That education be compulsory, a legal eight-hour week day and direct legislation; sanitary inspection of workshops, mine and home; liability of employers for injury to health, body or life of employes; the abolition of the contract system in all public works; the abolition of the sweating system; the municipal ownership of street cars, gas and electric plants for the public distribution of light, heat and power; the nationalization of telegraphs, telephones, railways and mines; the collective ownership by the people of all means of production and distribution; the principle of the referendum in all legislation."




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

NO ESCAPE FROM RESPONSIBILITY Some of the newspaper supporters of the Dominion Government are grumbling because the House of Commons has not finished its business, and are disposed, most unfairly, to throw the blame of a

summer session on the Liberals.

The initial cause of the summer session is traceable to the dalliance of the Government, which did not call the members together until many weeks after what is regarded as a reasonable time. Would honest representatives of the people be doing their duty if they let such rank scoundrelism passasthat which characterized the construction of the Curran bridge under Government auspices? TRY ALL ALIKE. As offenses under the Independence of Parliament Act are persistently winked at when the offender is on the side of the party in power at Ottawa, and desires to plead "not guilty," how would it do to relegate the trial of all such charges to the superior courts of the land? Formerly election trials were held by Parliament, but a Liberal Government changed the law. and the courts now conduct the investigations. If Mr. Turcotte, the Quebec M. P. charged with breaking the law, had been tried by an election court instead of by his associates in Parliament, he would have been unseated and compelled to face the

consequences of his acts. TO PREVENT STRIKES. The Government of Ontario has printed for distribution the measure for arbitration of labor disputes passed by it at the last session of the Legislature. This country has had comparatively few labor disputes, but it has not enjoyed entire immunity, and though there are differences of opinion regarding the best means of settling troubles of this nature when they do occur, no one can affirm that the Ontario authorities have not honestly endeavored to provide machinery whereby employer and employe may reach an amicable agreement as occasion arises. The Ontario law proasking what may happen to one in life, but vides for the constitution of courts of conciliation to act between master and man when their differences assume a serious phase. Some people profess skepticism regarding the possibility of settling labor disputes by means of arbitration. They will not even allow that Lord Rosebery's offices in settling the English miners' strike can be taken as a fair example of arbitration. They allege that both employers and employes in that trouble were tired of it, and welcomed an opportunity to have it ended. There may be some truth in that allegation, nevertheless we have a more recent example of arbitration in the settlement of the Boston building trades troubles last week. The builders of that city, along with those in 24 other centers of population, have a national association for promoting more peaceful relations with their employes. The scheme of the builders is to submit any difficulty about wages, hours, etc., to an umpire before the trouble gets to the acute stage of an actual collision or strike. Accordingly, when the Mason Builders' Association of Bostona while ago thought it necessary to cut wages 10 per cent because of the hard times and lack of work, and the Bricklayers' Union objected, the case was given to William Lloyd Garrison, an impartial outsider, to decide. After a full hearing from both parties Mr. Garrison gave a decision in favor of the bricklayers, and it will be acceded to by the builders.

Mr. Garrison's reasons for this decision are interesting. He ruled out as of little weight the bricklayers' contention that the building business was less affected by the hard times than almost any other; and also the point that as against a wage rate of 42 cents an hour for eight hours a day in Boston, Denver, Baltimore, New York and Indianapolis bricklayers were paid 50 cents, St. Louis 55, and Philadelphia 45-because, as Mr. Garrison said, conditions of labor in these various places might be very different, and the drift of workmen in the trade was rather toward than away from Boston, showing that the wage rate was not conclusive as to real earnings. But on the claim of the men that through the irregularity of work and the short season, the seemingly high wage rate brought in only about an average of \$11 to \$12 a week, or \$600 a year-a claim admitted to be true by the builders-Mr. these wages were none too high, and to lower them could not help the business much and would hurt the workmen. Such an amicable settlement of a labor dispute, in its initial stage, affords hope that the new Ontario law, though pernaps not all that advanced labor leaders would have liked, will prove of effective service in

ABOUT "SOLID" VOTES.

The Teronto correspondent of the Montreal Witness says that "the prevalent talk now among Liberals is that the Liberal party did not receive the support of either Roman Catholics or Prohibitionists to anything like the extent that was expected. So far from there being a 'solid' Roman Catholic vote, the vote was very much divided, a considerable portion of it going to the Conservatives, and a much larger proportion of it remaining unpolled. It is widely believed and alleged that the Liberals received fewer Catholic votes in 1894 than they did in 1890 or in 1886." The fact of the matter is, as the ADVERTISER pointed out during the campaign, there is no solid vote of any class or creed in the community, and it is just as well that there should be no solid vote. The Mowat Administration has been sustained on its general record as careful managers of public affairs and faithful defenders of Ontario's rights when they were assailed. It has had no solid vote either for it or against. 

How the People Are Robbed Under the Eyes of Government Officials -Bounty for Iron Makers - A Want of Confidence Amendment Lost-. 4 to 36.

(Special to the ADVERTISEL.) OTTAWA, July 18 .- In the public accounts committee this morning there was an interesting set-to between John Lorn McDougall, Auditor General, andMr. Hag-gart, Minister of Railways an Canals. Mr. Haggart made his first appearance as a financial expert. He introduced he question of accounts between the Domnion and the Provinces, and stated that seveal hundred thousand dollars had been pad out to the Provinces for interest on exces of debt over and above what they should hve been paid. He tried to show that the luditor-General was responsible for this erpr.

Mr. McDougall explained that a act of Parliament was passed in 1884 setting the basis and stating the principle surs upon which interest was to be paid to the Provinces. He calculated what he interest would be, and payment being ordered by Parliament and requesed by the Finance Department, was madeby the andit office.

SNAKE RIDES A BICYCLE.

Experiments and experience prove that a It Took an Ohio Scrpent, Ten Feet Long. to Persorm That Popular Feat, Ocean.)

Wm. Walton, one of the wheelmen who took part in the recent relay race across Ohio from Sandusky to Portsmouth, a distance of 214 miles, relates a remarkable adventure that befell him. Fiction is a back number compared with Mr. Walton's narrative, and were it not for the gentleman's high reputation for truthfulness and the confidence shown in him by those who know him best, there might be a chance for the incredulous to scoff. As it is, many persons are inclined to believe that another thrilling incident has been added to the strictly truthful and vouched for records of contemporary snake history.

Mr. Walton says that while going at a lively gait he reached the top of a long slope, which gradually dropped to the bed of a stream. When near the bottom of the hill he declared his speed must have been nearly a 25-mile gait, when he saw what he thought was a limb lying across the road. When it was too late he found it to be a snake about ten feet long, and just beyond it was a second reptile of nearly equal length. His wheel struck the nearer snake and went over it easily, but the reptile in some way gave warning to its companion, which raised its head and struck savagely at the shining spokes of the wheel.

The snake's head passed between the spokes near the hub and it fastened its fangs on the spokes at the opposite side. The rider was almost thrown from his wheel by the sudden shock, but he maintained his seat and made a successful effort to force the machine forward. The shining body of the serpent came in contact with the frame of the bicycle and the fangs still being attached to the further spokes, the long body of the snake was drawn within the wheel. The centrifugal force threw it out close to the tire, where it lay curled around the circumference of the wheel and held firmly in place by the centrifugal force. The rider dared not stop for fear of being bitten and was afraid of increasing his speed lest the snake should slip from the wheel and, becoming entangled, throw him to the ground. He noticed, however, that his speed was becoming gradually less, but attributed it to the fact that he was going up hill and to the added weight of the reptile; but as he reached the top of the hill he heard a scraping and hissing noise behind him. Turning to see the cause he was horrified to see that the second and larger snake was fastened to his bicycle and was holding on by its tail. The plucky wheelman at once saw that

he must increase his speed to keep away from his second enemy, and he strained every muscle to attain higher speed, but the long length of the snake dragging in the dust was proving too much for his already

tired muscles. As Mr. Walton had still two miles to go before he met the next relay he was becoming desparate. Glancing back again he saw that the snake had fastened its tail around the step by which a person mounts a bicycle. The step had sharp teeth on its upper side. The wheelman, taking in the situation, reached back with his foot and brought the heel of his shoe down forcibly upon the snake's tail, completely severing it and detaching the reptile from the bicycle. The snake hissed and started in pursuit, but the bicycle was easily kept in the lead. Meeting a farmer with a team the snake at once attacked them and was killed.

The bicyclist then had but a short distance to go and he finished his run. Waiting till the fresh relay got a good start he jumped from his wheel, allowing it to spin along up the road. Arming himself with a club he followed his wheel, but the snake did not emerge. An examination showed that it was dead and, in addition, was literally cut into small bits. The centrifugal force had been so great that it had forced the body of the snake deeper and deeper into the apex of the spekes and the snake was cut into chunks and had to be removed almost bit by bit.





Trouserings will be made to order Assessors in Cities. It is no longer the duty of assessors in cities to enter upon the assessment roll the names of persons who are entered only for the purpose of voting under the manhood franchise. Section two of the act respecting the registration of manhood suffrage and other voters in cities of the last session of the Ontario Legislature provides "that any assessor or assessment commissioner for any city shall not hereafter enter upon the assessment roll, the name of any person who is not liable to assessment for taxes, and the letters M. F. shall not hereafter be placed opposite the name of any person on the roll of any city unless such person is qualified to vote at municipal elections in such city as well as at elections for the Legislative Assembly." This section of the act will save assessors in cities very much labor. The act also dispenses with the revision of the manhood suffrage part of the voters' list every year, as now a revision of part three of the voters' list, namely that part which embraces those entitled to vote without property qualifications, is to take place only prior to an election, that is, ordinarily,
