Makes the Best of Seed Grain in the Estimation of the Russian Government.

Winnipeg, Sept. 25 .- Prof. Saunders, director of Canadian experimental farms, who accompanied the British scientists on their trip to the Pacific coast, is now returning east, and en route is visiting the experimental farms in the west. He left yesterday o inspect the progress made at the oneer farm established by the Onario Government at Dryden. "As a esult of the visit of a commissioner of agriculture from Russia," said Prof. Saunders, "who inspected the country during the summer, the government of that power has ordered ten tons of choice seed grain from the Dominion experimental farms, to be shipped o Vladivostock, in Siberia, and to be distributed among farmers there, in the hope of improving the grade of wheat in that territory." While in the city Prof. Saunders negotiated with the C. P. R. authorities for the transportation of the grain, which will be lected from wheat grown on Indian Head and Brandon farms. At Branion farm the record of the yields for the season were per acre: Wheat. 23 o 401/2 bushels; oats, 39 to 78 bushels; barley, 36 to 46 bushels; peas, 36 to 4 bushels. At Indian Head-Wheat, 23 to 42 bushels; oats, 50 to 101 bushels; barley, 49 to 77 bushels; peas, 20 to 4 bushels.

### THE BAKERS DOZEN.

How the Cook Shop Man Was Forced to Put an Extra Cookie in the Bag.

Everybody knows that 13 is a "baker's dozen," but everybody does not know why. The origin of the phrase "baker's dozen" is commonly attributed to a custom that prevailed among British bakers in the days when severe penalties were inflicted upon tradesmen who cheated their customers with short weight or short measure, says the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle A dozen cakes or rolls or loaves might easily fall short of the standard weight, so in order to guard themselves against the risk of indirectly incur-ring the penalties of the short-weight statutes without going to the trouble of weighing everything they sold the bakers added an extra cake or roll or loaf as a makeweight to every dozen cakes or rolls or loaves delivered to a customer. This explanation is unsatisfactory. It is disappointingly prosaic, fact that the "baker's dozen" is also commonly known as the "devil's

A better explanation is to be found in the legend that gives the phrase an American origin. It is not wholly devoid of picturesqueness; it suggests the reason why "baker's dozen" and 'devil's dozen" are synonyms, and it carries rather a good moral with it. The story is somewhat as follows: In the middle of the seventeenth century the most famous baker in the New Netherlands was Jan Pietersen, who had come to Fort Orange from Amsterdam, and was the first man in the new world to make those flat, oblong, ornamentally stamped, with-caraway-seeds - liberally-besprinkled, crisp, toothsome cookies, familiar to all the New Yorkers who were children in the days before all the Dutch customs sank into disuse, under the name of "New Year's cakes," Pietersen was a just man, but his justice was never tempered with liberality. With him a dozen was a dozen, neither more nor less. Also a pennyworth was worth a he parted with no penny-Worth of his save in consideration of a penny had and received in exchange. The saint departed. In walked the old woman with her demand for the extra cooky to make up her dozen. It was handed to her and she vanished, crying: "The spell is broken; from this time on thirteen is a dozen." Jan Pietersen never forgot his lesson. Through a long and prosperous career he always gave thirteen the dozen and ascribed his success to that practice. So his custom became the custom of his trade, and thirteen was the "baker's dozen."

# ONTARIO LOG LAW.

The Prohibition of Raw Material Still an Open Question.

Toronto, Sept. 24.-Of the action of the Ontario government in practically prohibiting the importance of foreign labor and supplies in connection with the manufacture of saw logs within the province, Hon. George W. Ross, minister of education, said that the passage of Tuesday's order-in-council did not mean that the government had decided not to interfere with the export of saw

logs.
"That," said Mr. Ross, "is another question altogether, and we still have it under consideration. We are waiting up our minds about it. The lumbermen themselves are not of one mind as to what should be done. Some owners of timber berths wish to see things left as they are, while others want us to step in and prevent the exportation of logs." As to whether the government was likely to come to a decision soon in the premises, Mr. Ross said he could not say, adding: "We have to try to avoid appearing too anxious against the States, and then there is the circumstance that the present timber berth leases do not run out until April 1. It would seem hardly fair to impose restrictions regarding these leases, which were let unconditionally."

The lamentable feature of the fire was the unfortunate accident that folowed. A large crowd had gathered in the vicinity. The firemen were work-ing at the fire from Victoria street, carrying the lines of hose over buildings to the rear of the Bijou, and Waterous engine was attached to a hydrant at the southeast corner of Adelaide and Victoria streets, and the horses were not detached, as is usually the custom. The noise of the steam scaping from the engine frightened frantic break in a southerly direction.
A dense crowd of men, women and children was right in their pathway. The horses made a bolt straight for the building at the southwest corner, knocking down and trampling upon every person in their way. The crowd was so thick that the horses could hardly make any headway. Driver Whiteside and Fireman Atkinson leavored to stop them. 

The Pioneer brings a report of a landslide, which occurred ear Sheep Camp, on the Chilkoot Pass, last Sunday morning, in which eighteen men are said to have lost their lives. Only one body is said to have been recovered—that of a man named Choyn-ski, a cousin of Joe Choynski, the prize-The men supposed to been lost were packers on the Dyea

The officers of the Pioneer say that the story was brought to Skaguay or Sunday evening by three men, who old it in such a way as to leave no doubt as to its truthfulness. They described the avalanche as consisting of rocks, ice and dirt, which had been loosened by the hard rain which had been falling continuously for the past month. All the bridges on the Skaguay River have been washed out and the

# Trade Across the Border.

The Yellow Fever Quarantine Restricts Business.

Advance in Iron and Steel - Better Feeling in Industrial Lines-Good Reports From Canada.

New York, Sept. 25. - Bradstreet's eekly review says: There is a check o the onward sweep of demand in stalines, so noticeable throughout the ountry for the past six weeks. The yellow fever quarantine, which ktends from Texas to Georgia, has ought wholesale business to a practical standstill throughout the greater portion of the region embraced by the Gulf States. At centers of distribution in Eastern, Middle and Central Western States, the recent activity in drygoods, hats and hardware has fallen off, but in the Northwest and on the Pacific coast buying by interior merchants and the free distribution of merchandise continue to be features. Demand for heavy textile fabrics has been stimulated

Favorable changes of the week are found in sharp advances in prices for iron and steel. The increased volume of general trade is also stimulated by continued heavy movement of cereals to tide-water, the almost unprecedented large quantities exported each week, and the increased number o ople finding employment in indu trial and commercial lines, as con pared with a year ago, together w abroad. There are 237 business faures reported throughout the Unit States this week, compared with 186 last week, and 321 in the third week in September, 1896.

IN CANADA.

Advices from Montreal report a beter feeling in trade circles, and from ronto that business is more active and farm products continue to bring good prices. The distribution of mer-chandise at Halifax meets anticipaions, and at St. John, N. B., the exhibition has drawn many visitors and stimulated sales of merchandise.
