London, June 5.—President Roosevelt's message to Congress on the meat scandal as substantially confirming some, if not the worst, of the charges against the packers, is the subject of general editorial discussion in the London newspapers this morning, and is used as a warning to British consumers to avoid all American products of the kind until a sweeping reform is established.

The papers urge the public to pay no attention to assertions that meat products for export are any better inspected than those for American consumption, and while the President's courage in attacking while the President's courage in attacking the scandal is highly praised, the public is counseled to purchase only British or colonial products.

will not expect our confidence in the wholesomeness of their food products to be restored for many a long year."

inadequate appropriation the department of agriculture is not even able to place inspectors in all establishments desiring them. The present law prohibits the shipment of uninspected meat to foreign countries, but there is no provision forbidding the shipment of uninspected meats in inter-state commerce, and thus the avenues of inter-state commerce are left open to traffic in diseased or spoiled meats. If as has been alleged on seemingly good authority further evils exist, such as the improper use of chemicals and dyes, the Government lacks power to remedy them. A law is needed which will enable the inspectors of the general government to inspect and supervise from the hoof to the can, the preparation of the meat food product. Their report was sufficient to show that Sinclair's book was not wholly fiction, and the President at once commissioned Charles Neill, commissioner of labor, and James Bronson Reynolds, to make an independent and more searching investigation. He also caused to be introduced in Congress a bill which revolutionized the methods of inspection in the stock yards and packing

This bill went through without debate, and it was suggested by the newspapers that it was not opposed by the beef trust and its representatives in Congress because the President had agreed to withhold the damaging evidence collected by Messrs. Reynolds and Neill. Since then there have been angry protests on all sides against the suppression of the report which the President has now given to the public.

A 20-foot canal would permit the passage of boats carrying 400,000 bushels of grain, which, at 3 cents per bushel from Duluth to Montreal, would net \$12,000, a profitable trip.

This would afford the best route to the seaboard for the products of the west, both Canadian and American, from all points north of Kansas City, He said if it were built, the bulk of the trade north of Kansas City would follow the line of the least resistance, and go by the St. Law-

The canal, he had been informed, could be built for \$55,000,000. Speaking of the invasion of the Canadian west, he said the Canadian Pacific controlled 2,200 miles of railways in the United States, and it would be only fair that Americans should control some railroads in the

He gave the advice that Canada should not be in a hurry to settle the Northwest, but should select her population for it and keep the land for the people who would live on it.

He thought the Northwest capable of supporting comfortably a population of fifteen or twenty million peo-



### Society Matters and One Is Fined.

Some time ago John Anderson (cola severe scalp wound. William Groat was arrested, tried and discharged, but court this morning, and pleaded not journed sine die. guilty to the charge of assaulting Anderson with a weapon.

Anderson was called, and he told of how he had gone to Mr. Hurst's house on the night of the alleged assault. The prisoner Isaac Groat, William Groat and another man, whom he did not know, were there. Anderson and isaac Groat were both Knights of Pythias, and when the prisoner tried to give him (Anderson) some "pass words" and "grips" the "fuss" commenced. Anderson asked the prisoner, why he struck him, but the "fuss" continued and both William Groat and the prisoner attacked Anderson, who sustained the wound on the head. Anderson did not know exactly what he was hit with, but it was some blunt instrument, he said. He did not know whose hands the weapon was in. George Hurst, in whose house the row took place, told of the commencement of the trouble and how he had warned them against "fussing" in his house, and finally turned them out. After a while Anderson came back with a wound on his head and said that someone had struck him with something more than a fist, and that he was going to the hospital. Hurst saw William Groat take Isaac, the prisoner, away, and that was all he knew about

Groat took the stand and gave evidence in his own behalf. He told of the row, and admitted assaulting Anderson by striking him with his fist, but denied using an instrument. He admitted drinking that day. His reason for the assault was that Anderson had insulted his brother William. When asked why he left town after the assault, and where he had gone, he said that he had secured a position on the steamer Huronic, and while working there had heard of the affair, and came back like a man to stand his

None of the witnesses denied that there had been considerable drinking, and as there was no proof that Isaac Groat had struck Anderson with anyother than his fist, he was convicted of common assault, and fined \$5 and \$4 50 costs or one month in jail.




