NOAH'S LIFE IN THE BALANCE JURY OUT NINETEEN HOURS

Crown and the Defense Concluded Their Cases at Seven o'Clock Last Night—Judge's Charge Impartial.

IS RUMORED THAT THE JURY IS EQUALLY DIVIDED

Six Are for Manslaughter and Six for Acquittal-Mr. Edmund Meredith Made Eloquent Plea for the Indian's Life-Prosecution Said Deal Out Justice, Not Mercy.

After deliberating 19 hours, from 7 o'clock last night until 2 o'clock today, the jury in the Noah murder case is still out, and is apparently no learer a verdict than when it began to deliberate.

It was rumored this morning that the jury stood 6 for acquittal and 6 r conviction for manslaughter.

The testimony of J. B. Wolfe, Noah's uncle, virtually proved an alibi for Noah, if it could be accepted in the face of the alleged circumstantial evidence and Dolson's evidence against Noah. A BIG SURPRISE.

It has been learned that the prosecution was taken by surprise when Wolfe took the stand, and that no preparation had been made to meet his

The prosecution, of course, tried to cross-counter this blow by attemptng to show that Wolfe had not been present at the dance.

Negative evidence, however, counts for little in a court of law, and while the defense only succeeded in producing a witness who "thought" that he had seen Wolfe at the dance on May 2," the evidence was more convincing, perhaps, in the eyes of the law than that of several crown witnesses who had not seen Wolfe present.

However, in the event of a disagreement, the crown would be in a position to prove, if it could, that Wolfe was not at hand the night of the

The crime with which Noah was charged was seemingly an unpremeditated one, but was, nevertheless, cold-blooded. No evidence was adduced at the trial or at the hearings to show that

Fox or Noah had been aught but the best of friends previous to the night of the tragedy, and no apparent cause for the crime was brought out by the prosecution, beyond the fact that Fox had been drinking on the night

Noah had always enjoyed the best of reputations previously, and was lever known to have been quarrelsome.

HISTORY OF THE CRIME. The history of the crime can be put forth in very few words. Thomas Noah and Absalom Fox, both Muncey Indians, had attended a dance held in an empty house owned by a Mrs. Delarey on the night of May 2.

Some time after 1:30 o'clock on the following morning, Noah and a wor man named Annie Fisher left the place and seated themselv standing in the road opposite the house.

HEAVY SENTENCE FOR APACHES

The Montreal Authorities Multc Three Parisian Thugs With Nineteen Years.

Montreal, Jan. 8 .- Sentences amounting in all to 19 years' penal selvitude were imposed upon three men in Montreal today. The names of the prisoners are Auguste Baulne, Emile Ardoine and Leon Lafargue, a trio of "Apaches" from Paris, whom the police regard as being of a particular dangerous char-

Baulne and Ardoin first appeared before Judge Choquet to be sentenced for having stored explosives in their





Famous Stone Instrumental in Wrecking a Big New York Gem House.

New York, Jan. 9 .- When the firms of Joseph Frankel's Sons, Joseph Frankel's Sons Company, Gattle, Ettinger & Hammel and E. M. Gattle & Co., among the largest importers in the United States, put their business in the hands of trustees, another was added to the long list of tragedies that have marked the story of the Hope diamond for the last 250 years.

The Hope diamond to some extent is the cause of the embarrassment. It is worth \$250,000, and there has been no one in the United States to buy such a costly gem. Weighing 441/2 carats and of a brilliant blue, it has been for 250 years one of the famous gems of Europe and America. How many years before that it was famous in India is not known, for it did not come from that land till 1642 Seven years ago Simon Frankel bought it. and there have been many negotiations looking toward its sale, but all

of them have fallen through. Stone Leaves India.

The diamond was brought from India by Tavernier, a Parisian jeweler. and eventually was bought for the crown of Louis XIV. For more than 100 years it remained a possession of the reigning family of France. During the revolution it, with other crown jewels, was placed in the Garde Meuble, and the later the last king who had worn it was guillotined.Louis XVI. took off his crown that was ornamented by this precious gem to walk to his death.

The diamond was never recovered by the Government of France. During the revolution it was stolen and for more than a quarter of a century was lost. When it appeared again it had been reduced in size from 112 carats to 67% carats. It was offered for sale by Daniel Eliason in 1830, and was purchased by Henry Thomas Hope, of London. When he exhibited it in the London exhibition of 1851 the British public for the first time saw this remarkable gem.

In Family Many Years.

The Hope heirs held possession of for many years, during which the estate was the subject of long litigation in the court of chancery. Not untit 1901 were the heirs in a position to sell it. Then, after negotiations, Mr. Frankel purchased it and brought it to the United States.

Since then the \$250,000 diamond has formed one of the important assets of the Frankel firm. But it has been \ something of a dead asset. It is be lieved that had the Frankels been able to realize on the investment they could have tided over their financial troubles. and it is likely that the other firms would have been able to pull through.




