

The first duty of the commissioners is to test and determine the qualification of candidates for the service, and to furnish certificates of merit, or of sought or where an exceptional salary increase is applied for. It will also be the duty of the commissioners, whenever the head of a department, through order-in-council, asks for their services, to examine into the management or organization of such department, to perform that service and report upon the subject to the governor-in-council.

The act makes all appointments to the service probationary, the necessity is remembered that only by competitive examination is entry into the service possible. Besides, there may be exceptional cases where an applicant who has very creditably passed an exexamination may, from some cause or other, not prove a success in practical work. Such cases are met by a provision of the act which enables the officers of the department, after two months' trial, and before the expiration of six months, if they have reasonable ground for so doing, to report to the commission that the clerk is unfitted for the work to which he has been assigned. If the commission considers the ground alleged renders the clerk unfitted for any other work in the Government service, his name will be removed from the list; but if the reason for his rejection by the officers of one department leaves ground for the belief that it was on account of his tour by four premiers, but that is something peculiar in the department as near premiership as he will get. or in the work to which he was assigned, rather than any disability on his part, then the commission may assign him to the vacancy.


